

Notice to Taxpayers.

Section 7-(1) Income War Tax Act:-

"Every person liable to taxation under this 'Act shall, on or before the thirty-first day of March in each year, without any notice or 'demand, deliver to the Minister a return on "Oath, in such form as the Minister may prescribe, of his total income duri "preceding calendar year. The Oath shall be "in the Form V prescribed in the schedule "to this Act.

"If the Minister, in order to enable him to "make an assessment, desires further infor-"mation, or if he suspects that any person "who has not made a return is liable to tax-"ation hereunder, he may, by registered let-"ter, require additional information, or a re-"turn containing such information as he "deems necessary to be furnished him within "thirty days."

NOTE.—Persons to whom forms have been sent under this Section are bound to return them filled in in accordance with their Income for the period named, even though no tax has to be paid.

Section 9-(1):

"For every default in complying with the provisions for the next two preceding sections, the taxpayer and also the person or "persons required to make a return, shall each be liable on summary conviction to a pen-"alty not exceeding one hundred dollars for "each day during which the default con-

NOTE.—Taxpayers and those suspected as being liable to taxation under the Income War Tax Act, and who have not yet made returns as required by the Act, are now given Thirty days from the Second day of August instant, to complete and send in returns for the accounting periods of 1917, 1918 and 1919. Persons who are in default with their returns after the expiration of the above number of days will be prosecuted. ation of the above number of days will be prosecuted in accordance with the Act.



The Austrian Government has "abolished" it, and substituted in its place a new National Anthem, with words by Chancellor Renner (who, by the way, was one of the Austrian plenipotentiaries who signed the Peace Treaty), and much by Herr Khenzel Hadyn's tune also served the German "Deutschland uber Alles." and this was likewise "abolished" during the war by the ex-Kaiser, who offered a prize for a national song to take its place.



America's Cup Remains in U.S.

Resolute Won Final Race in Eight Minutes 48 Seconds, Including Time Allowance.

Sandy Hook, N.J., July 27 .- Defend-Resolute gave the challenger, Shamrock IV., the worst drubbing of the 1920 regatta in the final race of the series to-day, winning boat for the series to-day, winning boat for towards Seabright. The wind came in boat thirteen minutes and forty-five seconds-and the America's famous yachting cup remains in the United

Overcoming forty seconds' lead the Overcoming forty seconds' lead the gradually worked out to weather of advantage of a windward berth which the challenger, which, however, at 2.36 Shamrock had taken at the start, the defender held a lead of 4 minutes and & seconds at the half-way stake of the thirty mile course, and crossed the finish line thirteen minutes and five seconds ahead. Including her handicap of six minutes and forty seconds, seconds.

Cheered the Victor.

As the challenger crossed the mark her British crew let out three ringing cheers for the victor and the conquer or's responded with lusty cheers for wock and her crew.

Sir Thomas Lipton announced immediately after the race that he would build another new challenger and come across again in 1922 to have another try at lifting the America's cup. going to windward. provided some other yachtsman did not challenge and win the cup sooner. "I was heaten by a better boat," he

said. "I have no complaint to make, but I am greatly disappointed." Shamrock won all the honors of the start. Resolute started in a very bad pocket underneath Shamrock, and the green boat had everything her own

way for the first fifteen minutes.

The wind was scarcely more than three knots at the start and both vachta failed to reach the line before the handicap limit of two minutes expired. Shamrock was the first to cross followed forty seconds later by the defender. Both crossed to the starboard tack, and Shamrock being 50 yards to windward immediately tack-

ed to port. Resolute followed, and to the surprise of all began to fall off to leeward. The yachts had not been sailing ten minutes before a row of barges oomed up ahead Resolute had to tack to avoid them, but for some reason Shamrock instead of tacking also and following the old adage, "always keep between your opponent and the mark," kept on and Resolute, having her wind

Story of the Race.

The preparatory signal was sound ed at two o'clock for a start at 2.15. Resolut carried mainsail, staysail, outer jib and club topsail. Shamrock carried the same sails, but did not break out her staysails until later.

The warning signal was flown at 2.10 and the sloops began jockeying slowly, ahead. for the start, with their baggy jib

wind aloft than the United States boat. She was about fifty yards to windward of the defender.

Shamrock crossed Resolute's bow at 2.32. The challenger footed very fast in the light air and, contrary to his former tactics, her skipper kept her right on the edge of the wind. The air was streaky off shore, but Sham ock seemed to thrive on what the

A 5 Knot Breeze

After a short hitch Resolute came about in the port tack and the two towards Seabright. The wind came in variable streaks and first one and then the other yacht would point better pinch Resolute a little bit and she still held a slight lead.

Although the breeze had increas to five knots, the sloops had their trouble breaking in shore, the fluky wind heading one and then the other. causing them to fall to leeward. Already observers began to express Resolute won by 18 minutes and 45 doubt if the yachts could finish be fore the six hour time limit expired at eight-fifteen.

Challenger Goes Better.

At 3.30 when both yachts were co tinuing their long board to starboard Shamrock had improved her weather position. Whether she was getting het ter slants of air or was being handled better than in previous races could not be stated but she certainly showed a surprising reversal of form in

At 3.55 the challenger had widened her position and was several hundred yards ahead of the defender. The wind was just strong enough to keep the yachts' sails filled.

Shamrock to Weather. Shamrock had worked still further out to weather and was leading Resolute by several hundred yards when at 3.50 the yachts had covered about 616 miles of first 15 mile windward of their 30 mile course. Both yachts were slanting out to sea on the starboard tack with the outer mark about 81/2 miles away.

At 4.06 Resolute ran into a favoring slant of air and quickly cut down Shamrock's lead.

Resolute by rapid footing fore reached Shamrock and then camabout on the port tack at 4.08.

The defender, however, could not quite clear Shamrock's bow and was forced to come about on the starboard tack as Shamrock had the right of way, being close hauled on the starboard tack. Only a few yards separated the races at 4.10.

The yachts were not carrying as much wind as they formerly did and were making slow headway against the flood tide, as they raced to finish Shamrock was evidently heading the contest before expiration of the time limit.

Resolute at 4.19 began to slip out ahead of the Lipton craft and had taken the lead from the challenger, although it was a slight one.

It who may undertake the work. effort will be made to clear up the section near the C.L.B. camp prior to the annual brigade inspection on Thursday, when His Excellency the Governor will likely visit there. After consultation with the Minister of Works it was decided to erect a concrete structure instead of the present bridge known as Fowler's, near Chamberlain's. Drivers of vehi les, particularly motors, are requested to drive slowly and carefully when they come to the working gauge, as the men complain that owing to carelessness on the part of drivers, they do not get a chance to build in the road properly. Their partly finished work is sometimes ripped up by a swerving speedy car. The Commission also appeals to drivers to follow the warnings as to the approach of bridges and points where repairs are being made. The good work being done should be an incentive to all motor owners to join the Association.
