G. I Tessier, who conmenced the dry goods business in Ottava last October, is in difficulties. A creditor to whom he had given a mortgage on the stock has taken possession and advertises it for sale. He claimed $\$ 700$ capital when he started a year ago.

Tres amount of tea that has already arrived at Vancouver, and being diatributed over the

Camadian Pacific Railvay, is three and a half million pounds. There are yet four vessels to arrive which will bring the total for the season up to nearly eight millions.
M. Nadeau, general storckeeper, of St. Francis, N.B., has locked up all his resources in lumber on which he is unable to realize. Added to this a sickness at the most critical time of the drive caused him edditional loss, so that lee las been compelled to askiga.
Thomas Boummoge, an Ottawa clothier, is offering a compromise of 35 cents in the dollar, which the majority of his creditors have accepted. His liabilities aro estimated at $\$ 7,000$, with assets of $\$ 2,000$. He has beon in business 15 or 20 sears, but of late has run behind.
Mank C. Wmont, Toronto, agent of the Holmes Electrie Protection Company, of Montreal, is wanted on a charso of forging the initials of the company's Montreal manager to a draft for $\$ 200.50$, which he presented at the Bank of Montreal and caslied. A warrant was issued for his arrest.

- THE TREATY WITH SPAIN.

The ratification and formal proclamation of tho commercial tragty between Great Britain and Spain, and the consequent. placing of the Dominion, as a British colony, on the footing of the most favored nations, so far as Spain and all Spanish
possessions are concerned, will undoubtedly largely benefit Canadian fishing interests, even should it have no stimulating effect on other articles of export. Throughout the maritime provinces, and especially in Newfoundland, the progress of this treaty and the harmonizing of its various stipulations have been eagerly watched by the mercantile community, and its final ratification will be hailed with satisfaction. In fact, the Newfoundland Chamber of Commerce has attached so much importance to this mutual agreement, that it looks upon the successful negotiation of the treaty as the one bright spot in the other-wise murky horizon of the export trade of that island, and appears satisfied that it will onable the large fish dealing houses to once more secure a fair share of the exports of cured fish to Mediterranean ports.
To the Lower Province fishermen, handicapped up to the present time, so far as Spanish ports were concerned, by a heary if not altogether prohibitive duty, in his competition with his more favored rivals In Trance and Norway, this measure will aflord a welcome relief that will enable him to stand once more upon the same footing as his competitors, and may very probably assist him to undersell them in their own markets. Thanks to the vigorous stand taken by the great supply houses, and the more careful supervision now exercised over the fishermen they control, the cure of herring will no doubt continue to improve; and the carelessness and slovenliness in curing and handling their catch, which has proved so fruitful a ground of complaint against Lahrador fishermen, will gradually disappear. Until this improvement shall have been consummated, no mere abrogation of duties caa be any avail, but with the commercial fraternity to become aware of an abuse is usually the precursor of its removal, and now that the abolition of the imposts, which have hitherto borne so heavily on our Mediterranenn trade, has been accomplished, more care will be exercised to produce an article that will commend itsolf to that large and steady market.

Whether the removal of the discriminatory dutics, and the fact that all productions of this country can enter Spanish ports in the West Indies under the same conditions us if the vessels bore the Spanish flag, will have the effect of stimulating other exports to the Antilles, remains yet to bo seen. Up to the present moment a fair export trade in fish and vegetables, and to a certain extent in grain products, has existed between this country, Cuba and Porto Rico, but whether a profitable trade in our minnufactured products between the Dominion and the Spanish West Indies is possible, is still a matter of doubt. The exceptionally favorable terms which the present treaty provides should give the
enterprising manufacturer or dealer an enormous advantage over those cummercial houses in the United States who have litherto monopolised the trade. The fact that Mr. Cleveland has issued a formal proclamation restoring the discriminating duties levied on products from Cuba and Porto Rico, which were suspended some two years ago by President Arthur, in retaliation for the heavy duties imposed on United States products in those islands, has given rise to a certain feeling of irritation against the American government, which renders the present moment particularly suitable for the entrance of Canadian goods into their markets.
It is certain that it will not be long before the experiment is tried; some of our most enterprising merchants are already preparing to take advantage of the new condition of affairs in their endeavor to discover a new market for their waref, and before long we shall be in a position to speak authoritatively as to the effect of this treaty on the general trade of the country. Like all new enterprises a certain element of doubt exists, but in view of the advantageous situation in which the Canadian exporter is placed, it will be strange if this treaty does not lead to a considerable enlargement of the trade between Canada and the Spanish West Indies.

