**A Mammoth Water Supply**

Engineers have on many occasions had to construct enormous works in order to provide us with the most vital necessity of life, but few of us have stopped to consider the cost of bringing water to our homes.

To construct a lake 40 miles long 26 feet deep, holding 13,633 million gallons of water, seems a stupendous task, but such are the facts relating to the Vaal River Barrage of South Africa, which has just been officially opened.

The scheme, which has taken nearly ten years to carry out, will supply Johannesburg and the Rand with twenty million gallons of water a day. The Barrage, costing almost £900,000, is 1,400 ft. long, and stands on 36 concrete piers. Each pier is 8 ft. thick, 6 in. high, and 5 ft. long. The 36 steel sluice gates closing the openings are 25 ft. high and 32 ft. 6 in. wide. Each gate weighs about 28 tons. A wagon road and a railway track run along the top.

All the water is passed through mechanical filters, and carried along 4 1/2 miles of steel pipes varying in diameter from 18 in. to 24 in., and costing £455,000. The whole scheme cost £1,500,000 of which £12,000 was spent in providing quarters for the men engaged on this huge and important landmark in engineering progress.

## Asquith will Lead the Liberals and will be Succeeded by Lloyd George.

Labour Adheres to the Capital Levy Plank -- Baldwin Govt. Sustained on Motion of Censure--Germany Denies Repudiation of Versailles Treaty--St. John Schooner Cut in Two.

Labour still favours Capital Levy. LONDON, Nov. 15. The report last night that the capital levy plank had been dropped from the programme of the Labour Party, said by the party's leader, in the House of Commons in the course of an interview. We stand in relation to the capital levy precisely where we stood in the last election. Mr. MacDonald said "the Labour Party believes it should be put into operation once only for the purpose of debt reduction. It is a thing that could not be repeated and we have never advocated it for meeting current expenses. There is no change in our attitude regarding it."

RAY REPORTS UNFOUNDED. BERLIN, Nov. 15. Official quarters here dismiss as unfounded reports circulated that the German Government had decided to repudiate the Treaty of Versailles in its entirety.

BALDWIN PLACES THE BLAME. LONDON, Nov. 15. Premier Baldwin in answer to a Labour motion of censure in the House of Commons to-day, said, with reference to the Ruhr and reparations situation, that he had spared no pains in letting it be known to Great Britain and Allies that the British people should not continue "indefinitely" to maintain the spirit necessary for cooperation if the present situation were allowed to continue. He had high hopes, he said, that were communications with America begun they might really be productive of solid progress, but here again, as often before, we have found all our efforts reduced to nothing, not through our own action, nor by the action of America, but by the action of two of our Allies.

A TAME SITTING. LONDON, Nov. 15. The House of Commons to-night, after a debate in which the Prime Minister and Lloyd George took part, and during which much heckling and derisive remarks were indulged in, rejected the labor motion of censure, introduced by Ramsay MacDonald, by a vote of 285 to 190, amid ministerial cheers. The Government thus maintained its Parliamentary majority and cleared for the formal dissolution tomorrow. Premier Baldwin was only specific to-day on what he proposed to exclude from the tariff taxation; that is, wheat, flour, meat, cheese, butter and eggs. For everything else the Premier reserves perfect freedom for later decision. His plea for the necessity of protection was based mainly on the argument that in the matter of protection every nation's hand was against Great Britain. Several States, especially the United States, Italy and Spain, had greatly increased their tariffs since the war. Lloyd George, criticized the Government's policy in calling a general election. He maintained that "settlement" in Europe would be a better remedy for unemployment than tariffs and regretted the Government had dropped international negotiations just when the United States had joined Great Britain in them.

Labour members heckled both speakers, wanting to know what Lloyd George had done for the unemployed men when he was in power. Altogether to-day's session was tame contrasting sharply with other historic days.

