

A Stunning Blow to Britain

LONDON, June 6—The news that Earl Kitchener, Secretary of State for War, and his staff, who were proceeding to Russia aboard the cruiser Hampshire, were lost off the Orkney Islands last night, was the most stunning blow Great Britain has re-ceived since the war began. This is the second shock the country has sustained within a week

week LONDON, June 6-"K of K drowned, official" flashed news

paper placards at noon today. Ten minutes later all London knew of the tragic death of Lord Kitchener off the Orkney Is-

lands last night. Coming on top of the recent naval action, the news hit the public a staggering blow—the whole of London being par-alyzed for a few minutes while people slowly recovered from the shock. In the eyes of the public Britain had no more popu-lar idol than Kitchener, and his loss meant more than the death of thousands on the battlefield or the destruction of a dozen ships.







MOTOR COMPANIES IN BIG MERGER

In the ALMAPER New York, June 5.—Progress toward the completion of the new \$200,000,000 automobile construction which embraces, the Willys-Overland, the Hud-son and the Chalmers automo-bile companies as well as allied concerns, including the Auto-Lite Company, was announced here today. The new company will probably bear the corporate title of the American Motors Company, with \$70,000,000 of preferred stock, with a par val-ue of \$100 and probably 2,000,-000 shares of common stock of no fixed par value. 000 shares of common stock of no fixed par value. It is proposed to apportion

It is proposed to apportion the entire preferred stock among the companies entering into the merger and according to present plans none will be offered to the public. The con-solidation involves an exchange of Willys-Overland stock for shares of the new company on the basis of three shares of the new company's preferred stock for one of the Willys-Overland.