## FIRE UNDERWRITERS IN COUNCIL.

The semi-annual meeting of the Canadian Fire Underwriters' Association, held last week, belongs to the past as much as the Crimean war or the battle of Waterloo; and this juurnal, like any other history, can only record the event and point to the results. To those who understand military manouvres it must be somewhat entertaining to listen to the criticisms of them by civilians, who describe the warlike evolutions as though they had been reared in a camp from their infancy; so, in like manner, we cannot help smiling at a rash daily contemporary or two, who rush into the arena of fire underwriting, of which they know as much as a babe unvorn does of Sanscrit or Hebrew. 'These remarks are called forth by a wise observation we noticed, stating that the Board of Underwriters had merely been discussing the question of rates, and that the meeting had nothing of public interest! Thus do we live and learn, for surely up to the present time we had supposed that the said question of rates had a good deal of interest for the public, but evidently wo have been quite mistaken.
Speaking seriously, there were three very important subjects dealt with by the $\Lambda_{s}$ sociation in their meeting just closed:First, there was the subject of schedule rating, which-albeit the same appears to be a new discovery to the contributor of
one of our contemporaries, who desires, we bolieve, to advertise some sprinklers for whom he is agent-has gradually been brought into practice for months past, and is rapidly being perfected, as regards doing justice to the merits of each individual risk of its class, and, further, is to be so adaptod as to place the stock companies in a fair position to compete with the Mutuals according to their respective methods of doing business. Secondly, we understand it has been decided, not only to do ample justice to Quebec, in return for the very efficient water service lately brought into operation in that city, but to specifically rate all the risks there, thus following the method working with so much success in the maritime provinces. We presume this is only the thin end of the wedge for the system of specific rating throughout the Association's jurisdiction, and is simply carrying out Schedule Ratings into ordinary hazards, each being judged by its construction, occupancy and exposure,-according to the recommendations repeatedly made in the early years of the Journal of Commbrob. Thirdly, the question of rating non-hayardous risks, such as dwellings, churches, and so forih, not hitherto considered amenable to tariff rating, was brought forward by the action of two companies, who maintuined that they had joined on the distinct understanding that this class of risks was to be left out of the tarifi, and that therefore they could not consent to those risks being now rated. We believe this knotty point was loft to a committee to report upon within a month or two, but we cannot help fancying that, in an association like the Canadian Fire Underwriters, formed for the general good, the decision of the majority should always rule; amb certainly it would seem to be better for all classes of risks to be rated atcording to tho combined experience of the oflices; while the plea put forth by the aforesaid companies strikes us as a rather dangerous one if maintained, since it may be used as a precedent by others in a manner which might threaten the very exjstonce of the Association.
There were, of course, many other subjects discussed-some merely formal-but the foregoing three will show that tho late meeting was hy no means de void or inlerest to the insuring public, and that while the Absociation camot lose sight of the fact that it is formed for the purpose of carrying on fire insurance on business principles, it necessarily, for that reason, is endeavoring to do every justice to insurers.

## EXTHADIIION.

The arrival of the latest Ameriom defaulter in Muntreal, and the cool ellrontory he displayed in openly taking up his quarters within a stone's throw of the institution he had swindled, has once more drawn the attention of the mercantile fra-
ternity to the extremely unsatisfactory condition of the present latw of oxtradition, and the complaint is mate that the chios business cily of the Dominion is becomiag a baven of refuge for a sleatily increasing colony of American swinders who infest the hotels, and by the ostentations parade of their ill-gotton gains tent to lowor the moral slatus of our younter commercial men, if not to tempt them by the prospeets of similar immonity from punishment to look upon petulation and emberolement in in the light of "smart trieks" instead of punishable and dishonorable arimes.
We shatl now read in the Amorican press tho usual number of sarcastic rematrks on the recont auldition to the American Colony. With that cerious habit of lowking at only their own site of the fuestion, they affect to boliove Lhat Canada feols a certain satisfation at receiving swindlers in her territory to contaminate leer yomblt, amb that tho mere fate of a defamber bringins in a cortatin amome of plamider sumbiently compensates us for the morat maisma he dissominates amongst the weak or extravagat who mark with envy the ease and impunity with which le has amased his ill-gotem weallh. To real man Amerisem paper one would helievo That it was Camala whe rofused to ratify the recently propesed amendments to the cxtradition treaty which would render such seanrity impossible, and that their own eftorts had heen directed towards the abolishment of the present anomatons condition of atlaits and to the conseguent restraint of erime.

would, in many cases, readily imitate them in their career, did opportunity ofler.

It is to the biller partisan character of the American Sonatic that we are indebted for the present condition of tho law of extradition. 'Jhey have stealily refused by their vote to receive or discoss any proposed amendments to the exsisting treaties. Thoir action in the fishery ghestion is well known, their condeavors to mge the Amorican fishermen to croato complications that would tend to embarrass the present Executive are matters of noloricty, and all their ations and speedtos have been in the direction of currying fivor with the more bigoted of their constituents by the virthlence of their attacks upon Canada. Under these circumstances to claim that Canada is responsible for the present conclitions is directly untrue ; every right thinking business man in the Dominion is opposed to the present condition of affairs, and would readily do all in his power to render the present harbor of rofuge to-criminals impossible. It now romains for the commercial commonities of the States to take the matter min and to bring such pressure to hoar upon their government that even the most fanatical and unsernpulons of pribiclans would be compelled to withdratw their oprosition, and thus put an ond to a condition of allairs which would disgrace the judicial system of the Middle Ages and which elevates a rague, who would otherwise expiate his misteds in jail, to the lovel of an oxile and a matryr.

## THE HEAMIH DEPARTMENI.

Whe first ammal report issued by the Ilealla Department marks a distinet epech in the sanitary history of Montreal, that records the initiation of the most radieal and, it is to be hopen, durable reforms ever chronieded in tho heath ree reds of any city. Allomogh tho reforms indiated may he ansiderel as merely the preliminary steps taken, previons to the formation of the new organization whith we trush will hansform Canada's commerciel metropolis into one of the heathiest edies on this contiment, yot the ambunt of work already aceomplished and the onligitenment and progressive spirit disphayed will bring confidenco to the merematilo community that any recurrence of our previous dark experience is entirely out of the question.
There can bo no donbt that the present. Healih Department far transcends in both powor and efticiency any previous hody of tho kind. Armed with improved logislative athority and with ample provision for the enforcoment of the Vaccination Aet, and above all having the moral influence and approval of tho whole comatry at their bate, they oceupy a position that no previons department has enjoyed and conse-
quently can effectually prevent the recurrence of any future outbreak of a comparatively preventable disease.

