





WHO WAS TO BETRAY HIM.

to-day relates a remarkable story of the King of the Belgians shooting his chauffeur who traitorously attempted to drive him into the German lines. The King was with his troops south of Antwerp, says the report. He ordered the chauffeur to drive ahead of them. After a while the King noticed the driver had changed the direction His Majesty warned him and when the chauffeur took no notice, he ordered him to halt. This having no effect, the King, convinced of treachery, drew a revolver and shot the chauffeur dead. The King then stopped the car and drove back to the Belgian lines in safety.

In the chauffeurs' clothing papers were found showing he had received German offer of \$250,000 for the King's capture.

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

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
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
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