## RUSSIA WON'T PARTICIPATE.

GENEVA, Nov. 15. Organizers of an international conference on transit and communication here received to-day from Foreign Minister Tchitcherin of Soviet Russia a telegram in which he refused the invitation to participate in the meeting. The telegram declared Soviet Russia believed any system evolved under the League of Nations, that was itself an instrument of the great powers, would be used by them as a tool to further their own interests.

## SOVING THE LIBERAL LEADERSHIP PROBLEM.

LONDON, Nov. 15. The question of leadership of the reunited Liberal Party was settled at a quiet meeting between the former rival leaders when it was decided that should the Liberals win the election, Asquith will be asked to form a Cabinet which he will do with Lloyd George second in command. Mr. Asquith, after thus preserving his dignity, would then quietly retire from the Premiership after a few months in office, upon which Mr. Lloyd George would return to his former office.

## SCHOONER CUT IN TWO.

ST. JOHN, N.B., Nov. 15. The St. John schooner Peter, McIntyre was cut practically in two last night in Delaware Bay, when she collided with a steamer, according to a message received by Mr. McIntyre, her owner here. She was en route from this port to Philadelphia with a cargo of lathes. No particulars were given.

## DEVONSHIRE'S ELDEST DAUGHTER MARRIED.

LONDON, Nov. 15. Lady Maud Mackintosh, eldest daughter of the Duke of Devonshire, was married to-day in St. Martin-in-Fields, to Capt. the Hon. Evan Michael Ballie, son of Baroness Burton. The marriage had been arranged to take place next January, but it was announced last evening the date had been altered.

## A Feast of Song and Dancing at the Nickel

PERFORMERS OPEN ENGAGEMENT TO WONDERFUL SUCCESS. The large audience that attended the Nickel Theatre last night was wildly enthusiastic over the excellent musical programme. Miss Bradley gives faithful and effective interpretations of the songs she contributes. The programme was admirably arranged. She is a genuine Contralto of extraordinary range, power and tonal beauty. The audience was moved to the highest pitch of enthusiasm and applauded vigorously. To hear Miss Bradley sing is an inspiration to all lovers of beautiful singing, and we bespeak for her a most successful engagement at this theatre.

Dolly Moore and Jimmie Clayton also opened their engagement, which all claim is the best and classiest Dancing Act ever witnessed in St. John's. ## An Underground "Cathedral"

Considering the small size of this country the number of shafts and caves, artificial and natural, is remarkable, and many of them are unsurpassed for interest and beauty. Engleborough, in North-West Yorkshire, contains some splendid examples, of which Gaping Ghyll, Rowton Pot, and Alum Pot are the deepest. The first-named goes down 360ft., and opens out into a great cavern, described by its first explorer, M. Martel, as "an immense cathedral." This "cathedral" is 500 ft. long by about 100ft. high, and is one of the largest caves in the world. Out of it run passages and crevasses in which the inexperienced adventurer could easily get lost.

## THE BOY WHO VANISHED.

Rowton Pot is 365 ft. deep, going sheer down, and Alum Pot takes two strides to reach 300ft. Few old cities do not possess legends concerning underground passages, the scenes of deeds of darkness in historical times; but fact provides Nottingham with the best example. Beneath this city a river flows, passing on its mysterious journey vast caverns and burrowed-out hiding-places of the early Saxons. It passes beneath the market place, and has been navigated for a considerable distance in a small boat.

