The Riot Reopened.

The trial of Riel over all our politics. It has made its appearance in the Ontario legislature, and will be dragged across every "stump" in the province during both the provincial and federal elections. We cannot regard the introduction of such extraneous issues into our provincial legislature with approval. It is enough that the administration of justice should be made a party issue at Ottawa without being also made a theme of debate in legislative bodies having no control in the premises. Mr. Coleman White has racial affinities with the Indians and the Metis which may naturally lead him to take an interest in them, but we are constrained to say that his amendment to the address is not inspired by any higher motive than a desire to embarrass the government. This he would find impossible to do were it not for the bad precedent set him by the reformers themselves. Hon. C. F. Fraser's position is logically tenable, but he is handicapped by the crooked record of his party. When the Hon. Edward Blake made the death of Scott a war cry against the late Hon. J. S. Macdonald, he did so most naively. Though the charge was successful in its aim, it has since proved a boomerang that has inflicted considerable damage upon himself and his party. Sir John A. Macdonald's want of straight forwardness in the same connection has ever since been a plague to him. While Mr. Blake was moving against Riel in the legislature that he knew had no jurisdiction, Sir John was "winding to God he could catch Riel," although he knew that Riel had got out of his reach by means supplied by himself. The Riel record is creditable to neither party, nor to their leaders. The old game is being played over again. The crisis are being played out to make Riel a source of embarrassment at Ottawa, and the Tories are laying similar plans in Toronto. Mr. Mevart and his colleagues are not yet satisfactorily responsible for Mr. White's unfair and untrue tactics of fifteen years ago, but their opposition to Mr. White's amendment can only be justified by implied censure of those tactics. Such reprisals are made at the expense of the country's interests, and should not be made at all, but it cannot be denied that from a purely party point of view, Ontario opposition to the government is a disadvantage in this instance. No consideration for the public interest will restrain them from making the most of their chance, such as it is.

Compromise or Capitulation.

There is no compromise in the air in London, according to yesterday afternoon's cables. If there is to be a coalition government, there is likely to be at least a policy of compromise. Gladstone and Salisbury had a twenty minutes' conference yesterday, and the subject under discussion was foreign affairs. This should be taken in connection with what the Globe's special cable says respecting the Queen's attitude on the question of foreign policy. We quote: "I have to say that the rumors about the Gladstone ministry being formed merely to make an extended tour of the world in the hope of some non-sensical reason for the Queen's duty in nominating Mr. Gladstone as premier are generally seen as a contradiction. Her Majesty's position was caused by her fear of Lord Salisbury's being foreign secretary at a critical moment of the foreign policy. He will not be the foreign secretary, but will most probably be Lord Salisbury's personal secretary on the best of terms with him. It is not the Queen's policy, but the House of Commons, before receiving Mr. Gladstone's resignation, was in favor of the result of Lord Salisbury's resignation." It is scarcely fair to put all the blame of recent blunders in foreign policy on Lord Salisbury, seeing that it was really Gladstone's policy as much as his, but what we said a few days ago appears to be getting confirmation—that Gladstone has taken a sharp curve on the question of foreign policy. The disappointment of the Greeks, the Queen's intense anxiety, and the brief conference between the two leaders—all point to the conclusion that on this question Gladstone has maturely changed, either through persuasion or pressure, or both combined.

The same despatch gives no hint of a coalition, but instead of that of a probable ministry, all taken from the liberal side. On "the highest authority" it is announced that Lord Northbrook will be victorious for Ireland, John Morley, chief secretary for Ireland, and Sir Wm. V. Harcourt, home secretary. Lord Northbrook will not have a seat in the cabinet. Mr. Gladstone will be chancellor of the exchequer, combining this office with the premiership. Mr. Childers will be minister of war, Mr. Chamberlain, first lord of the admiralty, Sir Charles Harcourt, probably Lord Chamberlain, Lord Randolph Crewe, lord privy seal, Earl Spencer will very likely be secretary of India. Lord Richard Grosvenor will have the office possibly of postmaster-general. Mr. Trevelyan will be president of the local government board, and Mr. Mundella president of the board of trade.

Other cables say the St. James' Gazette states that in the event of a coalition ministry being formed, Salisbury would be content to serve under Harcourt. But this probably does not amount to much. What is more likely is that there will be a compromise on foreign policy, but not a compromise on home policy too. Though it is not so stated in the despatches, the Parliaments issued for the present to sit with the opposition in the House of commons.
