## TRADE AT TONAWANDA.

Advices from Tonawanda, $N$. Y., a great lumber centic. say that business is improwing though cill far from what it ought to be. The fall trade has not opened with the degree of activity that was expected, but lumbermen have learned that it does no good to grumble and that it must take its own time. The lake receipts have been quite licavy since August 1 , and a very large stock of pine lumber will be carried over. Here you can get almost any quantits; grade or thickness, except the best grades, which are in light supply but in active jemand. 1'rices are firmer on the latter, but there is no general raise. Box and other cheap grades of lumber are not doing well. The receipts for Alugust were 72,000,000 feet. The east is not buying heavily, only what is needed. The local nills are fairly busy and some building is being done. The export trade is quiet at present. Lake freights are very stiff being \$2.25 to \$2.j0 from Superior, and the organization of the canal boat owners is kecping the rate up to New York and Albany. Lumber is be ing sold on a very low margin and it is hard for them to pay any advance at all, but the boat owners have been in very bad shape themselves and are tiying to make a living profit now. There is no doubt, 150,000,000 feet of lumber yarded here now: Shingles and lath are quite dull, and there is little hope of any good demand till next sprind Hardwoods are selling readily, especially oak and chestnut. Ash, elan and basswood are in re quest. There is some demand for timber.

## CURRENT TRADE CONDITIONS. ontario.

Trade is not picking up in this province as dealers hoped it would. They alwnys look for an improvement in September, but this year it proved to be a very poor month. The last few days there was slightly better demand, but it was hardly sufficient to help the trade to any appreciable cxtent, and so far in October there has been little improvement. By this period of the year mill men usually count on having macle sales of considerable portions of their stocks, and either to have shipped enough topartially clear their yards, or to have arranged for shipping so that they could calculate with some degree of certainty. This year the piling grounds are full, and there is little doing in the way of sales, with no immediate prospect of things getting better, for while there must be some movement as the seasongoes on, no startling devclopments are anticipated, cither in demand or prices. While the abuve refers specially to white pine, hardwond is, perhaps, a litile better. There is a fair movement and prices are pietty well manntaned. For oak thene is a steady demand in the United States, and with slocks low, prices keep well up. If we had quartered oak to send them we would do well by it. Other hardwoods are also asked for, and most of what our de.lers handle goes to that country. Shingles are dull. There is little demand, and so far as British Columbia shingles are concerned, inquiries for them scem to have dropped off almost entırely for the present.

Qurbec and new bxunswick.
Dealers in spruce in these provinces are begining to look mote to the southern m.trket. It has been better than for ycars, and as prices in the eastern states are low they regard the south as a mariet where they can send their goods with advautage. The English market too, shows a good demand, and prices firm, with only a moderate supply. While brokers are not paying any more for deals than in the spring, they car sell, and turn over the returns to the manufacturers, which is an advantage to operators, not always enjoyed in the past. The drought has hung up a great many logs. There are sad to be between $20,000,000$ and $30,000,000$ feet on the St. Jolin river between Fredericton and Andover, which will requate more ran than has fallen to move. Some mills have had to shut down a month earlier than usual. This will have a tendency to maintain prices. The retail yards have been buying slowly as yet, but they will have to stuck up soon for the winter. But there seems to be great difference of opinien as to how prices will be.
ukitisil columbia.
Trade has been quiet the past week, and there is nothing special to note in the conditions. There are more vessels in port than for some 'ime, and a number are loading, but there were no clearances. Building operations are quiet, so the local demand is small. C. P. R. cars being required to move Manitoba grain, there is litte lumber being shipped east. Prices are unchanged.

## united states.

The Northwestern Lumberman, of Chicago, predicts that the lumber trate is about to experience a revival in prices as well as in demand. It cannot come tou soon, say we. Precisel; what it basis its prediction on is not apparent, for so far as pine is concerned, and it is the kind of wood most extensively dealt in, the Timberman, published in the same city, says there will not be any inmediace betterment till the white pine nen combine for their mutual interests. The competition of yellow pine has done much to decrease the demand for white pine and to lower the price. As a white pine operator sig. nificantly expressed it, the time was when he and his associates looked down upon the yellow pine operator as a man to be pitied, but now he was inclined to take his hat off to the men who, in spite of all adverse conditions, had been abic durng this year 1895 to advance and maintain prices on theircommodity, and withadvancing prices extending its sale. The weak point of the market appears to be in common lumber. The better grades hold their own without any difficulty. In the Saginaw valley trade has improved, on account of the high rates of freight from Lake Superior ports, which went into operation recently. A Saginaw dealer declares the trade is only returning where it properly belongs, that while fretghts were low, eastern dealers flocked to Duluth and got poor lumber. But this is, perhaps, only the declaration of a business rival. If as be asserts, the Saginaw lumber is the best to be found anywhere, it is to be remembered that much of it comes from Canada. The higher freight rates from Lake Superior has had the effect of pilisg up the docks at Duluth, and room is geting so scarce that most of the mills have stopped running at nights. In the east the matket is not specially actue, but there is a betier inquiry than there was a short tume ago. Purchases to fill up broken assortmen, re being made, and this has quake::ed the movement in white pine, sprucc]and hemlock. On the whole, the present situation may be summed up thus: Septernber shows a decided falling off in movement as compared with the pre-
vious two months, with a hopeful tone that is encouraging. The effect of the good crops of 1895 will be felt more in 1896 than unmediately.

