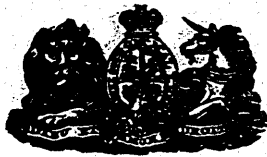

THIRD SESSION OF THE TWENTY-SECOND GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

Tuesday, February 28, 1865.

**T**HE House having, by several Proclamations hereto annexed, been prorogued until this day, then to meet for the dispatch of business;

And being met—

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by Robert Hyndman, Esquire, Usher of the Black Rod :

Mr. Speaker ;

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor commands the attendance of this Honorable House at the Bar of the Council Chamber, instanter.

Accordingly, Mr. Speaker and the House went up to attend His Excellency in the Council Chamber ;

And being returned—

Mr. Speaker reported, that when the House did attend His Excellency this day in the Council Chamber, His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of the Legislature, of which Mr. Speaker said he had, for greater accuracy, obtained a copy, which he read to the House, and is as follows :—

*Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council ;*

*Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly ;*

I rejoice that I am enabled, at the commencement of another Session of this Legislature, to congratulate you on the general prosperity of this Island.

You will, I am confident, join with me in an expression of gratitude to Almighty God for the abundant harvest, and the many blessings which have been bestowed on the people of this Province during the past year.

In compliance with the resolution which you passed last Session, I appointed Delegates to confer with Delegates appointed by the Governments of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, for the purpose of discussing the expediency of a Legislative Union of the Maritime Provinces.

Correspondence on this subject, together with a Report of the Conference of the Delegates will be laid before you.

From these papers you will learn the origin of a second Conference, to consider the wider question of a General Union of the British North American Provinces.

On the invitation of the Governor General I nominated Delegates to proceed to Quebec to attend this second Conference.

In appointing Delegates, I deemed it expedient, on both occasions, to select them from each of the political parties in the Legislature.

Copies of the Resolutions adopted at the Quebec Conference, will be submitted to you.

Despatches from Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonial department, on this important subject will also be laid before you.

From this correspondence you will perceive that Her Majesty's Government have given to these Resolutions their most deliberate consideration, and have expressed their general approval of the proceedings of the Conference.

For this, the most momentous question ever submitted to you, I ask your earnest consideration.

I have received from the Secretary of State for the Colonies a communication respecting the Militia Law.

The Colonial Minister has observed with satisfaction that a Volunteer movement has arisen in this Colony, which reflects much credit on the loyalty and spirit of its inhabitants; on the other hand, he has remarked that a law exists among the statutes of the Island which declares that the Militia shall not be called out, except in case of war, civil commotion, or other sufficient emergency.

You will, I confidently hope, give your careful attention to a measure which will be proposed to you, and which is framed with the view of remedying a state of affairs characterized by Mr. Cardwell as having no parallel in British North America.

*Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;*

The Public Accounts of the past year will be laid before you. It affords me much satisfaction to observe that the revenue exceeds that of any previous year, and is considerably in excess of the expenditure.

The estimates for the current year will also be laid before you. They have been framed with due regard to economy.

*Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;*

*Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;*

The people whom you represent are so thoroughly capable of appreciating the importance of Agriculture, that I would suggest for your consideration the expediency of giving some further encouragement to the promotion of the scientific culture of the soil, and to the improvement of stock.

In full reliance on your zeal for the welfare of the Colony, I now commit its interests to your care.

The Hon. James C. Pope rose in his place and stated to the House, that since the last Session of the Legislature, in consequence of the resignation of the Hon. Mr. Gray and the Hon. Mr. Palmer, as members of the Government, His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor had been pleased to appoint him (Mr. Pope)

as President of the Council, and instead of the Gentlemen who retired as aforesaid, the Hon. T. Heath Haviland and the Hon. Kenneth Henderson had been appointed to seats in the Executive Council.

*Resolved,* That a Committee of seven Members be appointed to prepare and report with all convenient speed the draft of an Address in answer to the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, delivered this day to both Houses of the Legislature.

*Ordered,* That Mr. Brecken, Mr. Ramsay, Mr. Haslam, Mr. John Yeo, Mr. Green, Mr. Duncan and Mr. Montgomery do compose the said Committee.

*Resolved,* That a Committee of three Members be appointed to examine what Laws have lately expired or are near expiring, with leave to report from time to time, by Bills or otherwise.

*Ordered,* That the Hon. J. Longworth, Mr. Brecken and the Hon. J. Hensley do compose the said Committee.

*Resolved,* That a Committee of seven Members be appointed to examine and report on the Public Accounts,—with power to send for persons, papers and records.

*Ordered,* That Mr. John Yeo, Mr. Haslam, Mr. Maclennan, Mr. Duncan, the Hon. G. Coles, the Hon. J. Warburton and Mr. Conroy do compose the said Committee.

*Resolved,* That a Committee of five Members be appointed to examine Bills to be engrossed, or that have been engrossed.

*Ordered,* That Mr. Maclennan, Mr. Green, Mr. Ramsay, Mr. Sinclair and Mr. Walker do compose the said Committee.

*Resolved,* That a Committee of six Members be appointed to keep up a good correspondence between the two Branches of the Legislature, and to report their proceedings from time to time—with power to send for persons, papers and records.

*Ordered*, That the Hon. J. H. Gray, the Hon. J. Longworth, the Hon. J. C. Pope, Mr. Haslam, the Hon. J. Hensley and the Hon. G. Coles do compose the said Committee.

*Ordered*, That the said Resolution be communicated by Message to the Legislative Council.

*Ordered*, That the Hon. J. H. Gray do carry the said Message to the Council.

*Resolved*, That a Committee of three Members be appointed to provide Stationery for the use of the House.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Maclellan, Mr. Montgomery and the Hon. D. Davies do compose the said Committee.

*Resolved*, That a Committee of five Members be appointed, to whom shall be referred every Private Bill, to report thereon to the House.

*Ordered*, That the Hon. J. Longworth, the Hon. A. Laird, Mr. Green, the Hon. J. Warburton and Mr. Sinclair do compose the said Committee.

*Resolved*, That a Committee of three Members be appointed to revise the Journal of each day, after the adjournment.

*Ordered*, That the Hon. D. Davies, Mr. Brecken and Mr. Howat do compose the said Committee.

*Resolved*, That a Committee of three Members be appointed to receive tenders for printing the Debates of this House for the present Session, in the form in which they have been heretofore printed in the "Parliamentary Reporter," and to report thereon to the House.

*Ordered*, That the Hon. the Col. Secretary the Hon. D. Kaye and Mr. Brecken do compose the said Committee.

*Resolved*, That a Committee of three Members be appointed to receive Tenders for the printing of the Journals of this House, for the present Session, and to report thereon to the House.

*Ordered*, That the Hon. D. Davies, Mr. Duncan and Mr. Howat do compose the said Committee.

*Resolved*, That a copy of the Journal of this House be sent to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, each day as soon as may be, after the adjournment.

On motion of Mr. Duncan, seconded by Mr. Ramsay,

*Resolved*, That Mr. David Laird be appointed Reporter to this House.

On motion of Mr. Maclellan, seconded by Mr. Haslam,

*Resolved*, That Mr. Archibald Macneill be appointed Summary Reporter to this House, and that it be his duty as such Reporter, to furnish each Member of the House, daily, with a copy of a printed report of each day's proceedings.

*Resolved*, That the postage on all letters and printed papers, both foreign and inland, to Members of this House; and the postage on the same, when inland only, from Members of this House, shall be charged to the Contingent Accounts of the House.

The House adjourned until to-morrow at Three o'clock.

## Wednesday, March 1, 1865.

### PRAYERS.

**M**R. Brecken from the Special Committee appointed to prepare and report the draft of an Address in answer to the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to both Houses at the opening of the present Session, presented to the House the draft of an Address, as prepared by the Committee; and he read the same in his place and delivered it in at the Clerk's table, where it was again read.

*Resolved*, That this House will to-morrow, resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, to take into consideration the said draft Address.

The Hon. J. Longworth from the Special Committee appointed to examine what laws have lately expired, or are near expiring, with power to report from time to time, by Bills or otherwise, presented to the House the first report of the said Committee; which report was again read at the Clerk's table, and is as followeth:—

Your Committee appointed to examine what laws have lately expired, or are near-expiring, submit that:—

The Act 9th Vic. cap. 27, intituled "An Act to make provision for the regulation of Seamen shipped on board of any ship or vessel owned in, or belonging to Prince Edward Island, whilst such ship or vessel shall be within the precincts of the said Island," (continued by 22nd Vic. Cap. 12.) will expire at the end of the present Session.

The Act 12th Vic. Cap. 34, intituled "An Act for the

appointment of Clerks to Justices of the Peace, and to regulate proceedings had before them," (continued by the 22nd Vic. Cap. 9,) will expire at the end of the present Session.

The Act 21st Vic. Cap. 15, intituled "An Act to continue for certain purposes the Seduction Act, and to make other provisions in lieu thereof, as regards all future actions," (continued by 22nd Vic. Cap. 9,) will expire at the end of the present Session.

The Act 22nd Vic. Cap. 8, intituled "An Act for regulating the size and quality of Fish Barrels and Tierces and the weight of fish made up therein, and for the appointment of Fish Inspectors, also to regulate the Inspection of pickled fish for sale within this Island, and to repeal a certain Act therein mentioned," will expire at the end of the present Session.

The Act 24th Vic. Cap. 13, intituled "An Act to authorize the appointment of Hog Reeves in certain Districts in this Island, and to prevent the going at large of Swine within the same," will expire at the end of the present Session.

The Act 19th Vic. Cap. 1, intituled "An Act for raising a Revenue," (continued with certain exceptions by 27th Vic. Cap. 1,) will expire on the 1st day of May next.

The Act 27th Vic. Cap. 1, intituled "An Act for raising a Revenue," will also expire on the 1st day of May next.

*Ordered*, That the said Report be committed to a Committee of the whole House to-morrow.

Then, on motion of the Hon. J. Longworth, seconded by Mr. Ramsay,

The House adjourned until to-morrow at Ten o'clock.

## Thursday, March 2, 1865.

### PRAYERS.

**T**HE Hon. the Col. Secretary, from the Committee appointed to receive tenders for printing the Debates of the House for the present Session, and to report thereon to the House, presented to the House the report of the said Committee; which report being again

read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

Your Committee appointed to receive tenders for printing the Debates of this House for the present Session, have to report that they have received three tenders, viz:—

First—From John Ings, Esquire, offering to print the "Parliamentary Reporter," at Forty-two shillings and six

pence per sheet of four pages, the paper to be of the same quality as that accompanying his tender for the Journals for this present Session. The Debates to be published in the *Islander* newspaper; and to bind the same for one shilling each copy.

The second from Mr. F. W. Hughes proposing to print said Debates in the same style as last year, for the sum of Forty-three shillings per sheet of four pages, and to publish the same in the *Examiner* newspaper; and bind them at the rate of one shilling for each copy.

The third tender from Mr. George T. Haszard proposing to print said Debates in the form in which they have hitherto been printed in the *Parliamentary Reporter*, at the rate of Forty shillings for each sheet of four pages, and to bind the same for one shilling each copy.

Although the specimen of paper submitted by Mr. Haszard is inferior to those accompanying the tenders of Messrs. Ings and Hughes, yet it is, in the opinion of your Committee, of sufficiently good quality for the *Parliamentary Reporter*, and his being the lowest tender your Committee recommend that it be accepted, provided Mr. Haszard undertakes to publish the Debates in one of the newspapers published in Charlottetown:

The Hon. J. C. Pope, a Member of Her Majesty's Executive Council, presented to the House the Fifteenth Annual Report of the Medical Superintendent of the Lunatic Asylum, exhibiting in a Tabular form the admissions, discharges, forms of disease, and remedial results of the cases of Insanity under treatment in that Institution.

### See Appendix (A.)

*Ordered*, That the said Report do lie on the table.

Then the House adjourned for one hour;

And being met—

The Hon. D. Davies, from the Committee appointed to receive tenders for printing the Journals of the House for the present Session, and to report thereon to the House, presented to the House the report of the said Committee; which report was again read at the Clerk's table, and is as followeth:—

The Committee appointed to receive tenders for printing the Journals of the House for the present Session, have to report that they have received four tenders, viz:—

First—From Daniel Bethune, proposing to bind the Journals in the usual way in calf, for Three Shillings and sixpence per copy, for stitched copies, one shilling each.

Second—From George T. Haszard, proposing to print the Journals on British paper for Thirty-three shillings per sheet; to bind the same for five shillings per copy; for stitching one shilling and sixpence per copy.

Third—From John Ings, undertaking to print the Journals on good English paper for Thirty-four shillings and sixpence per sheet of four pages; for binding five shillings per volume; for stitching, one shilling and nine-pence per copy.

Fourth—From F. W. Hughes, agreeing to print the Journals on superior English paper for Thirty-one shillings and sixpence per sheet of four pages; for half-binding each copy, five shillings; for stitching each copy, one shilling and nine-pence.

Upon comparing the specimens of paper accompanying the tenders, your Committee are of opinion that Mr. Ings's is superior to the others, but inasmuch as Mr. Hughes's is the lowest, and the specimen of paper submitted by him, of very good quality, your Committee recommend that Mr. Hughes's tender be accepted.

On motion of the Hon. D. Davies, seconded by Mr. Howat,

*Resolved*, That the said Report be adopted.

The Order of the Day for the House in Committee on the consideration of the draft Address reported from the Special Committee, in answer to the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, to both Houses, at the opening of the present Session, being read—

*Ordered*, That the House do now go into the Order of the Day.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. John Yeø took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And the Chairman reported that the Committee had made some progress, and had directed him to move for leave to sit again; which the House agreed to.

Then, on motion of the Hon. J. C. Pope, seconded by Mr Haslam,  
The House adjourned until to-morrow at Ten o'clock.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

1. We, Her Majesty's faithful subjects, the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, beg respectfully to tender our thanks for the Speech with which your Excellency was pleased to open the present Session.

2. The general prosperity of this Island, the abundant harvest, and the many blessings bestowed upon the people of this Colony, during the past year, demand our grateful acknowledgments to Almighty God.

3. We thank your Excellency for having, in compliance with the Resolution passed last Session, appointed Delegates to confer with Delegates appointed by the Governments of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, respectively, for the purpose of discussing the expediency of a Legislative Union of the Maritime Provinces; and we shall be happy to receive the Correspondence on this subject, together with the Report of the Delegates.

4. We shall be pleased to learn the origin of the second Conference held at Quebec, to consider the wider question of a general Union of the British North American Provinces, to attend which, your Excellency, on the invitation of the Governor General, appointed Delegates, selected as were the Delegates to the former Conference, from each of the political parties in the Legislature.

5. We beg to assure your Excellency that we shall not fail to give our most earnest consideration to the Resolutions adopted at the Quebec Conference upon the momentous subject of a General Union of the Provinces, and also to the Despatches from Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonial Department, relative thereto.

6. It is gratifying to us to learn that the Volunteer movement which has arisen in this Colony, has received the approbation of the Colonial Minister, and we will give our careful attention to any measure which may be proposed to us with the object of remedying the defects in the Law relating to the Militia of the Colony, characterized by Mr. Cardwell as having no parallel in British North America.

7. It is with pleasure we learn that the Revenue for the past year exceeds that of any previous year, and that it is considerably in excess of the Expenditure; and we thank your Excellency for the assurance that the Public Accounts for the past year, and the Estimates for the present will be laid before us.

8. The great importance to this Island, of Agriculture, commends it especially to our notice, and we shall attentively consider the expediency of giving some further encouragement to the promotion of the scientific culture of the Soil, and to the improvement of Stock.

And the said reported Address being again read,

The Hon. G. Coles moved to amend the same in the fifth paragraph thereof, by adding at the end of the said paragraph the following—  
 “But we regret that your Excellency should have appointed, as one of your legal advisers, a gentleman, who as a delegate, has declared himself, ‘a red hot unionist,’ upon the terms agreed on at the Quebec Conference.”

Your Committee to whom were referred the petitions presented to this House in its last Session, praying for various alterations in the Acts relating to Tavern Licenses, and the sale by retail of spirituous and fermented liquors, have given that full consideration which the importance of the subject and the earnest desire of this Committee to meet the views of the advocates of Temperance requires.

As the law at present stands, parties applying for Tavern Licenses are required (in addition to other requisites) to produce a certificate attesting to his or her moral character, and to the necessity for an Inn or House of public accommodation, signed by at least two of the neighbouring magistrates, and a majority of the householders resident in and entitled to vote for Trustees of Schools for the School District within which the proposed Inn or House of accommodation shall be situate; and where any party applies for a renewal of his or her Tavern License or licenses to retail Spirituous Liquors, he must produce and deposit at the

Colonial Secretary's office a certificate signed by any two out of the four Magistrates residing nearest to the applicant's place of residence, certifying to the orderly conduct of the house of the party so applying, up to the time of the application for renewal.

The Petitioners desire an amendment in the law to the effect, that the certificate of the majority of the inhabitants of the district should be obtained at a public meeting convened for the purpose of considering the propriety of granting a Tavern License in the District, and that the like consent obtained in the like manner, shall be annually obtained, and a certificate thereof signed in like manner, annually produced at the Secretary's office on the occasion of each application for a renewal of the license.

Your Committee are of opinion that a fair and candid expression of the individual feeling of the inhabitants of a district, on a question of so much importance in a domestic point of view, is certainly much more likely to be obtained as now, by requiring the signatures of a majority to be procured individually and separately, than under the excitement generally attendant upon a public meeting, and therefore, cannot recommend the alteration requested in that respect, or that the consent of the majority should be annually obtained for a renewal; but in order to place it in the power of the inhabitants of a district to do away with a Tavern License already granted, if they deem its renewal unnecessary or objectionable, they recommend that the law be altered so as to enable two-thirds of the inhabitants to prevent a renewal of the license, by signing a certificate to the effect, that such renewal will, in their opinion, be unnecessary and objectionable, and depositing the same in the Colonial Secretary's office previous to the proper time for a renewal of the license objected to.

Your Committee also recommend that no Store License to retail liquors in less quantities than one quart, shall hereafter be granted or renewed.

A motion being made that the report of the Committee be adopted.

It was carried in the affirmative, and

*Resolved*, accordingly.

*Resolved*, That a Committee be appointed to prepare and bring in a Bill in accordance with the said report.

That owing to the nature of the disposition, by the said John Hodges Winsloe of his said property, in his last Will and testament they—the petitioners—are unable to obtain leases in accordance with the said agreements,

and are therefore liable to great uncertainty in their tenures, and in case of sale, to heavy depreciation of property, and praying the House to pass such a measure as will remedy the evil complained of.

*Resolved*, That no new matter, on which a Bill can be founded, be introduced to this House; after Thursday the 23rd instant.

Mr. Speaker laid before the House a Communication from the Rev. J. Davis, Secretary

That all Collectors of Impost now or hereafter to be appointed, shall on rendering a just and true account of,—and paying into the Treasury all moneys received—under and by virtue of the provisions of this Act, and on their accounts being certified as correct, by the Auditors of Public Accounts, be paid by Warrant on the Treasury, an amount equal to Five Pounds per centum, on all moneys received and paid over by such Collectors of Impost, under this Act, except the Collector of Impost for Charlottetown, who is already provided for by salary, and the Collectors for Bedeque and Georgetown, who shall receive as a salary, as follows per annum,—One hundred and Seventy-five pounds for the Collector at Bedeque, and One hundred and Thirty-five pounds for the Collector at Georgetown, payable quarterly by Warrant on the Treasury, on their Returns being certified by the Auditors as aforesaid.

*Ordered*, That the question of concurrence be now separately put on the said Resolutions.

And the said Resolutions being again severally read, were, on the question being separately put thereon, agreed to by the House.

*Resolved*, That a Committee be appointed to prepare and bring in a Bill pursuant to the first of the above reported Resolutions.

"Every person not being an Inhabitant of this Island, who shall, without the authority of the Government thereof, take up or catch any oysters at any time or season at any place within the limits of this Island, shall forfeit and pay the sum of shillings for every bushel of Oysters so taken up or caught by such person,—such penalty, when under Twenty Pounds, to be recovered with costs in Her Majesty's name, before any two of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace, on the oath and information of any person who shall sue for the same,—and the offender shall, and may be arrested upon a warrant to be issued by any one Justice for the said penalty: Provided that the penalty imposed by this Clause shall not extend to any person who shall have taken or caught such Oysters by the leave or permission of any Grantee of any Oyster bed or ground, or other person having right to grant such leave or permission."

*Ordered,* That the said amendments be read a second time, to-morrow.

Read a third time, as engrossed, the Bill intitled "An Act to amend the law respecting defamatory words and libel."

*Resolved,* That the Bill do pass.

Read a third time, as engrossed, the Bill intitled "An Act to amend the Act for constituting Boards of Health."

*Resolved,* That the Bill do pass.

*Ordered,* That the Hon. the Solicitor General do carry the two preceding Bills to the Council, and desire their concurrence.

Read a third time, as engrossed, the Bill intitled "An Act to alter the time for holding certain terms of the Supreme Court in the several Counties in this Island."

*Resolved,* That the Bill do pass.

Read a third time, as engrossed, the Bill intitled "An Act in further amendment of the Laws regulating the sale by License of Spirituous Liquors."

*Resolved,* That the Bill do pass.

*Ordered,* That the Hon. J. Hensley do carry the two last preceding Bills to the Council, and desire their concurrence.

On motion of Mr. Brecken, seconded by the Hon. A. Laird,

*Ordered,* That the Resolution of this House, of the 16th March instant, viz: "That no new matter on which a Bill can be founded, be introduced to this House after Thursday the 23d instant," be suspended for this day; and thereupon

A petition of Robert Hutchinson, John Morris, and others, was presented to the House by Mr. Brecken, and the same was received and read, setting forth: That in the year 1789, General Fanning, the then Lieutenant Governor of this Island, granted to Lord Dorchester as Captain General and Commander-in-Chief of the Island of St. John's, and in his absence, to the Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the said Island, for ever, one hundred acres of land—described as being part and parcel of that large tract of land formerly appropriated as a Common—for the use and accommodation of His Majesty's Governor or Commander-in-Chief for the time being, whereon to erect a Government House, for the habitation and residence of His Majesty's Governor. That they, the Petitioners, believe that the Lieutenant Governor had no legal authority for making said grant. That in the same manner the rest of the Common of Charlottetown was granted to individuals in perpetuity. That the citizens of Charlottetown are consequently without any proper place for the recreation of themselves and families. That they have no wish to interfere with the comfort of the present or any future Representative of Her Majesty residing in the Government House, they at the same time consider that a portion of the said one hundred acres, taken from the Common might be applied to the purpose of being made into

a place of recreation for the citizens and others who may resort to the City, as well as for a site for a parade and exercising ground for the Militia and Volunteers, and praying the House to procure in such way as may seem best, such a portion of the said one hundred acres as may, with the least inconvenience to the present or any future Governor, be selected for these purposes.

*Ordered*, That the said petition be committed to a Committee of the whole House, to-morrow.

The Hon. J. Longworth read in his place, a petition of James Robertson and others, tenants of the South part of Township number 34, the property of the Rev. James T. Montgomery, setting forth that they made an offer on behalf of the tenants on the said Township, for the purchase of the fee-simple of their Leaseholds to the Reverend proprietor, of twelve shillings and sixpence currency per acre, which he declined to accept, but at the same time, said that if the tenants would combine to purchase the whole by the help of the Government, he would let them have it on somewhat more easy terms than by selling separate farms. That unless the fifteen years' Purchase Bill be accompanied with another enactment authorizing the Government of this Island to advance two-thirds of the purchase money of each farm on which the maximum price shall not exceed fifteen years' purchase, but which may be at any lower rate that may be agreed upon between the parties concerned, and to be repaid in ten annual instalments, and praying the House to pass a law to enable the tenants to realize the benefit of the fifteen years' Purchase Bill, according to the terms above set forth.