But, it must be remermbered, there are many other contagious disenses whose spreal can only be avoided by the thorough reform of domestic sanitary arrangements, and which rerpuire the most painstaking eo-operation on the part of the general publicijf ithe pflorts of the oflicials are to be cromned with success, and it therefore depends on theaction of the great bulk of our cilizens whetlier Montreal shall take her proper place as one of the healthjest towns in the Dominion or whether she shall still occupy her present unonviable position at the head of the moriality statistics so far as the death rate is concerned.
The incincration of refuse, the increased care displayed in the system of food inspection, the largely improved sanitary police, and the more eflicient aystom of prosecution of ollences against the healih laws, are all important factors in the elevation of the sanitary condition of the city, but it is to the care and co-operation of the citzens themselves that we must look for permanent and radical improvement. The question of the healh of the city lies largely in their lands and it is the necessity of obtaining not only thoir sympalliy bate their cortial support and practieal co-operation, that forms one of the most diflicalt and dishearlening foahures of hyrienic roform.
If the citizens of Moitreal will give their help, as (with the exceplion of a few whom distorted seruples of a moral or roligions rature may loul to rofuse) we think they will, the no st yours report of the Heallik hepartment will bo as encomaging in its dhamater as the present, and will record finly as many improvemonts. Nontreal is now the leading city of the Dominion in many wass and should take tho same position in sunitary reforms, and if the next year shows as much improvement in this direction as the present, il will not bo tong hetore sho will.

## OCTOBER STYITSS.

Owing to our geographical position, Canada call havdly be said to have a fall season so far as fashiomable styles are concernecl. The change from summer to winter, is, comparatively speaking, so immediato, that no special gaments are necessary for the fall, as is the caso in other climates. No sobner does the weather become too coll for the light fabries of summer that it becomes cold onough to wear furs with propricty, and consequently all our somethed fall styles are equally appropriato for winter wear.
Brown and may-hlue appear to be the colors to be worn this season, and all recent importations, no mattor what tho
description of goods, appear to rule in the varying shades of these two colors. Still it is noticeable that the newest of these so-called browns approximate closely to the dirker reds, and'two of them, rosewood and malberyy, seem to partake as much of the characteristics of one as of the other. Etruscan and mahogany are two other redbrowns that will be much worn, and the usual demand exists for dark-reds and gamets in all shades. In blues, those laving grey and green tints, such as salammbo, serpento and canard, are the favorites. Although of the same class, they are entirely distinct from the peacock blues and cadet blues of last year, but, though pretty and novel, they do not suit all complexions. Pale tints for indoor wear are principally suedes, beige, salmon. corn color and rose, while, for those who prefer green shades, chartreuse, pistachio and moss and myrtle greens are most asked for. The new olives are all far more greonish in their shades than those of last season, and the brownish and yellowish olives previonsly shown do not appear in new goods.
But few new sample dresses are shown, and these seom to be all combinations of woollon stufls with velvet, plain or striped, allhough some have combinations of two dilferent makes of the woollen material. The general effect of the make-up is the same as hitherto, and it is only in the smaller and less important details that any novelty in the cut can be noticod. The bisque is slightly shorter and the postillion a little narrower. The new sleeves are fuller above the ellow, and a litte tighter below, but not so much as to give a bagey appourance. The skirts are either plain or mule in phaits, and are decidedly fuller and mure ample, and the draperies are longer and less looped, the prevailing style being to have them massed in deep plats at the hack and so arranged as to fall in straight lines over the tomrnare.

A modification of the patel is also visible and is ovidently intended to take its phaco. This is tone by making long revers, usually richly braided or embroidered on each side of the back drapery so as to give the effect of a panel. No new front draperies have as yet been shown, and the latest dresses exhibt only modifications of existing styles. The effect of the popularity of the tailor mado gown is evident in all the new cloth suits, and all the designs shown bave the tailor cut look which is now so fashionable.
.. These so-called tailor mado gowns, of - which not one in a dozen is really made by a tailor, are now more worn than ever, in spite of the exactitude of fit they require and the consequent trouble in making them. The draperies on some new styles were arranged long, back and front, leaving "both sides of the skirt visible, the front
drapery caught up in deep plaits, and that over the tournure plaited to the belt, carried well to the back, and drawn into as narrow a space as possible. In fact, a narrow, bounfant, straight drapery at the back is a feature in all new styles, and appears equally in all classes of materials; and when the shorter basque, more ample skirt and fullor sleove is taken into consideration, it shows that the wheel of fishion is revolving slowly back to the styles which were in voguc some years ago.

## THE SARNIA TUNNEL.

That the Grand Trunk is by no means belind its formidable rival in commercial enterprise has already been abundantly munifest. The new project for connecting Ontario and the United States by a timel under the St. Clair river, which at present forms the boundary between the two countries, and thus avoiding the dolay necessitated by the transfer of all cars by means of luge ferrice, is rapidly assuming a tangible form. Several years ago a smull trial tunnel was run under the river at this point, und over $\$ 100,099$ was spent in the experiment, but so much earth and quicksand was encountered that the project was definitely abandoned as too costly Interost is againaroused by the amomecement that gentlemen indirectly comnected with the Grand Trunk railroad company have organized for the purpose of at once pulting a tunuel nuder the St. Clair river at l'orl IturonTwo companies have been organzed, with a capital of $\$ 1,000,000$ each, one on this side and the other in Ontario, and these will be combined into a joiut orgamization next month. Work on the proposed tunnel, it is: now stated, will begin at once therenfler. It will cross under the river direct from l'ort Iluron to Sarnia, and will be one mile in length, of which 2,300 feet will be under the river, 1,160 feet under the gromad in Cunada; and 1,800 foed under grownd on the American side. The cost of the tumel and appromelies is cstimated at $\$ 1,500,000$. It is a curious feature lant although a Graml Truak enterprise, and part of its settled policy, that company has not one dollar invested in the enterprise, nor does a single corporator of the two tunnel companies own a share in tho stock of the Grand Trunk raidway company of Camada. The juterests of the tumnel and the railroad companies will, however, be illentical, and the enterprise, its proprictors believe, will be economical and profitable to both. The tunnel will be of brick, circular in shape, with walls thirty inches in thickness, and will have only one track. If the business warrants the use of a double track another tunnel will be constructed as a careful estimate of the cost of a double track by the engineers, alows that it is more economical to luild two singletrack tunnels than one double-track tunnel. It is given out that Mr. Joseph Hickson will
be president of the cousolidated company, Mr. Joseph Hobson chief engineer and Mr. Robert White trensurer.