## maryic:

Reports from England indtate rather a quiet weeks trade. Most merchants have provided for present wants and only far-secing ones are buying loarrive. Flooring boards seem to show the greatest activity. In hardwood there has been greater briskness, London and Liverpool both showing a good trade. In Scotland conditions are the reverse, Glasgow reporting pine and spruce active, and hardwood quiet. There have been considerable arrivals of Canadian woods at Britisn ports. Pine, spruce and hardwood all have an upward tendency. Receipts from the Baltic have been checked by a stiffening in freights. In other directions rates are reported dull. The outlook for a better trade with Australia is improving. There is a prospect of better times there.

## STOCKS AND PRICES.

Heavy rail receipts of lumber for the past two months are reported at Buffalo.

Cooperage stock is reported dull at Buffalo. Trade is not good, though better than last year.
A large number of men have been sent from the Saginaw valley to the Canadian pineries this fall to take out logs for next season.

The schooner Hattie C. sailed from Mancton N. B., on Wednesday with 7,200 thes, and the schooner Burmah cleared from Fox: Creek on the Petitcodiac river on Thursday with 3,200 tics.

A correspondent of the Northwestern Lumberiman estimates the log imports to the United States from Canada this year at over $250,000,000$ feet. In 1891 it was $80,000,000$ and in $1890,30,000,000$.
Owing to low water in New England, compelling many mills to shut down, receipts of lumber have fallen off. Prices, however, have not improved, as stocks are sufficient to coverall present wants.
The Holland Emery Co., wath mills at Tawas and Bay City, has $3,000.000$ feet of logs in Canadsan waters which will have to lic over till next season and the company will consequently curtail its logging operations this winter.
The Holland \& Emery raft of $4,000,000$ feet, which broke away from the tug in a recent stom while on its way to Saginaw, has been recovered. It was found on the rocks at Michael's Bay. Only about $j \infty \operatorname{logs}$ were lost.
Three barges of lumber winch arrived at Buffalo a few days ago, in tow of the Sam: Marshall, lost most of their ieck loads in a storm. The loss is expected to aggregate 600,000 fect. The lumber lost is all high grade.
The St. Anthony Lumber Co.'s new mill at Whitney, Ont., the season's product of which was sold to the Export Lumber Co., of New York, is running night and day so as to complete the contract within the time linit.
In a few days Gilmour's mill at Trenton, Ont., will clase down for a week or ten days, at the end of which time the first of last winter's cut in the new limits, consisting of 45,000 pieces, will reach Trenton. The mill will then resume culting for another month.

The Saginaw Lumber \& Salt Co. is pushing work in its camps on Spanish rivel. The other operators there will put in less than the usual amount of stock. Men are scarce on account of the demand for farm work, and wages are up to last years standard.

Col. A. T. Bliss has sold his interest in a large track of pine near Queber, to Gen. Alger, for a consicieration in the neighborhood of $\$ 150,000$. He had previously sold him a fractional interest for $\$ 55,0 \infty$. Aiger, Smith \& Co. propose to work the tract the coming winter.

The lumber shipments through the St. Mary's canal, out ot Lake Superior, during August, were 138,152,000 feet, a large increase over last year. Of this, Duluth shipped about $42,000,000$ feet and Chequameson about $52,000,000$. The shipinents for the year so far aggregate 405,332,000 feet, a gain over last year of $60,000,000 \mathrm{ft}$.
The export from St. John, N. B., for the last week of September took a wide range. To United States ports went $1,500,000 \mathrm{ft}$. of long lumber, $4,000,000$ shingles, over $3,000,000$ lath, and 1,000 cords of wood. To the British market went $1,250,000 \mathrm{ff}$. of deals, etc.; to Buenos Ayres went 620,$\infty \infty$ feet of lumber and some laths; to Santa Cruz, 200,00 ft.; to Granada, 190,$\infty \infty f t$, and some shingles and clapboards; and to Las Palmas, 290,000 fect of lons lumber, and 500,000 lath.
The Messrs. Cushing, of Pleasant Point, N. B., are building a new mill, of which the foundation is already laid, and a contract entered into for the machinery. It is expected the mill will be ready for saming early in March. It will be $50 \times 220$ feet, and will be fitted with two large band saws. Since the old Cushing nill was burned, several months ago, the firm has had seven mills sawing for them, and have shipped about $8,000,000$ feet of lumber, besides that which was not destroyed by the fire.
The Howry Lamber Co., of Peterboro', expect to get out between $75,000,000$ and $100,00,0 \infty$ feet of lumber the coming season. They have already eigh: camps and will add one or two more. A representative has been in Montreal for the purpose of engaging 100 more. In one day recently the foreman and a gang of men, with one team of horses, put into Burnt river, $851 \log$, which is the largest number of logs ever watered in one day, by one gang and one leam.