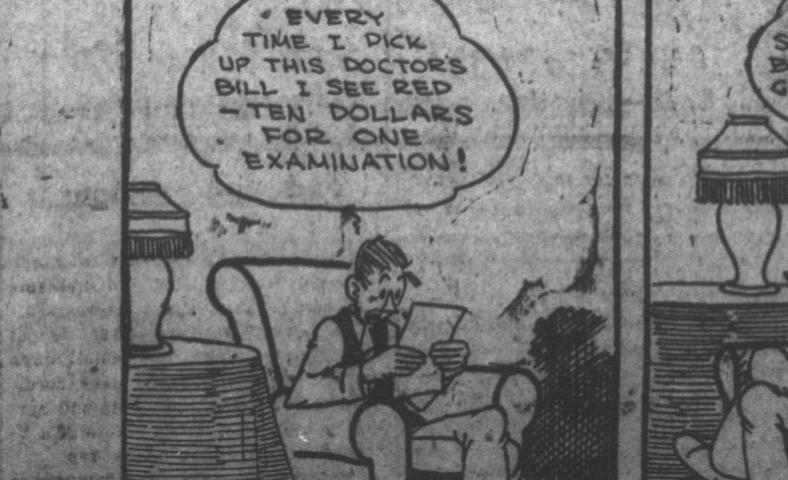

**Trade Through Panama**

Very important communication subject of the western trade has been sent to Eastern newspapers by Mr. R. J. Cromie, Manager of the "Sun," which demands close attention from Canadian manufacturing interests. It is to be noted that in the minds of most business men the Panama Canal has not yet begun to function in its relation to the trade of this continent. The war and the consequent delay of shipping delayed the opening of the canal's possibilities for a much longer period than has been the case had world conditions been normal; but now it is being set up as a prodigious reality. Mr. Cromie wishes to awaken attention to the fact that the Panama Canal has divided Canada into two distinct areas, of which he places the dividing line at Winnipeg. In the distant future, he argues, the business from Winnipeg west will be carried via the Pacific Ocean; western goods will move out and goods will come in. "Whether those goods are of Canadian manufacture, or of British manufacture, or of Canadian manufacture, rests entirely with Eastern manufacturers, but our Canadian manufacturers will certainly have to wake up."

Very striking facts are presented by Mr. Cromie as to the manner in which American manufacturers are already availing themselves of economic advantages supplied by the canal and a base rate of about 100 tons for Atlantic-Pacific shipping has been struck. But Canadians are still trying to do business just as if the Panama Canal did not exist, with the result that the business of Western Canada and British Columbia are in a way to be lost to the Canadian manufacturer. To ship a piano can be shipped from New York to Vancouver for \$7. It costs \$15 to ship the same piano from Montreal to Vancouver in car load or \$20. L.C. An ordinary bath-tub may be shipped from Trenton, N.J. to Vancouver for \$7 less than it costs to ship the same tub by rail from New York to Vancouver. How long, asks Mr. Cromie, can our Eastern manufacturers hope to hold the markets of Western Canada and British Columbia against competition like this? Mr. Cromie advises that Canadian manufacturers make use of the Canal, by shipping goods in bond to New York, availing themselves of any one of the many before-mentioned outside channels that have been established. He also holds that the immediate appointment of a Canadian Customs Officer at the port of New York would enable Western Canada to do business with the Pacific Coast on an economic basis, and that the time for this step is before channels of outside trade have been established. He also holds that the existence of the Panama Canal makes the question of equalized freight rates in the West, more than a local issue, and one that affects the whole Dominion.

It may be that Mr. Cromie's forecast of events, especially his assertion that all incoming and outgoing goods from Winnipeg west will one day be carried by the Pacific route is exaggerated. We do not think the shippers are yet prepared to drop the Great Lakes route to the Atlantic for shipment of grain, but unquestionably the Panama Canal is destined to play a bigger part in our national economic situation than most of us realize. In view moreover of the cheapness of water shipping as compared with the rail haul the possibility of an all-water carriage from our western lake and sea ports to Victoria and Vancouver are not to be ignored. But the main fact for the manufacturer is the necessity of immediate steps to meet American competition arising through the facilities of the Panama Canal route—Saturday Night.

#### HIRAM JOHNSON IS NOMINATED ON THE REPUBLICAN TICKET.

CHICAGO, Nov. 16.—Senator Hiram W. Johnson of California last night announced his candidacy for Republican nomination for president. The announcement came on top of the official launching of William G. McAdoo's hat into the democratic presidential ring.


#### A RUSH TO SECURE CLAIMS IN ALBERTA.

EDMONTON, Alta., Nov. 16.—It is estimated that four thousand acres in Wainwright oil area have been filed by leasehold seekers, when the Dominion Lands Department Office closed late yesterday. The rush resulted from the report of a strike of the British Petroleum Limited. The consensus of opinion of those in close touch with drilling operations is that the flow of one hundred barrels a day has been considerably under estimated.