The Hon. J. Longworth then moved that the said petition be received and read.

Mr. Speaker declined receiving the motion, stating as his reason that the mode of his introduction of the said petition is contrary to the Standing Rule of this House relative to the initiation of money votes.

*Resolved*, That the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House to take into further consideration the Bill for Raising a Revenue.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. MacLennan took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And Mr. MacLennan reported that the Committee had gone through the Bill, and had made an amendment thereto; which amendment was again read at the Clerk's table, and agreed to by the House.

*Ordered*, That the said Bill, as amended, be engrossed, and that the title be "An Act for Raising a Revenue."

On motion of the Hon. J. Longworth, which motion was seconded,

*Ordered*, That the Bill to carry into effect certain unexecuted agreements made by the late John Hodges Winsloe, Esquire, deceased, for the sale and leasing of certain parts of his Estate in this Colony, be now read a second time.

The said Bill was accordingly read a second time.

*Ordered*, That the said Bill be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Howlan took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And Mr. Howlan reported that the Committee had gone through the Bill without making any amendment thereto; and the report was again read at the Clerk's table.

*Ordered*, That the said Bill be engrossed, and that the title be "An Act to carry into effect certain unexecuted agreements made by the late John Hodges Winsloe, Esquire, deceased, for the sale and leasing of certain parts of his Estate in this Colony."

Then the House adjourned for one hour.

And being met—

*Ordered*, That Mr. Brecken have leave to bring in a Bill to alter, add to and amend the Act to incorporate the Town of Charlottetown, and the Acts in amendment thereof.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was received and read for the first time, and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

A petition of the President, Directors and Stockholders of the Union Bank of Prince Edward Island, was presented to the House by the Hon. D. Davies, and the same was received and read, praying for an amendment of the Act of 26th Vic., Cap. 4, (incorporating the said Union Bank), by altering the time of holding the annual meeting of the Stockholders, by substituting the first Wednesday in March, instead of the first Tuesday in April, and the semi-annual days accordingly.

*Ordered*, That the said petition do lie on the table.

*Ordered*, That the Hon. D. Davies have leave to bring in a Bill to amend the Act of 26th Vic., Cap. 4, incorporating the Union Bank of Prince Edward Island.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was received and read for the first time.

*Ordered*, That the said Bill be referred to the Special Committee appointed to report on every Private Bill, to examine the same and report thereon.

On motion of the Hon. D. Davies, which motion was seconded,

*Resolved*, That the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, to consider further of a Supply.

The House accordingly resolved itself into said Committee.

Mr. Maclellan took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And the Chairman reported that the Committee had gone into the further consideration of a Supply, and had come to Four Resolutions thereon, which he was directed to report to the House, whenever it shall be pleased to receive the same.

*Ordered*, That the Report of the Committee be received to-morrow.

The Chairman also acquainted the House that he was directed by the Committee to move for leave to sit again; which the House agreed to.

The Order of the Day for the House in Committee on the consideration of the Message of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor of the 4th day of March instant, transmitting copies of various despatches and other papers, being read,

On motion of the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, seconded by the Hon. the Solicitor General,

*Ordered*, That the Order of the Day for the House in Committee on the consideration of the said Message be discharged, and that the House do proceed to consider the same, with Mr. Speaker in the Chair.

The Hon. J. C. Pope moved, seconded by the Hon. the Solicitor General, that the Twenty-first Rule of this House, which Rule is "That no Member of this House shall speak twice to any Bill at any one time of reading, nor to any report, motion, or other matter, unless it be to explain some material point of his speech (but not to bring forward new argument,) and that not without leave of the House first obtained, except the Member bringing forward such Bill, report, motion, or other matter, who, at the close of the debate, shall be privileged to reply," be suspended in this case.

And the question being put on the said motion, it was unanimously agreed to, and

*Ordered*, accordingly.

The Hon. the Colonial Secretary then moved, seconded by the Hon. J. H. Gray, that the following Resolutions be adopted:—

1. RESOLVED, That the best interests, and present and future prosperity of British North America, would be promoted by a Federal Union, under the Crown of Great Britain, provided such Union could be effected on principles just to the several Provinces and Colonies.

2. RESOLVED, That the existence of immense Military and Naval forces in the neighboring Republic, renders it specially incumbent on the people of British North America to take the most efficient precautionary measures by which their independence against Foreign aggression may be secured.

3. RESOLVED, That a Union, such as in times of extraordinary danger would place the Militia, the Revenues, and the Resources of the several Provinces, at the disposal of a General Parliament, is necessary, in order to maintain the independence of British North America against foreign aggression, and to perpetuate our connection with the Mother Country.

4. RESOLVED, That a Federal Union of British North America, based upon the Resolutions adopted at the Conference of Delegates from the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and the Colonies of Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island, held at the City of Quebec, 10th October, 1864, as the basis of a proposed Confederation of those Provinces and Colonies, would, among other advantages, promote the developement of the Trade and Manufacturing capabilities of these Provinces and Colonies, and advance the general Prosperity, by inducing the substitution of a Customs' Tariff, uniform and common to the Confederation, in lieu of the various Tariffs now in force in the several Provinces and Colonies.

5. RESOLVED, That the Report of the Conference of Delegates from the British North American Provinces and Colonies held at Quebec in October last, taken as a whole, contains a declaration of principles—as the basis of a Federal Union—which this House considers just to the several Provinces and Colonies.

6. RESOLVED, That this House, believing it is only by mutual concessions and compromises,

the several British North American Provinces and Colonies can ever agree upon those principles which shall form the basis of a Union, orders that the report of the Conference of Delegates from these several Provinces and Colonies held at Quebec in October last, be published throughout this Colony for the deliberate consideration of the people, on whom will devolve the acceptance or rejection of the proposed Union.

7. RESOLVED, That until the larger Maritime Provinces and Canada shall have mutually agreed upon terms of Union, it is inexpedient that the people of Prince Edward Island should be called upon to decide on the question.

8. RESOLVED, That in case the Provinces of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Canada, should at any time mutually agree upon the basis of a Union, the question be then forthwith submitted to the decision of the people of this Island.

The Hon. J. C. Pope moved in amendment, seconded by the Hon. A. Laird, that all the words after "Resolved" to the end of the question be left out, and the following inserted instead thereof:—

The House having had under consideration the Report of the Convention held at Quebec, respecting a Federal Union of the different Colonies of British North America, and the Despatch of the Right Honorable Mr. Cardwell, Her Majesty's principal Secretary of State for the Colonies respecting the same.

1. RESOLVED, That Prince Edward Island, being entirely dependent on its Agriculture and Fisheries, has nothing to export for which Canada can furnish a market. That while such is, and ever must be the relative commercial position of this Island and Canada, the products of our soil and Fisheries find in the extensive markets of our parent country, the United States and the West Indies, ready and profitable customers. The proposed Union, while admitting the produce and manufactures of Canada into this Island free, would by assimilation of taxes, enormously increase the duty to which those of Great Britain and the United States are at present subject, thereby compelling this Island to take a large portion of its imports from Canada, making payment

therefor in money instead of procuring them from countries which would receive our produce in exchange; an arrangement so inconsistent with the fundamental principles of commerce must greatly curtail our commercial intercourse with the United States, and would, in the opinion of this House, materially diminish our exports to that country, and prove most injurious to the agricultural and commercial interests of this Island.

2. That if the relative circumstances of Canada and this Island rendered a Union practicable, the evident injustice of the terms agreed to by the Quebec Convention would prevent their being ratified by the Legislature of this Island. Without alluding to all, it is proper to notice some of the objectionable features of the Report. Without admitting the principle of Representation according to Population under all circumstances to be sound, it is, in the opinion of this House, particularly objectionable as applied to this Island in connexion with Canada, taking into consideration that the number of our inhabitants is, and must continue comparatively small, owing to the fact that we have no Crown Lands, mines, minerals, or other resources sufficient to induce immigrants to settle here, and that we never can expect to become to any extent a manufacturing people in consequence of our navigation being closed for nearly half the year, and all trade and communication with other countries stopped. Under this principle, the City of Montreal alone would, at the present time, have a representation greater than the whole Province of Prince Edward Island, and under the provisions of the Convention which regulates the mode of re-adjusting the relative representation of the various Provinces at each decennial census, looking at the rapid increase of the Population of Upper and Lower Canada heretofore,—particularly the former,—and the certainty of a still greater increase therein in the future, over that of the population of this Island, it follows as a certain and inevitable consequence, if a Federation of the Provinces were consummated upon the basis of the said Convention, that the number of our Representatives would, in the course of a comparatively short number of years, be diminished to a still smaller number than that allotted at the outset to us.

3. That the old Imperial error in granting all the lands in large tracts to absentees, which deprives this Island of the Revenue drawn by the sister Colonies from those sources, our insular position and numerous harbors, furnishing cheap and convenient water communication, which render expensive Public Works here unnecessary, the Revenue to be drawn by the proposed Federal Government from this Island, and expended among the people of Canada and the other Colonies in constructing Railways and other Public Works, thereby creating a trade which would build up cities and enhance the value of property in various localities there,—advantages in which this Island could enjoy a very small participation. Our complete isolation during five months of the year, when ice interrupts our trade and communication with the Mainland, and during which period the Island could derive no possible benefit from the Railroads and other Public Works which they would be (equally with the people of those Colonies) taxed to construct,—these and many other considerations, but which seem to have been entirely ignored, ought, in the opinion of this House, to have produced an offer of a financial arrangement for this Island, very different in its terms from that contained in the Report of the Convention.

4. That while this House recognizes the duty of this Colony to use every means, to the extent of its limited resources, to defend its inhabitants from foreign invasion, it cannot recognize the necessity of uniting in a Confederation with Canada for the purpose of defence, upon terms which, in other respects, are in the opinion of this House, so unfair to the people of Prince Edward Island, thus sacrificing our commercial and financial interests for the sake of securing the co-operation of Canada in a military point of view; feeling assured that so long as we remain a loyal and attached Colony of Great Britain, the powerful aid of that great country will continue as heretofore, to be extended to us, in common with the other North American Dependencies of the British Crown.

Lastly, **RESOLVED**, That this House disagrees to the recommendations of the Quebec Convention, and on the part of Prince Edward Island emphatically declines a Union which, after a serious and careful consideration, it believes would prove politically, commercially and

financially disastrous to the rights and interests of its people.

And a debate arising thereupon,

*Ordered*, That the debate be adjourned.

A petition of James Muirhead and others, inhabitants of Summerside, was presented to the House by the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, and the same was received and read, praying for the passing of an Act for the incorporation of the town of Summerside.

*Ordered*, That the said petition be referred to a Committee to examine the same and report thereon next Session, by Bill or otherwise.

*Ordered*, That the Hon. J. C. Pope, Mr. Green, and Mr. John Yeo do compose the said Committee.

A petition of James Campbell and others, Merchants, Shipbuilders, and others interested in Shipbuilding in Prince County, was presented to the House by Mr. MacLennan—and the same was received and read, praying for the passing of an Act authorizing the appointment of a Surveyor of Shipping for Prince County, resident in a central part of the County.

*Ordered*, That the said petition be referred to a Committee to examine the same and report thereon by Bill or otherwise.

*Ordered*, That Mr. MacLennan, the Hon. the Solicitor General, and Mr. Green do compose the said Committee.

*Ordered*, That the Hon. the Solicitor General have leave to bring in a Bill in addition to, and in further amendment of the Land Purchase Act.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was received and read for the first time, and ordered to be read a second time, to-morrow.

*Ordered*, That the Hon. the Solicitor General have leave to bring in a Bill to amend An Act intituled "An Act to repeal an Act made and passed in the Twenty-first year of the Reign of King George the Third, intituled 'An Act relating to Wills, legacies and executors, and for the settlement and distribution of the Estate of Intestates.'"

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was received and read for the first time, and ordered to be read a second time, to-morrow.

Then, on motion of the Hon. D. Davies, seconded by Mr. Haslam,

The House adjourned until to-morrow at Ten o'clock.

matter alleged to have occurred during a recent debate in this House, in which allusion was made to that Gentleman, and which letter is as follows:—

“MARSHFIELD, March 23rd, 1865.”

To the Hon. Colonel Gray, &c., &c.

SIR;—I was informed yesterday by a Member of the House of Assembly, that in the progress of a recent debate, you spoke of me in

terms, which I cannot but consider most disparaging, if not actually insulting.

The fact that the law very properly, in my opinion, affords the fullest protection to the persons of Members, and support to the privileges of Parliament, renders it the more incumbent on parties enjoying such protection, to abstain from using language calculated to lower the social position, or wound the feelings of private individuals.

Assuming that the substance of your remarks has been correctly repeated to me, which I can hardly doubt, I trust your sense of justice will induce you to retract or explain the expressions of which I complain, from your place in the House, without unnecessary delay.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Howlan took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And the Chairman reported that the Committee had made some progress, and had directed him to move for leave to sit again; which the House agreed to.

Longworth from the Special Committee appointed to report on every Private Bill, and to whom was referred the Bill to incorporate the Minister and Trustees of the Presbyterian Congregation of Woodville and Little Sands, Townships Nos. 62 and 64, presented to the House a Report of the said Committee, which Report being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

Your Committee appointed to examine and report on Private Bills, having under their consideration the Bill to incorporate the Minister and Trustees of the Presbyterian Congregation of Woodville and Little Sands, Townships Nos. 62 and 64, submit,—That the said Bill is of a private nature; but inasmuch as the Fees upon Private Bills, more especially those relating to Church matters have not here-

tofore been uniformly exacted by the House, your Committee recommend that the said Bill be exempt from such fees.

Then, on motion of the Hon. J. H. Gray, which motion was seconded,

The said Bill was read a second time.

*Ordered*, That the said Bill be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Green took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And Mr. Green reported that the Committee had gone through the Bill without making any amendment thereto; and the report was again read at the Clerk's table.

*Ordered*, That the said Bill be engrossed, and that the title be "An Act to incorporate the Minister and Trustees of the Presbyterian Congregation of Woodville and Little Sands, Townships Nos. Sixty-two and Sixty-four."

*Resolved*, That the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, to take into further consideration all matters relating to Roads, Bridges and Wharfs.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

The Hon. J. Warburton took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And the Hon. J. Warburton reported that the Committee had gone into the consideration of the matters to them referred, and had come to a Resolution thereon, which Resolution being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

Your Committee to whom was referred the petition of certain inhabitants of Georgetown, praying for the passage of a law to authorize the erection of a pound on the public square of that town, to report thereon, having under their consideration the said petition,—submit, That however desirable it may be to establish a pound in the vicinity of Georgetown, they entertain very grave doubts of the expediency of appropriating any portion of the Square referred to, for such a purpose, being impressed with a strong conviction that the permanent establishment of an erection such as that contemplated by the said petition, under the sanction of a law, while it would have a tendency to depreciate the value of property in the said town, would be entirely foreign to the purposes and objects for which such a Square was originally allotted by the Government in so central a part of the town, as that in which Kent Square is situated; your Committee therefore cannot recommend the prayer of said petition.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And the Chairman reported that the Committee had made some progress, and had directed him to move for leave to sit again; which the House agreed to.

The Order of the Day for the House in Committee on the consideration of the report of the Special Committee appointed to examine and report on the Public Accounts, being read,

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Sinclair took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And Mr. Sinclair reported that the Committee had gone through the report of the Special Committee, paragraph by paragraph, had amended and then adopted the same, and the report so amended, being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

Your Committee appointed to examine and report on the Public Accounts for the past year, having examined the same beg, to report as follows:—

The Expenditure for the Financial year ending 31st January 1865, amounts to £57,873 15s. 6d., and the receipts for the same period amount to £66,323 11s. 10d., leaving a surplus in favor of the Colony, of £8,449 16s. 4d. which amount deducted from the balance standing against the Colony on the 31st January 1864, shews the Public Debt to be £66,729 0s. 9½ up to the 31st January 1865. In the above balance all Treasury Notes, Warrants and Debentures issued up to that date, are included, as will appear by referring to the annexed tabular statement, marked (A.)

Your Committee in this statement do not give credit to the Colony for any balances due from the sales of Public Lands, nor for any estimated value of Lands remaining unsold.

The Revenue for the past year shews an increase over the previous one of £4,634 17s. 6d.

The usual Tables have been prepared by your Committee and are appended from (A.) to (K), inclusive, and contain particulars of the Revenue and Expenditure of past years, and other information.

The receipts for, and on account of Public Lands for the past year, amount to £4022 10s. 1d., and for Crown Lands for the same period, £97 2s. 10d. The Expenditure for the same period, including estimated loss of Land Tax and Interest, is £2390 8s. 8d., leaving £1729 4s. 3d. in favor of the Public and Crown Land department.

The balances due on Public Lands, Bonds, Deeds, &c., amount to £34,734 16s. 2d. There are 33,966½ acres of land remaining on hand unsold, being a decrease in the quantity on hand last year, of 572½ acres. During the past year 4243 acres of land have been purchased by the Government, and 4815½ acres sold.

Your Committee have to report, that the Expenditure for the year has been increased to the extent of, in round numbers, £5300 over what may be considered the ordinary Expenditure of the year, for the following services, viz :

The receipts for advalorem and other duties from the Ports of Souris, New London, Murray Harbor, Crapaud, Pinette and Orwell are respectively £724, £258, £150, £58, £34, and £30 less than the receipts at these Ports for the preceding year, affording strong presumptive evidence

that smuggling has been carried on at those Ports to a large extent, calling for increased vigilance on the part of the authorities.

The receipts from same sources, from the ports of St. Peter's and Rustico for the two past years, amount in the aggregate to £20 8s. 3d., and as the Controllers' salaries amount to £60, your Committee submit, that these Ports are too insignificant to require Controllers, and recommend the offices to be abolished.

A Message from the Council, by Mr. Cooper, their Clerk :

Mr. Speaker ;

The Legislative Council have passed the following Bills without any amendment, viz :—

“ An Act in addition to, and in further amendment of the Land Purchase Act.”

“ An Act to amend the Act intituled ‘ An Act to repeal an Act made and passed in the Twenty-first year of the Reign of King George the Third, intituled ‘ An Act relating to Wills, Legacies and Executors, and for the settlement and distribution of the Estates of Intestates.’ ”

“ An Act to amend the Act of Twenty-sixth Victoria, Chapter Four, incorporating the Union Bank of Prince Edward Island ;” and

“ An Act to incorporate the Minister and Trustees of the Presbyterian Congregation of Woodville and Little Sands, Townships Numbers Sixty-two and Sixty-four.”

Also,—

The Legislative Council have passed the following Bills, viz :—

“ An Act for Raising a Revenue ;” and

“ An Act to assist Leaseholders in the purchase of the Fee-simple of their Farms.”

Also,—

“ LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL,  
“ FRIDAY, March 31, 1865.

“ RESOLVED, That a Message be sent to the House of Assembly acquainting that House that the Legislative Council hath agreed to appoint a Committee to join a Committee of the House of Assembly to prepare an humble Address to Her Majesty the Queen, praying that Her Majesty will be graciously pleased, in consideration of the peculiar circumstances in which this Island is placed by reason of the alienation by His Majesty George the Third, of the entire lands of the Colony, to recommend

to the Imperial Parliament the propriety of continuing the annual grant heretofore made for the payment of the salary of the Lieutenant Governor of this Colony.

“ ORDERED, That the Hon. Mr. Henderson, the Hon. Mr. Macdonald, and the Hon. Mr. Beer do compose the said Committee.

And then he withdrew.

*Resolved*, That a Committee of Three Members be appointed to report on the Contingent expenses of the House for the present Session, with power to send for persons, papers and records.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Haslam, Mr. J. Yeo, and Mr. Maclellan do compose the said Committee.

*Resolved*, That the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, to take into further consideration the Bill in further amendment of the Act to incorporate the Royal Agricultural Society of Prince Edward Island.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. John Yeo took the Chair of the Committee ; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And Mr. John Yeo reported that the Committee had gone through the Bill, and made several amendments thereto ; which amendments were again read at the Clerk's table, and agreed to by the House.

*Ordered*, That the said Bill, as amended, be engrossed, and that the title be “ An Act in further amendment of the Act to incorporate the Royal Agricultural Society of Prince Edward Island.”

The Hon. J. Hensley from the Committee appointed last Session, to make further enquiries as to the propriety of opening a new Road through the farm of Alexander Hayden, to the shore of Hillsborough River, and to report



thereon this Session, presented to the House the report of the said Committee, which report being again read at the Clerk's table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth :—

Your Committee who were appointed last Session to make enquiries as to the propriety of opening a new Road to the public, through the farm of Alexander Hayden, to the shore of Hillsborough River at Mr. Longworth's shipyard, Township No. 36, have to report—That two of your said Committee, namely, Messrs. Francis Kelly and Joseph Hensley, met at the farm of Mr. Hayden, on the Second day of November last, and examined the site of the proposed Road, and now recommend that the southern terminus of the said Road on Hillsborough River should be at Mr. Hayden's shipyard, directly opposite Fisher's wharf on the Southern side of the River, and that the Northern terminus thereof should be on the St. Peter's Road, and that the intermediate course of said Road between said two points should be at or near the Eastern side of Mr. Hayden's farm, and be laid off by the Superintendant of Public Works on such precise site between said two points as shall appear to him to be most proper.

And your Committee also recommend that a Commission should be appointed to determine the amount of compensation to which Mr. Hayden and others will be entitled in respect of the laying off of such Road.

*Resolved*, That a Committee be appointed to prepare and report the draft of an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in accordance with the recommendation of the said Report.

*Ordered*, That the Hon. F. Kelly, Hon. J. Hensley, and the Hon. E. Thornton do compose the said Committee.

The Order of the Day being read for resuming the adjourned debate upon the amendment which was, for the first time, on the Twenty-fourth day of March, instant, proposed to be made to the question, that the following Resolutions be adopted :—

1. **RESOLVED**, That the best interests, and present and future prosperity of British North America, would be promoted by a Federal Union, under the Crown of Great Britain, provided such Union could be effected on principles just to the several Provinces and Colonies.

2. **RESOLVED**, That the existence of immense Military and Naval forces in the neighboring

Republic, renders it specially incumbent on the people of British North America to take the most efficient precautionary measures by which their independence against Foreign aggression may be secured.

3. **RESOLVED**, That a Union, such as in times of extraordinary danger would place the Militia, the Revenues, and the Resources of the several Provinces, at the disposal of a General Parliament, is necessary, in order to maintain the independence of British North America against foreign aggression, and to perpetuate our connection with the Mother Country.

4. **RESOLVED**, That a Federal Union of British North America, based upon the Resolutions adopted at the Conference of Delegates from the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and the Colonies of Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island, held at the City of Quebec, 10th October, 1864, as the basis of a proposed Confederation of those Provinces and Colonies, would, among other advantages, promote the developement of the Trade and Manufacturing capabilities of these Provinces and Colonies, and advance the general Prosperity, by inducing the substitution of a Customs' Tariff, uniform and common to the Confederation, in lieu of the various Tariffs now in force in the several Provinces and Colonies.

5. **RESOLVED**, That the Report of the Conference of Delegates from the British North American Provinces and Colonies, held at Quebec in October last, taken as a whole, contains a declaration of principles—as the basis of a Federal Union—which this House considers just to the several Provinces and Colonies.

6. **RESOLVED**, That this House, believing it is only by mutual concessions and compromises, the several British North American Provinces and Colonies can ever agree upon those principles which shall form the basis of a Union, orders that the report of the Conference of Delegates from these several Provinces and Colonies, held at Quebec in October last, be published throughout this Colony, for the deliberate consideration of the people, on whom will devolve the acceptance or rejection of the proposed Union.

