Slaying in India Nets 7 Officials

Bombay, Feb.—Seven officials of the native State of Indore, including the aide-de-camp of the Maharajah himself, whose royal favor proved a curse to the beautiful nautch girl Mumtaz Begum, are under arrest at Indore in connection with the death of her suitor, Abdul Bawla.

Extradition has been asked for the prisoners. Eight arrests previously made here include two step-mothers of the mutilated dancer, her sister and the chauffeur of the late Bawla.

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League to Learn that Portoc Is Not Acceptable to the Empire

Officials Determined to Fight to a Finish.—Quiet Reigns in Cape Breton Strike Area.—Dr. Simons Made Interim President of Germany.

PROTOCOL TURNED DOWN.

GENEVA, Mar. 8. The Geneva protocol fashioning the nations to outlaw war is not acceptable to the British Empire, the announcement which August Chamberlain, British Foreign Secretary, will make to the Council of the League of Nations to-morrow.

DISCUSSING SECURITY PACT.

PARIS, Mar. 7. In connection with the talks in progress between Premier Herriot and Foreign Secretary Austen Chamberlain of Great Britain on the security pact, it is understood on the authority that M. Herriot has assigned Mr. Chamberlain that France is ready under certain conditions to negotiate the Rhineland in the near future. These conditions would be the granting of a security agreement and the control of armaments along the Rhine by the League of Nations. After a two hour talk with Premier Herriot this afternoon, Austen Chamberlain expressed himself as well satisfied with the exchange of views. He thought there was no inherent impossibility of reaching a security agreement that would satisfy Poland and Czechoslovakia as well as other Allies.

BESCO TO FIGHT.

SYDNEY, N.S., Mar. 7. This business has got to be fought out once and for all to determine who is running the collieries, the Company or the United Mine Workers of America. So declared J. E. McLurg, Vice President of the British Empire Steel Corporation this morning. Regarding the situation precipitated by the complete cessation of work among the miners throughout the coal fields of Nova Scotia, McLurg emphasized the contention that officials of the company unused to the hardships of long hours and working twelve hour shifts, could not continue to man the pumps and fans for upwards of a week. After that it would be up to the Province of Nova Scotia to assist in the protection of its own property. He added that the Company had no intention of abandoning any of the mines the permanent pumps at number 10 having been removed to prevent them from being submerged. Water was entering No. 10 at the rate of 1,400 gallons per minute. There have been no disturbances of any kind to-date throughout the collieries.

WIT REIGNS IN STRIKE AREA.

SYDNEY, Mar. 8. With their ladders replenished at the hands of their more fortunate neighbours, the miners of Cape Breton quit work Friday night following the refusal of the British Empire Steel Corporation to restore credit at the company stores and operate collieries for four and six on a working basis for four days per week, spent perhaps the quietest Sunday in their memory. The long lines of muddy streets lined the dreary cottages characterizing the mining communities of Nova Scotia were unpeopled save for swarms of apparently care free children. Smoke was belching from the smoke stacks of various bankheads where members of the company's clerical staff laboriously fired the boilers furnishing steam for pumps and fans which must be operated, tie-up or no tie-up. In order to keep the mines in operating conditions, but the din of industry was absent. In the towns of miners gathered about the street corners but there was no disturbance and no intercommence. John McLeod, District President of the United Mine Workers of America, discussing the situation to-day said, "We have had a number of conferences in Cape Breton and each time we have agreed something. There was no intercommence during the trouble of last week, there will be none this year. However, there will be no violence. We can avoid it." J. E. McLurg, Vice-President of Besco, was asked this afternoon what effect a ten per cent decrease in the wages scale paid the miners would have on the selling price of a ton of coal. He replied that he was not prepared to answer that question. Instead he showed that in 1923 with a wage scale seven per cent less than the 1923 scale,

SHOCKS STILL BEING FELT.