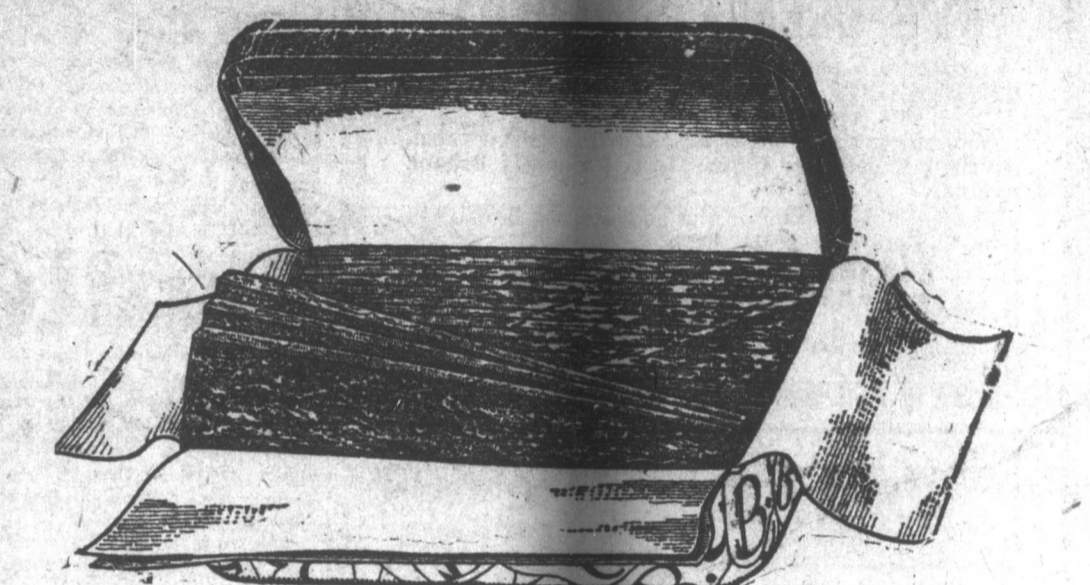

### Importation of Second-hand Clothing.

JUDGMENT BY JUDGE MORRIS IN  
THE CENTRAL DISTRICT  
COURT.

Hon. W. H. Cave, Minister of Finance and Customs, vs. Edward and Margaret Everson.

This is an action taken from the complaint of the Minister of Finance and Customs, against Edward Everson, of Flat Rock, charging them that within the preceding twelve months they did import into this Colony quantities of used clothing contrary to the Revenue Act 1905, Section (5) Schedule c (b) entitled "Prohibited Goods" and Acts in amendment thereof.

The evidence of Levi G. Chafe, Examining Officer, H.M. Customs, proved there were five shipments of goods to the defendants, two last year and three during the present year, one in June 14th, one on August 14th, and the last shipment on October 20th. The goods were addressed "E. Everson" and were in trunks and cases. They were second hand goods consisting of ladies' mens' and children's wearing apparel. The goods were passed by the defendant, Edward Everson, as second hand goods, and only a nominal value was placed upon them. In the cases bundles of clothing were tied together and there were price tickets on them.

Customs Detective Tobin visited the house of the defendants on Oct. 25th. He had information the defendants were selling second hand clothes at Flat Rock. The defendant, Margaret Everson, informed him she was importing second hand goods and was selling them to neighbours around Flat Rock. She had some clothing scattered around her front room: blouses, sweaters and one ladies' skirt. Mrs. Everson gave Tobin the names of several people she had sold goods to. She admitted she had been selling them for a year and a half occasionally when she got the goods in; she thought it was no harm. The blouses were of the last shipment. She got the goods from two sisters in Boston. She had used some of them for her children, gave away some, and sold the remainder.