7. RESOLVED, That until the larger Maritime Provinces and Canada shall have mutually agreed upon terms of Union, it is inexpedient that the people of Prince Edward Island should be called upon to decide on the question.

8. RESOLVED, That in case the Provinces of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Canada, should at any time mutually agree upon the basis of a Union, the question be then forthwith submitted to the decision of the people of this Island.

And which amendment was, that all the words after "Resolved" to the end of the question be left out, and the following inserted instead thereof:—

"The House having had under consideration the Report of the Convention held at Quebec, respecting a Federal Union of the different Colonies of British America, and a Despatch of the Right Honorable Mr. Cardwell, Her Majesty's principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, respecting the same.

1. RESOLVED, That Prince Edward Island, being entirely dependent on its Agriculture and Fisheries, has nothing to export for which Canada can furnish a market. That while such is, and ever must be the relative commercial position of this Island and Canada, the products of our soil and Fisheries find in the extensive markets of our parent country, the United States and the West Indies, ready and profitable customers. The proposed Union, while admitting the produce and manufactures of Canada into this Island free, would by assimilation of taxes, enormously increase the duty to which those of Great Britain and the United States are at present subject, thereby compelling this Island to take a large portion of its imports from Canada, making payment therefor in money instead of procuring them from countries which would receive our produce in exchange; an arrangement so inconsistent with the fundamental principles of commerce must greatly curtail our commercial intercourse with the United States, and would, in the opinion of this House, materially diminish our exports to that country, and prove most injurious to the agricultural and commercial interests of this Island.

2. That if the relative circumstances of Canada and this Island rendered a Union practicable, the evident injustice of the terms agreed to by the Quebec Convention would prevent their being ratified by the Legislature of this Island. Without alluding to all, it is proper to notice some of the objectionable features of the Report. Without admitting the principle of Representation according to Population under all circumstances to be sound, it is, in the opinion of this House, particularly objectionable as applied to this Island in connexion with Canada, taking into consideration that the number of our inhabitants is, and must continue comparatively small, owing to the fact that we have no Crown Lands, mines, minerals, or other resources sufficient to induce immigrants to settle here, and that we never can expect to become to any extent a manufacturing people in consequence of our navigation being closed for nearly half the year, and all trade and communication with other countries stopped. Under this principle, the City of Montreal alone would, at the present time, have a representation greater than the whole Province of Prince Edward Island, and under the provisions of the Convention which regulates the mode of re-adjusting the relative representation of the various Provinces at each decennial census, looking at the rapid increase of the Population of Upper and Lower Canada heretofore,—particularly the former,—and the certainty of a still greater increase therein in the future, over that of the population of this Island, it follows as a certain and inevitable consequence, if a Federation of the Provinces were consummated upon the basis of the said Convention, that the number of our Representatives would, in the course of a comparatively short number of years, be diminished to a still smaller number than that allotted at the outset to us.

3. That the old Imperial error in granting all the lands in large tracts to absentees, which deprives this Island of the Revenue drawn by the sister Colonies from these sources; our insular position and numerous harbors, furnishing cheap and convenient water communication, which render expensive Public Works here unnecessary; the Revenue to be drawn by the proposed Federal Government from this Island, and expended among the people of Canada

and the other Colonies in constructing Railways and other Public Works, thereby creating a trade which would build up cities and enhance the value of property in various localities there,—advantages in which this Island could enjoy a very small participation; our complete isolation during five months of the year, when ice interrupts our trade and communication with the Mainland, and during which period the Island could derive no possible benefit from the Railroads and other Public Works which they would be (equally with the people of those Colonies) taxed to construct,—these and many other considerations, but which seem to have been entirely ignored, ought, in the opinion of this House, to have produced an offer of a financial arrangement for this Island, very different in its terms from that contained in the Report of the Convention.

4. That while this House recognizes the duty of this Colony to use every means, to the extent of its limited resources, to defend its inhabitants from foreign invasion, it cannot recognize the necessity of uniting in a Confederation with Canada for the purpose of defence, upon terms which, in other respects, are in the opinion of this House, so unfair to the people of Prince Edward Island—thus sacrificing our commercial and financial interests for the sake of securing the co-operation of Canada in a military point of view; feeling assured that so long as we remain a loyal and attached Colony of Great Britain, the powerful aid of that great country will continue as heretofore, to be extended to us, in common with the other North American Dependencies of the British Crown.

Lastly, **RESOLVED**, That this House disagrees to the recommendations of the Quebec Convention, and on the part of Prince Edward Island emphatically declines a Union which, after a serious and careful consideration, it believes would prove politically, commercially and financially disastrous to the rights and interests of its people."

The House resumed the said adjourned debate.

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

MOST GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN.

We, your Majesty's loyal and faithful Servants, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, having had under our consideration the Resolutions or Report of the Conference of Delegates from the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick, and the Colonies of Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island, held at the City of Quebec on the 10th October, 1864, upon the subject of a proposed Confederation of those Provinces and Colonies, and the Despatch of the Right Honourable Edward Cardwell, your Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonial Department, to Lord Viscount Monck, Governor General of Canada, dated the 3rd December, 1864, relative thereto, humbly beg leave to approach your Majesty's Throne, for the purpose of conveying to your august Majesty the expression of our desire and determination, as the Constitutional Representatives of the people of Prince Edward Island, in regard to the great question involved in the said Report; and having, after most mature deliberation, arrived at the conclusion that the proposed Confederation, in so far as it is contemplated to embrace Prince Edward Island, would prove disastrous to the best interests and future prosperity of this Colony, we would humbly crave leave to state the grounds upon which that conclusion is based.

*First*, Prince Edward Island, being entirely dependent on its Agriculture and Fisheries, has no staple commodity to export for which Canada can furnish a Market (Canada being also essentially an agricultural country, and possessing valuable and extensive fisheries in the Gulf of St. Lawrence). That while such is, and ever must be, the relative commercial position of this Island and Canada, the products of our soil and fisheries find in the extensive markets of our Parent Country, the United States, and the West Indies, ready and profitable customers. That the proposed Union, while admitting the produce and manufactures of Canada into this Island free, would, by assimilation of taxes, enormously increase the duty to which those of Great Britain and the United States are at

present subject in this Island, thereby compelling this Colony to take a large portion of its imports from Canada, making payment therefor in money, instead of procuring them from countries which would receive our produce in exchange, an arrangement so inconsistent with the fundamental principles of commerce that it would not only greatly curtail our commercial intercourse with Great Britain and the United States, but materially diminish our exports to those countries, and prove most injurious to the agricultural and commercial interests of this Island.

*Second.* That if the relative circumstances of Canada and this Island rendered a union practicable, the evident injustice of the terms agreed to by the Quebec Conference would prevent their being ratified by this Island. Without entering into full detail on this branch of the subject, or advertent to the fact, that by the proposed terms of the Confederation we are called upon to transfer to the Confederate Exchequer a steadily increasing revenue, and that too, under our comparatively low tariff, for a fixed and settled annual subsidy of a greatly diminished amount, we would briefly notice some of the objectionable features of the said Report.

And, first, in reference to the fundamental principle upon which the Confederation is proposed to rest, namely, representation according to population. Without admitting this principle under all circumstances to be sound or just, we consider it to be particularly objectionable as applied to this Island in connection with Canada, from the fact that the number of our inhabitants is and must continue comparatively small, in consequence of this Island possessing no Crown Lands, mines, or minerals, or other extraneous resources, and that we never can expect to become, to any great extent, a manufacturing people, by reason of our navigation being closed for nearly half the year, and all trade, and even communication with other countries (except by telegraph and the medium of a fragile ice-boat) stopped. And when we consider the provision of the said Report which is intended to regulate the mode of re-adjusting the relative representation of the various Provinces at each decennial census, and reflect upon the rapid rate of increase in the population of Upper and Lower Canada—particularly the former—heretofore, and the certainty of a still greater increase therein in the future, over that of the population of this Island, it follows, as a certain and inevitable consequence, if a Federation of the Provinces were consummated upon the basis of the said Report, that the number of our Representatives in the Federal Parliament

would, in the course of a comparatively short number of years, be diminished to a still smaller number than that proposed to be allotted to us at the commencement of the Union.

*Third.* In further noticing the injustice of the terms of the said Report, as applicable to us, we would advert to the old Imperial policy, so pregnant with ill consequences to us, by which all the lands in this Colony were granted in large tracts to absentees, and which deprives this Island of the revenue drawn by the sister Colonies from these sources.—to our insular position and numerous harbours, furnishing cheap and convenient water communication, which render expensive public works here unnecessary,—to the revenue to be drawn by the proposed Federal Government from this Island and expended among the people of Canada and the other Provinces, in constructing railways, canals, and other great public works, thereby creating a trade which would build up Cities and enhance the value of property in various parts of those Provinces.—advantages in which this Island could enjoy a very small participation,—and to our complete isolation during five months of the year, when ice interrupts our trade and communication with the mainland, and during which period this Island could derive no possible benefit from the railroads and other public works which they would, equally with the people of those Provinces, be taxed to construct. These, and many other circumstances, placing Prince Edward Island in an exceptional position in regard to the other Provinces, but which seem to have been entirely ignored, ought, in our opinion, to have produced an offer of a financial arrangement for this Island very different in its terms from that contained in the Report of the said Conference.

*Fourth.* That while we fully recognize it to be the duty of this Colony to use every means, to the extent of its limited resources, to aid in defending its inhabitants from foreign invasion, we cannot recognize the necessity of uniting in a Confederation with Canada for the purpose of defence upon terms which, in other respects, are so unfair to the people of Prince Edward Island, and thereby sacrificing our commercial and financial interests for the sake of securing the co-operation of Canada in a military point of view; it being our abiding hope and conviction, that so long as we remain a loyal and attached Colony of Great Britain, under whose protecting sway and benign influence we have so long had the happiness to live, and endeavour to aid, by a reasonable contribution towards the defence of our Colony, by placing our Militia service upon a sounder and safer footing than



it has hitherto attained, the powerful aid of our Mother Country will continue, as heretofore, to be extended to us in common with the other North American dependencies of the British Crown. For the foregoing reasons, and many others which we could urge, we beg most humbly and respectfully to state to your Majesty that we, the Representatives of your faithful subjects, the people of Prince Edward Island, in Colonial Parliament now assembled, do disagree to the recommendations contained in the said Report of the Quebec Conference, and on the part of Prince Edward Island, do emphatically decline a Union which, after the most serious and careful consideration, we believe would prove politically, commercially, and financially disastrous to the rights and best interests of its people.

We do, therefore, most humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased not to give your Royal assent or sanction to any Act or Measure founded upon the Resolutions or Report of the said Conference, or otherwise, that would have the effect of uniting Prince Edward Island in a Federal Union with Canada, or any other of your Majesty's Provinces in America.

And the said reported Address being again read

*To the Queen’s Most Excellent Majesty :*

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY :

We, Your Majesty’s dutiful and loyal subjects, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, in Colonial Parliament assembled, beg leave to approach Your Majesty and to submit for Your Royal consideration, the following Statement and Petition :

Your Petitioners have had under their consideration a Despatch, dated Downing Street, 18th February, 1865, and addressed by the Right Honorable Edward Cardwell, Your Majesty’s Principal Secretary of State for the Colonial Department, to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor of this Island, in which Despatch it is intimated to his Excellency that it will be necessary within a very short time, to provide for the Salary of the Lieutenant Governor of this Island out of the funds of the Colony.

Your Petitioners humbly submit to Your Majesty, that in the year 1764, Your Majesty’s Royal Predecessor, King George the Third, caused Prince Edward Island, then called the Island of Saint John, to be surveyed and laid off into Townships of Twenty thousand acres each.

That on the Ninth day of May, A. D., 1764, His said Majesty in Council, was graciously pleased to approve a plan for the granting and the settlement of the said Island.

That at a meeting of His Majesty's Commissioners for Trade and Plantations held on 8th July, 1767, that Board recommended the Lords of the Committee of Council to advise His Majesty to cause the several Lots or Townships, into which the Island has been divided, to be granted under the Seal of the Province of Nova Scotia, to certain individuals according to the distribution, and subject to the conditions set forth in the Minutes of the proceedings of the said Commissioners, on the 8th July, 1767.

That on the 23rd day of July, 1767, the distribution of the Lots or Townships of Prince Edward Island, according as they were mentioned upon the original map or survey of the said Island, was decided upon in presence of their Lordships, His Majesty's Commissioners for Trade and Plantations, by ballot, in the form and manner set down in the Minutes of the proceedings of the said Commissioners, on the 8th July, 1767.

That on the 26th August, 1767, His said Majesty was pleased, with the advice of His Privy Council, to confirm the said proceedings of the Lords Commissioners for Trade and Plantations, and to order the same to be carried into execution.

That on the said 26th August, 1767, the Fee Simple of the whole of the Lands of the said Island, (except about six thousand acres which were subsequently granted,) was vested in one hundred and three persons.

That the Lands so granted were charged with a Quit Rent, varying from two shillings to six shillings per one hundred acres, payable to His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors.

That the annual amount of said Quit Rents was estimated at about Three Thousand Pounds sterling.

That the said Island on being ceded to the Crown of Great Britain by the Treaty of Paris, was attached to the Government of Nova Scotia.

That in the year 1769 the principal proprietors of Land in the said Island, petitioned His Majesty, George the Third, praying that the said Island might be detached from Nova Scotia, and constituted a separate independent Government, and that the Quit Rents payable in respect of the Lands of the said Island might be appropriated to the payment of the expenses of such Government.

That His said Majesty was graciously pleased to grant the prayer of the petition of such Proprietors, and to order that the said Island should be detached from the Province of Nova Scotia, and be constituted a separate Government.

That by Letters Patent, dated at Westminster, on the 4th day of August, 1769, Walter Patterson, Esquire, was duly

commissioned Governor and Captain General in and over the said Island, and authorized to call a General Assembly therein, and to organize a Government.

That a separate Government was granted to the said Island on the express understanding that the expense thereof should be paid out of the Quit Rents to which the Lands were subject, and the Governor of the said Island, on the occasion of his appointment was instructed by His Majesty, that in case the annual amount of said Quit Rents should prove inadequate to the payment of the salaries of the Officers of Government, as fixed on their appointment, either by failure of the Proprietors to pay their Quit Rents, or by any accident or casualty whatever, the salaries and allowances to the several officers should be diminished in proportion.

That the failure of the Proprietors to pay the Quit Rents, to a great extent left the officers of Government without the means of subsistence, and in the Session of 1777, His Majesty's Ministers applied to Parliament for a grant to defray the expense of the Civil Establishment of the Colony.

That in 1818, the Quit Rents upon all the Lands of the Colony were; by Royal authority, reduced to an uniform rate of Two shillings per one hundred acres.

That at this reduced rate the Quit Rents would not exceed One thousand three hundred pounds per annum.

That from 1777 until 1850, the Imperial Parliament voted annually the sum requisite to defray the expense of the Civil Establishment of the Colony.

That as a condition precedent to the introduction of Responsible Government and the surrender of the Crown Revenues prayed for in 1849-1850, Your Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, required that this Colony should provide permanently for the payment of certain officers, and also for the payment of certain pensions.

That the conditions on which Your Majesty's Ministers expressed their willingness to sanction the introduction of Responsible Government into this Island, and to surrender the Crown Revenues, are set forth in Despatches No. 93, dated Downing Street, 27th December, 1849, addressed by Earl Grey to Lieutenant Governor Sir Donald Campbell, and No. 2, dated Downing Street, 31st January, 1851, addressed by Earl Grey to Lieutenant Governor Sir Alexander Bannerman.

That the Representatives of the People of this Island passed the Law, the Act 14th Vic., Chapter 3, by which the Colony is rendered liable to pay the salaries and pensions therein mentioned, and which duly received Your Majesty's Royal Allowance.

That in passing this Law the Legislature relied upon Parliament to provide for the Salary of the Lieutenant Governor, a provision which Earl Grey, Your Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, assured them in the

said Despatch, of the 27th December, 1849, he had no reason to suppose Parliament was likely to withdraw.

That Your Petitioners would humbly beg leave to represent to Your Majesty, that the alienation of the Lands of this Island in manner hereinbefore set forth, deprived the Colony of that important source of Revenue, which in the other British North American Colonies is specially available for the payment of the expense of their Civil Establishment; and that as the Grants were made to Persons having claims upon the Nation for Naval, Military and Civil Services, in consideration of such claims, it is reasonable to expect from Parliament, this small compensation for the great wrong to this Colony occasioned by the improvident alienation of its Lands.

The annual value of the Quit Rents and Crown Lands which passed to this Island under the Act 14th Vic., Cap. 3, taken together, would not be adequate to defray the Salary of the Lieutenant Governor alone.

Your Petitioners therefore humbly pray that Your Majesty, taking into consideration the wrongs which have been inflicted upon this unfortunate Colony by the alienation of the Lands, and the consequent introduction of a System of Leasehold Tenures under absentee Landlords, which has produced wide spread agitation, and also the circumstances under which this Colony enacted the Law passed in the Fourteenth Year of the Reign of Your present Majesty, will be pleased to recommend to Parliament the continuance of the annual provision for the Salary of the Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island, and Your Petitioners, as in duty bound, will ever pray.

An Act to regulate the salaries of the Collectors of Impost and Excise for the Districts of Bedeque and Georgetown.

An Act to assist Leaseholders in the purchase of the Fee-simple of their Farms.

An Act for Raising a Revenue.

An Act for appropriating certain moneys therein mentioned, for the service of the year of Our Lord, One thousand eight hundred and Sixty-five.

To each of which His Excellency was also pleased, in Her Majesty's name, to give his assent

The title of the following Bill was then read :

An Act to carry into effect certain unexecuted agreements made by the late John Hodges Winsloe, Esquire, deceased, for the sale and leasing of certain parts of his Estate in this Colony.

When His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor was pleased to say, that he reserved this Bill for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon.

And then His Excellency was pleased to make the following Speech to both Houses :

*Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council ;*

*Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly ;*

The unremitting attention which you have bestowed on your legislative duties enables me to relieve you, at an earlier period than usual, from further attendance here.

After deliberate consideration of the terms adopted by the Conference at Quebec, as a basis for Confederation of the British North American Provinces, you have refused, on the part of this Colony, to sanction the proposed Scheme.

In accordance with your request, I shall forward to the Secretary of State for the Colonies, your Address to Her Majesty on that subject.

*Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly ;*

I thank you, in Her Majesty's name, for the provision you have made for the Public Service of the year.

The appropriation you have made for Agricultural Purposes is a due acknowledgment of the importance you attach to the cultivation of the soil and the improvement of stock.

*Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council ;*

*Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly ;*

I have given my assent with great satisfaction to the Act which you have passed to assist leaseholders in the purchase of the fee-simple of their farms.

I anticipate most beneficial results from this measure. The assistance which it offers cannot fail to be fully appreciated by a large number of the people whom you represent.

I observe that several measures of Law Reform have occupied your attention, and that you have taken action with a view of facilitating and simplifying the procedure in Courts of Justice.

I am glad to be enabled to relieve you from your legislative duties, by proroguing this General Assembly.

After which the Hon. the President of the Legislative Council said :

Gentlemen ;

It is the will and pleasure of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, that this General Assembly be prorogued until Thursday the Fourth day of May next ; and this General Assembly is accordingly prorogued until Thursday the Fourth day of May next, to be here then holden.

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### Fifteenth Annual Report of the Medical Attendant of the Lunatic Asylum.

CHARLOTTETOWN,

January 31st, 1865.

GENTLEMEN ;

In compliance with the requirements of your Board, I have the honor of presenting you with this Fifteenth Annual Report, comprising a Statistical view of the results of our operations in the Asylum for the Insane, for the year ending January 31st, 1865.

In the fulfilment of this duty, I have the satisfaction of being again able to congratulate your Board and other friends interested in this humane institution, upon the steady enlargement of its field of usefulness, upon the regular increase in the number of patients under its care, of applicants for admission, so far as our limited accommodation can admit, and the number restored to society in the full enjoyment of health. For these blessings, and for the success which has attended our labours, we must feel abundant cause for thankfulness to a beneficent providence, as well for the general absence of acute disease, as for the discipline, good order, and harmony which have always prevailed in the institution.

By directing your attention to the accompanying chart, you will observe, that the number of patients remaining at last report, was 24, viz : Seventeen males and seven females.

There have been admitted during the last year, six patients, viz : Three males and three females.

The number discharged has been four, viz : Three males and one female.

During the past year one death has occurred among the inmates ; it was a case of Acute Pulmonary Consumption in a young woman of 21.

The unimproved Chronic cases amount to eight ; six have improved, twelve much improved, and five have recovered their reason ; while twenty-eight yet remain under treatment.

The Paupers at present, are only four in number, they are all infirm old men, whose united ages amount to 301 years.

With regard to the comfort and accommodation in the Asylum, the recent repairs and enlargement of the wards have been no small acquisition to its general usefulness, by which we have acquired two large associated dormitories, and six private bedrooms, thereby enabling us more advantageously to classify the patients, and administer to their comfort and recovery.

Of the recent additions to the comfort of the building, not the least in importance is that resulting from the two large hot-air Stoves imported from the United States, by which the whole atmosphere of the house is maintained at an equable and comfortable temperature.

I may here remark with regard to the efficiency of the treatment adopted, that out of one hundred and seventeen patients admitted into the Asylum since it was first opened, fifty-nine have been recovered permanently ; being at the rate of fifty-one per cent,—an amount of recoveries not very frequently attained even by institutions of much higher pretensions, with unlimited appliances and princely endowments.

APPENDIX (A)

The Royal Asylum at Glasgow containing six hundred and eighty patients, and acknowledged to be the most perfect in Britain, rates its recoveries at fifty-two per cent. While our percentage of recoveries is calculated from the total number of both recent and Chronic cases, which last, amount to twenty-four, being all over ten years standing, and who may safely be pronounced incurable, evincing as they do but equivocal symptoms of ultimate recovery; but in recent cases alone, our per centage of recoveries sometimes amounts to upwards of 80 per cent, which ought to be a powerful inducement for friends and guardians to place their afflicted relatives under treatment on the first invasion of the disease.

During no previous period since the opening of the Institution has it enjoyed a greater amount of comfort and prosperity, than it does at this present time; the patients are well fed, warmly clothed, and comfortably lodged, and their attendants kind and attentive.

For some years past we have been enabled greatly to mitigate the means of restraint in turbulent cases, and with few exceptions the patients at present, conduct themselves quietly and orderly.

Before closing this brief Report, I have the agreeable duty of referring to the valuable ser-

vices rendered by the several attendants engaged in the various stations about the patients, and assisting in carrying out the details of management and treatment. This is especially due to Mr. Gidley the resident Steward, for his general care and attentive supervision of the patients; to Mrs. Gidley, the Matron, who has the charge of the female department, and particularly to Mr. James Thompson, who has the onerous and responsible charge of attending on 23 of the male patients, a situation which, while he performs this double duty, demanding steadiness, kindness and method, he has accomplished for these several years with much ability and fidelity.

Nor would I do justice to my own feelings did I omit an expression of obligation to the Members of your Board for that uniform and liberal confidence which has tended to render comparatively pleasant the performance of duties always laborious and full of anxiety, and often painfully responsible.

I herewith submit to the consideration of your Board this my Fifteenth Annual Report.

Lest it might be supposed that it devolves on this Province, as originating the idea, to initiate also further action, and that any delay can be fairly charged on the Executive here, I wish to inform your Excellency that having consulted my Executive Council, I am prepared to nominate five Delegates on the part of this Province, three to represent the existing Government, and two Her Majesty's Opposition.

In reference to the time and place for the meeting of the Delegates, I can only say, that whilst I and my Ministry would very cordially welcome the Representatives of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island in this capital, we prefer leaving to them the choice of such place of meeting, as may be in their opinion most appropriate, and most agreeable to themselves.

