Englina Press Expresses Opinion That Proposal Is Almost Certain To Be Accepted by Peace Conference—Sinking HIPON COUNTY of Ships Would, It Is Argued, Eliminate Heartburnings Due to Their Division.

BRITAIN INSISTS ON DESTRUCTION. Paris, Feb. 22 .- (By the Associated Press) .- Out of the great umber of contradictory statements being made public concerning the disposition of German warships which have been seized, this much may be accepted as a definite official fact:

Great Britain insists that these ships be destroyed. This proposition, it is understood, will be put before the supreme war council as a part of the British proposals for definite peace terms. The published assertion that these ships will be destroyed would seem premature, since there is considerable opposition to the plan, especially on the part of France.

Opposition has been voiced in various quarters to the destruction of ships on the ground that they present, not only a military force, but also material required for industrial purposes. In this connection, one important feature of the British plan has not been

Great Britain does not propose to destroy the engines or other parts of the ships which have industrial importance. She would remove these parts before the ships were sunk.

London, Feb. 22.-The proposal to sink the German warships now in the Scapa Flow, it is now generally stated in the English newspapers, is practically certain to be accepted by the peace conference. It is also proposed, it is said, to raze the Island of Helgoland to the water level. According to the Mail, both proposals, which originated in the British admiralty, will be discussed at Paris in the next few days. The destruction of the ships is advocated on the ground that their division among the victors would cause heartburnings. The question of dealing with the surrendered submarines will be considered separately, whether

they shall be sunk or preserved.

Another point for which the British naval delegates will press at the peace conference, says the Mail, will be the razing of Heigoland. This would be a stupendous undertaking, as the Island is about onefifth of a mile square and at its highest point one hundred and ninety feet, while the coast is fortified with concrete and steel. An enormous quantity of explosives would be required, but, continues the newspaner 'it would be the best way of consuming the German reserves of high

After destroying the fortifications at Kiel, assuming the British ontention for this action is accepted, the canal, the Mall says, could be handed over to a private company on the same lines as the Suez.

AGED PREMIER WITH BULLET IN HIS BACK CONFERS WITH FORTY PERSONS

Paris, Feb. 22.—Premier Clemenceau was able to rest well during the night, and seemingly suffered no adverse effects from his exertions yesterday, which caused considerable anxiety to his physicians and family. During the day he saw no less than forty persons, which the doctors considered excessive for a man of his age with a bullet in his back, but M. Clemenceau is an arbitrary gentleman, who does exactly as he pleases. arbitrary gentleman, who does exactly as he pleases.

All the physicians agreed that the action of the premier's lungs should be reduced as much as possible, as movement causes the edges of the wound to rub against each other. The only way of effecting this was an injection of morphine, which no one cared to propose to the premier, foreseeing how he would oppose the suggestion. At last Dr. Laubry volunteered, says the Petit Journal. He appealed to the premier as a "brother doctor," but M. Clemenceau sprang up, seized the physician by the shoulders and shouted: "What! What! Morphine! You want to finish me? Are you in the pay of the Bolshevik?" Dr. Laubry threw up his hands and said: "There you are. We want to give your chest rest, and you've nearly burst it!"


Arthur H. Keene Will Place Rare Beasts On Farm.



This is not the sign of a new make of car, but of any old or new car whose owner has expressed a willingness to place it at the disposal of returned soldiers, for the purpose of taking them to their homes or elsewhere when they arrive in the city.

The sign of the red heart was designated by the reception committee of the soldiers' aid commission at a meeting yesterday afternoon, and, "the car with a heart" was adopted as a slogan. The intention of the committee is to provide a red heart, to be affixed to the windshield, to every citizen who owns an automobile and is willing to use it to help in the work of demonstrating to returned soldiers that the people of London are glad to see them home again and anxious to do everything possible for them.

David's estimate of the sincerity of his newly found political friend is seen in his utter dejection and sorrow—he, the king, following the bier, weeping as he went—surely the greatest honor ever paid to the memory of an Oriental subject. Pilsudski's strength lies in his popularity with the army. One factor in the election fight is the question of the responsibility for the failure to send the Polish army in France under Gen. Haller to Poland. Pilsudski's friends realize, however, that Paderewski is in favor with the Allied governments, but they are hopeful that some event will arise to diminish 'the pianist-statesman's popularity.