The Equirame levis ano Mr. Game-R. W. Gate, whon has been for the past eighteen years populaty identified with thic Lquitable Lifo Assurance Suciety, in this city, is now engaged in litigation with the company, who. are cudeavoring to replace him in this agency by a more popular, if not moro eficient, gentleman, Mr. Stearns, who, in his capacity as American consul in Montrenl, has made hosts of friends among ns. It lins loug been felt that the contract under which Mr. Galo held his positign was far too costly to the policy-Lolders as well as to the Society, that too large a proportion of the profits was claimed by that gentieman, and now that they seo a clance of replacing him by Mr. Sargeant P. Stearne at a lower cost, they maturally endeavor to take ndivantage of it. Mr. Gale is resisting stabbonmy, on the adviee of counsel, alleging that he is a contractor and not a saluried officer, and consequently camnot be removed before the term of liis contract expires, in 1889, while the company allege that he is simply their manager and can be removed at any time. According to the statemonts of Mr. Gnle's counsel, he is willing to to surrender his position, upon pryment of his interest in the re-insuratees, amomating to over $\$ 150,000$, and it is mederstuod that the company acknowledge indebledness to tho extent of $\$ 102,000$. A further compiliation in the cuses arises from the fiet that four or five years ago the Equitable instracted Mr. Gale to advertise that they would make a deposit in Camada to the full extent of the policies issued here. This, according to Mr. Gale, they have not done, and us it is chamed that all business done since was done on the strength of this amomeement, one of the policy- H tulders has taken out a mide for $\$ 85,000$ to compel the company to deposit this amoment bere for the security of their polieies. On tho other hima, special telegrams from Othawn state that, as the linaility of the Equitable to its policy-holders in Canada on the 18 st dan, 1886, on account of policies issuted since 31st -March, 1878, was $\$ 471,000$, to secure which - the Dominion Govermment hetal from the compuny, United States londer, $\$ 205,000$, and Caundian Municipal deventures, $\$ 292,000$, a total of $\$ 556,000$, even at the discomit on Candian recurities demanded by law, the company las still a surphus of $\$ 50,000$ deposited over the sum required by the Act. Both cases are set down for immediato hearing, and will probably bo settled one way or another within a short time. 'the Equitable has bad a new and separate manngement in Ontario for the last two or three yems, and this was generally supposed to be the thin end of the wedge in Mr. Gale's position. The company las not accomplished as much in Canada lately as they were cutitled to by their standing.

While enorgetic managers of other large Americoun companien wero making gigantic strides in new business, the Equitable, the Union Mutual of Porthanl, mind the United Stutes Life have been seceping on it the dear old ways, and hiding their light muler a bushel or a broudbrimmed hat.

Fatrens from Firrope effectunily dissipate the opinion that the advance in dress goods abrum will not be maintuinced. The leading foreige manufacturers have alremdy disposed of their entire output up to the midelle of Aprit nest, and at rates indicating an ndvance of from 20 to 60 per cent. over the rates obtainable lusi year. Gashmores both black and eolored have adranced 25 to 30 per cent. Merinus 25 per cenl. Debuiges 30 per cent. Wool lwills and diagonale 25 to 30 per cent. Ilensictat cloths and olher silk and wool fabries 30 per eent., while every deseription of dresh fatric made from soft Australian wool is from 25 to 30 per cent. higher. Stocks of dress gould are sold up very clean in foreign markets, and foreign manafacturers who lave taken large ovders for future delivery will take no more ab present. The immediate canse of higher prices is the increased cosh of anw wools, but there is also a much incrensed demand for these goods, which will be the mont important facter in mantaining the advance.

Abvess from Chicago state that the managers of the north-western lines to-day agred Lo form a pool en emst-bound traflic, covering all hasiness excegh wheat and its products. The pool is to be for one year, with nincty days notice of withalrawal after Oot. 15, 1887, and groes into elfect at once. The exemption of whent amb its prodncts takes out of the pool 80 per cent. of the through businesk, and leaves the romeds freato fight over the transporfation of that momant. As all of the troubles and disputes hatve heen over his chass of truder the ngreement resulves itselfinto a compromiso whereby cates aro kegh up on merehandise und live stock, white the bulk of the trathe will be open for free compeliton. As the pretent through rate on flour is 72 cents when destined for eastern points, there is not mach margin for the lines to fight over.
'The: Baxquet Rerobt-To our insmance friende al least, whom we have not been over ullentive lo for some weeks past, wo need ofter no apology for the lengthy report ulseWhere of the hamguet recently given at the Windsor in this city to the Joronto Board of Firo Underwriters by their bredhren in Mont. real, as a lithing close to the luehnical disenssions of the semi-tumbul partianemt held dimring the preceding days of the week. 'lo insumate men at a distume the report will furbikis some iden of the hamony which prevaile among the mangers of the respective compmies, as confrasted with the too strong competitive feeling of former years. It must not bu infered from this tha there does not yoh exish a sublicient degree of rivalry anong
the members to ensure carnest work: they follow the advice of the old Oxford pro-fensor-" Strive mightily, gentlemen, but eat aud drink as frionds"

Scienolh Ratina,-The editor of our egteemed contemporary, the Slar, must surely be abrond. We cannot concelve him to be so unacquainted with what is going on under his very nose, as to be the perpetrator of the arlicle on insurance matters which appeared in the Star of Saturday last. Surely the editor is aware that schedule rating has been praclised since May last by the Canadian and other insurance companies doing business in Canalla. The Slar naively recommends the Underwriters' Asbocintion to follow the cxample of the Americans by schedule rating, which went into operstion over the border on the 15th of the present month-nearly six months after its adoption in Cauada! But, whero is that man with the sprinklermachines?