I see some advantages in the selection of Charlottetown for that purpose, but the point is one on which any determination taken by the authorities of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island will be at once acted on by myself and my Ministry.

I would therefore suggest the expediency of your conferring with His Excellency the Administrator of the Government of New Brunswick, on the early appointment of Delegates, and fixing the time and place for their meeting. The Committee in Council have given their best consideration to the Despatches which have passed between your Excellency and the Lieutenant Governors of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, on the subject of the Conference proposed to be held at Charlottetown, with reference to the future Union of the Provinces with Canada.

The Committee entirely concur in the opinion expressed by the Lieutenant Governors that the proposed meeting must necessarily be of an informal character, but they consider very great advantages will flow from the opportunity that will be thus afforded of considering the practicability of uniting, under one Government, the respective Provinces ; and should it be found that a reasonable prospect exists of such a Union being practicable, the Committee consider that it will then be possible to proceed to a more formal Conference, and to place before the Imperial Government such a general outline of the policy proposed, as may enable Her Majesty's Ministers to determine whether the interests of the Empire will be promoted thereby, and of giving the sanction of the Queen to the future negotiations on the subject.

The Conference met separately, and with these gentlemen daily, until Wednesday the 7th September, and full and free discussion took place between them and the members of the Conference.

Upon the 7th September, at the invitation of the Delegates from Nova Scotia, the Conference was adjourned to meet at Halifax, N. S., when, on the 10th September, it was reassembled at the Legislative Council Chamber, and the discussions continued with the members of the Canadian Government. On the 12th September, upon the invitation of the Delegates from New Brunswick, the Conference was adjourned to meet at St. John, N. B.—Previous to adjournment, the Hon. J. A. Macdonald announced to the Conference that the Executive Council of Canada would advise His Excellency the Governor General

to invite the Lieutenant Governors of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island, to appoint Delegates to attend a Conference at Quebec, to take formally into consideration the subject of a Union of all the British North American Provinces.

Pursuant to adjournment, the Conference met at Stubbs' Hotel, St. John, N. B., on the 16th September, when it was decided to adjourn until after the Conference to be called at Quebec, had formally discussed the larger question in all its bearings.

An adjournment accordingly took place until again called by the Chairman, to meet at such time and place as he should think fit, of which due notice should be given by the Secretaries to the Members.

Such adjourned meeting was duly called and held at the Queen's Hotel, Toronto, C. W., on the 3rd November, when it was

“That in view of the resolutions passed at the Quebec Conference in favor of a Confederation of the British North American Provinces, this Conference decide to postpone the consideration of the question of a Legislative Union of the Maritime Provinces, and that the Joint Secretaries be requested to draw up a report of the proceedings of the Conference for the information of the Lieutenant Governors and of the Legislatures of the Maritime Provinces.”

### REPORT

Of Resolutions adopted at the Conference of Delegates from the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and the Colonies of Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island, held at the City of Quebec, 10th October, 1864, as the Basis of a proposed Confederation of those Provinces and Colonies.

1. The best interests and present and future prosperity of British North America will be promoted by a Federal Union under the Crown of Great Britain, provided such Union can be effected on principles just to the several Provinces.

2. In the Federation of the British North American Provinces the System of Government best adapted, under existing circumstances, to protect the diversified interests of the several Provinces and secure efficiency, harmony and permanency in the working of the Union,— would be a general Government charged with matters of common interest to the whole Country, and Local Governments for each of the Canadas and for the Provinces of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, charged with the control of local matters in their respective sections, Provision being made for the admission into the Union on equitable terms of

Newfoundland, the North-West Territory, British Columbia and Vancouver.

3. In framing a Constitution for the General Government, the Conference, with a view to the perpetuation of our connection with the Mother Country, and to the promotion of the best interests of the people of these Provinces, desire to follow the model of the British Constitution, so far as our circumstances will permit.

4. The Executive Authority or Government shall be vested in the Sovereign of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and be administered according to the well understood principles of the British Constitution by the Sovereign personally, or by the Representative of the Sovereign duly authorised.

5. The Sovereign, or Representative of the Sovereign, shall be Commander in Chief of the Land and Naval Militia Forces.

6. There shall be a General Legislature or Parliament for the Federal Provinces, composed of a Legislative Council and House of Commons.

7. For the purpose of forming the Legislative Council, the Federated Provinces shall be considered as consisting of three divisions, 1st. Upper Canada, 2nd. Lower Canada, 3rd. Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, each division with an equal representation in the Legislative Council.

8. Upper Canada shall be represented in the Legislative Council by 24 Members, Lower Canada by 24 Members, and the three Maritime Provinces by 24 Members, of which Nova Scotia shall have Ten, New Brunswick Ten, and Prince Edward Island Four Members.

9. The Colony of Newfoundland shall be entitled to enter the proposed Union, with a representation in the Legislative Council of four Members.

10. The North-West Territory, British Columbia and Vancouver shall be admitted into the Union, on such terms and conditions as the Parliament of the Federated Provinces shall deem equitable, and as shall receive the assent of Her Majesty; and in the case of the Province of British Columbia or Vancouver, as shall be agreed to by the Legislature of such Province.

11. The Members of the Legislative Council shall be appointed by the Crown under the Great Seal of the General Government, and shall hold Office during Life; if any Legislative Councillor shall, for two consecutive sessions of Parliament, fail to give his attendance

in the said Council, his seat shall thereby become vacant.

12. The Members of the Legislative Council shall be British Subjects by Birth or Naturalization, of the full age of Thirty Years, shall possess a continuous real property qualification of four thousand dollars over and above all incumbrances, and shall be and continue worth that sum over and above their debts and liabilities; but in the case of Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island, the property may be either real or personal.

13. If any question shall arise as to the qualification of a Legislative Councillor, the same shall be determined by the Council.

14. The first selection of the Members of the Legislative Council shall be made—except as regards Prince Edward Island—from the Legislative Councils of the various Provinces, so far as a sufficient number be found qualified and willing to serve; such Members shall be appointed by the Crown at the recommendation of the General Executive Government; upon the nomination of the respective Local Governments, and in such nomination due regard shall be had to the claims of the Members of the Legislative Council of the Opposition in each Province, so that all political parties may as nearly as possible be fairly represented.

15. The Speaker of the Legislative Council—unless otherwise provided by Parliament—shall be appointed by the Crown from among the members of the Legislative Council, and shall hold office during pleasure, and shall only be entitled to a casting vote on an equality of votes.

16. Each of the Twenty-four Legislative Councillors representing Lower Canada in the Legislative Council of the General Legislature, shall be appointed to represent one of the Twenty-four Electoral Divisions mentioned in Schedule A, of chapter first, of the consolidated Statutes of Canada, and such Councillor shall reside or possess his qualification in the Division he is appointed to represent.

17. The basis of Representation in the House of Commons, shall be Population, as determined by the Official Census every ten years; and the number of Members at first shall be 194, distributed as follows:

Upper Canada,	- - - - -	82
Lower Canada,	- - - - -	65
Nova Scotia,	- - - - -	19



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New Brunswick, - - - - -	15
Newfoundland, - - - - -	8
and Prince Edward Island, - - -	5

18. Until the Official Census of 1871 has been made up, there shall be no change in the number of Representatives from the several sections.

19. Immediately after the completion of the Census of 1871, and immediately after every Decennial Census thereafter, the Representation from each section in the House of Commons shall be re-adjusted on the basis of population.

20. For the purpose of such re-adjustments, Lower Canada shall always be assigned sixty-five members, and each of the other sections shall at each re-adjustment receive, for the ten years then next succeeding, the number of members to which it will be entitled on the same ratio of representation to population as Lower Canada will enjoy according to the Census last taken by having sixty-five members.

21. No reduction shall be made in the number of members returned by any section, unless its population shall have decreased relatively to the population of the whole Union, to the extent of five per centum.

22. In computing at each decennial period, the number of members to which each section is entitled, no fractional parts shall be considered, unless when exceeding one half the number entitling to a member, in which case a member shall be given for each such fractional part.

23. The Legislature of each Province shall divide such Province into the proper number of constituencies, and define the boundaries of each of them.

24. The Local Legislature of each Province may, from time to time, alter the Electoral Districts for the purposes of Representation in the House of Commons, and distribute the representatives to which the Province is entitled, in any manner such Legislature may think fit.

25. The number of members may at any time be increased by the General Parliament—regard being had to the proportionate rights then existing.

26. Until provisions are made by the General Parliament, all the Laws which, at the date of the Proclamation constituting the Union, are in force in the Provinces respectively, relating to the qualification and disqualification of any person to be elected or to sit or vote as a member of the Assembly in the said Provinces respectively—and relating to the qualification

or disqualification of voters, and to the oaths to be taken by voters, and to Returning Officers and their powers and duties,—and relating to the proceedings at elections,—and to the period during which such Elections may be continued, and relating to the trial of controverted Elections, and the proceedings incident thereto, and relating to the vacating of seats of members, and to the issuing and execution of new Writs in case of any seat being vacated otherwise than by a dissolution,—shall respectively apply to Elections of Members to serve in the House of Commons, for places situate in those Provinces respectively.

27. Every House of Commons shall continue for five years from the day of the return of the writs choosing the same, and no longer, subject, nevertheless, to be sooner prorogued or dissolved by the Governor.

28. There shall be a Session of the General Parliament once at least in every year, so that a period of twelve calendar months shall not intervene between the last sitting of the General Parliament in one Session and the first sitting thereof in the next session.

29. The General Parliament shall have power to make Laws for the peace, welfare and good Government of the Federated Provinces—saving the Sovereignty of England—and especially Laws respecting the following subjects:

1. The Public Debt and Property.
2. The Regulation of Trade and Commerce.
3. The imposition or regulation of Duties of Customs on Imports and Exports, except on Exports of Timber, Logs, Masts, Spars, Deals and Sawn Lumber, and of Coal and other Minerals.
4. The imposition or regulation of Excise Duties.
5. The raising of money by all or any other modes or systems of Taxation.
6. The Borrowing of Money on the Public Credit.
7. Postal Service.
8. Lines of Steam or other Ships, Railways, Canals, and other works, connecting any two or more of the Provinces together, or extending beyond the limits of any Province.
9. Lines of Steamships between the Federated Provinces and other countries.
10. Telegraphic communication and the incorporation of Telegraph Companies.

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11. All such works as shall, although lying wholly within any Province, be specially declared by the Acts authorising them to be for the general advantage.
12. The Census.
13. Militia — Military and Naval Service and Defence.
14. Beacons, Buoys and Light Houses.
15. Navigation and Shipping.
16. Quarantine.
17. Sea Coast and Inland Fisheries.
18. Ferries between any Province and a Foreign Country, or between any two Provinces.
19. Currency and Coinage.
20. Banking—Incorporation of Banks, and the issue of paper money.
21. Savings Banks.
22. Weights and Measures.
23. Bills of Exchange and Promissory Notes.
24. Interest.
25. Legal Tender.
26. Bankruptcy and Insolvency.
27. Patents of Invention and Discovery.
28. Copy Rights.
29. Indians, and Lands reserved for the Indians.
30. Naturalization and Aliens.
31. Marriage and Divorce.
32. The Criminal Law, excepting the Constitution of Courts of Criminal Jurisdiction, but including the procedure on criminal matters.
33. Rendering uniform all or any of the laws relative to property and civil rights in Upper Canada, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island, and rendering uniform the procedure of all or any of the Courts in these Provinces.; but any Statute for this purpose shall have no force or authority in any Province until sanctioned by the Legislature thereof.
34. The Establishment of a General Court of Appeal for the Federated Provinces.
35. Immigration.
36. Agriculture.
37. And generally respecting all matters of a general character, not specially and exclusively reserved for the local Governments and Legislatures.
38. The General Government and Parliament

shall have all powers necessary or proper for performing the obligations of the Federated Provinces as part of the British Empire to Foreign Countries, arising under Treaties between Great Britain and such countries.

31. The General Parliament may also, from time to time, establish additional Courts, and the General Government may appoint Judges and Officers thereof, when the same shall appear necessary or for the public advantage, in order to the due execution of the laws of Parliament.

32. All Courts, Judges and Officers of the several Provinces shall aid, assist and obey the General Government in the exercise of its rights and powers, and for such purposes shall be held to be Courts, Judges and Officers of the General Government.

33. The General Government shall appoint and pay the Judges of the Superior Courts in each Province, and of the County Courts in Upper Canada, and Parliament shall fix their salaries.

34. Until the consolidation of the laws of Upper Canada, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island, the Judges of these Provinces, appointed by the General Government, shall be selected from their respective Bars.

35. The Judges of the Courts of Lower Canada shall be selected from the Bar of Lower Canada.

36. The Judges of the Court of Admiralty, now receiving salaries shall be paid by the General Government.

37. The Judges of the Superior Courts shall hold their offices during good behaviour, and shall be removable only on the Address of both Houses of Parliament.

### LOCAL GOVERNMENT.

38. For each of the Provinces there shall be an Executive Officer; styled the Lieutenant Governor, who shall be appointed by the Governor General in Council, under the Great Seal of the Federated Provinces, during pleasure: such pleasure not to be exercised before the expiration of the first five years, except for cause: such cause to be communicated in writing to the Lieutenant Governor immediately after the exercise of the pleasure as aforesaid, and also by message to both Houses of Parliament, within the first week of the first Session afterwards.

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39. The Lieutenant Governor of each Province shall be paid by the General Government.

40. In undertaking to pay the salaries of the Lieutenant Governors, the Conference does not desire to prejudice the claim of Prince Edward Island upon the Imperial Government for the amount now paid for the salary of the Lieutenant Governor thereof.

41. The Local Government and Legislature of each Province shall be constructed in such manner as the existing Legislature of such Province shall provide.

42. The Local Legislatures shall have power to alter or amend their constitution from time to time.

43. The Local Legislatures shall have power to make laws respecting the following subjects :

1. Direct Taxation and the imposition of Duties on the export of Timber, Logs, Masts, Spars, Deals and Sawn Lumber, and of Coals and other Minerals.

2. Borrowing Money on the credit of the Province.

3. The establishment and Tenure of Local Offices, and the appointment and payment of Local Officers.

4. Agriculture.

5. Immigration.

6. Education ; saving the rights and privileges which the Protestant or Catholic minority in both Canadas may possess as to their Denominational Schools, at the time when the Union goes into operation.

7. The sale and management of Public Lands, excepting lands belonging to the General Government.

8. Sea coast and Inland Fisheries.

9. The establishment, maintenance and management of Penitentiaries, and of Public and Reformatory Prisons.

10. The establishment, maintenance and management of Hospitals, Asylums, Charities and Eleemosynary Institutions.

11. Municipal Institutions.

12. Shop, Saloon, Tavern, Auctioneer and other Licenses.

13. Local Works.

14. The incorporation of private or local companies, except such as relate to matters assigned to the General Parliament.

15. Property and civil rights, excepting those portions thereof assigned to the General Parliament.

16. Inflicting punishment by fine, penalties, imprisonment or otherwise for the breach of laws passed in relation to any subject within their jurisdiction.

17. The Administration of Justice, including the Constitution, maintenance and organization of the Courts—both of Civil and Criminal Jurisdiction, and including also the Procedure in Civil Matters.

18. And generally all matters of a private or local nature not assigned to the General Parliament.

44. The power of respiting, reprieving, and pardoning Prisoners convicted of crimes, and of commuting and remitting of sentences in whole or in part, which belongs of right to the Crown, shall be administered by the Lieutenant Governor of each Province in Council, subject to any instructions he may from time to time receive from the General Government, and subject to any provisions that may be made in this behalf by the General Parliament.

### MISCELLANEOUS.

45. In regard to all subjects over which jurisdiction belongs to both the General and Local Legislatures, the laws of the General Parliament shall control and supersede those made by the Local Legislature, and the latter shall be void so far as they are repugnant to or inconsistent with the former.

46. Both the English and French languages may be employed in the General Parliament and in its proceedings, and in the Local Legislatures of Lower Canada, and also in the Federal Courts, and in the Courts of Lower Canada.

47. No lands or property belonging to the General or Local Government shall be liable to taxation.

48. All Bills for appropriating any part of the Public Revenue, or for imposing any new Tax or Impost, shall originate in the House of Commons, or in the House of Assembly, as the case may be.

49. The House of Commons or House of Assembly shall not originate or pass any Vote, Resolution, Address or Bill, for the appropriation of any part of the Public Revenue, or of any Tax or Impost to any purpose, not first recommended by Message of the Governor General, or the Lieutenant Governor, as the case may be, during the Session in which such Vote, Resolution, Address or Bill is passed.

## APPENDIX (E.)

50. Any Bill of the General Parliament, may be reserved in the usual manner for Her Majesty's Assent; and any Bill of the Local Legislatures may in like manner be reserved for the consideration of the Governor General.

51. Any Bill passed by the General Parliament shall be subject to disallowance by Her Majesty within two years, as in the case of Bills passed by the Legislatures of the said Provinces hitherto; and in like manner any Bill passed by a Local Legislature, shall be subject to disallowance by the Governor General within one year after the passing thereof.

52. The Seat of Government of the Federated Provinces shall be OTTAWA, subject to the Royal Prerogative.

53. Subject to any future action of the respective Local Governments, the seat of the Local Government in Upper Canada shall be Toronto; of Lower Canada, Quebec; and the Seats of the Local Governments in the other Provinces shall be as at present.

### PROPERTY AND LIABILITIES.

54. All Stocks, Cash, Bankers' Balances and Securities for money belonging to each Province, at the time of the Union, except as hereinafter mentioned, shall belong to the General Government.

55. The following Public Works and Property of each Province, shall belong to the General Government, to wit:

1. Canals;
2. Public Harbours;
3. Light Houses and Piers;
4. Steamboats, Dredges and Public Vessels;
5. River and Lake Improvements;
6. Railway and Railway Stocks, Mortgages and other Debts due by Railway Companies;
7. Military Roads;
8. Custom Houses, Post Offices, and other Public Buildings, except such as may be set aside by the General Government for the use of the Local Legislatures and Governments;
9. Property transferred by the Imperial Government and known as Ordnance Property;
10. Armories, Drill Sheds, Military Clothing and Munitions of War; and
11. Lands set apart for Public purposes.

56. All lands, mines, minerals and royalties vested in Her Majesty in the Provinces of Upper Canada, Lower Canada, Nova Scotia,

New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, for the use of such Provinces, shall belong to the Local Government of the territory in which the same are so situate; subject to any trusts that may exist in respect to any of such lands or to any interest of other persons in respect of the same.

57. All sums due from purchasers or lessees of such lands, mines or minerals at the time of the Union, shall also belong to the Local Governments.

58. All assets connected with such portions of the public debt of any Province as are assumed by the Local Governments, shall also belong to those Governments respectively.

59. The several Provinces shall retain all other Public Property therein, subject to the right of the General Government, to assume any Lands of Public Property required for Fortifications or the Defence of the Country.

60. The General Government shall assume all the Debts and Liabilities of each Province.

61. The Debt of Canada not specially assumed by Upper and Lower Canada respectively, shall not exceed at the time of the Union,

\$62,500,000

Nova Scotia shall enter the Union with a debt not exceeding,

8,000,000

And New Brunswick, with a debt not exceeding,

7,000,000

62. In case Nova Scotia or New Brunswick do not incur liabilities beyond those for which their Governments are now bound, and which shall make their debts at the date of Union less than \$8,000,000 and \$7,000,000 respectively, they shall be entitled to interest at 5 per cent. on the amount not so incurred, in like manner as is hereinafter provided for Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island; the foregoing resolution being in no respect intended to limit the powers given to the respective Governments of those Provinces by Legislative authority, but only to limit the maximum amount of charge to be assumed by the General Government. Provided always, that the powers so conferred by the respective Legislatures shall be exercised within five years from this date, or the same shall then lapse.

63. Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island, not having incurred Debts equal to those of the other Provinces, shall be entitled to receive by half-yearly payments in advance from the General Government, the Interest at five per cent. on the difference between the actual

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amount of their respective Debts at the time of the Union, and the average amount of indebtedness per head of the Population of Canada, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

64. In consideration of the transfer to the General Parliament of the powers of Taxation, an annual grant in aid of each Province shall be made, equal to 80 cents per head of the Population, as established by the Census of 1861. The Population of Newfoundland being estimated at 130,000. Such aid shall be in full settlement of all future demands upon the General Government for local purposes, and shall be paid half-yearly in advance to each Province.

65. The position of New Brunswick being such as to entail large immediate charges upon her local revenues, it is agreed that for the period of ten years from the time when the Union takes effect, an additional allowance of \$63,000 per annum shall be made to that Province. But that so long as the liability of that Province remains under \$7,000,000, a deduction equal to the interest on such deficiency shall be made from the \$63,000.

66. In consideration of the surrender to the General Government by Newfoundland of all its rights in Mines and Minerals, and of all the ungranted and unoccupied Lands of the Crown. it is agreed that the sum of \$150,000 shall each year be paid to that Province, by semi-annual payments. Provided that that Colony shall retain the right of opening, constructing and controlling Roads and Bridges through any of the said Lands, subject to any Laws which the General Parliament may pass in respect of the same.

67. All engagements that may, before the Union, be entered into with the Imperial Government for the Defence of the Country, shall be assumed by the General Government.

68. The General Government shall secure, without delay, the completion of the Intercolonial Railway from Riviere-du-Loup through New Brunswick to Truro in Nova Scotia.

69. The communications with the North-Western Territory, and the improvements required for the development of the Trade of the Great West with Seaboard, are regarded by this Conference as subjects of the highest importance to the Federated Provinces, and shall be prosecuted at the earliest possible period that the state of the finances will permit.

70. The sanction of the Imperial and Local

Parliaments shall be sought for the Union of the Provinces, on the principles adopted by the Conference.

71. That Her Majesty the Queen be solicited to determine the rank and name of the Federated Provinces.

72. The proceedings of the Conference shall be authenticated by the signatures of the Delegates, and submitted by each Delegation to its own Government, and the Chairman is authorised to submit a copy to the Governor General for transmission to the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

With the sanction of the Crown, and upon the invitation of the Governor General, men of every Province, chosen by the respective Lieutenant Governors, without distinction of party, assembled to consider questions of the utmost interest to every subject of the Queen, of whatever race or faith, resident in those Provinces, and have arrived at a conclusion destined to exercise a most important influence upon the future welfare of the whole community.

Animated by the warmest sentiments of loyalty and devotion to their sovereign, earnestly desirous to secure for their posterity throughout all future time the advantages which they enjoy as subjects of the British Crown,—steadfastly attached to the Institutions under which they live, they have conducted their deliberations with patient sagacity, and have arrived at unanimous conclusions on questions involving many difficulties, and calculated under less favorable auspices to have given rise to many differences of opinion.

Such an event is in the highest degree honorable to those who have taken part in these deliberations. It must inspire confidence in the men by whose judgment and temper this result has been attained ; and will ever remain on record as an evidence of the salutary influence exercised by the Institutions under which these qualities have been so signally developed.

Her Majesty's Government have given to your Despatch, and to the Resolutions of the Conference their most deliberate consideration. They have regarded them as a whole, and as having been designed by those who have framed them to establish as complete and perfect a Union of the whole into one Government, as the circumstances of the case, and a due consideration of existing interests, would admit. They accept them, therefore, as being in the deliberate judgment of those best qualified to decide upon the subject, the best framework of a measure to be passed by the Imperial Parliament for attaining that most desirable result.

