THIRTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF ST. GEORGE'S BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

The Annual Meeting of St. George's Branch of the W. A. was held in the school-house on Friday, March 24th, at 3 p.m.

About fifty ladies of the congregation were present and the Rector presided. After a hymn and the opening prayers, the Secretary was called upon for her report. It showed that 22 meetings had been held during the year. The Branch has a membership of 105. Of these, 27 names are on the roll of working members, the average-weekly attendance being 15. The 1st Vice-President and two others have been absent most of the winter through illness and have been much missed, and four other faithful workers have left the Parish, Mrs. Lough, Mrs. Henry, Miss Bennett and Mrs. Evans.

Four bales were sent away during the year, two to the Gordon Schools containing complete summer and winter outfits for four boys besides other clothing, and one each to Apsley, Diocese of Toronto, and to Thessalon, Algoma. These contained 235 new garments, 20 second-hand, and 176 Christmas gifts, besides books and cards. The money pledges of the Branch amount to \$144.

Only five members subscribe to the Extra-cent a-day fund. More subscribers are carnestly desired. Thirty-nine Leaflets are taken.

The President of the Girls' Branch then read her report as given below. Next followed the Treasurer's statement, after which the Rector gave some information about the Poor Fund of the Parish. The Rector then presented a Life Membership to Miss Street from her fellow-workers in the Branch as a token of affection, and of their appreciation of her work and devotion during many years. The Rector said what great pleasure he had in making the presentation and that Miss Street's connection with St. George's Parish, was older than the W. A. itself and had begun further back than his own work among us.

He then called upon Miss Tilley to address the meeting, and all listened with real interest to her explanation of how membership in the Auxiliary may help and develop our higher life, and in how many ways it is possible to work for the great cause of Missions.

Miss Lowe then read a beautiful paper on a clause of the Members' Prayer, after which the Rector gave the benediction. Tea was then served in the class room, presided over by Mrs. Phillips, where several former members of the Branch received a warm welcome.