Margaret Everson in her evidence stated she was the mother of five children aged from three to sixteen years. She had two sisters, one in Lowell and one in Boston; and they sent her down some clothes. The clothing consisted of women's skirts, sweaters, blouses, boots and shoes. Since the beginning of last January she received two trunks. She paid nothing for the goods only the freight and duty. She was not in business and had no shop. She sold nothing of the last shipment but gave away some to her friends. When the next box arrived the neighbours came in, and if they liked they would buy it. She sold the goods to neighbours for about a year and a half but did not think she sold more than fifty dollars worth.

Section (5) of the Newfoundland Customs Tariff sets forth:—"The importation into this Colony of any goods enumerated, described or referred to in schedule (c) in this Act, is prohibited under a penalty of \$200."

Under Section (2) of the Customs Act "Importer" means anyone who imports and in whose name goods are manifested, and the person who proves property in goods imported, and the right to pass entry for same."

Under the evidence submitted by the prosecution I find the defendants imported on five occasions, used clothing consisting of mens', ladies' and children's wearing apparel. Under the evidence submitted for the defence Margaret Everson admitted she had been selling (from four shipments) used clothing to her neighbours at Flat Rock for about a year and a half. Schedule c (b) of the Revenue Act prohibits used clothing when imported for sale. In my opinion the proof that the goods were imported for sale or to be sold is found in the fact that portions of the four shipments were sold. I therefore hold the defendants guilty of the charge preferred against them and fine them in the sum of \$200.00.

### FROM SHAMPOOS TO ETHICS.

My shampoo lady has a new, and to me very interesting, suggestion on the subject of making one's hair grow.

If there are thin spots in the hair on any part of the scalp, she says it will stimulate the hair to grow there if you take hold of it and pull it quite hard.

Pull The Hair To Make It Grow.

I wonder if you are as startled as I was when she brought that out. Instead of trying to coax the hair by some kind of pleasant treatment, or by oils or unguents you are to give it opposition and see what that does.

My mind went back to what the dentist had to say about sensitive gums. "Don't try to cure them by salves, the only thing that will help is to get a brush and brush them every day. That hardens them."

I wonder if you remember the old days when people who had consumption were coddled and kept warm, and if they could afford it, sent to the land of eternal sunshine. I don't think I quite recall those days, but I do remember that the bracing cold air treatment, the sending north instead of south, was not enough in my childhood to cause a great deal of comment.

All of which sounds something like a talk on medical subjects by one who has no license to talk on such lines.

Hardships Instead of Coddling.

But it is the thread that runs through those three methods of treatment that interests me—and I hope may be made to interest you a bit.

They all represent a reaction away from trying to help disease by coddling, toward trying to correct it by the discipline of more bracing methods.

Doesn't this mean that we are going back to a realization of the usages of discipline as opposed to the usages of coddling?

The past age has certainly been an age of coddling in every sense. We have had predigested foods advertised for the weak stomach; and in education we have had the school where the child was supposed to be developed by doing everything he wanted to do

and sheltered from having to do things that were hard for him.

The New Old Method.

But there have been many signs in the last few years that the pendulum is swinging away from the ideas of developing by indulgence back to the idea of development by discipline.

If you prune a plant it grows the faster. Of course feeding it fertilizer helps to, but it doesn't take the place of pruning in producing a healthy, lasting growth.

Also we gain the strength of the obstacle we overcome.

### France a Vassal But For Allies

Lloyd George Confident French Will Heed Britain's and U.S. Advice.

New York, Nov. 5.—Right Hon. David Lloyd George, war Premier of Great Britain, is to-day on his way home in a fower filled suite on the Majestic, confident that his plea for world peace had been well received on his extended tour of Canada and the United States. The stocky little Welshman saluted at midday Saturday with a final word on the reparations crisis. The effectiveness of Anglo-American co-operation he repeated in the guarded phraseology of his last address at the Metropolitan Opera House, depended upon whether the United States followed through the proposal of Secretary Hughes, for an international commission to settle the sums that the defeated powers could and should pay. France, he was confident, would heed the advice of the United States and Britain regarding German reparations.