The point of principal importance to the practical well-working of the scheme is the accurate determination of the limits between the authority of the Central, and that of the local Legislatures in their relation to each other. It has not been possible to exclude

from the Resolutions some provisions which appear to be less consistent than might, perhaps, have been desired with the simplicity and unity of the system. But upon the whole it appears to Her Majesty's Government, that precautions have been taken which are obviously intended to secure to the central Government the means of effective action throughout the several Provinces, and to guard against those evils which must inevitably arise, if any doubt were permitted to exist as to the respective limits of central and local authority. They are glad to observe that, although large powers of Legislation are intended to be vested in local bodies, yet the principle of central control has been steadily kept in view. The importance of this principle cannot be overrated. Its maintenance is essential to the practical efficiency of the system; and to its harmonious operation both in the general administration and in the Governments of the several Provinces. A very important part of this subject is the expense which may attend the working of the central and the local Governments. Her Majesty's Government cannot but express the earnest hope that the arrangements which may be adopted in this respect may not be of such a nature as to increase, at least in any considerable degree, the whole expenditure, or to make any material addition to the taxation, and thereby retard the internal industry, or tend to impose new burdens on the commerce of the country.

Her Majesty's Government are anxious to lose no time in conveying to you their general approval of the proceedings of the Conference. There are, however, two provisions of great importance which seem to require revision. The first of these is the provision contained in the 44th Resolution, with respect to the exercise of the Prerogative of Pardon. It appears to Her Majesty's Government that this duty belongs to the Representative of the Sovereign, and could not with propriety be devolved upon the Lieutenant Governors, who will, under the present scheme, be appointed not directly by the Crown, but by the central Government of the United Provinces.

The second point which Her Majesty's Government desire should be reconsidered, is the Constitution of the Legislative Council. They appreciate the considerations which have influenced the Conference in determining the mode in which this Body, so important to the

Constitution of the Legislature, should be composed. But it appears to them to require further consideration, whether if the members be appointed for life, and their number be fixed, there will be any sufficient means of restoring harmony between the Legislative Council, and the popular Assembly, if it shall ever unfortunately happen that a decided difference of opinion shall arise between them.

These two points relating to the Prerogative of the Crown and to the constitution of the Upper Chamber, have appeared to require distinct, and separate notice. Questions of minor consequence, and matters of detailed arrangement, may properly be reserved for a future time, when the provisions of the Bill, intended to be submitted to the Imperial Parliament, shall come under consideration, Her Majesty's Government anticipate no serious difficulty in this part of the case, since the Resolutions will generally be found sufficiently explicit to guide those who will be entrusted with the preparation of the Bill. It appears to them, therefore, that you should now take immediate measures, in concert with the Lieutenant Governors of the several Provinces, for submitting to the respective Legislatures this project of the Conference, and if, as I hope, you are able to report that these Legislatures sanction and adopt the scheme, Her Majesty's Government will render you all the assistance in their power, for carrying it into effect.

It will probably be found to be the most convenient course that in concert with the Lieutenant Governors you should select a deputation of the persons best qualified to proceed to this country, that they may be present during the preparation of the Bill, and give to Her Majesty's Government the benefit of their counsel upon any question which may arise during the passage of the measure through the two Houses of Parliament.

The year 1864 will live in history as the EPOCH OF CONFEDERATION—the year in which, in our little Town, assembled the leading minds of the British North American Colonies, and entered upon the discussion of the great question of a Confederation of the several Provinces, which resulted in the Quebec Conference, and the adoption of the Resolutions which are to form the basis of a Confederation destined at no very distant day to constitute one of the greatest nations of the earth.

The expense of the Conference will be complained of by some in the Lower Provinces, especially in this Island, where the great majority of the people appear to be wholly averse to Confederation. Let our people bear in mind, that if no other benefits should result from the Conference, than those which will flow from the interchange of sentiments between the leading statesmen of the several Provinces, and the wide dissemination of information relating to the Colonies, consequent upon the publication in all parts of Europe of the speeches delivered by the delegates, they, in common with the people of the several Colonies, will be amply repaid.

For years past the statesmen of the several Provinces have been impressed with the desirability of a general meeting for the purpose of discussing matters relating to the Provinces generally. No occasion other than the Conferences of 1864 could have brought together the men who met in Charlottetown and at Quebec. They were men of very different politics—Members of Governments and Members of Oppositions—not a few of whom had for years been mutually opposed the one to the other—often in contests savoring too much of personal feeling—they met, and displaying a common spirit of conciliation, compromise and concession, and actuated by one common desire—that of advancing the general interest of their common country. Well may the Press of England express satisfaction at the unanimity and good feeling which characterised the proceedings of the Conference. The unseemly differences, which are too often witnessed in the Colonies, were unknown in the Conferences—the proceedings of which evidence ability and enlightened statesmanship, such as our transatlantic friends did not expect to find among Colonists. Prince Edward Island may not accept the offer of Confederation with her great and flourishing neighbors; the refusal to do so will injure Prince Edward Island alone, and will not at all affect the grand question. We have done our duty. We have urged Confederation—the people have declared against it; and, by-and-by, when, in Prince Edward Island, the desire for Confederation shall be as loudly expressed as to-day is expressed the desire to avoid it—and that hour, we predict, will come—we shall have our reward.

Referring to my Despatches, No. 124, of August 26th, and No. 129 of September 1st, I have the honor to transmit a copy of an approved Minute of the Executive Council of Canada, requesting me to invite the Governments of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland, to send representatives to a Conference with the Ministers of Canada at Quebec, to be held for the purpose of considering the question of the Union of these Provinces, and to digest a practical plan for the realization of the idea, which should be submitted for your approval.

The desire for a closer union amongst these Colonies than has hitherto existed appears to be very generally felt, both in Canada and the Lower Provinces.

It appears to me that the mode of proceeding suggested in this minute is the only one in which the views entertained by the leading politicians of the British North American Colonies, on this important subject, can be brought intelligibly and in a practical form before your attention.

This course is also, I think, that which was pointed out by the Duke of Newcastle, in his Despatch to Lord Mulgrave, (Nova Scotia, No. 182) of July 6, 1862, transmitting to me for my information, on the same day, as that which ought to be pursued in the circumstances.

I have therefore had no hesitation in com-

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plying with the request of my Executive Council, and I have addressed identical communications (of which I enclose a copy) to the Lieutenant Governors of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, and to the Governor of Newfoundland, inviting them to nominate deputations to represent these respective Provinces at the proposed Conference.

Referring to my Despatch (No. 135) of the 23rd of September, in which I have informed you that I had invited the Lieutenant Governors of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, and the Governor of Newfoundland, to send Representatives to confer with the members of the Canadian Government on the feasibility of effecting a Union between the Colonies of British North America, and to my

Despatches of the 14th October, (No. 151), and the 2nd November (No. 165), in which I enclosed to you the answer received to that invitation. I have the honor to report that the several gentlemen named in the communications above referred to, as representatives of those Colonies respectively, arrived at Quebec, on Monday the 10th October, the day named for the assembling of the Conference.

They immediately proceeded to the consideration of the important question, the discussion of which constituted the object of their meeting, having appointed Sir E. P. Tache, Prime Minister of Canada, as Chairman, to preside over their deliberations.

Their sittings began on the 10th October, and continued *de die in diem* until the 28th of the same month.

I have now the honor to transmit the Resolutions agreed to by the Conference, for which I would ask the favorable consideration of yourself and Her Majesty's Government.

I may state that an extended intercourse with the members of the Conference enables me to assure you that they were one and all actuated by the strongest feelings of loyalty to the Queen, the most earnest desire to maintain the connection with England, and the wish to make the proposed Union work, so as to strengthen that connection by enabling the Provinces to take upon themselves more largely the responsibilities of a self-governing community.

I do not enter into any argument to prove that a consolidation of these Provinces is desirable, if it can be effected on principles which will give guarantees for strength and durability.

The advantages of a well-considered plan of Union, whether looked at from a point of administration, commerce, or defence, appear to me so obvious that it would be a waste of time to state them, and the fact that the most eminent public men of all the Provinces concur in desiring such a Union, appears to me to go a long way in superseding the necessity for any abstract arguments in its favor.

The plan which has been adopted by the Conference, you will observe, is the Union of all the Provinces, on the monarchical principle, under one Governor to be appointed by the Crown, with Ministers responsible, as in England, to a Parliament consisting of two Houses, one to be nominated by the Crown, and the other elected by the people.

APPENDIX (E.)

To this central Government and Legislature will be committed all the general business of the United Provinces, and its authority on all such subjects will be supreme, subject, of course, to the rights of the Crown, and the Imperial Parliament.

For the purpose of local administration, it is proposed to have, in each Province, an Executive Officer, to be appointed by the Governor, and removable by him, for cause to be assigned, assisted by a Legislative body, the constitution of which it is proposed to leave to the decision of the present local Legislatures, subject to the approbation of the Imperial Parliament.

To these local bodies are to be entrusted the execution of certain specified duties of a local character, and they are to have no rights or authority beyond what is expressly delegated to them by the act of Union.

To the general Government, it is proposed, to reserve the right of disallowing the Acts passed the local Legislatures.

I think this will be found a fair general outline of the constitutional portion of the proposed scheme of Union, and I trust it will be found of such a nature as to merit the general approbation of Her Majesty's Government.

I do not allude to the proposed financial arrangements between the different Members of the proposed Union, as these relate to questions exclusively affecting the Provinces, and upon which I presume they may safely be allowed to adopt any course which they may themselves think conducive to their interests.

In transmitting these Resolutions for your consideration, I venture to state my opinion that the desire for a consolidation of British North America, has taken strong hold on the minds of the most earnest and thoughtful men in these Provinces, and I trust, whether on the plan suggested by these Resolutions, or on some modification of it, a Union may be effected which will satisfy the aspirations of so loyal and influential a portion of Her Majesty's subjects.

MY LORD;

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Lordship's Despatch of the 23rd December, transmitting copy of the reply of Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State to your Lordship, expressing the views of the Queen's Government on the Resolutions adopted by the Quebec Conference.

2. In reference to the course which your Lordship suggests, for the purpose of giving effect to the instructions of Her Majesty's Government, viz: to submit to the respective Legislatures the project of the Conference, I am in a position to state that this Government will take similar steps to those proposed to be taken in Canada. That is to say, when the papers and correspondence connected with the subject shall have been laid before Parliament, which I have summoned to meet on the 9th February, an address to Her Majesty will be moved by the Leader of the Government, praying Her Majesty to direct steps to be taken for passing an Act of the Imperial Parliament to unite the Provinces of British North America.

The Resolutions of the Quebec Conference will be suggested as the basis of such Union to be carried out in such manner as may be judged by Her Majesty's Government most compatible with the joint interests of the Crown, and of these portions of the British Empire.

APPENDIX (E.)

3. It is evident from the communication of the Right Hon. the Secretary of State, that Her Majesty's Government expects to be aided in the preparation of a Bill embodying the suggestions of the Quebec Conference by deputations from the respective Provinces.

It also appears to myself and the Members of my Government that to avoid the probable multiplied divergency of opinion in each Legislature, inseparable from discussing a great variety of details in several independent Parliaments, despite of a general agreement in the main objects and principles of the general scheme, it is better for these Provinces to avail themselves of the friendly arbitrament of the Queen's Government, and send Delegates to consult with the latter during preparation of the proposed Imperial Bill. The peculiar views of each Legislature might, if necessary, find expression in instructions to the Delegates from each.

This seems the wisest and most complete mode of disposing of all questions of Prerogative, as well as of all suggested amendments of the Quebec Resolutions. On all such points I, and my Council, feel that the simplest and most effectual mode of serving these Provinces is to confide in the wisdom, discretion and friendly disposition of the Imperial Government.

Any other course appears to this Government calculated to open a door to the renewal not of one, but of as many Conferences as there are distinct Legislatures. Such a course might possibly end in the indefinite adjournment of all Union, and this Government would view with serious apprehension the grave consequences, and general embarrassment to public business which might be caused by thus holding in suspense such important questions, and protracting their discussion so late as to prevent their settlement by Imperial Legislation within the current year.

I trust the above views of myself, and of this Government coincide with those of your Lordship, and that all these Provinces may attain the early realization of their hopes of Union, by reposing a general confidence in the ability and wisdom of Her Majesty's Government to arrange satisfactorily whatever details the Quebec Conference may have left incomplete.

SIR;

The state of the Militia in the different British North American Provinces having lately engaged my attention, I have observed, with satisfaction, that in Prince Edward Island a Volunteer movement has arisen which reflects much credit on the loyalty and spirit of the Inhabitants. On the other hand, I learn that a law exists among the Statutes of the Island which declares that the Militia shall not be called out "except only in times of war, civil commotion, or other sufficient emergency."

It appears that this enactment was passed simultaneously with the concession to the Legislature, of Responsible Government, so that at the time when the Inhabitants obtained

exclusive power to manage their own affairs, they inaugurated their career of self-Government by depriving their Militia of the opportunity of becoming an organized and efficient body.

You will, I am sure, concur with me in the opinion, that if, in time of peace, a community neglects those measures of precaution by which its independence against foreign aggression can be secured, its safety must be more than imperilled in time of war. Her Majesty's Government are very desirous that no British Colony should be left in this situation; and I wish that you would confer with the Members of your Council with the view of remedying a state of affairs, as respects the Militia, which has no parallel in British North America.

SIR :

I have the honor to transmit herewith, three authenticated copies of An Act passed during the late Session of the Legislature "for settling differences between Landlord and Tenant, and to enable Tenants on certain Townships to purchase the Fee-simple of their Farms," and also the Attorney General's report thereon.

2. This Act reserved by a suspending clause for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure, received my assent on the 2nd instant.

3. The voluminous correspondence on the Land Question of this Island, and more particularly that which has taken place since the appointment of the Royal Commission, renders it unnecessary for me to enter into the subject. It is sufficient for me to remark, that the enclosed Act is intended to settle this embarrassing question, in so far as the Proprietors who consented to the Commission are concerned.

4. The terms of the enclosed Act are shortly as follows:

All Tenants (on the Estates of these Proprietors) who have unexpired Leases of not less than 40 years, are to have the right to purchase the Fee-simple of their farms, at 15 years purchase of the annual rent, for a period of ten years from the time when this Act shall come into operation.

3. All arrears of rent that accrued previous to May 1st, 1858, are to be bona fide remitted by the Proprietors as recommended by the Commissioners, except only in the case of Tenants who have not complied with the recommendation of the Commissioners to pay the

annually accruing rent, and against whom judgments have been entered up in the Supreme Court.

4. The decision of the Commissioners as regards Fishery Reserves and Quit Rents, is to be declared binding in law and equity in respect of these Proprietors.

5. Such is the substance of the enclosed Act, to which I venture to ask your early attention.

6. I heartily trust that the Proprietors will consent to these terms, and that you will be able to advise Her Majesty specially to confirm this Act.

With reference to my Despatch No. 61, of 16th ultimo, I have the honour to enclose the minute of my advisers, which I informed you was being prepared.

2. I also enclose a printed copy of the Petitions (transmitted with that Despatch), praying Her Majesty to disallow the Act passed last Session, "for settling differences between Landlord and Tenant, and to enable Tenants on certain Townships to purchase the fee simple of their farms."

3. With regard to the Petition of the Fishermen, praying that the Act be disallowed, because by it the Fishery Reserves are conceded to the Proprietors, I cannot do better than refer you to the remarks made on the subject of these Reserves by the Land Commissioners in their Report, transmitted to me with the Duke of Newcastle's Despatch No. 94, of 7th Feb., 1862.

4. On the objections generally, I may remark, that my ministers never expected that the measure which they introduced last Session, and which was approved by the Legislature, was one which would meet with the entire approval of either Tenants or Proprietors. It was intended as a compromise between the conflicting interests of the two parties, and not as a measure which would be proposed by either, if possessed of unlimited powers to legislate for their own advantage.

5. From these Petitions it appears that some Tenants object to this Act. I have reason to believe that its terms are not such as satisfy all the Proprietors.

Extract from Minutes of the Executive Council.  
COUNCIL CHAMBER,  
7th September, 1864.

At a Meeting of Council,

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor,  
&c., &c., &c.,

His Excellency laid before the Board a Petition from divers inhabitants of this Island, praying Her Majesty the Queen may not give Her assent to the Act of the Colonial Legislature of this Island, passed on the Second day of May, 1864, intituled "An Act for settling differences between Landlord and Tenant, and to enable Tenants on certain Townships to purchase the fee simple of their Farms."

The Board thereupon expressed its regret that any number of the Tenantry of the landed Estates in this Colony should be so misguided as to raise any opposition to a measure which has been passed by a large majority of both Branches of the Legislature, and by those bodies considered of especial advantage to a vast number of the Tenantry of the Colony.

The Petition states, "That such Act has been passed without the sense of the tenants and other Electors of this Island being taken upon its provisions, and contrary, as Petitioners believe, to their wishes."

The Board feel it impossible to determine what number or proportion of the Petitioners are tenants, inasmuch as there is nothing in the Petition to distinguish which of the Petitioners are tenants, and which are not; nor does it in fact appear what number of the Petitioners of any class have actually signed or subscribed the Petition, as many parts of the list of signatures exhibit numerous names signed in succession by the one hand.

The Board is of opinion, that in proceeding to legislate upon any principle or measure with a view of settling the long agitated Land Question of this Colony, the Legislature, of whatsoever party composed, must be guided and restrained by that regard for the rights of property which is secured to all classes by the long-established principles of our Constitution.

Were it to depart from this, and to be guided merely by the suggestions of the tenantry in their own case, emanating directly from them as a class, and to yield entirely to their wishes, it would be in vain to expect that a law embodying and framed substantially upon their own opinions and wishes would ever receive the sanction of the Sovereign.

The Act of Assembly to which the Petitioners object secures to all the tenants of the Estates which come within its operation, the freeholds of their farms at fifteen years purchase, keeping that right open to them for ten years, and it provides for a remission of all back rents up to the year 1858.

The Petitioners allege this to be a high rate, and that they conceive the Tenantry at large will derive no benefit from it. From the public newspapers it appears that the same Committee who have waited on His Excellency with the Petition, have lately negotiated a purchase from Robert P. Haythorne, Esquire, of his Estate, on Township Number Forty-Nine, on behalf of the tenants thereof, the terms of which purchase are Twelve shillings and Sixpence per acre, payable by equal yearly instalments in five years each, bearing interest at six per cent; and in addition thereto, payment of the back rent as a sixth instalment, with interest on the same until paid; and if the tenant fails to fulfil these conditions *by nine days default* in payment of any one instalment, or the interest thereon, he forfeits his right to purchase, and the payments he has made are placed to the account of past and future rent. Thus a tenant of one hundred acres of land who owes thirty pounds back rent, will have to pay on this Estate, Ninety-two pounds Ten shillings (£92 10s. 0d.) for the freehold of his farm, besides five years interest on his back rent, making the sum of (£101 10s. 0d. exclusive of what interest he may have to pay on his instalments. Under the Land Purchase Bill complained of, a tenant of one hundred acres, who pays one shilling sterling yearly per acre, (and the exceptions of those who pay a higher rent, are comparatively very few) who owes £30 arrears of rent, or who might owe £50 of arrears prior to 1858, instances of which latter case are very common, will be enabled to purchase his farm at any time within ten years, for the sum of

£83 6s. 8d. currency. Thus there appears to the Board a most singular inconsistency in their opinions on the merits of the Bill, of those persons, who, as representing the body of Petitioners, have accepted terms for such of them as are Mr. Haythorne's tenants in the purchase of the freehold of their farms.

Although they believe that that portion of said Act which grants them a remission of arrears of Rent up to May 1st, 1858, might be an advantage to a very few of your Petitioners, yet your humble Petitioners do not accept said Bill (as a whole,) as any just settlement of the said differences so existing.

And your Petitioners believe that the above measure is not at all calculated to remove the grievances under which this Island generally,

and the tenant portion thereof particularly, have suffered, and do suffer, on account of the original improvident granting away of the Lands, and the evils entailed upon it, and upon them, under the pernicious system of Landlordism.

That no settlement of the Land Question will be just, or of any benefit, unless on a much more liberal and extensive footing than the measure above alluded to; and the Petitioners, your Majesty's loyal subjects, approaching your Majesty with every feeling of devotion and loyalty, therefore humbly Petition your Majesty not to give your Majesty's assent thereunto.

And your petitioners, as in duty bound, will ever pray.

Ladyship informs you; that Mr. Henry Palmer of this Island, assures her, that he never gave his assent to the provisions of the recent Act of the Provincial Legislature, for settling the differences between Landlords and Tenants, and that his name had been inserted in the Schedule to the Act, without his knowledge and against his consent.

2. You request that I will furnish you with a full explanation upon this point at as early a period as possible, and you inform me that in the meantime, the final confirmation of the Act will be suspended.

3. I regret that the absence in England of Mr. Henry Palmer prevents my giving you as much information regarding this matter as I desire.

4. I have the honor, however, to enclose a letter addressed to me by Mr. Attorney General Palmer on the subject. He has entered so fully into it, that little necessity exists for amplification on my part.

5. After the failure of the various modes that from time to time had been proposed of adjusting the land differences, the present measure was introduced by my ministers as a settlement which, although open to objection, was deemed by them to be a reasonable compromise between the conflicting interest of Landowner and Tenant.

6. The Proprietors named in the Schedule, were not consulted by the local Government previous to the introduction of the Act in question. They are those who consented to the Commission of 1860, and who were subsequently named in the Schedule of Sir S. Cunard's Draft Bill, transmitted to me by the Duke of Newcastle, in his Despatch No. 103, of 5th April, 1862.

7. Mr. Henry Palmer, one of these Proprietors was resident in Charlottetown during the whole of last Session, when the Act in question was introduced, carried through the Legislature and received my assent. He must have been acquainted with all the provisions of this Act, which his brother the Attorney General had drawn up, and aware that his name with that of his brother was in the Schedule.

8. The Act received my assent on the 2nd May, and with the Schedule annexed, was

published in the *Royal Gazette*, of May 11, 1864. Mr. Henry Palmer did not leave this Island for England, until the 4th June, up to that period he did not make any protest against his name having been inserted in the Schedule to the Bill, and I gather from your Despatch, that since his arrival in England he has not made any direct appeal against it.

9. I am therefore led to conclude, that Lady Georgina Fane has misunderstood Mr. Palmer's sentiments on the subject, and that Mr. Palmer does not wish to throw any obstacle in the way of the confirmation of this Act.

10. I have, therefore, directed that a communication be addressed to Mr. Henry Palmer, who is still in England, requesting that he will, in order to avoid loss of time, correspond directly with the Colonial Office.

I may add, that I understand that Mr. Henry Palmer's interest in Lot 1, of this Island, is of the value of about £25 sterling per annum.

SIR ;

I have had the honour to receive from your Excellency, a copy of a Despatch dated 8th July, 1864, from the Colonial Minister, respecting Mr. Henry Palmer's reported dissent from the Bill recently passed here "for settling differences between Landlord and Tenant."

In compliance with your Excellency's wish to be furnished with my observations on the subject, I beg leave to state, that I was not previously apprized that Mr. Henry Palmer had not given his sanction to this Bill, as much at least as any other of the Proprietors whose names appear in the Schedule attached to it.

APPENDIX (G.)

In preparing the draft of the Bill for the purpose of being introduced into the Legislature last Session, I, in compliance with the instructions of the Colonial Government, adopted the Schedule which contained the names of those Proprietors, who were originally parties to the Commission in 1860. This list was altered only, as regarded those Proprietors who had sold Estates to the local Government between the periods of the Commission being issued, and the passing of the Bill last spring. As the Draft Bill, prepared by me, was liable to amendment in its passage through the Legislature, where indeed it underwent considerable alteration, no advantage would have resulted in previously obtaining the formal consent of the Proprietors to a draft liable to important changes.

