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

PETROLEUM AGREEMENT.

. The Premier moved the House into Committee of the Whole to consider the ratification of an agreement between the Government and the Newfoundland Oil Fields Co., Ltd.

It provides for the imposition of a duty on imported oil to enable the Company to compete with imported oil. The rate is to be settled by the Governor in Council and proclaimed when the Company are in a position to supply the local market.

All machinery, plant and material for installation, etc., are to be entered duty free. No duty, export or excise, is to be imposed, for a period of ten years following the beginning of sales in the local market.





tlement. Why does he suppress the fact that Abbe Baudoin, in his diary of the French campaign of 1696, states that the inhabitants of Harbor Grace told him that their harbor was the first place settled in the country by the English. Also that he (Abbe Baudoin) had got the information to confirm this: that a man had died there in 1693 or '94 aged 83 years.

Here we find Mr. Gosling wrong on two points:

1st-We have the definite statement that Harbor Grace was the first place settled in the country.

2nd-There was a man born in Har bor Grace about 1610 or 1611, which is two to three years earlier than the "lusty boy," son of Nicholas Gure.

Why does Mr. Gosling suppress these facts? Is it because he is an ardent partisan of Cupids and has done his best to discredit holding any celebration at Harbor Grace or Mos-

Placentia thus for many years remained the capital of Newfoundland. The English settled at St. John's and vicinity, and raids soon began by the French on the English and vice versa. Several times the French seized St. John's by coming overland from Placentia. Raids continued to go on with varying fortune till the year 1713, when Newfoundland was ceded to England. many years after. In 1729 Capt. Far from causing a ministerial crisis the debate in the Chamber of Deputies on the scandal in connection with the liquidation of the religious orders resulted to-day in the adoption of a resolution three hundred and forty three to seventy-nine, condemning in the severest terms the manner in which the liquidations were executed, but expressing confidence in the Government's promise to fix the responsibility and punish the guilty whoever they may be. This was an overwhelming vindication of Premier Briand, who in masterly speech made an attempt to plead any circumstances, for what had happened but contended that the Government was not responsible for individual breaches of trust in the great work of the separation of the church and state, which he said had freed the country from that which to-morrow other countries will be obliged to sever. The result in no wise compromises the programme which the Premier has mapped out which includes first the institution of appeals for the re-opening of all liquidations in order that State may save what is possible out of the wreck, and second the immediate transference of unadjudicate liquidations into the hands of official administrators who will examine all accounts and procure testimony for the correction of irregularities and the punishment of the guilty, M. Pinet especially singled out Millerand, the Minister of Public Works, declaring that the Minister had obtained fees amounting to about twenty thousand dollars which his Secretary had received. Do you intimate that I divided with my Secretary? No, responded M. Pinet, your own fees sufficed.

Slaughter of Seals Must be Stopped.

WASHINGTON, March 15. President Taft has come to the conlusion that the slaughter of seals on the Islands of St. Paul and St. George must be stopped and to-day he sent a special message to Congress recommending that the Government take control of these Islands, also their inhabitants and the seal herds when the present lease to hunting rights expires on April the first.

Indicted for Forgery.

PARIS, March 15. The Public Prosecutor has decided to indict E. Duez the former Liquidator of Church properties for forgery and breach of confidence which charges involved criminal penalties. The trial will be held in Assize Court. Other arrests are anticipated.
