However, it is not always the most fashionably bred horses that trot the best, and stallions of ordinary blood lines have been the progenitors of extreme speed.

A low record is a valuable asset in a stallion, and owners of mares no doubt give due consideration to the record of a stallion when they contemplate mating them, but, at the same time, it is a fact that many of the great tarness horses of recent days were got by stallions that were without turf records. Colorado E., for instance, holder of the world's record of 2.04%, for 3-year-old trotters, in the E., for instance, noncer of the worther specific of 2.04%, for 3-year-old trotters, is a son of The Bondsman, a stallion with no turf record. The Bondsman, however, was a 2.10 trotter, but not fortunate enough, to obtain a record before he broke down. The same may be said of The Director General, the ill-fated stallon that died last week at Dayton. Ohio. This horse just missed having a low record. In fact he had none, but he was the sire of four in the 2.05 list. nevertheless. Many more such instances exist, but The Bondsman and The Rirector General are striking illustrations of no-record stallions being great stres.

There are hundredsof stallions left in America, any one of which might get a world's champion trotter or pacer without creating surprise, so the exportation of a few of the low-record stallions to Europe each year should not be considered alarming.



The bank made a claim of the sum of \$596,900. It was distinctly illegal hat the bank should carry on the business of the company as it did, the Dominion bank act. There was equitable principle by which the pank could be entitled to recover from he company or its assets any money advanced by the bank in paying debts arred by itself in the execution of acts prohibited and therefore illegal. April, 1907, an agrement was nade between the two parties that the sales of lumber were to be set aside to meet these two sums borrowed amounting to \$79,000. A special account was opened for that purpose, but was abandoned in December 1907, after four months.

Mentone, France, May 5.—Lord Gorell of Brampton, who was a judge of the probate divorce and admiralty division of the English High Court from 1892 to 1905, and president of the court from 1905 to 1979, has died here in his 55th year. As a judge he was known as Sir John Gorell Barnes, and he probably divorced more persons than any other British judge has ever done.