QUEBEC, March 7. Seismic shocks are still being felt in the Charlevoix District, according to advices reaching here. The latest disturbance to be noticed occurred last night at half past nine, but it was slight and did not last for more than a very few seconds.

FIRST GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF UNION CHURCH.

TORONTO, March 8. The first general assembly of the United Church of Canada will be held in Toronto on June 11, and an invitation to hold this meeting in Trinity Methodist Church has been extended.

SIMONS TO BE PRESIDENT AD INTERIM.

BERLIN, March 7. The majority parties in the Reichstag have agreed to frame a measure appointing Dr. Walter Simons, President ad interim of the German Republic. Dr. Simons is a former Foreign Minister and now President of the Supreme Court at Leipzig.

CANADA GETTING NEWSPRINT INDUSTRY.

NEW YORK, March 7. The newsprint industry is going to Canada according to A. E. Grambs, President of the International Paper Company. Despatches from Montreal which announced purchases of lands, mills and water power by the Company, means nothing less than the transfer of a large part of United States newsprint to the Dominion. Mr. Grambs said to-day.

PRIEST BURIED ALIVE.

KIEV, Ukraine, March 7. Father Andrea Fedoukovich, Polish Catholic Priest, has been buried alive in the town of Jitomir, near here. Authorities allege his assailants are agents of the Polish secret police.

JARVIS BEGINS TO PAY FINE.

TORONTO, March 7. There has been action on the huge fine imposed on Amelius Jarvis, bond dealer, and Peter Smith, former Provincial Treasurer of Ontario, who were convicted last year of conspiracy to defraud the Province in certain bond transactions. It was announced by the Attorney General this morning that \$140,000 of the \$600,000 fine imposed had been paid by Mr. Jarvis, who is now serving a six months' sentence at a jail farm, York County.

CURZON'S CONDITION UNCHANGED.

LONDON, March 8. The condition of Marquis Curzon was unchanged to-day.

\$150,000 FIRE AT MONTREAL.

MONTREAL, March 7. The \$150,000 plant of Danford Bros., cotton and wool manufacturers, was destroyed by fire this morning. The firemen had difficulty in saving the

Knowing He Must Die of Heart Disease

POLICEMAN "CHEERFULLY" ENDS HIS LIFE.

John Flaherty of Traffic Squad Shoots Himself in Washington Hotel.

Told by a department surgeon, he was doomed to die within a few months of heart disease, Traffic Policeman John Flaherty, forty, of Subdivision A, apparently considered the time too long, for yesterday he was found a suicide in the Whitehill Hotel, No. 103 2nd Street, N.W., Washington. He had shot himself in the throat with his service revolver.

Flaherty, member of the Traffic Squad since 1913, got his warning from the surgeon last Friday. He immediately obtained an indefinite leave of absence. He packed his belongings in the room he had occupied at No. 70 Bank Street seven years. Saturday morning he said good-by at Traffic Division headquarters in West 20th Street Station.

"I'm going to Miami and then New Zealand," he said. "Am I coming back? I can't say."

The next heard of him was a telegram from Washington announcing his death. He had registered Sunday

at the plant of the Maple Leaf Milling Company, separated only fifteen feet from the burned building.

MANITOBA DISCUSSING REDISTRIBUTION.

WINNIPEG, March 8. A redistribution bill, which would reduce the number of seats in the Manitoba Legislature of 45 is under consideration by supporters of the Bracken Government, it was learned Saturday. At present the Legislature is composed of 55 members.