IT is reported that the sharcholders of the Inman Steanship Compnny, at a mecting at liverpool on the 18 th ult., resolved to wind up the aflitirs of the compmay, and that Messers. Peter Wright is Sons, of Philadelphia, linve purchased the business for $£ 250,000$. This is for the good will of the company and its business only, and does not includo any consideration for tho ships of the line. The mankers of the line affirm that no final decision will bo arrived at by the shareholders until the result of the negotiations with Wright \& Sons is known.

Mr. J. D. Ronalid, of Brusecis, Ont., is in town, pressing the merith of his fire engines upon the notice of the city fathers. There are one or two points about these home-made Camadian engines that render them specially suitable to our climate; the most important of which is that the water is leopt from freezing in them by being placet near and around the boiler. By a change in the diameter of fore wheels they can be made, to turn in as narrow a suace as other engines. See the illustrotions on amother page.

Min. Jemmit, of London, Ingland, assistantsecretary of the Northern Insurance Company, is awaiting the arrival of the home manager in order to confer wilh him as to the uature of any possible clunges in the organization of the company in Canada. Mr, Lermit was the ghest of Mr. Taylor, the Canadian general ngent, at the recent bnaquet of the Undervriters' Association: Several insurance men, among them two or three managers of recognized nuility, are applicants for the managemont, in which there is a possibility of some chainge being effected.

Mr, Gusss, of the Niagara District Mutun, long since defunct, is still sojourning in Montreal legally pressing for payment of the promium notes given by policy holdors in
this Province in the olden time of 1875-80 and thereabouts. Mr. Giles has stuck to it manfully for several years, although he has sometimes been scarcely able to collect enough to keep his own body and soul together. Ho hopes in the course of time to save enough from the wreck to pay something on the dollar to the creditors.

IT is to be hoped that the two excellent companies from Waterloo west will not persist in the purpose expressed by their representatives at the recent insurance parliament in this city, of pursuing a way of their own as regards the rate on private dwellings. Should this departure be agreed to, it would simply open the door to special exceptions of various kinds, to the evident undoing ultimately of all the good that the Associntion has hitherto accoimplished.

This London Lumber-Trades Journal says: "Lhe volume of trade done now, we believe, is on a much sounder basis than it has been for a long time, and there is some consolation in the knowledge that, if less is doing than last year, the prospect of the market recovering itself is more hopeful."
A. D. U., of Wablacetome, Ont, says:"I herewith enclose my annual subscription for your valunble paper, which I still appre. cinte very highly. It is a valuable absistant to traders and merchants and those who do not subscribe and get the paper, I would recommend at onee to begin."

THE UNDERWRITERS' BANQUET.
The banquets which constitute so agreenble a feature of the periodical meetings of the Fire Underwriters' Association of Canada, alternately in Toronto and Montreal, would seem in every instance to outrival all their predecessors in brillinncy and enjoyment, the hosts in ench case being evidently determined not to be outdore in the endeavor to furnish a plensing alternative to the discussions of tha highly interesting and practical Agenda chosen for treatment at the meetings of the week-subjects, the greater number of which would be pronounced by the public simply dreary. To many people insurance is perhaps the most dismal of the sciences, and no one will wouder that many of the mostable and carnest of the fraternity are not averse to the semi-amnual relaxation at which, for an evening, the chief representatives of insurance in 'loronto and Montreal alteruately become hosts and guests, and practically express their recognition of the great truth that lies in the simple proverb-"All work and no play makes Jack a dull boy," or the more stately one about the bow unbent. There is no department of trade and commerce more dreary in one sense than that of fire insurance. The chief function of an insurance company, as a witty judge once remarked, is to pay losses; nad there is no more reliable index of dullnoss in trade than the fluctuations in the ratio of losses to premiums received by insurance companies. Especinlly is this the case in a country like Caunda, where a very large proportion of insurable property is built of wood, and where the moral bazard finds consequantly such fucility of expression,-a state of things which, however, can only prove transitory as the country advances from the wooden to the stone are in the construction of its warehouses and dwellings. But our object here is not to write an apology for no speceh of oure at the festive board on the evening of the 14 th inst., but to afford as briefly as possible somo idea of the proceedings on that occasion.

The president of the Montreal division, the brilliant and acholarly manager of the Liverpool \& London \& Globe, Mr. G. F. C. Smith, presided at the banquet. On his left sat Mr. Fitagerald, Dominion Superintendent of Insurance, and on his right Mr. Lermet, of Londom, Eng., assistant secretary of the Northern, next to whom sat tho Canadian manager, Mr. James Taylor ("Taylor of the Northern" as he is known throughout the length and breadth of the Dominion), to whose keeping has been eutrusted a goodly share of the brains of the profession. At the long table to the right sat Mr. Gooch, Toronto agent of the North British, beside his chief, the courtly, elever and always-ready Thomas Davidson. At the hend of this table presided Mr. Tatiey, of the Royal (vice-president), with $H$. J. Nouge, of the Queen, W. H. Mintoul nad his facetious Toronto agent, Alf. Smith; Mr. Fred. Cole, of the Commercial Union, with his representative in Toronto, Mr. W. Evans, and R. W. Tyre, of the Phoenix. On the inner side of the quadrangle sat Mr. L.'II. Boult, of the National \& Athas, to whose management the success of the banquet was largely. due,
and beside him Mcessrs. E. D. Lacy, of the Imperina; Steward Brown; mannger of tho Glasgow and Londan; M. S. Foley, of the Jodrnal of Comareroe and Insuranoe Review; 1. MeLean, secretary of the Toronto brapely of the Association; J. W. Molson, Norwich Union ; A. Hadrill, secretary in Montrenl, and R. W. Smith, of Insnrance Society. At the table to the left presided Mr. §. C. DuncanClark, of the Laucashire in Toronto (vicepresident), with the following gentlemen at his right : Gerald E. Hurt, of the Citizens; Jeremiah B. Hughes, Waterloo Mutual; Jns. Lockic, Mercantile; E. P. Heaton, Tire Insurance Association; C. C. Foster, Loudon Assurance; H. Holden, British America. The others prosent were Messers. Pearson, of the Northern in Toronto; T. R. Wood, of the Jotan; R. Evans, of the latter company in Montreal; Geo. J. Pyke, of the Quebec; W. Henderson, of the Hartford (President Toronto Board, who courteously yielded his place beside President Smith to the Superintendent of Insurance); W. A. Sims, London \& Lancashire; W. Rowland, City of Loudon; Mr. E. Lilly, of the Guardian and Mfr. Routh of the Western.

