PALERMO, Nov. 9th, 1860. My DEAR SIR. - When the word of God was first offered for sale in the city of Naples, the people seemed slow to realize the liberty which the overthrow of the oppressive Government had accorded to them, and many hesitated to purchase it, for, they said, it was a prohibited book.