Discovery of Man-Like Ape's Skull

IS OUTCOME OF GIRL STUDENT'S ZEAL
Tends to Prove Africa Was Cradle of Human Race, Scientists Say.
LONDON—The reported discovery of the "missing link" in Bechuana-land has aroused intense interest among British scientists. Prof. Elliot Smith, one of the world's leading anthropologists, said: "This is the greatest discovery ever made regarding man's ancestry, if cable reports are accurate."
Sir Arthur Keith and Sir E. Ray Lankester, both world famous authorities, said that the claim that Africa is the cradle of the human race had been fortified by the discovery.
Prof. Dart cabled from Cape Town that he has named the discovery "Australopithecus Africanus." Prof. Dart is quoted as saying: "The gap in the geological record between the most primitive men and the most advanced apes is filled by his discovery at Taung. He was not an ape-like man, but rather a man-like ape. He lived early in the Pliocene geological epoch (400,000 or 500,000 years ago), or even earlier, in the Miocene epoch."
The discovery is an outcome of the zeal of a girl student in the Rand University. She brought Prof. Dart the fossilized skull of a monkey from the Rand mines and when Dart found this had been blasted out of a limestone cliff in Bechuana-land, he made the arduous journey to the scene with Prof. Mouny, a geologist.

Cows That Never Drink

Large quantities of beef are produced in the Hawaiian Islands, and Hawaii itself now boasts several ranches devoted to the breeding of white-faced Hereford cattle.
Although they are as thirsty as any other cows the majority of the animals exported from this island have never enjoyed a drink of water, for water has no chance to accumulate owing to the arid soil and the complete absence of irrigation.
Any close observer on horseback, however, soon discovers the animals' secret, for whenever a horse sees a cactus tree it throws up its head and nibbles the shoots, which contain moisture in abundance. Seeing the horse slake its thirst in this way, it is almost certain that a fiery band of "white faces" will thunder up to the spot. Destructive Fire at Corner Brook

A report of the destructive fire to the Staff House of the Armistice, Whitworth Company, at Corner Brook, which occurred on Sunday, March 1st, has been received by Inspector General Hutchings, from Head Constable Jacob B. Cox, of that place. The fire broke out between the floors of a small room on the second floor and before the occupants could get at the real seat of the blaze, the flames soon spread and engulfed the building. Before the fire had reached serious proportions willing hands tore off several boards between the ceiling and upper floor, and poured all the water that was obtainable on the blaze, but their efforts proved futile. An alarm of fire was sent in by a crane whistle close by, when the water hose was brought into play. One of the occupants, a Mr. Spence, escaped from the burning building by a bedroom window. The origin of the fire was due to heated stove piping. The funneling passed through the floors of the upper flats and the dry boards became quickly ignited. The inmates saved most of their belongings. The amount of insurance carried on the building was \$950.



Current Radio



A Two-Stage Audio Amplifier

EDITED BY JOHN M. CLAYTON.
In the articles which appeared in the February 3 and 4 issues of this paper, two sets were described—a simple single-tube receiver, in the February 10th issue was described a single-stage audio amplifier which could be added to either of the two sets.
In to-day's article we will show the hook-up for a two-stage audio amplifier which can be adapted to either the crystal or the one-tube receiver.
The hook-up is shown in the diagram at the head of the column. You will need the following instruments: Two audio transformers, two sockets, two rheostats, two tubes, and a dozen binding posts. These latter may be Fahnestock clips, if desired.
The audio transformers need not both be the same range, but it is important the ratio of neither exceeds 5:1. Higher ratios will work, but there is a very good chance for distortion to creep in, whereas with a low ratio the chances of getting near-perfect amplification are increased about 100 per cent.
Note that binding posts are used for both the input and output terminals. If either the tube or crystal set previously referred to is being used the input terminals connect on to the detector unit output posts. If you are using a set with jacks, the input terminals of the audio amplifier can be connected to a plug, and the plug used to connect into the output jack of the detector.
Note that posts are provided for a "C" battery. A "C" battery is hardly necessary on a one-stage amplifier, but it will more than pay for the trouble of installation on a two-stage by the "B" battery economy effected and the better quality of amplification.
The "A" and "B" battery posts may be jumpered over to the corresponding posts of the detector unit. Since only 22½ volts of "B" battery is used on the detector unit, another set of posts are provided in the two-stage unit for hooking in more "B" battery for the amplifier. One, two or three more 22½ volt batteries may be hooked in here.

