READ REGULATIONS

1. A. R. A. Rules will govern unless otherwise provided for.

2. Short service rifles will not be permitted to fire at 800, 900 and 1,000 yards.

3. Challenges: A fee of 5c will be charged for all challenges.

4. No competitor will be allowed to shoot on the Range unless he has fired his preliminary practice on the Gallery.

5. No one but the Range Officer or someone appointed by him, will be permitted to use the telephone to the Butts.

6. Shooting to start at 1.30 p.m. and the 200 range will close at 3 p. m.

7. A first-class spoon will be given on Saturday afternoons only. Second-class spoons will be given on Wednesday evenings and Saturday afternoons at short ranges.

PRIZES.

No. 1.

The Association will present Sterling Silver Spoons, suitably engraved, for first and second class shots, commencing April 12th, and ending October 4th, as per dates on last page. Each competitor winning a spoon will be handicapped 5 points.

No. 2.

REGIMENTAL COACHING MATCH.

Prizes donated by Lt.-Col. W. C. G. Armstrong. Ranges 200, 500 and 600 yards.

Rounds 7, and sighter at each range.

Teams of Two. (One first-class shot and one second-class shot.)

Highest aggregate of eight shoots to be declared winners in their respective classes.

A first-class competitor shall select a second-class competitor to form a team, and the combined scores of the two competitors shall be the score for each member of the team for this shoot.

No competitors shall shoot as a team together more than once during the same season.

Coaching will be permitted by members of the respective teams. No others will be permitted to coach.

Claim cards will be provided for each competitor, and may be had upon application to the Hon. Sec. Lieut. J. S. Gilker.

Each competitor must hand into the Hon. Sec. at the finish of the competition a claim card, correctly filled in, and signed; no notice will be taken of any scores made, unless this rule is complied with. Any error in claim card may invalidate the com-

petitor. The first-class shot shall hand into the secretary the names of his team before the match starts. The competition will be open during the whole of the regular season, all scores to be made on the same date and time. The first-class shot may elect to fire his range before the second-class shot, so as to enable him to coach, if he so desires. The committee may amend the above rules, but not so as to alter the principle of the match.

SPECIAL PRIZE.

No. 3.

Should a second-class shot be moved up into the first-class before the close of the competition, and thus be not permitted to finish his scores, a special prize will be given to the competitor having the highest aggregate of eight scores at the said ranges. All of the scores made in the competition previous to competitor being moved up into the higher class, must be counted in this aggregate.

No. 4.

OFFICERS' COMPETITION

Prizes donated by Mrs. Col. W. C. G. Armstrong.

Open to Officers only—First-class.

A special prize will be given to the Officer making the highest aggregate score in four shoots at 200, 500 and

600 yards, and four shoots at 800, 900 and 1,000 yards.

Scores to be made at the shorter ranges on same dates and times as the Coaching Team Match, the longer ranges to be fired on the regular afternoon long range competitions.

No. 5

Second Class

A special prize will be given to the Officer making the highest aggregate score in six competitions at 200, 500 and 600 yards, during the season, and in the regular shooting hours. Should the Officer be moved up into the first-class during the season, scores made in the second class shall count in this competition, any scores necessary to finish the competition shall be made at the same time and dates as the Coaching Team Match.

No. 6.

AGGREGATE MATCH.

Second Class Shots.

Prizes donated by Mrs. Col. W. C. G. Armstrong.

A special prize will be given to the second-class shot making the highest aggregate during the season at the short ranges. Made in regular shooting hours and the first score on any one day to count. All scores must be made with the short service rifle as issued.

No. 7.

A match rifle presented by Capt. G. W. Morfitt.

Open to duty Srgts. to be won by the competitor making the highest aggregate of six shoots at 200, 500 and 600 yards, during the season.

No. 8.

A Field Telescope, presented by Major H. J. Robie.

Open to duty Srgts. as a second prize, conditions as No. 7 match.

No. 9.

A valuable prize presented by Capt. E. S. Sales.

Open to second class shots, to be won by the competitor making the highest aggregate of six scores at 200 yards; six scores at 500 yards, and six scores at 600 yards.

No. 10.

A gold medal presented by Amb. Srgt. A. Martin.

To be won by the competitor having the highest aggregate of two scores. One score at 200, 500 and 600 yards, and one score at 800, 900 and 1,000 yards.

No. 11.

A challenge trophy, presented by Q.M. Srgt. F. W. Herring.

Open to all sergeants in the regiment, to be won by the competitor having the highest aggregate of eight scores at 200, 500 and 600 yards

and one score at 800, 900 and 1,000 yards.

No. 12.

A medal, presented by Staff Srgt. A. R. Carmichael.

Open to second-class shots, below the rank of sergeant, to be won by the competitor having the highest aggregate of six scores at 200, 500 and 600 yards.

No. 13.

OTTAWA PRIZE

Presented by Lt. Col. W. C. G. Armstrong. Open to any member of the 103rd Regiment not having competed at Ottawa meeting of the Dominion Rifle Association.

Transportation to Ottawa and return, with entrance fees to the regular squaddled matches will be furnished to the successful competitor.

To be won by the competitor shooting in the Alberta Provincial Rifle meeting and having the highest place in the Ottawa aggregate and not winning a place on the Alberta Provincial Rifle team.

No. 14.

103rd REGIMENT PLATE MATCH

Challenge trophy and five individual prizes presented by Lt. Col. W. C. G. Armstrong. Open to teams of five from the different companies. One or more teams may enter from each

company. Distance not more than 500 yards or less than 200 yards. Targets, one plate for each competitor.

Teams will line up at distance selected and at the sound of the bugle, will load and fire one round, and when all have fired will move forward at the sound of the bugle, not faster than a walk and all teams must keep in line. At the sound of the bugle all teams will immediately halt, load and fire one round, and will then act as in first instance. On arriving at 200 yards, teams will then fire until one is declared the winner and will cease fire with the bugle.

Immediately one of the plates allotted to any team is shot down, one member commencing from the left of the team must fall out and must not fire after the plate is down or team will be disqualified.

The team having the last plate up will be declared the winner. Service rifles as issued must be used and individual loading. Rifles must be empty when teams are advancing.

No. 15.

MASON TROPHY

And Five Individual Prizes.

A challenge trophy and five individual prizes presented by Major E. G. Mason.

1. To be competed for annually by teams of five from each company, including one officer.

2. Every competitor must be a bona fide member of the company for which he competes, and have attended at least 60 per cent. of the regimental parades for the year, and have attended the annual muster roll call.

3. Ranges, 300, 500 and 600 yards.

4. Rounds, 7 at each range and one sighter.

5. The company winning the trophy the greatest number of times in ten years to become the permanent possessors of the trophy.

6. Five individual prizes will be provided by the donor for the winning team.

No. 16.

C. Co. CHALLENGE TROPHY

Donated to the 103rd Regiment by Officers of C. Company.

Range 2, 5 and 600 yards.

Rounds, 7 and sighter at each range.

Teams, 10 men.

Trophy to be competed for annually by teams of ten members from each company, officers, non. coms. or men.

Company winning the trophy three years in succession to become permanent possessors of the trophy.
