

The Government would lose nothing by so doing, he declared, as the money would eventually be paid back, and it would be only in keeping with what other countries were doing. He further thought a commission that would work gratuitously should be appointed to see the work done. ed to see the work done.





PERILOUS STRAND.

The statement made by a high auhority that there are now twentywo reformative and protective agencles at work in the Strand guarding the youths and girls who persist in making that three-quarters-of-a-mile their favorite promenade, is rather startling. One is inclined at first to think that there can hardly be room for anyone but the patrols, though the most experienced workers say they could do with even more helpers. It is difficult to get the full list, but the protective agencies include the patrols of the International Hospitality League of the Young Men's Christian Association, who pay special attention to colonial soldiers; Church Army, Salvation Army, and various missions' workers; women police patrols from Scotland Yard, and several women police from Miss Damer Dawson's organization, who are engaged by different huts and societies to guard the interests of people on their remises. The Young Women's Christian Association has a hostel in the Strand and a building in Trafalgar Square, at the western extremity of that thoroughfare, ready to afford advice and shelter to girls in difficulties, and the church of St. Martin's-inthe-Fields is open all night long for the benefit of men and women who, through some emergency, are unable to get lodgings at that hour or who have missed their trains. A TWO-SEATER TAXL