Suggestions for Encouraging Tourist Development

Dear Sir—Permit me to take up some of your space, just now more valuable than ever, to call the attention of the Government representatives of the district, and the people of this locality, to some of the ideas necessary, in my opinion, to be carried out for the future development of this area. As the Govt. are about expending some millions of dollars in the encouragement of Tourist Traffic by building and improving roads as well as by encouraging the erection of hotels, I presume to call on them first. As the Representatives of the District should have it in their power to materially assist, I ask for their quota. But as the people of the area referred to are those most vitally interested I call on them to unite in soliciting, and by every lawful means, induce the other two parties to perform their obligations.

At present the people from Norris Arm west are principally dependent on the two industries of logging and the manufacture of paper for their livelihood. For some thousands this means continuous and remunerative employment. For others, especially those at Botwood stevedoring work is more spasmodic and, in consequence, there are many periods, long or short, of enforced idleness. In all this area, particularly Norris Arm, Peter's Arm, Exploits Valley, and near Badger there are large, and comparatively easily developed tracts of rich agricultural land. What is needed is some system of encouragement to induce the people to go more extensively into the production of the many farm products consumed and at present, to a large extent imported into the locality. Surely some means can be devised that will do good and, at the same time, prevent the foolish and unlawful waste hitherto pertaining to such expenditure in this country.

Again, we have in this neighbourhood some of the finest sporting and recreational areas in this fine sporting and recreational country. There is a good motor road from Grand Falls to Botwood and another not so good from Badger to Hall's Bay. By linking up the two through a road from Grand Falls to Badger and a little improvement on that around North Arm a splendid motor drive of about seventy miles through some of the best portion of Newfoundland can be obtained. If the people of Hall's Bay succeed, as I trust they shall in obtaining their road around the bay this drive may then be extended. I believe to Cape St. John's. Along this route lie many valuable fishing streams and lakes. At the seaside we have many sea trout and salmon rivers while in the interior are to be found large quantities of native, or mud, trout and ostanchole.

To complete the cycle I would suggest a central Tourist Hotel at Grand Falls with branches at Badger and Botwood, and possibly Hall's Bay. We thus have all the principal equipment necessary for the encouragement of visitors via Hotels, Roads and Farms—ensuring rest, locomotion, and nourishment. The Badger Lakes running as they do for many miles, and having on their shores several nice beaches together with good fishing are well adapted for exploitation in this respect.

There are dozens of competent guides to be obtained in this locality all expert and boatmen. Such a scheme would also provide employment during the summer months for the trappers and thus prevent them roaming over each others trapping ground seeking what they may devour, to properly carry out such a scheme we require a proper system of game protection, and not the ridiculous farce we suffer under at present.

MARKET LETTER. In spite of complaints to the effect that business has not improved as rapidly as was expected prior to election, there has been real and substantial improvement. The data now available shows that another sharp increase in basic production occurred in January. An index of industrial production reveals that in that month it was more than 10% above normal, as compared with almost 20% below normal last summer. A significant thing regarding business conditions is that while industrial production has increased 25% since last summer, bank credit has increased only 8%. There have been no heavy borrowings to finance big manufacturing programs for speculative purposes. In other words, there has been no inflation.

"Listener in" Voices a Complaint. March 9th, 1925. Dear Sir—I ask the privilege of your columns to vent the woes of an already large and rapidly increasing section of the community—the "listeners in". The Government is sufficiently aware of our existence to collect a small tax from us, but in spite of this liability we have no clearly-defined rights. Radio reception, though a fascinating hobby, is by no means an unadulterated joy. There is a serpent in our Eden, and his name is Interference. Only those who have endured the tantalizing experience of hearing a beautiful musical number of interesting speech drowned in shattering discharges of "static" can appreciate just what an annoyance it is.