Mr. Kenny, of the Western, was recalled by telegram to Toronto, and Mr. Burt, of the Connecticut, to Hartford. Nessrs. Walter Kavanagh, of the Scottish Union, and Geo. FI. McHenry, of the Royal Cunadian, were also unavoidably absent from the dinner.

That the menu was all that could be desired goos without saying when prepared by the best hotel on the continent, whish the Windsor is universally acknowledged to be, while the wines and cigars were of the choicest. An orchestra discoursed sweet music at intervals during the evening. After fully an hour and a half spent in discussing the various and well-eerved viauds.
The president, in $\mathrm{B}_{s}$ few words, proposed the usual loyal und patriotic toasts. He snid there appeared to be a wrong impression abroad as to the object of these meetings. Insurance men were not talkers but performers; we find that our neighbor usually knows more about our lusiness than we do ourselves. He would request Mr. Davidson to lead off in singing the Nutional Anthem. This was followed by Rule Britannia and other patriotic songs, rendered with much spirit, all present joining in the refrain. The next toast-" The prosperity of the Tusurance interests of the Dominion"-was responded to by Mr. Catley, of the Royal. He expressed his inability to do justice to the subject of the tonst as ably as the worthy proposer, although it was to them all a labor of love-for what is its object but the prosperity of the companies committed to their charge? It has been difficult to make profits for some years past, owing to increasing expenses, unfair competition from mutual and other companies, and it was a problem in his mind, in view of these facts, how we can make business prosperous in the future.

Mr. S. C. Duncan-Clark, in responding to the toast-" The permanence and success of the Fire Underwriters' association of Canada" -referred to the princely hospitality with which thoy had been received in Montreal. Mr. Henderson, of Toranto, recalled the condition of insurance in his younger days, before the nge of Pullman cars, and referred to the great progress made during the last twenty years.

Mr. Jeremiah B. Hughes, of Waterloo, being called upon, said he would prefer waiting until later in the evening. $[A$ voice-" Better notl"]. Indeed he would prefer remaining silent. He found frequent occasion for repenting of a few remarks he madeat one of the Toronto mectings on the sulject of schedule
rating. He might truly say lo lnew something of the "Lamentations of Jeremian." Mony of his friends cordially endorsed his ries's and encouraged him to go on and rake the companies on this head. The troublesome importance of his few hitile remarks on that occasion was brought home to him in various ways. Trom Wond kindly made him a present of a beautiful pup hecatuse of them, but the pup soon developed into a big Newfoundland dog, who loved him : not wisely but too well." They led also to serious discussions as to who should ocenpy with himself as S. R. A. (Schedne Rater for the Association) the foreground in the picture about to be made for them, whether Benderson ind Magurn, or Tom tood and Alf. Smilh. (Laughter and applause.)