"France would have been a vassal country but for your country and mine," he said spiritedly.

A crowd of several hundred was on the pier to bid Mr. Lloyd George farewell after his month's visit to the new world. The police who twice had foiled the attempts of Irish republicans in this city to insult the former statesman to his face, escorted him in considerable number from his hotel to the Majestic and no untoward incident occurred.

Mr. Lloyd George sailed in complete ignorance of the fact that a Hindu, a disciple of Gandhi, originator of the non-co-operation movement in India, had been removed from the liner. The Hindu was reported to have followed the little Welshman on his tour and at one time to have been detained by Canadian officials.

Mr. David Lloyd George has contracted to write thirty more articles, the first three dealing with his impressions of America, for a New York syndicate. The price paid for the articles is said by the purchaser to be "one of the largest sums per word ever paid in the history of the world."

London, Nov. 5.—The triumphal send-off accorded Right Hon. David Lloyd George in New York last Saturday is featured by the morning newspapers, but editorial comment is scarce.

The Westminster Gazette, which although liberal in politics, is not especially friendly to the former Premier, cannot discover any evidence that "Lloyd George has got home with the American people as a statesman with a world care policy, but as far as his visit has revived American interest in European affairs it has not been without value."

Considerable curiosity is being shown in learning what attitude Mr. Lloyd George will take toward Prime Minister Baldwin's new tariff proposals and there is some speculation as to whether the launching of the protection issue will lead to a resumption of the two wings of the Liberal party which heretofore have been at variance.

On this point the Westminster Gazette says Lloyd George "when suspected of mild sympathies with Imperial preference. . . . As the sponsor, if not the author, of the Safeguarding of the Industries Act, to which Mr. Baldwin is building part of his appeal, Lloyd George will have to make a clear cut and prompt decision as soon as he returns."