"Static" however, is an evil at present beyond control, and we must resign ourselves to endure it as best we can until Senator Maroon or some other modern wizard finds a cure for it. It is otherwise with the other major forms of interference, telegraphic wireless signals—"Morse" for short—with their deafening iteration, and the pandemoniac wailing and screeching of "re-radiation" caused by obsolete or badly-constructed local receiving sets. I speak subject to correction, but I am given to understand that telegraphic messages are by regulation supposed to be sent on a wave length less than 220 or more than 500 metres. Yet it is a common occurrence to have them drown out signals broadcasted at 350 or 400. This can only be deliberately careless tuning, is there no authority behind the regulation with power to penalize those who offend in this way? Re-radiation should be a easier problem to solve, as all the offenders are within local jurisdiction. In England the difficulty is overcome by official inspection of sets before licenses are issued, licenses being refused to sets which re-radiate above a certain unavoidable minimum. There are some sets in St. John's which emit a note that would shame the compressed-air whistle at the dock for pitch and volume. It is fortunately difficult to identify the offenders, or the victims might be tempted to apply drastic remedies! Now that the Legislature is in session, would it not be well for it to deal with this question? I am sure radio users would cheerfully pay a tripled tax in return for the abolition of these nuisances. If the Minister of Posts suspects the writer of exaggerating the evil, any listener-in will, I am sure, be glad to invite him to make a personal experiment. If he doesn't come to the conclusion that (owing to the paucity of the vocabulary available for a family paper), I have considerably missed the facts, I will eat my loud-speaker!

Miss Loder is the pioneer worker in this branch of welfare work in Newfoundland, the Methodist School having inaugurated a clinic under Miss Loder's supervision.

An interesting account of her work was given by Miss Loder, and great benefit is being done to children through these clinics.

It was stressed that parents attach little or no importance to defects such as constricted chests, squinting eyes, adenoid teeth, and other ailments which have a direct bearing on the health of their children and generally on their mental powers.

Parents who send their children to school where there are clinics have a weight of anxiety taken off their minds. They know that their children are not associating with schoolmates who are infected in any way.

Close to her address Miss Loder gave an interesting account of her experience in school clinic work in England.

Mr. Johnson then spoke at some length on the necessity of awakening the public to an appreciation of the value of medical supervision in schools. Lady Allardice also emphasized this need and hoped that the Government would have the active support and development necessary for the development of such clinics.

Layer of Two Girls to Hang

Feb. 14.—Guilty of murdering Canada's Doctor Jekyll—Mr. Hyde, Harry D. Williams, will hang on the gallows at Fredericton, N.B., on April 23, unless government clemency is secured.

Found guilty of killing his two half nieces, Williams, on the eyes of all Canada were found guilty in ten minutes and sentenced after one of the speediest and most thrilling trials ever conducted in a Canadian court.

It was in November that the bodies of the two little girls were discovered wired together in a lonely spot in the hills. They had been strangled to death. The finger of suspicion suddenly and unexpectedly pointed at Williams.

His arrest quickly followed, but without a storm of protest throughout Canada, because the prisoner had a distinguished record over his life.

He protested his innocence at first, but as the net of circumstances tightened about him he confessed.

It was then that the Doctor Jekyll-Hyde situation entered the case, and all Canada was aroused and Williams was blamed for the tragedy.

Williams, it developed, was at the time of a most peaceful and loving father, and at other times an entirely different personality. Ten years ago his wife divorced him.

One of the sensations of the trial was the calling of George Camp, a member of the jury, as a witness for Williams. Camp was barred from the service when it was shown that he had assisted the sheriff of the county in the hunt for the murderer.

There was created in court Williams' former wife, Mrs. Thornton, of Honton, Me., who stated that she had been married to Williams ten years ago, but that she was appearing in court to testify against him.

Williams and his former wife were divorced.



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
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
