At these lectures Miss Chipman has consented to give the club the use of her collection of pictures, and for greater convenience in this and other reference matter, the use of a class room in the seminary. The cost of the course will be only one dollar. As the preparation of these lectures will entail a great deal of work, it is hoped that all the old members and as many new ones as possible will avail themselves of this splendid opportunity.

The first meeting will be held to-morrow afternoon at half past three, in the seminary. The following will be the subjects considered during the course: Jan. 30. FRANCE.—Cathedrals of Rouen and Paris. Outline of the development of Temple Architecture. Art Treasures of the Louvre and Luxembourg.

Feb. 13. THE NETHERLANDS.—Antwerp, The Hague, Amsterdam. The works of Rubens, Rembrandt, Vandyck, and the Minor Dutchmen.

Feb. 27. GERMANY.—Berlin, Dresden, Nuremberg, Munich. Outline of the development of Sculpture.

March 12. VENICE.—Cathedral and Palazzo of L. Marco. Development of Venetian Painting with special reference to Titian, Veronese and Tintoretto.

March 26. FLORENCE.—Cathedral and Tower. Comparative study of bronze doors of the Baptistery. Genus of the Uffizi and Petto Galleries. San Lorenzo, Sculptures by Michael Angelo, and Fra Angelico.

April 9. ROME.—The Forum, Colosseum, Pantheon, St. Peter's, Art treasures of the Vatican, Development of Mosaics in the churches of Rome.

April 23. SICILY.—Taormina, Syracuse, Greece; Delphi, Olympia, Mycenae, Tiryns.

May 17. ATHENS.—Architectural Monuments of the Acropolis, Acropolis Museum, Kerameikos.

some effort in behalf of the young,
the speaker declared that it but a
single boy were saved, the hundred
thousand dollars asked for would be
well expended. When a friend in-
quired if he had not spoken rather
hastily, he replied: "No, not if the
boy was mine."

Let each citizen, where the saloon
is seeking entrance, remember now,
before it is too late, that its coming
means ruin to somebody's boy, and
let each father say to himself, "It