Mr. Alf. Smith being called upon to explain, the president satid that as a member of the respectable family of Smith, it was imperntive that he should do so. Alf. smith -Whose characteristic manner is so well apppreointed by all who know him, and of which the printed words afford but a faint iden,Eaid he could make it clear in five minntes, but he thought it was yet twenty minutes too soon for him. It seemed to him that they were ringing in too many tonsts on one drink. It may be the Scotch practice to have fumr toasts to one drink, bit the proportion was too great. It may be on the bill of fire, but he did not understand French. 'I'here was another jtem on the bill (Sherbet), every glass of which Mr. Rinioul told him contains a glass of whiskey, aud yet he saw his friend Mr. McLean, a thorough-going Scott-Act man, shovelling it down as if he'd like some more. As for the other items of the bill we have shown our appreciation of them. He (Mr. Smith) said to his wife when leaving for Montreal that she could now put the house on Lenten fare for a while, for he would be sure to lay in a good supply while down there. As for the drinkables they were all his fancy painted them. He saw about him many dear friends from Toronto who conld not "indulge." He appreciated their self-denial; he did not know which was the best plam, but it seemed to him that the man who drank whiskey could get up more fun. His friend from Waterloo, Mr. Mughes, brought four botiles with him, to accompany the Waterloo deputation. I. wanted to observe the scenery along the way. You know Tom Wood is not temperance from conviction, but from an economical point of view. (Laughter.) A friend of his said: "I hope I'om Wood won't drink, because we haven't any too much for ourselves." When we got to Peterboro' we had only one bottle left, but a Scott-Act man got on there with a supply of rye. Wo then got up a warm discussion as to whether white or rye whiskey was the best; we lmd to go to the other and of the car to get the water; I tasted the different kinds as often as they did, and there is no clase of men who can do better justice to a bottle of whiskey on a C. P. I. train, whatever his position with his company; it does not matter whether ho be secretary, manager or anything else. I have been brought into contact with many different problems, but the most diflicuit thing I ever had to decide was the respective merits of those two kinds of provision. (Lond laughter.). Mr. Ihomas Davidsom, being called upon for a few remarke, said he shomble he sorry to think there was nuy disposition to madearale:
 thombit, however, the pilblie shemate apprecinte: then loakreater extent Han they do. We represend eompmise, with many times more capital than all the lmuke pat together, and ehartered to do hesiuess, withond the nid of which the sommaneree of the comntry teonld mot exist for asingle dity. Nal eren the hanke could lives a day wilhont Hom. We neect to dise oss the best melhads of promoting the commortial interesits of the combity. There is a popmiar iflea that insurmae compmies are established for the purpose of paying duvidends to the shatelablars, hat we all know that dividends form labia very small jwomortion of the payments. I and eatled umom to propese the heallis of "One Guests." We have here tonithle a very good representative of one of the companies of the lese, standing in linghand. I regred that the home repmesentative of the doyal is not hare, and Mr. Bhrt, of the Connectiont, is not here. We like to have the home representatives of the companies among us on these oecesions, $A *$ the representative of an bonglish or mather of a Beoleh company, $I$ buy this, that we wish more of these gonticmen would come out and visit tus. As for 'Toronto-have we not always been royally trented there. (Apphatse) I regred that the manger of the Western is not here, that he has heen called away this ovening. 'loronto is ulways dear to our hearts; the loronto members have worlsed heart and hand to promote the interests of the Association. It was in 'I oromfo that the Association origimated, num there they are to tell the good fate of whint is lowing done for the insumace interests of Canala. (Applanse) We are ghad to see at. these meetingri people representing all the tempmies doing lusiness in the comitry. 'Foronto has had her share of entertaining most royally, and new that we have our innings, we can only embeavor to reciprocate wilh the same good will and wishes towats them sill. Wo have mueh to learn from 'roronto; perhmp we can teach them; fomething also. The limd much pleasure in proposing the toust of " (Gur Ginesis." (Aphmate.)

Mr. dames Taylor heing called apon to supplement a fow remarlis to the tomst, said: I cati only express the hearliness with which, persomalty, i sympathize with this tomsi, It buens that we extend tho cording hand of welcome to our guests here to-might. Among them wo have a gentlemun from London connocted wilh the Northern; we have Mr. litiogernht, Superintemdent of husurance; wo have our ghests from I'oronto; it requires only Mr. lime of the Cominecticut to have representadives of all tha finsumace interests of the combtry-from Lingland, the United Staies, the Government of Ganadn-and finally we firvo our kinad friunds and supporters of tho pross-lhas constiluting tho whold of the insurance interests of Gumada. We hear mach of federationi, bat it is rarely that wo find such a' unity of commereinl interests as wo havo here to-night. $i$ is for the press, there is a bmanel of it in Gmmala which acenses us of locing und sided in our views; lont thm portion of the pross represented here this even-
ing lats alwayo effen us the kindest and heartiest support, and I would include them in this toast. The necidental use of the word "Ferderation" to-night has ruggested the application of it to the present mecting, which is a federalion of insurance representalives for seconring jusily and impartially the permanence and prosperity of the commercial interests of this conntry. As Mo. Davidson lans shid, all and every olher one of the interests of Canada are dependent upon this one-no other is equal to it in importance-il is entirely and alone over every olher department of linsiness-higher than any other interest exisiong in Cammar ab hais moment. If we minte it is for the gencmi benefit, and wo are not confederates as enemies to the public, but as friente; we wnol to place-the oligects of the Ansociation is to place-the interests of Chanda mpon a more secure footing, and to depend upon combined intelligence for carrying out that thasimess. As far is I ton see the Assoctation is passing limough a pertiod of groner usefulness; the promises of the greset. L we favorable rand indicative of hamony and sympathy, whatever diflerences of opinion may urise, imbleative of a desire on the part of every member to millere to the Association. I have been a faithfol friend of the Association from the berinning, and no one has taken a mowe lively interest in it than myself; I shond be sony therefore for any evidence of unplemsatness in the Association. We have friends rendy to express their opinions, but they have this right; when thus expressed, they are robbed together, and they are all the better for the rubbing. The goed work of the Association is growing among us, and when Hacse meetings also are finished we slanll get on butter that before for the general good. The toust is that of "Our Gucbts," and as representing Montren, we must express our thunks to the gentlemen who have so kindly supported the interests of the Associntion, for the benefit of the fire insurance interests of the country, and I am sure we will continue to get the support of our friends from England, Toronto, the Press and the Govermenent of Canada. (Checrs.)

Mr: Hurt, of the Citizens, responded to the call upon him by a few appropriate remaks. The disenssions of the Associntion were productive of much bencfit. The period of disaster to the fire insurance interests was passing away, owing to the better malerstanding prevailing among the companics. The Association had bronght aboul many improvementa, and business is now placed apon a more protitable basis. Ihe outside press or thu sucular (G. F. C Smith-" Ours is the religious press l") has not fivored us; but the insurance press duserves our thanks. If the Govermment would yield us thie protection gramed to other interests we should be all right. He was glud to see Mr. Fitzgerald mong them ter-night, and hoped he wonld nttend every meeting of the Association. He referred to the progress of Toronto; he never saw handsomer or better dressed slopp windows than those along King street in that cily.

Mr. Rintoul-Ti is evident you're notamarried man. (Langhter.)

The Chairman-I had hoped from the significant signs of netive thinking on the brows of Mr. Fitagerald that we should hear something from him, but he has just received a telegram from-his wife which necessitates his immediate departare.