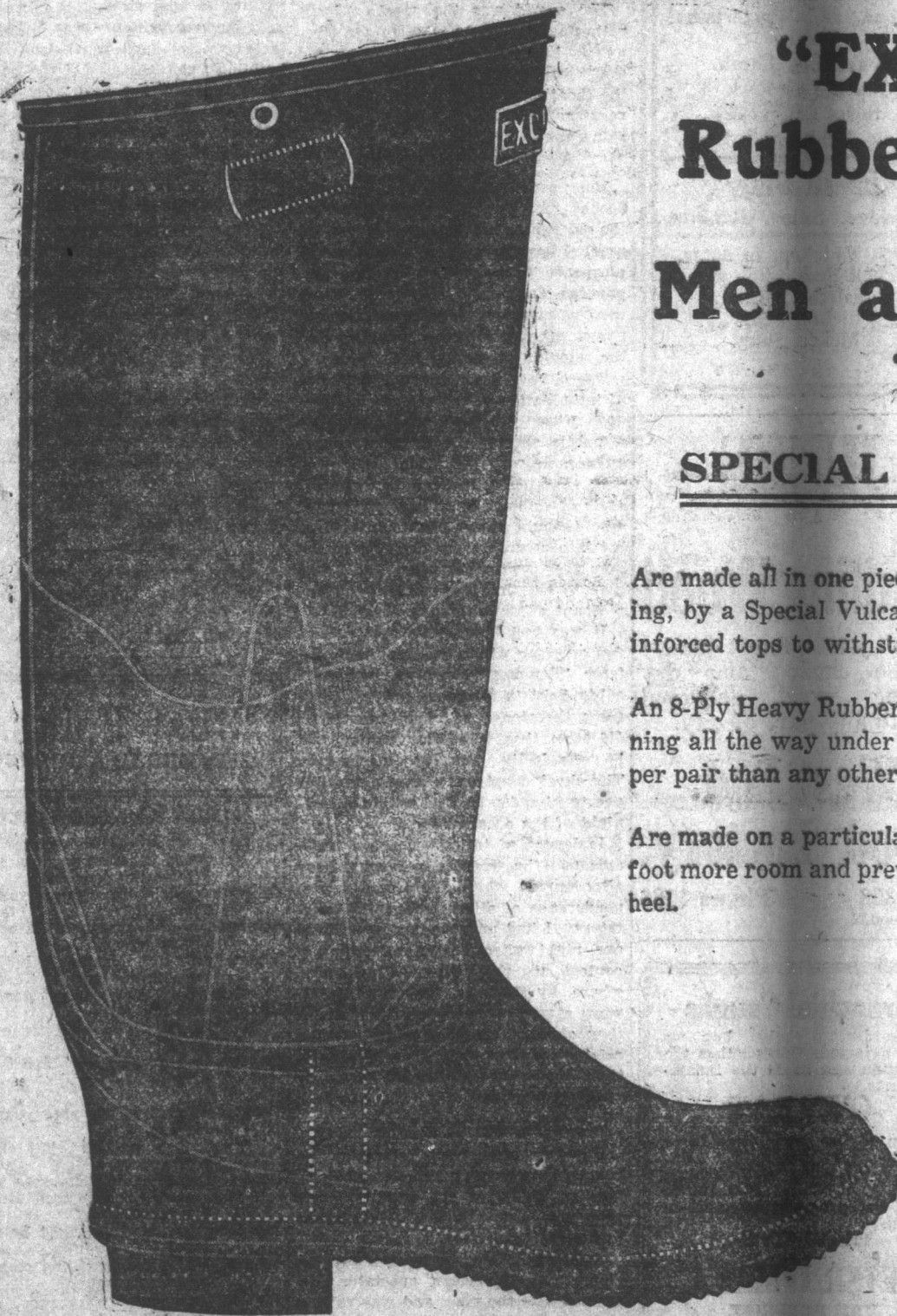

### Vagaries of Currents

These caverns are propped up by timber. The weight of the earth upon the timber causes friction, and there are consequent falls of roof and dust. Thus are created the atmospheric elements which are necessary for an explosion. Some of the South Yorkshire mines contain sleeping gob fires, and the miners are ever on the alert for an outbreak.

Miners resort to many methods to keep gob fires in subjection, the most common being either digging them out or smothering them. The main object is to cut off the supply of oxygen in the region of the fire, and a whole section of "the face" might be rendered idle by walling it in with brick or sand-bags.

#### Battling With the Flames.

It is difficult to keep gob-fire walls entirely air-tight. One can often realize what is taking place in the gob by peeping through the "stop hole." One can imagine, too, the intense heat

the fire-fighters have to endure to stem the approach of the raging flames. Neither is it a stand-up fight for the halls of roof make standing impossible.

Working in the stokehold of a warship or liner is not half so strenuous as the struggle that these miners have to put up to stop the ravages of the fire-demon. They think of their comrades who, in the "walls" or "places" on the other side, are hewing out the coal, while the perspiration is trick-

ling down their blackened bodies. On the occasion of a gob fire there is a strong naphtha-like smell in the atmosphere, and the experienced miner is able to detect the slightest presence of gas.

**Dramas of the Ringside**  
THRILLING SCENES AT BOXING CONTESTS.

(By EUGENE CORRI).  
The riotous scenes witnessed at the ringside on the occasion of the Mike McGuire-Young Stribling contest at Columbus, Georgia, must have made the Irish boxer wonder whether he ought not to be dubbed the stormy petrel of the ring. Whenever he takes part in a contest there is some disagreement as to the justice of the decision, whether it is given in the Irishman's favor or against it.

Sentenced to Death.  
In Columbus, McGuire was threatened with violence at the pistol's point, and with the alternative of hanging at the end of a rope if he refused to go into the ring. And when he did go through with his contest, the referee was compelled to agree to Stribling being proclaimed the winner. However, after he had been safely escorted to his hotel by the police, he altered his decision and stated that his official decision was a draw.