The views of those Proprietors resident in England, and named in the Schedule have not yet been officially made known, and with their opinions, I am consequently unacquainted. As to the other Proprietors named in the Schedule, resident in this Island, I can speak with greater confidence. They were on the spot when the Bill was introduced into the House of Assembly, and must have been fully aware of their names being in the Schedule. It was open to them at any time to protest against a measure the provisions of which were well known and freely canvassed in this community; but no remonstrance to the local authorities was made, nor, as far as I am aware of, was any Petition against the final confirmation of the Act forwarded by them to the Colonial Minister. All those gentlemen named in the Schedule, and resident in the Island, may therefore, have been reasonably supposed to acquiesce in the Bill; and as it was published in the *Royal Gazette* within ten days from the time when your Excellency gave your assent to it, none can plead ignorance of its provisions, or of his name appearing in the Schedule.

With regard to Mr. Henry Palmer, all I have stated as applying to the other resident Proprietors applies with equal force to him. I never heard him express any objections to the Bill, nor from any other person that he had done, or intended to do so, and I fully believed that the Bill met his approbation, as it had my own. Mr. Henry Palmer is, at present, in England, as your Excellency is aware; I am unable therefore, to obtain from him at once

his sanction personally given to the Bill. I shall transmit to him however, by this mail, a duplicate of the certified copy of the Act, which I annex to this letter. To prevent the possibility of any further misunderstanding, these two certified copies of the Act bear the signature as assenting parties of every resident Proprietor named in the Schedule, and at present in the Island.

I feel confident that Mr. H. Palmer will not hesitate to subscribe his name formally to the document I have enclosed him, and that he will, by forwarding it without delay to Downing Street, obviate the objection which Lady Georgina Fane has apparently raised to the passing of an Act which is looked forward to with the deepest anxiety by such a large number of the Tenantry of the landed Estates in this Colony.

That under these circumstances, and in the absence of any expression of dissent on your part, he is induced to believe that Lady Georgina has misunderstood your meaning.

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The Lieut. Governor has further informed the Secretary of State, that you will be communicated with, in order that you may put yourself in direct correspondence with the Colonial Office.

I am therefore directed by the Lieutenant Governor to request, that you will, at your earliest convenience, communicate with the Colonial Office on the subject, in order that no time may be lost in removing an obstacle to the confirma-

tion of this Act,—an obstacle which is founded on a misapprehension, as His Excellency believes it to be, that you refuse to assent to the provisions of that Act.

## Copy of a Despatch from Lieut. Governor to Secretary of State, transmitting Blue Book for 1863, and of reply thereto.

No. 77. PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND,  
GOVERNMENT HOUSE,  
28th November, 1864.

SIR ;

I have the honor to transmit herewith duplicate copies of the Blue Book for the year 1863.

2. The year 1863 was one of prosperity to this Island ; the harvest was an abundant one; the war in the United States created an unprecedented demand for oats, the staple produce of this Colony, and this demand naturally caused a considerable rise in the prices of that product.

3. In addition to this, trade in ship-building was unusually brisk, and the tonnage of vessels launched exceeded that of any previous year.

4. The most important point on which I have to remark with regard to the Returns comprised in the present Blue Book, is the great improvement in the Financial condition of the Colony.

5. Since the year 1853 the Expenditure has been annually in excess of the Revenue. In the year 1862 it exceeded it by £8590.

6. I brought the financial state of the Colony prominently before the Legislature in the Speech with which I opened the Session on the 3rd of March, 1863. I particularly directed its attention to the system under which

individual members of the Legislature had the power to propose Grants of money for any purpose, and urged it to consider the propriety of placing the appropriation of the Revenue under the direct control of those to whom the responsibility of administering Public affairs was entrusted. The Legislature readily adopted this principle, and passed a Resolution, yielding to the Executive the exclusive right to initiate money votes in the House of Assembly.

7. With a view to equalizing the Revenue and Expenditure of the current year, it was deemed advisable to modify to a certain extent the Free Education System, a measure was, therefore, passed reducing the Government allowance to Teachers by about one third, and providing for the deficiency by the voluntary contributions of the parents of the several School Districts and in default of those contributions by local Assessment.

Praiseworthy as Free Education undoubtedly is, I have considerable doubt as to the success which has practically attended it here. I believe that the people have not sufficiently appreciated, what they apparently obtained for nothing, and that the direct taxation, consequent on the modification of the system will stimulate them, not only to send their children to school with greater regularity, but also to take a greater interest in their District Schools and in the efficiency of the Teachers.

## APPENDIX (M.)

8. The new Act did not come into operation until a considerable part of the year had passed, but there was, nevertheless, a decrease of £450 in the Expenditure on Education in place of the usual yearly increase.

9. The ad valorem duties on Imports were raised from £7 10s to £10 per £100. The unprecedented activity of trade, and the consequent productiveness of these duties gave a return of £30,704 against £17,136 collected in 1862, or an increase of £13,568 from this source of Revenue alone.

10. The Revenue for the year was £41,125—£15,496 more than the Revenue of 1862, and nearly 35 per cent in excess of that of any previous year. The Expenditure was £36,441, about £2,000 more than that of 1862.

11. The Revenue exceeded the Expenditure by £4,684, and the Public Debt is thus reduced from £54,803 to £50,149.

12. £3,522 included in the Revenue, and £1,925 in the Expenditure are amounts received from the sale of Lands, or expended in their purchase from Proprietors, and cannot be considered as ordinary Revenue and Expenditure.

13. *General Commerce.*—The value of Imports was £293,431, an increase of £82,191 on the value of those of 1862. The value of Exports was £209,472, an increase of £58,923 on the value of those of the preceding year.

14. From these Returns it would appear that the value of Imports exceeded that of Exports by £83,959. But no account is taken of vessels built in the Island while their material rigging, &c., are included in the Imports. 100 vessels of the aggregate burden of 24,991 tons were built in the year 1863. The value of these vessels, about £125,000, added to the Exports, leaves a balance of about £40,000 in favor of the Colony.

15. From the Custom House Returns it appears that this Island imported nearly half its requirements from the United Kingdom, and exported more than half of its products to the United States.

16. *Councils and Assemblies.*—A General Election for the House of Assembly took place early in the year, and resulted in a considerable majority being returned to support the existing Government.

17. Since the General Election of 1859 all holders of salaried offices had been excluded from seats in the Legislature, in conformity with pledges made on the Hustings by the present Government Party, which was previous to that Election in opposition. The practical inconveniences which attended this experiment proved greater than those which it was intended to remedy, and at the Election of 1863 this system was so far modified, that two salaried officers, the Attorney General and the Colonial Secretary came forward as Candidates, and were returned as Members of the House of Assembly. In my opinion, a further extension of the Departmental System, and the appointment of a Financial Secretary, with a seat in the House, would be advantageous.

18. A few weeks after the General Election of the Lower House, the first Election for the Upper House took place under the Act which had been passed in the previous year “to change the Constitution of the Legislative Council by rendering the same Elective.”

19. The qualification for Electors under this Act is fixed at Freehold or Leasehold Property, of the value of £100, currency, or lands partly freehold, and partly leasehold, amounting together in value of that sum. A candidate for the Council is required to be a British subject, 30 years of age, who has been resident in the Colony for five years previous to the Election.

20. Seven of the thirteen Members elected were Members of the nominated Council at the time of its dissolution, and of these seven, five had been placed in the old Council by me since my assumption of the Government of this Province. Nine of the thirteen elected Members were returned to support the policy of the Party composing the majority in the Lower House. The first Elective Council, therefore, was in harmony with the popular branch of the Legislature.

21. *Military Expenditure.*—The amount expended by the Colony towards its own defence was £285, of this £266 13s 4d was appropriated for the Volunteer service, and £16 13s 4d is the salary by statute of the Adjutant General of Militia, with this inadequate grant it was obviously impossible for me to do much to maintain the discipline and efficiency of the Volunteer Force. I have to rely mainly upon the patriotism and liberality of the Volunteers

themselves, and to them individually is due all the credit of the movement in this Island.

22. In my Despatch which accompanied the Blue Book for 1862, I directed the Secretary of State's attention to the Militia Law. I have recently received Your Despatch, No. 24, of 15th October, containing the views of Her Majesty's Government on this Law, which, as you justly remark, is without a parallel in British North America. I entirely concur in your opinion, that if in time of peace a community neglects those precautions, by which its independence against foreign aggression can be secured, its safety must be more than imperilled in time of war. It affords me much satisfaction to express my belief, that within the last few years, a feeling has been rising in this community, that it is hardly keeping pace with the neighboring Colonies in measures of self defence, and I trust that during next Session an Act for the amendment of the Militia Law will be proposed to the Legislature.

23. When that measure is proposed, and the Legislature is asked to appropriate for that service a reasonable grant of money--without which all Legislation on the subject is useless--I trust that the measure will not be treated as a Party one, but that Members of the Legislature, irrespective of party will vie in perfecting an enactment calculated to place the Militia in a position creditable to the people of the

Colony, and suitable to the privileges and free institutions which they enjoy.

DUBLIN INTERNATIONAL EXHIBITION.

The British Colonies, although laboring under disadvantages from the short notice given them and the difficulty of obtaining legislative grants so soon after the last London Exhibition, will be very fairly represented by small but interesting collections of produce and manufactures at Dublin in May next. The Australasian Colonies will have collections of their wools, wines, fibres, silk, woods, oils, cotton, grain, arrowroot, minerals, and objects of natural history, and even some illustrations of fine arts in photographs and pictures. India will show a magnificent collection of raw products and rich manufactures, arranged by Dr. Forbes Watson, of the India Museum. Ceylon sends carved wood tables, a fine collection of fibres and ropes, gums, oils, grains, and pharmaceutical products. Malta will show the carved stonework, silver filigree, and the fine lace for

which she is so famous, with probably mosaic work and other articles. The North American Colonies are making some preparations to be represented. Several of the West India Islands send furniture, cotton and other fibres, objects of natural history, shell work, pimento, coffee, and other walking sticks, which have recently risen into a large and profitable trade, besides samples of those staple products which are the mainstay of their industry. Lagos, Sierra Leone, and other West African Colonies, will make a fine display of native mats and basket work, country cloths, native curiosities, carved calabashes, and articles of produce. Most of the African merchants and companies have promised their aid in contributions. Other Colonies contribute produce and miscellaneous objects of various kinds.

SIR ;

In the month of January, 1863, I caused to be transmitted to you, in common with other Governors of Colonies, in which the Government is responsible to the Legislature, a copy of a circular Despatch addressed on first of that month to the Governors of all other Colonies, requesting answers to our series of interrogatories respecting Public Hospitals, and to another respecting Lunatic Asylums.

The circular despatch explained the object with which the information was sought, and the answers I have received have now placed me in a position to review the state of the Colonial Hospitals and Lunatic Asylums in the Colonies.

I transmit to you herewith a copy of a circular which I have this day addressed to the Governors of Colonies, in which the Government is not responsible to the Legislature, accompanied by a digest of the answers to my interrogatories which have been received from the Colony under your Government and from others, which digest is preceded by an account of the general condition of the Hospitals and Lunatic Asylums in the Colonies, a summary of the classes of defects more generally prevailing, and suggestions for the cure of such defects.

The consideration which has been given to the subject by yourself and the other local authorities by whom the information transmitted to me was supplied, assure me that you and they will receive the papers now communicated to you with a disposition to make any use of them which can conduce to the alleviation of human suffering in Hospitals and Lunatic Asylums.

SIR ;

On the 1st January, 1863, I addressed to the Governors of Her Majesty's Colonies a Despatch requesting answers to one series of interrogatories respecting Public Hospitals, and to another respecting Lunatic Asylums. I received in the course of last year from yourself and the Governors of other Colonies such answers as you and they had been enabled to furnish. I have had the information thus collected under my consideration, with a view to ascertain what steps can be taken for the improvement of Public Hospitals and Lunatic Asylums in the Colonies.

APPENDIX (O.)

In this country by far the greater number of hospitals owe their existence to the bounty and philanthropy of private persons; and the beneficent spirit in which they originated has attended them continually, inducing by the efforts and care of those who took an interest in them progressive improvement of structure, arrangements, management, and supervision.— In the Colonies institutions of this nature have been almost universally founded and supported from public funds, and they are dependant for their well-being on the Executive and Legislative Authorities.

I regret to find that, generally speaking, the state of these Institutions in the Colonies, though not perhaps worse than in England at a former period, is yet widely and deplorably different from what would be now considered in this country to be consistent with the humane objects they are designed to promote; whilst in some cases, though not, I trust, in very many, the state of Colonial Hospitals or Lunatic Asylums would seem to be such as can hardly be deemed to be consistent with humanity itself.

I am persuaded that the state of these Institutions is in general to be attributed less to any wilful and deliberate neglect on the part of the Legislative and Executive Authorities than to a want of adequate knowledge of what such Institutions ought to be, and of the methods by which improvements are to be brought about, and in the case of some of the

smaller Colonies, no doubt, it may be ascribed to a want of adequate funds and resources.

With a view, therefore, to supply all the information in my power, I have placed myself in communication with the College of Physicians, and with the Commissioners in Lunacy, and I have caused a digest to be prepared of the answers to my interrogatories received from the Colony under your government, and from others, which digest is preceded by an account of the general condition of the Hospitals and Lunatic Asylums in the Colonies, a summary of the classes of defects more generally prevailing, and suggestions for the cure of such defects.

I am confident that in the interests of humanity the exposition of the subject thus afforded will command, not only your own serious attention, but also, if necessary, that of the Legislature; and I shall hope to receive from you in due time a special report of any improvements which may have been effected in the Hospitals and Lunatic Asylums within your government, accompanied by a statement of those which remain to be effected, in order to bring those Institutions into a not unfavorable comparison with those of this Country; and I shall be anxious to be made acquainted with the steps which may be in progress or in contemplation for this purpose.

## Report of the Superintendent of Public Works for the year 1864.

*To His Excellency George Dundas, Esquire, and Gentlemen of the Executive Council.*

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY ;

I have the honor to submit to Your Excellency and the Honorable Gentlemen of the Executive Council the following Report of the branches of the public service under my management during the past year, with the sums expended on each contract, and a detail of the requirements for the current year, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, with an Estimate of the probable cost of the whole :

1st. A new Floating Bridge has been erected across the Morell River, by Mr. Geo. Douglass, for six hundred and twenty-three pounds ; the extra expenses incurred were thirty-five pounds, making the whole cost six hundred and fifty-eight pounds. This Bridge, I think, gives general satisfaction.

2nd. A new Block and Span has been added to the wharf at Summerside, and the expense of the repairs has considerably exceeded the estimate of probable cost. It was found that the whole of the inside part of the wharf, from the light-house to the shore, was in such a state of decay that life and property were rendered unsafe. The following repairs had consequently to be made : Three of the forty feet spaces have been filled in with new timber, and filled up solid with brush, wood and clay, new span-beams and covers have been put on six of the arches, the blocks have been repaired and filled in solid, and a new string piece laid from the shore to the light-house.

The wharf is now in a very efficient state of repair, and if a small tax or wharfage duty were laid on the goods landed there, and shipped therefrom, no further outlay would be required by the Government for many years. Indeed, the wharf should be made self-sustaining. The whole amount expended was six hundred and forty-seven pounds sixteen shillings and ninepence (£647 16s. 9d.)

3rd. The Bridge at Fife's Ferry has been repaired during the past summer, and the repairs, as far as they have gone, give general satisfaction. But I deem it my duty to state that the abutments of the Bridge were originally built in a very careless manner, blocks of round logs were erected, and span beams of forty feet were thrown across, and the Bridge was covered with a plank cover from the extreme end to end. It has already had the second cover since it was built, and it is again becoming very dangerous. The span beams are getting rotten ; the cover is becoming worn out, and in a few years it will take a large sum to repair it. I would recommend that the abutments of the bridge be built anew and filled in solid. No plank covering nor any other repairs would then be required for many years. A part of this work may be done each year until the whole is accomplished. The sum already expended is three hundred and fifty-four pounds nineteen shillings and sixpence.

## APPENDIX (R)

4th. The Bridge near Mr. John Hall's, at Crapaud, has undergone considerable repairs during the past summer, but some further repairs will be required as the south end or abutment has been built on a quantity of brush laid to form a bridge by the early settlers, and the earth-work of that part of the bridge is constantly settling down, or being washed out by the action of the tide. The sum expended last year on this bridge was one hundred and twenty pounds.

5th. A new Bridge has been built across Crabb's Mill Dam, Princetown Road, by Mr. John Roper. The work has been done in a very creditable manner. The amount of the contract was one hundred and sixty-three pounds, extra work four pounds, making in all one hundred and sixty-seven pounds.

6th. A new Block and Span has been added to the wharf at Southport, and the old block which forms the dock has been raised and filled in. This affords additional accommodation for loading purposes, and is the means of keeping a clear passage for the travelling public. In addition to this, one hundred and six feet of the wharf has been built up solid, and filled in with brush, stone and clay. This requires to be continued out to the end in a line with the T block. When this is done it will give an additional breadth to the wharf of about nine feet, and will add strength and stability to the whole structure. There is already on hand for this purpose, from fifty to sixty tons of timber. The amount expended on this contract was three hundred and thirty pounds.

7th. A new Block and Span has been added to the wharf at Orwell, and the amount expended thereon was one hundred and three pounds.

8th. A new Wharf has been built at Tryon River, and with the exception of some additional filling-in, no repairs will be required for some time. The amount of this contract was one hundred and thirty pounds.

9th. A new Bridge has been erected across Wright's Mill Dam, St. Peter's Road, for two hundred and twenty-five pounds.

10th. A new Light House has been erected at Sea Cow Head during the summer, and was lit up last autumn. The building is a very substantial one, standing about eighty feet above the level of the sea, and the light will

be seen at a distance of twenty miles, and will serve both as a harbor and a gulf light. Owing to the materials for the roof of the lantern, and the lamps not having arrived until late in the autumn, the whole of the arrangements were not completed, but it shall be my care early in the spring to have the whole put in efficient order.

11th. A new Block and Span has been built to the wharf at Apple-tree Farm, and some additional repairs have been made to the old wharf. The amount of the contract was seventy pounds, extra work twenty pounds, making in all ninety pounds.

12th. A considerable quantity of repairs has been done to the wharf at Crapaud, but the contract is not yet completed. When completed, no further repairs will be required for some time. And here I might add that this wharf might be kept in repair by the same means as are referred to in the remarks upon Summerside wharf, the imposition of a small tax or duty, thus saving the Government any additional outlay. The amount of this contract was one hundred and forty pounds.

13th. A Contract has been entered into by the Government for reconstructing the wharf at McConnel's shore, which was carried away some two-years ago. This Contract will be completed next summer, and the amount thereof is three hundred and seventy-five pounds.

14th. A Contract has been entered into for the building of two blocks and two spans to the wharf at Georgetown. This Contract will be completed in the summer of 1865, and the amount thereof is two hundred and forty pounds.

15th. A Contract has been entered into for the erection of a new block and span at Aitken's shore, Montague, which is also to be completed in the summer of 1865. The amount of this Contract is thirty-nine pounds and ten shillings.

16th. A new Cell has been built to the Jail, at Charlottetown, for the accommodation of the prisoner, William Young, for the sum of one hundred and thirty pounds nineteen shillings and five pence.

17th. A large quantity of repairs has been done to the Colonial Building, which was absolutely requisite for its preservation.

APPENDIX (R.)

18th. A Contract has been entered into for the erection of a new Block and Span to the wharf at South Pinette, to be finished in the summer of 1865. The amount of the Contract is ninety-nine pounds and fifteen shillings.

19th. A Contract has been entered into for the erection of a new Bridge across Ellis's River, Lot 16, to be finished during the summer of 1865. The amount of this Contract is one thousand one hundred and ninety-five pounds.

The Bridges requiring repairs which have come under my observation during the summer are as follows :—

The Bridge at Poplar Island across the Elliot River. This Bridge was built on piles a number of years since, and has cost a large sum since its erection for repairs of piles and covers. The abutments of the bridge have had no repairs since its erection, and the top timber now requires to be renewed. If the centre of the bridge had been built on blocks instead of piles, although the first cost would have been greater, a very large sum would have been saved in the end. This bridge will require a large sum to put it in an efficient state of repair.

Mabey's Bridge requires a new cover.

The Bridge across the West River will require to be repaired. The Bridge at De Sable, and the Bridge near Mr. Marshall's will also require some repairs.

There are three small bridges on the Saint Peter's Road, between Wright's and the Mount Stewart Bridge, which will require considerable repairs.

A new bridge is required across the Pisquid River. Hon. Francis Kelly agrees to build the abutment on the south side, if the Government will provide the east abutment, two centre blocks and three arches.

Stanfield's Bridge, Tryon River, requires to be re-built, and Clark's Bridge is in a most dangerous condition, a great part of it having been carried away by the action of the tide. Another Bridge on the east side of the Tryon River requires to be repaired.

The Bridge across Wilmot Creek, near Bedeque House, requires to be repaired. A very considerable outlay will be wanted on this Bridge.

I beg to call your attention to the state of the Jails in the three Counties. Additional accommodation is required in the Jail at Charlottetown. If a wing were added to the east end of the building for the keeper's residence, the rooms now occupied by him might be used for the prisoners, and this alteration might be carried out with little or no inconvenience to the present arrangement.

The Jail at Saint Eleanor's is entirely unfit for the purpose of a prison. The building is in a most dilapidated condition, the cells are much out of repair, the plastering in many places falling down, the floors are worn out, and the fastenings of the doors and windows are not at all suitable for the safe-keeping of the prisoners. There are no distinct apartments for the male and female prisoners, and in fine, the whole building now used for Court House and Jail, is quite small enough for the purposes of a Jail alone.

The Jail and Court House, at Georgetown, has been built on precisely the same plan as the Saint Eleanor's Jail, and is equally out of repair, so that what has been said of the one building will apply in every particular to the other. Before these buildings are repaired some provision must be made for the accommodation of a Court House in both of those places. I have written a specification of repairs and alterations to the Jail at Saint Eleanor's, which I wish to submit to your honorable body before further action is taken in this matter.

A new set of Floaters will be required for the Docks on each side of the river, at the Charlottetown Ferry, as the old ones are becoming so rotten that it is almost impossible to repair them. This matter will require to be taken in hand during the course of the ensuing summer.

The Estimate of the cost of the Public Works above mentioned, including Bridges, repairs of Jails, and Floaters, amounts in the whole to five thousand nine hundred and sixty-five pounds (£5965).

In concluding this Report, I would remark that the Government would do well in tendering for public contracts to observe a discretionary power not to be bound to receive the lowest tender, even though the sureties thereto

I would also state that I do not deem it advisable for the Government to purchase the timber for any contract, or other materials therefor, except in cases where it is a matter of necessity.

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## Report of the Superintendent of Vaccination for the Port of Charlottetown and Royalty.

*To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council.*

KENT STREET,  
December 31, 1864.

The Census of 1861 gave 1505 persons as unprotected from small pox, to this number may be added, as the aggregate of yearly births from that date, at least 500 more, thus making 2000.

In endeavoring to carry out the purposes of the "Act to promote Vaccination" I have made a great many special appointments, at different convenient places, both in the City and Royalty, and am sorry to be able to report only 635 successful vaccinations in two years; other medical men have, no doubt, vaccinated the richer part of their patients; but I may venture to say that the number, so vaccinated, does not amount to one half the increased population; so that it may be fairly assumed that 1300 persons, or more than one-fifth of the population, are still unprotected themselves, and dangerous to the community.

Your Excellency in Council will please to observe that almost the entire number of these unprotected persons are of the poorer class, to whom even the pittance to be charged for vaccinating them is an object, which, when superadded to their natural apathy, and prejudice, strengthens the barrier opposed to vaccination. This difficulty is greater in the beginning than will exist after the full operation of the act, seeing that many families have accumulated to serious numbers.

