BISLEY TEAM FOR 1907

Placed in First Stage of Governor-General's Match.

Weather Was Not the Best, But the Shooting Was Magnificent—Sergeant Brayshaw of British Columbia Made Grand Score of 321, Which Was Nine Points More Than Was Made Last Year—Other Matches.

Ottawa, Sept. 1.—The twenty men for the Bisley team found their places yesterday at the finish of the first stage of the Governor-General's match in the D. R. A. The weather was again not of the best, yet the shooting was magnificent.

The twenty men who composed the team, with their scores, are: N. R. A. silver medal and \$20—B. C. Brayshaw, 5th C. A., Victoria, B. C. 321. D. R. A. silver medal and \$18—Sgt. C. R. Crowe, 36th, Guelph, 320. D. R. A. bronze medal and \$15—Sgt. S. Sgt. A. Graham, 48th Highlanders, Toronto, 319. \$10—Sgt. W. H. Foubill, 90th Winnipeg, 317. \$10—Sgt. F. H. Morris, 46th Bowmanville, 317. \$8—Lt. T. Cunningham, 6th, 314. O. R. Vancouver, 314.

For Collision in B. C. Waters—Damage Suits Will Result. Vancouver, Sept. 1.—The court of enquiry appointed by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries to investigate the cause of the collision between C. P. R. steamship Princess Victoria and Union steamship tug Chehalis on July 21, in the harbor here, in which ten lives were lost, concluded yesterday.

Runaway Cars Wrecked. Toronto, Sept. 1.—A serious accident was narrowly averted on the James Bay Railway. Five flat cars got away from Road Hill Station when a train was shunting other cars. A. W. A. grade from there to Toronto. The cars went as far as Duncan Station, about nine miles south of here. They had attained a speed of 50 or 60 miles an hour, and collided with engine 364. Result of the Meat Scandals on the British Workman. Ottawa, Sept. 1.—Weddell & Co., London, Eng., importers of dairy products, in a communication to the Trade and Commerce Department, pay a high tribute to the value of Canada's cheese. In their review of the last fiscal year they say that cheese on the British workman's table was being displaced by frozen mutton and beef until the Chicago disclosures came, which had the effect of driving the people back to cheese, of which all other countries and colonies combined contributed only 33,000 tons. The quality of Canadian cheese last year was improved.

George Ham's Versatility. Wherever George Ham, the veteran newspaper man, and representative of the Canadian Pacific Railway, goes there is sure to be a trail of stories. Here are a couple of them, the first told by The Nelson Herald: "When George Ham, the well-known C. P. R. official, was in Nelson last week, a deputation waited upon him and urged in eloquent language that the C. P. R. should build an hotel in the city to accommodate the tourist trade. George listened patiently to the harangue and its close remarked: 'Well, I don't think the C. P. R. can afford to put up an hotel here, but I'll put his hand in his pocket and pull out an imitation \$100,000 bill given to him as an ad for Saskatoon and handed it to the leader of the deputation. I am glad to contribute personally this amount towards the scheme.' Nothing more was said about the hotel."

Lord Chancellor and Motorists. Sitting in the Court of Appeal at the law courts, and giving judgment in a matter which arose out of personal injuries inflicted on a cyclist by a motor-car, the Lord Chancellor said it was desirable that drivers of motor-cars, as well as of other vehicles, should realize that not only able-bodied people, but deaf, blind and nervous people, decrepit, old people and children, were quite as much entitled to the use of the King's highway as they, and that if anyone thought proper so to drive that there was no chance left of averting serious consequences, and a mistake of judgment or miscalculation be made by a wayfarer, the driver would have to pay for it in damages.

STRANGE FIND IN A CAVE.

Skeleton and Old Books—New Brunswick Men Discover Traces of Dwelling Used 200 Years Ago. A remarkable discovery was made on a recent Sunday afternoon, by Charles E. Stewart and his uncle, J. E. Stewart, near Johnville, N. B., about eight miles back of the village of Bath, where the bones of a human being were found in a blocked cave. The Stewarts, who have long been desirous of investigating, went to the cave, and with dynamite the obstruction to the cave was demolished. The men found twelve stone steps leading to a passage seven feet long and two feet wide, this opening into a main room about twelve feet square, where they found the bones of a human being lying on a bunk of stone flesh was there and the bones were dry and crumbly. Near the bones was a gold ring on which was inscribed "John Long, Dec. 1773." A few inches away was a silver watch, which bore the date 1740. Underneath the bones were found several traces of coarse red hair, which would indicate that the body had lain on a skin or something of that nature. Underneath the bunk were found three books, two in Latin, the third written in English.

One of the Latin books was Suetonius' History of Rome, dated 1667, and on the fly leaf were several Latin inscriptions. Inside was written: "B. A. Strong, Oxford College, May 24, 1676." Underneath this appeared the name James Hayward, 1685. The other book was Seneca's Tragedies, and it was marked the date 1653.

In the English book was written the name of David Fowles and Michael Carney. Around the books, which were in a good state of preservation, was a large piece of bark on which were marks believed to be plants or implements. At one end of the little hole in the rock was an old fireplace. What this signifies the people here do not know, but the investigation will be continued.

Ploughed Up Old Coin. William White ploughed up an old Spanish silver coin of Charles III, dated 1787, on his farm in the Township of Matilda. The date coincides with that of the first settlement of the district by U. E. Loyalists from Mohawk Valley. The coin is in a good state of preservation, about the size of a 50-cent piece and is one of the last issued by Charles III.