In Ireland McGuire had the unhappy experience of being threatened with shooting if he fulfilled his contract by going into the ring to fight Battline Siki. The promoter of the contest was actually sentenced to death by the Irregulars in the event of his failing to comply with their demands in calling off the fight.

The Free State Government, however, ordered the promoter to "carry on," and the contest was staged under armed protection. McGuire and Siki fought with troops guarding the ring, whilst the theatre was surrounded by Free State troops and detectives.

The crowd was the most orderly gathering one could wish to see anywhere, but when the time came for the fighters and spectators to leave the theatre, they were fired on by Irregulars, who used bombs and machine guns.

An Alarming Experience.  
Most people imagine that dramatic scenes did not "with the demise" of the old prize ring, but such is not the case. I have been present at very unpleasant "flare-ups" following unpopular decisions. Happily, though, these occurrences are far and few between, otherwise boxing would not be the popular attraction it is to-day.

There have been several instances of intimidation of the referee in Glasgow, where for some time boxing as a public spectacle was, as a consequence, in very bad odour. I was once threatened, in Scotland, with all sorts of violence by a gang of roughs, who thought they could intimidate me into awarding my decision to the man they wanted to win. But I was glad to say that I got out of the unpleasant affair without a scratch.

It was just before this that a London sporting paper had sent their referee, "Brammy" Meadows, to handle a big fight in Glasgow. The same gang threatened to shoot him if he did other than what they wanted, and he was badly handled afterwards. The shock must have been a terrible one to him, for he died within a fortnight of the occurrence.

Instances of intimidation and ruffianism at the ringside in London have all occurred where there was a preponderance of aliens among the spectators. I had an alarming experience one night when I was refereeing a contest at the Rings, Blackfraters, where, by the way, the crowd is always a well-behaved one. Sometimes they shout their disapproval at the referee's ruling, but they never let their displeasure go beyond verbal or vocal expression.

Threatened by a Lunatic.  
However, when I was refereeing the contest between Pat O'Keefe and Bombardier Wells, at the Rings, O'Keefe attempted a few tricks. I cautioned him more than once.

Suddenly there was a warning shout. An American spectator had jumped into the ring, and was raising a revolver to fire at me when he was seized and held by the seconds and a number of the spectators. Had

they not done so I am afraid it would have gone badly with me. The American was afterwards found to be a madman.

I have been present at a number of riotous scenes where rival gangs have used the opportunity provided by a boxing show to get at each other's throats, but these fights belong to the now dim and distant past. It is safe to say that nowadays, such happenings would be practically impossible at any of our big London shows, where the organization leaves nothing to be desired.

At another fight the crowd that collected was of such dimensions that a building twice the size of the one decided on could not have accommodated them all. This was the return meeting between Bombardier Wells and Gunner Moir, staged at the Canterbury Music Hall, in 1913.

Dispersed by Firmness.  
The crowd that clamoured to get into the building was so great that the police were powerless to disperse the throng. Ticket holders who were late in arriving could not get within yards of the outer doors, and many had to go away without gaining admittance.

Traffic was held up, and it was not before the Fire Brigade was called out and the hoses played upon the crowd indiscriminately, that disappointed would-be spectators went home to change their minds and their clothes.—Tit Bits.

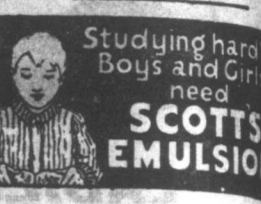

**MARCONI.**

Giuglielmo Marconi, born (1874), Italian electrical engineer, was born at Triliveto, near Bologna, his mother being an Irishwoman. His first experiments in wireless telegraphy were made in Italy in 1895, then put to practical use in England in 1896. In 1899 he established connection by the same means across the English Channel; in 1901 between Cornwall and Newfoundland, and in 1902 between Canada and Newfoundland. In 1904 he entered into an agreement with the British Post Office for the commercial transmission of wireless messages, and in the same year, through the same means, the first ocean daily newspaper was started on the ships of the Canard Line. His system is in use in the British, Italian and other navies, and is at the present time established throughout the world.
