



Owing to the war with France a naval convoy was necessary while in European waters, and the 'Duff' proceeded to Portsmouth and was there delayed for a couple of weeks. While there a clergyman gave one of the Missionaries a manuscript vocabulary of the Tahitian language which had been taken from one of the mutineers of the 'Bounty' when seized by the 'Pandora.' This manuscript was extremely useful on the voyage for those whose destination was Tahiti.
