Night Blooming Cereus. (Cereus Grandiflorus).

No description can do justice to this wonder ul flower. It is of large size, great beauty, pleasant perfume, and most peculiar habit. Belonging to the cactus family, the plant is " without comeliness," and of singular formation. It blooms annually, but only in the night, each flower commencing to open about sun down, fully expanding by 11 o'clock and closing forever at the approach of day.

The flower varies in size, from nine to twelve nches in length, and from seven to ten inches diameter. The petals are of purest white, and of most delicate structure. 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
