



TORPEDO BOATS AND IRONCLADS.

The Dead Sea of America.—There are no fishes in the Great Salt Lake. The only living thing beneath its surface is a worm about a quarter of an inch long. This worm shows up beautifully under the lens of a microscope. When a storm arises they are driven ashore by thousands, and are devoured by black gulls. We found a pure stream pouring into the lake, it was filled withchubs and shiners. The fish became frightened, and were driven down the brook into the briny lake. To be self-frustworthy is the first thing in moments of danger; but the act of swimming has a high value in the saving of other lives, and is, besides, a luxury and accomplishment worth the having, for the mere fun of the thing. In our civilization, swimming is an acquired accomplishment. It is understood to be a natural function with nearly all kinds of animals hogs and humanity being the leading exceptions. The inability to swim is in all cases a defect of education.—Sanford B. Hunt, St. Nicholas for July.