Southern pine lumber has advanced from 50 cents to $\$ 1.50$ per 1,000 feet, especially in those manufactures required in the west and southwest. Western pine manufacturers have added 50 cents to $\$ 1$ per $1, \infty 05$ feet to their prices. At a mecting held in Albany, N. Y., at the office of the Skillings, Whitney $\&$ Bannes Lumber Co., the price of cutting-up and better pine lumber, was advanced $\$ 2$ per thousand feet. There is less of ti:2 better grades of white pine in sught at the present time than there was one year ago, and the demand is now more active.
The cut of the Chaudiere lumber nills at Ottawa, will this season be $50,000,000$ feet behind that of last year. This ycat's cut will total about $265,000,000$ feet and will be divided as follows: J. R. Booth, 100,00,000feet; Buell, Orr\& Co., 50,000,000 ; Bronson \& Weston, $50,000,000$ feet; Gilmour \& Hughson, 40,000,000 feet, and W. C. Edwards, 25,000,000 feet. Many
reasons are given for this shortage. The delay of some firms in beginning the season's sawing on account of replacing old machinery with that of a more modern type and a scarcuty of logs are largely responsible.

## a LUMBER CASE IN APPEAL.

Before the Supreme Court at Oltawa last week, the lumber case of North British and Merchantile Insurance Co. vs. Louisville came up on appeal. The insurance con.pany resist payinent on a policy of insurance on lumber at Three Rivers, on the ground that the oivner, iwho insured for the benefit of respondents, practised a fraud on the company by insuring more lumber that he really had, and claiming for some two million feet more than was insured. The case rests almost, entirely on figures and measurement. The court below was evenly divided: After hearing argument judgment was reserved.

## Lumber ITEms.

The water is 50 low in the Ottawa that it is feared it will interfere with the runing of the mills at the Chaudiere for the rest of the season.

The fire losses in Canada and the United States during August amounted to $\$ 9,929,000$ of which the wood industries contributed $\$ 1,605,000$.
Mr. Pyke, of Vancouver, B. C., was in Totonto last week, and in speaking of the lumber trade in his province stated thatit is at present in a depressed condition, owing to the paralysis of buildink operations the world over, due to the hard times. He predicts that when trade revives the province will te very prosperous. Vancouve: is growing in importance as a port and distributing centre.

## SHIPPING MATTERS.

There were no clearances at Victorin, B. C., during the week ending Oct. r.
The American bark Enock Talbor, 1.300 tons, has loaded lumber at Cassady's mill, Vancouver, for California.
The American schooner Aida, 507 tons, has arrived at Vancouver from Shanghai, to load a return cargo of lumber at Moodyville mill.
The City of Nanaimo took from New Westminster a car load of hardiwood lumber, which had come to Liverpool by G. N. R. for Nanaimo.
The large four masted baique Olivebank, from Vancouver, with Oregon pine, which callerlat Aigoa Bay for orders, lias leen sent rourd to Delagoa Bay, where she is now discharging a full cargo for Johannesburg.
The Norwegian ss Transit, 1,027 tons, the first of the Puget Sound and Central American steamship company's liners, sailed Sept. 24 from Scatle on her initial voyage. In her eargo was lumber and shingies to the value of $\$ 5,00$, and sash and doors invoiced at $\$ 350$.
The Brilish ship Eall luurgess, on her way fromplownsea, to Vancouver, I. C., to load lumber for the United Kingdom or continent, went ashore at English Bank, Uruguas). She was got off and towed to Montevideo leaking, surveyed and reported unseaworthy, and recommended to discharge for repairs.
The followings shipnents have leen made from the port of Montreal during the week ending October 7ih : Mamnon, $17,7 \mathrm{ca}$ deals, 1,024 ends, to Liverpool ; Nessmore, 24,235 deals, to Liverpool ; Tritonia, 13.551 deals, to Glasgow ; bark Gazelle, 53,239 pieces of lumber to Buenos Ayres ; Lake Superior, 10,207 deals, 8,953 ends, 22,815 boards, to Liverpool.
