A despatch to-day from Dongola makes no mention of the reported fall of Khartoum. It says, how-ever, that the Mahdi at last accounts was collecting forces around Khartoum, and had summoned Gen. Gordon to surrender. in Summit county, has reached here by two or three different routes; but beyond the assertion that seventeen men were lynched at that point on the charge of cattle stealing nothing is known. Rock creek is in the Gore mountains, a sparsely settled region in the northern portion of Summit county, and the means of com-municating are slight. The information, although lacking particulars, is believed to be reliable. had summoned Gen. Gordon to surrender. The Mahdi has intercepted two messen-gers despatched by the British to Khar-toum. The same despatch declares that a large force of rebels was at Berber and the rebels had possession of the wells on the caravan route between Debbah and Khar-

rebels had possession of the wells on the caravan route between Debbah and Khar-toum. After the crops are harvested the Mahdi's forces will be largely increased. The Daily News has a despatch from Debbah stating that Gen. Gordon attacked a large force of rebels at Andermann, and after eight hours' fighting put them to flight. Gen. Gordon had twelve vessels well man-ned. The rebels numbered 25,000. They had four Krupp guns, one of which burst during the engagement. When the mes-senger left the rebels were returning to re-new their attack, having obtained rein-forcements to nearly double their original strength.