Taking these circumstances into consideration I have for come calling upon the Magistrate to inflict the penalties, believing the case may be successfully met if your Excellency in Council will commit the ordering of vaccinating the City and Royalty to the Board of Health, by whom the vaccination of the whole might be enforced stringently as a defence from the fatal and expensive visitations of small pox, which, in the present exposed state of the Island, are likely to be much greater than payment for vaccinating the poor. I should not have succeeded in vaccinating so many had I not done it gratuitously in more than one half the cases. I mention this not to claim remuneration for what I have done, but respectfully to explain to your Excellency that the poor must be provided with gratuitous vaccination or you cannot enforce its performance with consistency, by fine or imprisonment, and it cannot be expected that the Health Officer or Vaccinator will bear the loss and trouble.

The late visitations of small pox have afforded a most rigid and satisfactory test of the power and value of cow pox as a preventive to the spread of small pox, proving most evidently that if a community of people become protected by vaccination the spread of small pox will be stayed, for out of the three visitations of this year not a single case of small pox has occurred after the attendance of the Health Officer, and the immediate vaccination of all

the persons exposed ; and this has been tested repeatedly, in Quarantine Hospital, on board the infected vessels, in the houses of the affected, and in the local settlement, without a single exception. Your Excellency in Council will please to bear with me, as a strenuous advocate of vaccination, in presenting these facts forcibly to your attention, as an encouraging inducement to extend its protection throughout the Island, as soon as possible, which I believe may be done most effectually and economically by entrusting its performance to the several Boards of Health, with power to enforce it on all, and to charge the poor to the public purse. With these remarks I respectfully submit this report.

MEMORIAL OF THE HEALTH OFFICER.

KENT STREET,

January 5, 1865.

To His Worship the Mayor and Board of Health, Charlottetown.

I most respectfully submit the following observations to your Worship and Board of Health:

1. That the Health Officer is not duly and properly assisted in the performance of his important duties, particularly and especially as it

respects the inspection of vessels when coming into Port—there being no person appointed to prevent the landing of passengers or crew until they are inspected—no person to notice the Health Officer of the entrance of foreign vessels—no person ready to row him alongside in times of suspected danger—no boat provided for the Health Officer's use for visiting vessels in quarantine and patients at the hospital.

2. It will be evident to the Board that the duties of the Health Officer cannot be promptly and efficiently performed without this assistance, taking into the account that the hospital cannot be safely visited by the Ferry in time of malignant contagion, nor can the officer maintain a proper watch over quarantine vessels, unless he be provided with suitable assistance, nor can he prevent the landing of passengers or crew from infected vessels. The notice, by signal, does not distinguish the part from which the arriving vessel sails, nor the situation at the time of signalling ; frequently occasioning the officer two or three visits, and frequently for vessels not to be inspected at all.

3. Under these circumstances it becomes me to say that Messrs. DesBrisay and Brecken, the gentlemen appointed by the Board last summer, rendered me every assistance in their power, with much trouble to themselves and often with great inconvenience to me notwithstanding ; and, after all, I believe the cost to the public would have been much less if proper previous appointments had been constituted.

4. I respectfully submit to the Board that the system of paying for inspection by a scale of fees, is both troublesome and derogatory to a medical officer. The present charge amounts to about a half-penny per ton, is always troublesome to collect, frequently evaded altogether, and renders the officer liable to the charge of being a needless officious meddler in order to obtain a fee, now if all foreign vessels were charged to that amount at the Custom House, and paid there, it would be much fairer for the vessels, no charge to the government, and secure the Health Officer's salary for that part of his duties.

5. The Board I am sure will appreciate my motives in presenting this memorial. I simply wish to offer suggestions that may lead them to consider the propriety of placing themselves

and the Health Officer in a position more suitable and effective for carrying out the most important part of their public duties—that is to prevent the access and spread of malignant pestilence among the people, of which small pox is the most frequent.

6. For the prevention of the latter the visitations of last year afforded a perfectly satisfactory proof of the preventive and protective powers of cow pox, not a single case has occurred after the attendance of the Health Officer, and the immediate intervention of vaccination, and this in more than 400 cases of exposure and danger. In the Report of the Superintendent of Vaccination, to the Executive Council, I have suggested the propriety of entrusting the execution of the "Act to promote Vaccination" to the several Boards of Health, to whom, as one of the most important agents for their purpose, it most suitably belongs, and by whom it can be most effectually promoted.

7. From reliable date it may be said that there are upwards of 1300 persons in the City and Royalty totally unprotected themselves, and so many centres of danger to the commu-

nity. They are principally poor, and the accumulated number of some of their families, makes even a small charge serious to them, which, when superadded to their apathy and prejudice, prevent their obeying the notice of the Superintendent; and under such circumstances I have been very unwilling to prosecute until some further opportunity is afforded them, and I believe if left to the ordering of the Board of Health, with power to enforce it on all, and the privilege of its gratuitous performance to the poor, I think then the object will be secured in a few months from its adoption. The Vaccination immediately supported by the authority and assistance of the Board would succeed in like manner as it has at West River.

I am sorry I cannot explain my purpose to the Board without prolixity. I hope the Board will make my intended purpose an accepted excuse.

### Quarterly Reports of the Visitor of Schools for the Western Section of this Island for the past year, as transmitted by the Board of Education.

*To the Board of Education for the Island of  
Prince Edward.*

GENTLEMEN,

In presenting you with my report for the last quarter, I have but little to add to the statistical details contained in the accompanying Schedule.

The breaking up of the roads compelled me to suspend my operations in the month of April last, before I had visited all the schools comprised in my division of the Island for the second time. I have recently examined nearly all I then omitted, which, together with 22 others previously visited, but not reported, making a total of 43 since my last report.

It would be very desirable to prepare an extended list of books to be used in the schools; and if any plan could be devised for supplying them readily, and at reduced rates, it would, I think, be attended with advantage. I recommend the two Sequels to the second book in the Irish National Series, and Chamber's History of the British Empire, to be added to the present list.

A map of the Island should be placed in every school house; I have, in most cases where this deficiency existed, left a request to the Trustees to procure one. The keeping a regular Trustees Book should be insisted on.

I have placed before the Board two applications from the several Districts of Union and

South Kildare, for a junction of the two, so as to give them a central school house at Alberton. I think this may be effected with great benefit to the larger portion of the inhabitants, and (with some slight alteration in the boundaries of the adjoining districts) without material inconvenience to any one.

GENTLEMEN,

Since the date of my last quarterly report, I have made 106 visits to district schools, but in some few cases I have thought it advisable, when I could conveniently do so, to repeat a visit, where the absence of the teacher has prevented an examination of the scholars; thus the number of schools is not adequately represented by the number of visits. The Schedule to be annexed hereto will give full statistics.

Referring to my report of June last, I have again to draw the attention of the Board to the expediency of publishing an enlarged list of books for use in the district schools; which, however, might be permissive, not obligatory

on the teachers and trustees; that is to say, no books should be used not included in the list, but a choice should be allowed among those authorized by the Board. The books to be used for reading and spelling might be confined to one set or series for the sake of uniformity in the schools, and also to secure a cheaper rate of supply; but I suggest that a wider range might be safely allowed in the other branches of education, for instance, in History, Geography and Arithmetic. In June last I mentioned the two Sequels to the Second Book of the Irish National Series, (which have been advantageously introduced into some schools), and Chamber's History of the British Empire. I also recommend, for consideration, White's History of England, Pinnock's and Simpson's Abridgements of Goldsmith's, and also a History of England published by the Society for promoting christian knowledge, Chamber's Educational Series, including his introduction to Mathematics and Geographical Primer, Constable's Educational Series and Early Lessons, No. 2, published by Nelson & Co., Edinburgh. Some Latin Grammar should also be included, perhaps Bullions and Rudiments of the Latin language for the use of the Edinburgh Academy, Latin Delectus, Cæsars Commentaries or some other Latin Author. The arithmetical works would, I suppose, be a matter of indifference.

I have in many instances insisted on a Map of Prince Edward Island, and Sutherland's Island Geography being provided by the Trustees. On my next circuit I will make a more peremptory requisition to this effect, and report those schools in which it is not complied with.

The union of two Districts, with a view to the establishment of a superior or Grammar School, has, in obedience to the minute of the Board of the 29th August, received my attention. I have no doubt that this may be done, in some localities, with great advantage; but, at present, the case of Alberton, involving the amalgamation of the South Kildare and the Union schools (Lot 4) is the only one I can recommend. Although there may be some individual inconveniences occasioned by this union, yet on the whole, I think, it will be generally beneficial to the neighborhood.

I have before alluded to the advantage, in many cases, of remodelling the School Dis-

tricts. I am aware that this would be attended with considerable difficulty, but it would also have many advantages, and should not, I think, be lost sight of.

I beg leave to suggest to the Board that a uniform commencement of the Teachers' engagements might not only facilitate the supply of Teachers to vacant schools, but also save trouble to the Board and its officers.

I also suggest that the keeping a Trustees Book should be rigorously insisted on.

The Grammar School at Summerside requires, I think, some special consideration, and I have therefore made it a subject of a separate report.

GENTLEMEN,

The past quarter affords but little on which I can report. I have visited only fourteen School Districts, owing partly to the vacation, and partly to the season of the year, which is unfavorable to a full attendance at the schools.

I find a considerable increase in the number of children on the Teachers' Journals, and the attendance is also much improved. This increase would have been greater, had it not been for the alarm of small pox in Lot 65 and the neighborhood, which led to the closing of some schools, and to a short attendance at others. It has been suggested that the average number of scholars at all the schools should appear on the Visitors Report. This average, however, can only be accurately gathered from the Teachers' Journals. Any statement of the average, especially of those attending, taken on the various days of the visits, would be liable to daily alteration; but if the journals were checked against the results of the inspection, a considerable degree of accuracy might be obtained.

There are several applications for new school districts within my circuit; and I can recom-

mend all those with which I am locally acquainted, to the favorable consideration of the Board.

New school houses have been built in six Districts. Those at Park Corner, Upper Westmorland, and Kildare River, deserve particular notice as highly creditable to the inhabitants. There are still a great number in need of repair or rebuilding. In school furniture there is room for considerable improvement. Thirty schools are destitute of a black board; and in a much larger number maps and geography books, more especially those relating to Prince Edward Island and the adjacent Provinces are deficient. A cupboard or other safe receptacle for the books should also be provided.

In my last quarterly report I adverted to the merging of the two districts called the Union and South Kildare, in Lot 4. The report of the Commissioners has, no doubt been laid before the Board; and I trust means may be devised to ensure the placing a school in the growing village of Alberton, without encroaching materially on other localities.

I have more than once recommended in former reports that a Trustee's Book should be kept in each District. If this were regularly done, so as to embrace all the school transactions of the District, as contemplated by the act of Assembly, and if, at the same time, a copy or extract of the Register, shewing the boundaries of the District were entered in it, I have no doubt but many of the disputes and difficulties so frequently arising might be avoided.

As soon as the Board shall have determined on a renewed and enlarged list of books, it will be desirable to print the amended "Regulations," and to transmit a copy to each school for the information of the trustees and teachers.

GENTLEMEN,

Referring to my report on the Grammar School lately established at Summerside, under

date of 24th September, 1864, I beg leave to submit the following as the results of my examination of that school on the 25th ultimo:

At that time there were seventeen scholars in the school, being an increase of ten over those present at my former examination. All of these were being taught the usual branches of an English Education, and appeared to be well grounded in the common rules of arithmetic, including the extraction of the Square and Cube Roots—four were instructed in Algebra, and worked their sums very correctly and expeditiously—seven were studying Geometry—nine the French language—nine the Latin, and one the Greek. Of the Latin scholars, three were in the Grammar, five reading Delectus, and one in Virgil. Those in Delectus translated and parsed very fairly, and the pupil in Virgil remarkably well. The pupil in Greek was merely learning the Grammar, but appeared well grounded as far as he had gone. Five of the scholars worked each a Problem in the first book of Euclid in my presence, and acquitted themselves very creditably.

On the whole I consider that the school has very much improved since my last visit.

I was informed that it was intended to remove the building to a more convenient site; if so, I hope it will be placed out of the town, and that a play ground for the scholars will be provided.

GENTLEMEN,

During that part of the current quarter which has elapsed up to this date, I have made eighty-five visits to various schools in the Western Section of the Island, detailed particulars of which will appear in the Schedule to this report.

I need hardly repeat what I have stated in the reports already before you; the fluctuations which take place in the attendance of the children at school prevent the tracing any

## APPENDIX (X.)

steady general progress. On the whole, however, I see no reason to be dissatisfied with the state of the schools. If a more regular attendance could be procured, it would be much more satisfactory, but the early age at which children are required for field labors renders this very difficult. The increased number studying algebra, mathematics and book-keeping indicates an improved tone in the general education.

Three new school houses have been erected, one at Cape Traverse, one in the new District of Fortune Cove, and one at St. Ignatues in the Cavendish Road ; all are well adapted for the purpose.

The Union Schoolhouse, Lot 4, and St. Ann's, Lot 22, are very much out of repair ; but the former will probably be rendered useless if any alterations in that neighborhood be carried into effect ; and I have given notice to the Trustees of the latter that it must either be rebuilt or thoroughly repaired.

The new catalogue of books is much required ; and I think also an amended set of regulations. Many of the recent orders of the Board are not printed, and they would be much better observed if publicity were thus given to them. Some of the schools have no copies of the former rules. A Trustee's Book is not kept in a great many, and a Visitor's Book in still fewer.

I may perhaps be allowed to observe that the powers of the Board appear to me to be deficient in many respects, but to remedy this, as well as to effect some alteration in the present acts, the interposition of the Legislature would be required. I would recommend some modifications with regard to the averages, and also the placing a small sum at the disposal of the Board for contingent expenses.

I annex a summary of the statistical information I have collected in my two last circuits, referring to my quarterly reports, and to the schedules for particulars. The increase in the number of scholars in the summer was considerable, but it has not continued during the winter. The attendance ought to have been compared with the corresponding period of last year. From this and the quarterly reports it will appear that 249 visits have been paid since march last.

The total number of School Districts in the Western Section of the Island is 150. I have

endeavored to show the average attendance in each quarter, which is, I think an approximation to the truth, though the actual number is probably greater. It might perhaps be more correctly ascertained from the teachers' journals.

GENTLEMEN,

In consequence of the instructions I had received from your Secretary with regard to the Baltic District School, I proceeded to that place on the first instant, in order to investigate the charges brought against the Teacher by Mr. James Henderson.

As Mr. Henderson did not appear on a former occasion to have received either of the letters I then addressed to him, or to have seen the notice affixed to the school house calling a meeting of the Trustees for the 7th February, I wrote to him from Alberton apprizing him of my intention to be at the school and to consider the charges made by him in the week following the 27th February. This letter I posted nearly a fortnight previously and I have reason to believe he received it.

On the 27th February I left a letter for him, and also one for the teacher, each enclosing a notice of a meeting on the 1st March, at the Post Office, Barrett's Cross, whence a Bag is sent for Malpeque and the Baltic. The Postmaster promised that both should be forwarded. That for the Teacher reached its destination, and the notice was affixed to the school house, I believe, but am not certain, on the 28th.

On the 1st March I attended from four (the hour named) until half-past five, but neither Mr. Henderson nor any person on his behalf appeared.

Two persons only were present, Mr. James Barnard, and Mr. William Champion, both of whom expressed themselves favorably to the Teacher, and wished for his continuance.

Corbett did not produce his copy of the charge, but stated he had given it to his father; I had at the former meeting desired him to be prepared with it.

I could only enter on the inquiry from what I heard from the parties present and gathered from Mr. Henderson's letters. As regards the Journals, it appears to me that the omission to enter the Saturday's holiday regularly arose from ignorance. Corbett assured me that this was the case, and I see no advantage resulting to him from it.

The name of John E. McGregor appears No. 33 on the Journal. Corbett asserts that this was entered by mistake for John Crawford, whose name appears in the subsequent Journals; there is no other proof one way or the other as to this.

There is no question but that the name of his father, Robert Crawford, on the subscription list, was intended merely to make up the required amount. This is frequently resorted to as well as other subterfuges of the same nature, I fear and strongly suspect, to evade the provisions of the act. And this is the only serious charge, which, in the absence of evidence, I find bearing strongly against Corbett.

The copies set by him in the writing books are highly objectionable, if done with an intention of insult, which I think is very probable, though Corbett disclaims it. There appear to have been several petty squabbles between the parties about washing &c. which led to this.

As Mr. Henderson did not attend, I sent my son to him in the evening to say that I would call a special meeting of the Trustees for the next morning, and requesting him to bring his rough copy of the charges—he said he had no copy and declined attending. I waited at Mr. Bearisto's till 10 o'clock to give him an opportunity of doing so, and was told that he passed near the house while I was there.

I afterwards sent my son to Corbett's father, who resides at a distance of fifteen miles or thereabouts, to obtain the copy charge, when he stated that he had burnt it, and he came to me to repeat the assertion.

On the whole, considering the youth and inexperience of Alex. Corbett, and that he succeeded a very excellent teacher at the Baltic school—considering also that squabbles and disputes had arisen between the parties, and that a considerable number of the inhabitants wish for his continuance, I think the justice of the case will be met by his receiving a severe reprimand from the Board for his irregularities with regard to the Journal and Subscription paper, and that he be allowed to continue till the end of his engagement, but that it be not renewed with him. I think he should apologize to Mr. Henderson for the letters.

Of the 106 schools, to which visits are included in this report, 15 have either been vacant, or the Teachers absent at the time of visiting, or in one or two instances twice visited, reducing the number to 91, which gives an average of  $25\frac{50}{91}$  or nearly  $25\frac{1}{2}$  to each school. It must be remembered that this includes part of harvest quarter, and also that the prevalence of the small pox in one district contributed to reduce the average. The increase on this quarter amounts to 384 on the Journals, and to 212 in the attendance. The difference between the numbers on the Journals and those present is 1732.

## School Visitor's Report of Eastern Section of the Island.

BOARD OF EDUCATION,

THURSDAY, MARCH 30, 1865.

EXTRACT FROM MINUTES OF THE BOARD:

“The Report of the Visitor of Schools for the Eastern Section of the Island, was, this day, laid before the Board by a Member. The details of the state of the Schools reported on, appear to be full, but the Board regrets that this report has not been received at an earlier period, so that it might have been transmitted to the Legislature in proper time.”

*To the Board of Education.*

GENTLEMEN,

In compliance with your order, I respectfully submit a precis of my services in the last Quarter.

I visited forty-eight (48) districts which were not included in my last report, as I was unable to complete the inspection of all the schools in my Circuit.

I found four (4) schools vacant, and eight (8) suspended; the teachers absent had the sanction of their respective trustees, with the exception of Mr. Angus McDonald, Big Cape, who had been remarkably irregular in his attendance. I remonstrated with R. McIntyre, Esq., chairman of the Board of Trustees, to inform his colleagues of the notorious breach of trust imputed to them; I expressed surprise that they signed their teacher's quarterly certificates, and I urged him to close their school-house, which was in a dilapidated condition.

The school in the adjacent district, Cable Head, was better attended by the master and scholars, who were crammed within a ship's round-house. I ordered this school to be also closed, until suitable accommodations would be provided. One of the trustees, who was present at the examination, promised to call a general meeting of the inhabitants, to devise ways and means to remedy this deplorable grievance.

I regret to have to report that an *unsufficient* school-house is the *rule*, not the *exception*, in the section of districts to which this report refers.

In this condensed summary, I do not give the statistics in detail, as I intend to submit an exposition, in my next report, of the general method of teaching. I perceived mechanical routine so prevalent, that I consider the common practice ought to be discontinued, and I will suggest such improvements as I suppose desirable and practicable. I also would respectfully invite your attention to the policy of cancelling agreements, and of the concession of the privilege of “making up lost time.” I know that inconvenience has resulted from the release of the teacher from his engagement, and I think that the payment of salaries subject to deductions for vacations, would cause the suspensions of schools to be “few and far between,” and would relieve the Secretary of your Board from extra calculations in preparing his Schedule for the Executive Council, and also, the visitors from dissatisfaction in finding several schools closed. The Registers of the schools which this synopsis embraces, exhibited an enrolment of 1140 pupils, and the aggregate attendance, when inspected, was 678. The minutiae of the general statistics shall be indicated in my next report.

No important changes have occurred in the City schools, but I respectfully renew my suggestions in previous reports, recommending

their classification, there are objections to this in form, but the theory is sound, and the organization proposed practicable. At all events the migration from school to school should be regulated if not prevented, and a system of promotion to classes established. All the schools are well attended and as efficiently managed as peculiar circumstances allow. The attendance in the head master's department, in the Normal School, 37; students, 22; and pupils, 15; 10 in Latin and 8 in French. In the Preparatory School, taught by Miss McKinnon, there are 47 pupils—38 girls and 9 boys.

I am obliged to make special reference to holidays, as there are no definite regulations prescribing the time or duration of vacations in the City schools. In consequence of discord and discussion on this topic, with the view of establishing harmony by assimilating on the principle of "Equality" third Course and the Forms of Instruction; and to obviate the discrepancy and disparity, members of the Board agreed that the summer vacation, this season, would be four weeks, from the 8th July to the 8th of August. I informed the teachers of this provisional order, which included the Normal School. Miss Davis asked permission to close her school a week earlier, but promised to observe the limits prescribed in respect to the four weeks. The other teachers complied with the order, except Mr. R. McNeill, who closed his on the 6th instant. He does not teach on Saturdays, considering himself entitled to exemption granted to the Grammar and the Normal Schools. Some of the other schools are open on alternate Saturdays.

Mr. Webster says that the terms of the Normal School have been defined by a previous order of the Board.

Miss McKinnon does not teach on Saturdays.

It is desirable that this irregularity would be immediately rectified, to avoid confusion and controversy.

*To the Board of Education.*

GENTLEMEN,

I respectfully submit the accompanying documents, comprising summarised statistics of the school districts in the Eastern Section, on a scale adopted to the general course on the Registers, with an appendix, giving a condensed precis of examinations.

I presume, that reference in detail to the manner in which the orders of the Board have been carried out with respect to the selection of candidates for the scholarships—the duration of the mid-summer holidays in the City districts—the vacations on alternate Saturdays in all districts—the establishment of grammar schools by merging two districts into one—the removal of old school houses to new sites, together with other subjects, would be now unnecessary recapitulation of the reports then submitted.

I think that the progress of education is, on the whole, very satisfactory; the improvement in spelling, reading and writing, is particularly gratifying; likewise in discipline and method.

As a class, the teachers deserve praise for zeal and faithfulness; but there are a few who ought never to have schoolmasters. Competent teachers expect, and they are entitled to, remuneration adequate to their services, and I regret to state that the late amendment of the statute has disheartened all of them. Few received in reality, the subsidy to compensate for the reduction of their salaries from Government, and trustees as well as teachers are clamorous for a remedy, as the amendment failed in its practical working.

Old school houses are disappearing before more commodious ones.

Several new districts have been established; and aid has been granted by government to localities that petitioned for such as the law provides.

In weak settlements, such as Stanhope, in this County; the Union Road in King's, and other places, to maintain the courage is difficult; however, the irregular attendance is generally attributable to the negligence or indifference of parents.

