



This has been quite forcefully demonstrated in the fisheries of the North British trawler per day's absence from War, the fisheries were afforded an opportunity to recuperate. With the renewal of operations in 1919, the average daily catch increased to 3,483 pounds or 80 per cent, greater than the pre-war average. In 1921 it had declined to 2,173 pounds, and in 1923 to 1.568 pounds. Thus within a fiveyear period of fishing, the increment gained during a five-year closed season was wiped out and new low levels reached. The record of British trawlers operating in Iceland waters is similar. The average daily catch per day's absence for the years 1906-13 ranged within the limits of 4,883 and 7.376 pounds. In 1919, it increased to 7.638 pounds, falling to 4,872 pounds in 1923. The story of Dutch trawlers operating in the North Sea is corroborative. In 1905 the average catch per voyage day was 1,965 pounds; in 1913. 1,738 pounds; in 1918, 5,744 pounds, and in 1923, 1,723 pounds. As a result of the impoverishment of the port yesterday, one of the members of nearby fishing-banks, the present trend is to build larger fishing vessels, capable of making longer voyages. No less than thirty such vessels are being built in Hull, England. The White Sea is being drawn upon, and several expeditions have been sent to Greenland waters, even as far as Davis Strait, to ascertain the abundance of fishes. The great numbers of Drowning Fatality fishes found in these areas will undoubtedly lead to their exploitation. African fisheries are also being exploited on a much larger scale than before. This depletion of certain areas and expansion of operations emphasizes the need of extensive studies of the life histories and habits of the



The Bartlane Process is a method of picture transmission whereby a perfect picture is punched on an ordinary telegraphic or cable tape and transmitted over ordinary telegraph or cable lines. At the receiving station the tape is run through a light projector, producing on a film an accurate reproduction of the original photo-



Industrial Norway

Norway, for its population, is the ost industrious fish producing country in the world, and she knows how to prepare fish for export in ways that enable her to sell her products at fair prices all over the world. Last year Norway exported 360,000,000 kroner worth of fish. That is, about \$70,000,000. At Norway prices her total catch for 1924 was only valued at 100,000,000 kroner, or about \$20,-000,000. So she added greatly to the value of her fish produce by preparing t for foreign markets.

Norway catches about 500,000 tons of fish annually, herring furnishing about 60 per cent. of this weight. Canada's catch in 1923 was about 380,000 tons, with a larger percentage of high priced fish like salmon, halibut and lobsters. But Canada's export of fish in 1923 was only \$27,000,000—not half the export of Norway.

Of the total value of Norway's catch 50 per cent. is represented by cod. Of Canada's total catch the value represented by cod is about 10 per cent. Of Norway's value, herring represents about 26 per cent; of Canada's only 31/2 per cent. Whereas fish other than cod and herring make up 861/2 per cent. of the value of Canada's catch, these other fish only make up 24 per cent. of the value of Norway's catch. Cod and herring bring high prices; it takes a lot of them to run up values by the tens of millions. Aspirin Braces up Cut Flowers

Experiments have confirmed the fact that cut flowers may be prevented from fading by giving them an aspirin tablet. The experiments were conducted with chrysanthemums. The treated blooms outlasted the untreated by three days. Flowers which were badly wilted were given fresh water and an aspirin tablet. They revived in two hours, looking as fresh as they did when picked. The leaves, however, remained wilted. The aspirin acts as an antiseptic, interfering with the enzyme which causes the clogging of the stem at its cut surface.

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Attempt Fails

REINDEER TAKEN TO BAFFIN LAND IN 1921, DIE.

OTTAWA, Oct. 9 .- Failure has attended the attempt to pasture Lapland reindeer on Baffin Land, according to advices from the Arctic expedition. Private interests in 1921 took six hundred reindeer to this district and of this number only seven are alive.

The failure is attributed to the lack of wooded country and absence of accustomed shelter. While reindeer are not suited to the district, it is thought caribou will survive and propagate there if feeding grounds are established, while the Royal Canadian Mounted Police at Craig Harbor report that musk oxen are comparatively tame and subject to domestication.

American Bishop Guilty of Heresy

SENTENCE WILL BE PASSED IN THE NEAR FUTURE.

NEW ORLEANS, Ia., Oct. 8-The house of Bishops of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America to-day approved the finding of a court convicting Bishop William Montgomery Brown of heresy. More than two hours was occupied in executive session and Bishop Brown addressed the House of Bishops on his case. It was understood that the vote was 95 to 11 in favor of approving the court's finding.

The next step in the "Brown case" must be taken by the presiding bishop, the Right Reverend Ethelbert Talbot, Bishop of Bethlehem. The presiding Bishop was notified by the House of Bishops of its approval and he may pass sentence at his leisure. No date was set, it was said, for pronouncement of sentence which would prevent the convicted Bishop from exercising the functions of his office.





Tidal-Wave

A study of tidal-waves by Professor Vaillaux, a French authority, is given in The World's Health, the organ of the International Red Cross (Paris)

Says this writer: "The determination of the causes o this phenomenon, which often pro duces terrible loss of life and property, is especially difficult in view of coating all round the fish. Part a the difficulties of observation. Testimony of witnesses who have escaped from the calamity is naturally con fused or contradictory. The seismo cords, and the former can not function, of course, when earth tremors are about. Observations from boats at sea are almost always useless because of the relatively calm rise and fall of the ocean-level as the tidal-wave passes. The problem is further complicated by the confused terminology of description. Finally, the frequent minor oscillations of the ocean-level, aside from the daily tide fluctuations. need to be recorded and studied for the same reason that a record and analysis of the 30,000 annual minor earth tremors are as necessary in the work of the seismologist as that of the thirty or forty great earthquakes. The problem is of the greatest interest to the warmer, volcanically, unstable, regions of the globe, and is confined for the most part between latitudes of 40 degrees north and


