### **Local** and **Miscellaneous** New Buildings and Improvements in Guelph.

With the return of spring, the torpidity in building operations gives place to activity and euterprise; and as the weather becomes more open and genial, a fresh impetus is given to the ever onward march of progress. Navigation may now be said to be fairly open on all the lakes and on the St. Lawrence below Quebec; while throughout the greater portion of Ontario the farmers have commenced their spring work in earnest, and are now busily engaged in ploughing and seeding. Although winter maintained its reign somewhat longer than usual, its more genial successor has put forth its power without that waywardness which sometimes characterizes it, and under its influence snow, ice and frost have disappeared as by magic, giving place to a mild atmosphere and green fields.

In Guelph building operations promise to be very brisk this season—much more so in fact than in many previous years; and the number and style of many of the new buildings will give employment to scores of mechanics and laborers. There are not enough masons in town to supply the demand, and to push on the work that will be required, more will have to be obtained from other places. The wages now given at Guelph are two dollars a day. Carpenters are receiving \$1.50, and both these and laboring men are plentiful at present.

The following are the new structures about to be erected in this town:

A storey and a half brick cottage for the Misses Mickle, on a park lot on Mitchell's hill, near Dr. Clarke's, and facing the river Speed. It will be built in the villa style, and having an elevated position, will present a very handsome appearance. Its dimensions are 34 by 44, with four rooms on the ground floor, and six on the upper. Mr. Stephen Boult is the architect and builder, and in fact has the contract for the entire work—painting and all. It is to be insished and ready for occupation some time in June.

Mr. Henry Berry is about to put up a large three-storey brick and stone building next to Massie's Block, Upper Wyndham street. It is to be used as a whole

a workshop to be ready for occupation as such by about the first of September. Mr. Boult has charge of this work. Mr. Boult himself is putting up a dwelling house, almost new, close to his factory, on Quebec street, which will be completed in about a month. Further Damages in Waterloo.

The large mill dam connected with Mr. Elias Snyder's grist and flouring mills at Waterloo village, at length gave way, and sidewalks, staves, cordwood, fences, bridges, and even houses were swept away with the destructive and madly rushing floods of water. FRIDAY EV'G, APRIL 23, 1869. PAYMENT OF CRIMINAL WIT-NESSES.

At the Assizes for this county just concluded, there was exhibited a great deal of dissatisfaction by some of the witnesses subporned by the Crown, at the expense to which they had been put in coming to Guelph to give evidence, and receiving nothing therefor. The complaint is not a new one, but chronic in its character, and must remain so till something is done to remedy the grievance; and as it looms up at every court held throughout the Province, public attention is being directed more strongly to the matter, and people are beginning to enquire whether it is altogether right to force a man from his daily avocations and make him attend the Assizes at his own expense simply because he has been an involuntary spectator of a crime. There, for instance, was the manslaughter case at Mount Forest—a village some forty miles from Guelph—which was tried last week. Ahost of witnesses were summoned to put in an appearance; and when it is remembered that nearly all these witnesses came from the townships of Egremont and Arthur, and were obliged to remain in town till the case came up for adjudication, and their evidence was given, the cause for complaint will not appear to be a slight one. The same, too, with the other criminal trials, though in these the number of witnesses was much smaller and the distances from which most of them came far less. In all these, witnesses received no compensation for time or travel. It is on this account that there is so much reductance manifested by parties to attend court when required by the Crown, and in some instances the ends of justice are very liable to be frustrated by the principle under which the existing law is put forth. The judge, crown counsel and constables are paid for their services in criminal cases, but the witness, whom the law presumes to be actuated by a "sense of public duty," receives nothing in compensation, though without him neither judge, jury nor counsel could do very much in matters of this kind. To the poor man in particular, the hardship of losing his day's

one, and calls for redress of some kind.

The Grand Juries at the Assizes for Perth and Middlesex have made a move in this matter, and amongst other suggestions, recommended the payment of witnesses in Criminal cases, and their example will probably be followed by other juries, and steps taken to have a change of some kind made in the law. In England and the Province of Quebec, witnesses of the class alluded to are allowed travelling expenses and a sum for subsistance while in attendance at court, in addition to the compensation for loss of time; and if there is any special reason why the same practice should not be carned out here, it would be as well to learn what it is. The subject at all events is ripe for legislation.

London, April 23rd, evening. — The London Post, a Conservative Whig or gan, has an elaborate editorial on the Cuban question, in which it mentions that it is asserted that Pres. Grant has a longing eye upon Cuba, and would not be unwilling to distract the attention of the people of the United States from watching the course of internal affairs by a war with some foreign power. A conflict with Spain can't leave any doubt respecting the issue unless England and France should interfere. A blow dealt towards the whole West Indies, and the acquisition of Cuba might be followed by that of Jamaica and Martinique. The same paper quotes the recent acquisition of territory by the United States as a proof that it wants to acquire by piecemeal all the possessions held by European powers in that latitude, and would naturally commence by Cuba because it belongs to the weakest of the powers. Having settlements in the West Indies, France and England will doubtless determine whether these designs against. Cuba will be tolerated or aid Spain in retaining her colony.

The French press has agitated this question much in the same tenor, and special meetings were held in the French Cabinet on Tuesday and Wednesday, which resulted in a special envoy being sent last night to London with despatches referring to the present complications of events.