This and the lower district should be united, which would enable all concerned to maintain a respectable school, on a central site, near the Cross Roads. Examined, 25.
- 118.—5, Judicious zeal and judgment noticeable in the government of this school, which Mr. Power has conducted for many years. Examined, 21.
- 119.—1, Rather lenient. 2, Good. 3, Good. 4, Well qualified. 5, The children have a

- habit of monotonous reading that the teacher finds difficult to improve. The attendance very irregular, and a great scarcity of suitable books and stationery. The new school house is a credit to the settlers, who have agreed to finish and furnish it with the indispensable equipments. Examined, 24.
- 120.—1, Fair. 2, Fair. 3, Good. 4, Good. 5, The broken attendance, the want of books and room, and the unsuitable furniture and fixtures, hinder the scholars' progress, but Mr. Enman is faithful, and the school is now improving. Examined, 20.
- 121.—5, This is a new district, and the school house is not ready for use.
- 122.—1, Good. 2, Fair. 3, Fair. 4, Able. 5, The house comfortable, but in other respects, unsatisfactory. The children are making a fair average progress. The teacher is much respected. A suitable house needed. Examined, 24.
- 123.—1, Fair. 2, The usual. 3, Practical. 4, Good. 5, The junior classes made a fair appearance when examined, the others were necessarily absent; but judging from the aspect of the school, it is satisfactorily managed. Some of Mr. Smith's old "scholars" are now teachers, and he seems anxious and attentive to sustain his character. When I visited on my second tour, the school was closed; the master being at a funeral. Examined, 24.
- 124.—5, In estimating the condition of this school, the drawbacks that the master and the children have encountered should be considered; Mr. Began, as a primary teacher, has been faithful to his duties.
- 125.—1, Firm. 2, Fair. 3, Good. 4, Able and active. 5, At examinations the children acquitted themselves very well. The school house is small and deficient in furniture. Mr. Webster is exemplary for order and discipline, and the scholars are doing well. Examined, 27.
- 126.—5, This is a new settlement, and the progress of the children who attend the school as satisfactory as could be reasonably expected in the "old shanty." The new house when furnished will be suitable.
- 127.—Mr. Curran is gifted with the tact of drawing out the intelligence of his pupils in a peculiarly pleasing manner, and a generous rivalry seemed to pervade the school at the examination.
- 128.—5, The serious disputes that caused last year, exciting general altercations about the "master and the school" in this district, have been, through the conciliatory intercession of the leading men, amicably settled, harmony now prevails; and a neatly constructed commodious school house is being furnished and made convenient to be occasionally used as a Lyceum or Institute, to accommodate the adult population of this settlement and its neighborhood. Examined 30.
- 129.—At the time intended to be appropriated to the inspection of this school, with Nos. 130, 131, 132 and 140, I was unavoidably employed and detained in other sections of my circuit; but I purpose to visit and examine them as soon as practicable.

- 133.—1, Fair. 2, Fair. 3, Good. 4, Able. 5, The house is not in good condition. When examined, the scholars in the higher classes surpassed my expectations in Etymology, Analysis, Reading and Arithmetic. Three or four are preparing for the Normal School. The writing copies highly creditable. Examined, 15.
- 134.—1, Fair. 2, Good. 3, Good. 4, Very good. 5, This is a promising school, and managed in a manner creditable to such a young teacher as Mr. McIsaac. Examined, 18.
- 135.—1, Fair. 2, Fair. 3, Fair. 4, Good. 5, This district is isolated, and there is some difficulty in keeping up the school, which is, however, fairly managed by a faithful master and the intelligent inhabitants. Examined, 19.
- 136.—5, Mr. J. McDonald, now a student of medicine in Canada, taught this school for many years with good success, and Mr. Jas. McAulay, who is gifted with superior talents and natural tact for teaching, succeeded Mr. McDonald; and judging from the appearance made by the very few who were present when I visited it, its efficiency was creditable to Mr. McAulay's abilities and attention as an instructor of youth. I regretted that he had completed his engagement a few days before my second visit to the district and neighborhood, and was taking a week for r.

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- creation and arranging his private business. Examined, 15.
- 137.—1, Good. 2, Good. 3, Good. 4, Very energetic. 5, When Mr. Blue was engaged by the Trustees, a few parents were strongly opposed to him, and appealed to the Board of Education by petition; but by prudence and exemplary attention to duty, he has gained the hearty confidence of the objectors, and general respect of the people who are determined to build a superior school house. The attendance and progress of the pupils in all branches, very satisfactory. Examined, 30.
- 138.—1, Mild but firm. 2, Good. 3, Intellectual. 4, Able and very attentive. 5, With the exception of promotion to the higher classes of some scholars who were last year in the primary department, the aspect of this school has not altered much. The attendance at certain seasons falls below the average required by law from local circumstances, and the fact that many of the old settlers have not now scholars within "school age." This case claims consideration. Examined, 18.
- 139.—5, This school when conducted by Mr. Duncan Cameron was prosperous; his successor, Mr. McRae, was absent when I visited to examine; he was employed as a substitute to complete Mr. Cameron's engagement. The contention about removing this school to a site that is said to have been selected by J. Robertson, Esquire, is strong, and the parties opposed have appealed to the Board of Education. The Stanhope school house is only a mile and a half from this, which is nearly three miles from those families who petitioned for its removal to a new site.
- 140.—5, Mr. Meleod has enjoyed for many years the distinction of being one of our superior teachers. At examinations, the exhibitions of intelligence by his pupils were satisfactory. Employed for years in the district, he is familiar with the character and capacities of the children.
- 141.—5, This school had been for years under the able and judicious management of R. Robertson, Esquire, and Mr. McLeod maintains the school in the high position it has held among others for its efficiency.
- 142.—1, Fair. 2, Fair. 3, Good. 4, Suitable. 5, Decided improvement has been made this year. The school is faithfully taught, but the irregular attendance hinders the advancement of the children.
- 143.—1, Good. 2, Good. 3, Good. 4, Meritorious. 5, Examinations gratifying. Good order observed. Children always attentive, tidy and diligent; and making creditable progress.
- 144.—1, Good. 2, Good. 3, Appropriate. 4, Skilful. 5, This is a model district school. The house is neat, convenient and comfortable. The scholars remarkable for diligence and attainments, and the teacher popular in the district and neighborhood for his activity and zeal.
- 145.—5, When inspecting the "South School" I was detained and could not have time to examine this, which was temporarily closed at the time of my examination in the neighborhood. Miss McGregor seems anxious to do what can be done under adverse circumstances, chiefly resulting from irregular attendance, and the deficiencies in books and other equipments.
- 146.—1, Fair. 2, Fair. 3, Suitable. 4, Qualified. 5, The school house is convenient and very comfortable, with suitable furniture; but the want of books, irregular attendance and the apathy of parents are great drawbacks. Mr. Campbell has been attentive since his appointment, and the progress of the scholars more satisfactory than in Miss Hudson's time, and the discipline more stringent. Examined, 26.
- 147.—1, Good. 2, Fair. 3, Explanatory. 4, Experienced. 5, The teacher was trained as a pupil teacher in a Scottish Parish School, and was afterwards master of a Sessional School. He attended our own Normal School, and is competent to conduct satisfactorily any district school. He is, however, laboring under serious disadvantages in his present situation, as the school house is a disgrace to a wealthy community. Considering the inconveniences and deficiencies so notorious, the attainments of the children are creditable. The trustees have been notified that this school must be closed, unless suitable accommodations are, without delay, provided.
- 148.—1, Good. 2, Fair. 3, Judicious. 4, Able and attentive. 5, The old inhabitants

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- have been proverbial for earnestness and liberality in their efforts to maintain an efficient school, and their children who are now the "Heads of Families" are imbued with a remarkably laudable spirit to enjoy and diffuse the benefits of education. The scholars have a natural perspicacity and exemplify a persistency to acquire a practical knowledge of useful branches. The dispute about the site has not been settled, and continues to embarrass all concerned.
- 149.—1, Fair. 2, Good. 3, Appropriate. 4, Clever. 5, Although the house is in a disgraceful condition, and the scholars, with a few exceptions, notorious for their carelessness and perverse propensities, even when under the superintendence of experienced masters; yet, the young teacher, who was appointed this year, has talent and tact sufficient to maintain good order, and a surprising degree of diligence. He is successful, notwithstanding such untoward circumstances.
- 150.—5, Change of teacher since last examination; Mr. James Stewart is well qualified. He has altered the classification, is punctual in attendance, and has introduced new arrangements that appear suitable. Examined, 20.
- 151.—5, This district has been lately established. When visited Mr. Kennedy was organizing the classes. The house is neat, desks and seats suitable, and when the other necessary equipments are provided, if the children, who appear to be diligent and decent, attend regularly, this may be a superior school.
- 152.—1, Fair. 2, Fair. 3, Good. 4, Good. 5, Considering the accommodations the order, progress and proficiency are very creditable; the intelligence of several pupils, remarkable, especially "Master Bell." Mr. Archibald McKenzie is a veteran in the profession—well known for skill and success as an instructor of youth in several settlements in this Colony. Examined, 24.
- 153.—1, Good. 2, Good. 3, Good. 4, Very intelligent. 5, This is a very superior school. Examination highly creditable.—The children appear very anxious to improve and Mr. Farquharson judiciously encourages their aspirations. Examined, 29.
- 154.—1, Fair. 2, Fair. 3, The usual. 4, Qualified. 5, The examination, on the whole, satisfactory. A few of the pupils made a good appearance. The attendance small and irregular, Miss McGregor seems anxious to discharge her duty faithfully, but I suspect some of the people do not take any interest in the school, which was in a very flourishing condition when taught by Mr. H. Barnard. Examined, 16.
- 155.—1, Strict. 2, Good. 3, Good. 4, Meritorious. 5, The skill and success with which Mr. John Butler conducted this school, demand unremitting diligence, talent and judgment to maintain its progressive efficiency. Mr. Smallwood seems to realize his responsibilities. He has a good mode of developing the faculties of the children, according to their age and attainments. He teaches a modification of Morrell's Analysis, and a superior style of penmanship. The aspect of the school in all the departments satisfactory.
- 156.—1, Fair. 2, Fair. 3, The usual. 4, Suitable. 5, All the classes well taught, but greater energy by the teacher, would enliven the children, and raise a spirit of emulation. The sense of the reading lessons is understood by the scholars in the higher classes, some of whom write neatly, and accompanying specimens show the style of penmanship taught. Examined, 25.
- 157.—1, Strict. 2, Good. 3, Good. 4, Intelligent. 5, The teacher exemplifies praiseworthy zeal and exercises sound discrimination in classifying and advancing his scholars. The elementary branches are fairly taught; the pupils in the higher classes trained to cultivate their faculties, and acquire accurate knowledge of their exercises; I submit specimens of their penmanship. Examined, 30.
- 158.—1, Good. 2, Fair. 3, Good. 4, Skillful and attentive. 5, Examination very satisfactory. The progress made creditable. Examined, 24.
- 159.—5, Miss Boyd's method of arranging and teaching the classes has changed the aspect of this school. Judging from the appearance made by both the junior and senior scholars examined, the prospects of improving the school are fair. They have a set of superior maps. The house small and too shabby for the youth of such a respectable and prosper-



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- ous settlement. Examined, 17.
- 160.—5, Zealously managed on the explanatory system of the Scottish Sessional Schools; but irregular attendance and other hindrances embarrass the teacher. Examined, 20.
- 161.—1, Fair. 2, Fair. 3, The usual. 4, Qualified. 5, The best finished and furnished school-house of its size in Queen's County. The teacher is a very respectable young man of good abilities, but too indulgent and deficient in energy to meet the requirements of this school, which was formerly flourishing under stringent discipline.
- 162.—1, Fair. 2, Good. 3, Good. 4, Able and active. 5, Improvement in all the branches creditable. Mr. Bassett is decidedly more successful than his predecessor who was highly gifted with talent and tact, but deficient in prudence. Examined, 21.
- 163.—5, When I visited this school, it was in a disorganized condition, from disgraceful injuries to the house, &c., done by parties unknown. This school was in a satisfactory condition when examined.
- 164.—Vacant.
- 165.—1, Good. 2, Good. 3, Good. 4, Enthusiastic. 5, Since Mr. Roche's appointment to the mastership of this school, it has been steadily progressing. The large attendance and the variety of subjects to be taught, required systematic arrangements, which special training for the profession, matured by subsequent experience, enabled him to adopt. The school is supplied with a suitable set of maps, and a large black board, which is in daily use in illustrating the exercises. Mr. R. has been for years ably assisted by his eldest son, who now enjoys a more lucrative situation in the United States; and his successor, Mr. McIntyre, is a respectable young man, trained in our Normal School.
- 166.—1, Good. 2, Good. 3, Good. 4, Zealous. 5, This school continues to be taught with surprising energy and success. The principal teacher is endowed with a peculiar natural talent for teaching, and maintaining discipline. His attention to his duties, his skilful method of exercising the faculties of his pupils, and training them to diligence, have secured for him extraordinary popularity. All the available space in the room is occupied by classes, simultaneously and attentively engaged in their respective studies, and by a judicious arrangement, the different branches are taught in satisfactory, systematic, succession. When Mr. Peterson resigned, Mr. John T. Ferguson was appointed Second Master, and the spirit of activity that Mr. Amos infused, has been stimulated by Mr. F.'s energy, ingenuity and competency to discharge the complicated duties devolving on a teacher in such a crowded school. The improvement in writing, arithmetic and the rudiments of grammar is commendable. The room is inconvenient in some respects, but the furniture is arranged as well as circumstances allow.
- 167.—1, Fair. 2, Good. 3, Good. 4, Intelligent. 5, The trustees take little interest in this school, and the apathy that has characterised the parents in this district, embarrassed the teachers in succession. Mr. McNeill, at the commencement of his engagement, imagined he had encouraging prospects. He is naturally active and ambitious to excel, and his training in Truro qualified him for becoming a useful teacher. The difficulty of realizing his expectations of success in this school has apparently discouraged him, and may cause him to relinquish school keeping to attain distinction in some more profitable profession.
- 168.—1, Good. 2, Appropriate. 3, Good. 4, Able and experienced. 5, The attendance has generally been as large as the room could accommodate, and he had always the complement required by law. His skill, as a teacher is well known, but he did not realize in the profession remuneration commensurate with his abilities, which, at his leisure time, he devoted to useful purposes. Such of his pupils as attended regularly, were making satisfactory progress in the branches taught. He had an interesting class in Arithmetic. Barrett's System of Grammar and General Information.
- 169.—1, Good. 2, Good. 3, Suitable. 4, Qualified and earnest. 5, This school was

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formerly taught by Miss E. McKinnon, who is now teaching in the Juvenile Department of the Normal School, with her usual success. Many of Miss Davis's pupils are learning elementary branches, and under her judicious management, making steady progress. Her senior class is fairly taught in English branches and Arithmetic, together with plain and fancy needlework. Order and arrangement very satisfactory.

170.—1, Mild. 2, Good. 3, Suitable. 4, Zealous. 5, The attendance fair, the children neat, docile and making satisfactory improvement. The arrangement of the classes, and the system of teaching them, judicious. Miss Scantlebury also teaches the elements of drawing and needlework.

171.—1, Mild, but firm. 2, Good. 3, The usual. 4, Competent. 5, Miss McDonald has kept this situation for several years, and is highly esteemed. She is remarkably at-

tentive, and the children are making creditable progress under her tuition.

172.—5, The children attending this school are making satisfactory progress in the lower branches. The school-room, neat and comfortable. Miss Shaw is occasionally assisted by a few ladies who take a praiseworthy interest in the school.

The attendance of Students and Pupils in the Normal School, and of Youth in the Juvenile Department attached to it, is a satisfactory proof of its popularity; which may be fairly attributed to the success of the bulk of the Teachers trained in it.

Eleven girls are studying French.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

SIR;

I have the honour to inform you, that the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury have drawn my attention to the propriety of discontinuing, within a reasonable period, the Grant from Parliamentary funds of the Salary of the Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island.

I am aware that the Quebec Conference in their 40th Resolution, make the following statement:

In undertaking to pay the salaries of the Lieutenant Governors, the Conference does not desire to prejudice the claim of Prince Edward Island upon the Imperial Government for the amount now paid for the salary of the Lieutenant Governor thereof.

In using these words the Conference guards themselves from proposing to affect by a mere act of Union, any separate claim which Prince Edward Island might have on the Imperial Government. But the fact is, that quite independently of the project of Union, and whether or not that important public measure be accomplished, the position of Prince Edward

Island in common with that of all the North American Provinces has now become such, that Parliament could not be expected long to continue paying out of the Taxes of this country the Salary of the Lieutenant Governor. It is necessary for me, therefore, to apprise you, that in case the Union be effected, Her Majesty's Government could not continue to make provision for the Salary of the Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island, and that if the Union does not take place, it will equally be necessary within a very short time to provide for the Salary of the Lieutenant Governor out of the Revenues of the Colony.

**W**HEREAS the Lieutenant Governor of Her Majesty's Island of Prince Edward, with the Council and Assembly of the said Island, did, in the month of May, 1864, pass twenty-eight Acts, which have been transmitted, entitled as follows, viz:—

1182. "An Act in addition to, and in extension and amendment of the Act authorizing a cash account to be opened by the Governor in Council with the Bank of Prince Edward Island."

And whereas the said Acts have been laid before Her Majesty in Council, together with a letter to the Lord President of the Council, from the Right Honorable Edward Cardwell, one of Her Majesty's principal Secretaries of State, recommending that the said Acts should be left to their operation. Her Majesty was thereupon this-day pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve the said recommendation. Whereof the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, or Commander-in-Chief for the time being of Her Majesty's Island of Prince Edward, and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

SIR ;

I have the honor to submit a Report of the  
Local Forces for the year, 1864.

**MILITIA.**

Steps were not taken towards organizing this  
Force, owing to the state of the Law on the  
subject.

**VOLUNTEER BRIGADE.**

I annex a return of the first systematic In-  
spection of this Force. It was made in con-  
formity with the Regulations to which I had  
occasion to allude in my Report for 1863. By  
these Regulations, an allowance to each Com-  
pany for the year was made to depend upon the  
number of men who actually paraded in uniform,  
or were absent by reason of illness or other  
unavoidable cause, certified by the commanding  
officer of the Company.

It was originally intended that these In-  
spections should be made half-yearly, but the ex-  
penses of travelling, &c., attending them, were  
found to be too large, taking into consideration  
the limited sum placed at your disposal by the  
Legislature, to allow of more than one in the  
year. This is much to be regretted, as the  
value of the Arms, &c, issued throughout the  
country, renders frequent Inspections highly  
desirable.

Many of the Companies did not seem fully to  
understand the importance of being present at  
Inspection ; as, however, their allowance has

been made to depend on the numbers actually  
present or, unavoidably absent, (subject to de-  
duction for Arms, &c., damaged or not pro-  
duced.) I anticipate that at the next Inspection,  
the attendance will be more regular.

Eleven Companies did not assemble at all for  
the summer Inspection.

As one of the principal reasons for enforcing  
these Inspections, is to ascertain the condition  
of the Arms, &c., issued to the several Com-  
panies. Those Companies which did not parade  
for Inspection were ordered to send in their  
Arms, &c., to Head Quarters. Four of these  
Companies made representations on account of  
which the Inspector received orders to inspect  
them at their several (Company) Head Quarters.

Of the remaining seven uninspected, the  
Tryon Company did not turn out, owing to the  
illness and death of their Captain. Serjeant  
Inman, 2-17th Regiment, who has recently  
been sent to drill this Company, reports that it  
is deserving of encouragement.

The remaining six Companies (uninspected)  
have received orders to return all Arms, &c.,  
which have been issued to them ; and after they  
have had a reasonable time allowed them to  
re-organize, I understand it is your Excellency's  
intention, if they fail in re-organization, to dis-  
band them.

638 men have been inspected, and 118 were  
unavoidably absent from Inspection, from illness  
or other cause,—making 756 in all. To this  
number, the Tryon Company may fairly be  
added, which will make in round numbers, 800  
effectives.

**APPENDIX (Z.)**

All Returns made heretofore, have been calculated from Muster Rolls, and have included non-effectives as well as Effectives. Numbers of persons at the commencement of the Volunteer movement enrolled themselves as members, but have not taken any steps to provide themselves with uniforms, or to render themselves Effectives. No inducement was held out to honorary members, or those unprovided with uniform to turn out for Inspection; and the Returns, including these members, have not, I regret to have to remark, been forwarded with sufficient regularity to enable me to state the exact number of enrolled members.

It is moreover, perhaps unnecessary for me to do so, as all non-effectives will come under the operation of the Militia Law, in the event of the Act 14th Vic., Cap. vi., being repealed during the present Session.

With respect to the time of year at which the Inspections of 1864 were held, I may remark, that the summer is not a convenient time for some of the Companies, as for instance that at Souris, many of the members of which are at sea at that season of the year.

**FINANCES.**

With the regular accounts, those for great coats are unavoidably mixed up. The cost of

of these Coats (53 Artillery,) 142 new (condemned) Infantry, and 50 (cast) condemned Infantry, was, including expenses, £112 1s. 5d., £101 8s. 11d. has been already paid, and £10 14s. 9d. is still due for these Coats.

**MILITARY SCHOOL.**

I annex the Report of this School, made by Mr. Rowan, late 62nd Regiment, who was appointed Commandant by your Excellency.

The interest your Excellency took in it, and the many opportunities your Excellency had of observing the progress made by its members, render it unnecessary for me to remark on its general success.

Each country Company was allowed to send two members to this school, with the understanding that the actual expenses of their Board and lodging would be paid during their attendance. In addition to this, your Excellency directed that the travelling expenses of those who had come from considerable distances, should be paid.

*Commandant's Report on Military School.*

GOVERNMENT HOUSE,  
CHARLOTTETOWN,  
9th March, 1865.

SIR;—I have the honor to report that, in compliance with His Excellency's instructions, 33 officers, non-commissioned officers and men of the Volunteer Force, selected with a view of including members of each of the country Companies were assembled in Charlottetown, on the 17th January, 1865, and formed into a School for the purpose of Military Instruction.

From that date to 9th February, when the School was broken up, they were drilled for not less than Four hours each day, by Serjeant Innman, of the 17th Foot, under the immediate superintendance of either Captain Cropley, Mr. Atkinson, or myself.

Throughout the course of drill, our object was not so much to make well "set up" soldiers of the members of the School (which would have been impossible in the limited

period) as to give them a thorough knowledge of those simpler evolutions most necessary to Volunteers, in order that each member might in turn be able to impart that knowledge to his Company.

During the course of Instruction, and at the close of the School, the Lieutenant Governor had opportunities of judging with what success our efforts were attended; but I may remark, that any defects which His Excellency observed in the final Inspection, are due, not to negligence on the part of the members of the School, who, on the contrary, throughout the course were most obedient to order and most attentive, but are attributable to the limited time devoted to the task, and to the want of a sufficient number of men to form a Battalion.

In conclusion, I may remark, that the habits of punctuality in attending Parade and obedience to order exercised even for so short a period, will not be the least of the advantages gained by the members of the School.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY ;

Whereas in the classification of the lands of the several Estates purchased by the Government, the minimum price for the wilderness lands is 5s. per acre.

I beg to submit to your Excellency, that the larger portion of such lands now remaining unsold, is of a very inferior quality, and some portions utterly valueless ; consequently at the price demanded they must remain unsold ; thereby incurring on my office an annual expense by loss of Land Tax, and interest on purchase thereof.

I would beg to submit to your Excellency, the necessity of a revaluation of such wilderness lands as will enable me to dispose of the same.

Under the 9th section of the 16th Vic., Cap. 18, "An Act for the purchase of Lands, &c.," it is provided, that after the classification of lands by the Commissioner of Public Lands, it shall be the duty of the Lieutenant Governor to fix and determine the price to be charged for the sale of each class and description of land.

By the provisions of the said section, the minimum price of lands on the Worrell Estate and Lot 11, was fixed at 6s., and on the Selkirk and Winchester Estates at 5s. per acre.

And, whereas there are on each of the Estates portions of Wilderness Land of very inferior quality, and totally unfit for settlement ; they consequently will not realize the minimum prices so fixed and determined, and remain an annual charge and loss to the Government, both by Land Assessment, and interest on the purchased value of such lands.