The toust being duly completed, the chairmun called upon Mr. Hermit, secretary of the Norharn. Mr. Lemit said that any feeling of strangeness he may lave experiened was entirely removed by the leartiness of the reception which they gave him. "They have
no such pleasant mectings in Fighand as you have here." His youthfil appenrnnce seemed to strike people in this comntry, who had evidently expected to find him pompons and grey-haired. He thanked them most cordially for the handsome manner in which they lad propored his health.

Mr: Ihomas R. Wood was here called to his feel. Mr. Wood, as an old Montreal man, referred with pride to the great growth of his mative eity, its importomi situation-in the middle of a continent mod yet a senport; the conters and politeness of its citizens, thrmgh the influence of the Firenih popmation, of which they lave nove in the west. Insumance men have nehieved great things of late yearsI'wenty yens ago they were all afmid of ench other in Toronto. We used to kiek up rows and send down for the wise men of the batst to come up and settle them. You are a ereat people in Montrent, you have done-grant things, but we cm throw more energy into hasiness for yon. Your hospitatily is great. Ali. Smith was telling me (o-dity that this is hetter than the old duys in Troronto, when a hit of bimburger cheese and a glase of beer ware considered quite a treat for minsurance mum, when the hankers nsed to book down on us-it was a big change from the dimburger ind the beer. Mr. Wood concluded ly thansing their Montreal friends for the liandsome manner in which they had been enterfained. Mr. Lacy, of the Imperial, said that in the absence of their Amorican friands, and as the only native of the United States present-(the President - "Did you vote to-day ?") - he would offer a few remarks. He was quite sure that everyone present to-night was lieart and soul with the Association, and would stand by it. Ile decply regretted the derarture, that evening, of their friends from the United States. He could recall only one other instanco in which the Americans man away, and that was ai Bunker Hill, where both sides ran. One side only rin away from the hanquat here to night; he was sorry for it, because they would have benefitted by it. Mr. Intley had referred to the cutting of our businesi in Camada by Mutmals from neross the line, but they are nlso cutting on legilimate business in the United States. We should not be discouraged by such competition. He loped that the Americm representatives would be welcomed as henrtily as any representative of English, Scotch or Canatian insurance interests. The insurance interests were the greatest in the country ; we represent from 150 to 200 million dollars of capital here to-niglit.- (Applause).

Mr, Lockic, of Waterloo, being called upon, said he hatd a difficult duty to perform this evening. I'hree gentlemen sitting beside him neither drink nor smoke, and he had to do business for them all. (Laughter.) As representative of the youngest company of the Association he felt highly complimented by the earnest and cordin! and overpowering manner in which his nume had been mentioned, rendering it impossible for lim to maku in suitable response at the present time.

The president admired the courage with which Mr. Lockie buarded the lion in his den. He again referred to the representatives of the Press present, who have shown themselves our friends, the wamest fricnds of the interests we represent.
Mr. Foley, of the Joursal, of Comarmer, being loudly called upon to respond, said that he was no speaker,-hhis eloquence was of the kind that oozes out at the fingers' ends-like Bob Acres' courage. He thanked them for their kind references to the efforls of the "religious" press as distinct from the " secular," as the worthy prosident had named it, and hoped the press would always prove
faithrit in the performane of its duties-in the fulfilment of its mission-ly seconding the eforts of the Underwiters' Association in promoting the edvancement of the insarance interests of Camadn. He had heside him an old experienced joimrualist, Mr. MeLem, who would to more justite to the subject.

Mr. Smith, of "the "Insurance Society," being culted upon, said the insurance profegsion wats the noblest in the wortd. Ihe referred to the amombt of gome performed by the companices in the payment of losese-in the relief broment to memy doors throngh


Mr. Tadley being called on for a somg gave "Simon the dellaver" in a good romad beritone; he was followed by Mr. Sims in an excellent tenor. Boll were encored.

President (a. F. (i. Smith here satid be had lost track of the "Agendi,". The insumance men, by the way, were supposed to have invented dat word. Ife inad heen aked the moaning of it by a friem, he looked for it in the diettomary, becense he did not linow hime-self-(laughter)-ind there, sure enongh, he found it. It had not been coived hy the insurance men after all. Str. Sinifh, who hat recently returned from a trais-athantic tome, here gave a hemorous atecount of a deip he took up the classical Isis in a steamboat which kept up a frequent striking upou the bottom in its progress, and he wondered how the "Eights" had managed to get along without bumping each other. While at one of the muscums in Jengland he was shown an ancient cabinet which contained the figure of a man who, it was said, lived in a state of single blesseduess and yel was fither to the fatherless, the friend of the widows and the orphans, and who died in the year 1400 and something, in a single state, regretted by people from fir and near. "Plus brings us to the toast of 'the Ladies,' and I beg to call upon the ludies' man, Mr. Bonlt."

Mr. Boult being loudly called for, cxpressed his surprise at a married man being asked to propose this toust wheir so many bachelors were present. There had been much tatk about insuranee, but he was now expected to be a proficient in assurance also. Mr. Rintoul, as a bachelor, excused himself for not responding at length to the toist. There were many about him who knew'more about the sulject than he. He could only say in a general way-" Bless them all round."

Mr. Healon thought it unfair to be callid upon at: so late :an hour after all the good things had heta said. His knowledge of the sulject as an insumme man wedt to show

The tonst of "the usefulness of the Secretaries" of the Association brought an eloquent response from Mr. MeLem, of Toronto, who amoms other things bore high testimony to the orderly manner in whith the election had been curried on that day in Montrenh. It was was all owing to the absence of that "cup [pointing to the wine on the table] which cheers lout not inebrintes!"- This, the secomd fimons lutl of the evening, was recivel with loud haughter. Alf. Sinith attributed it to the influence of " that sherbet."

Provisioss.-There has been a quict trade during the week, with no materinl change in quotations. Lhums continue scarce and prices steady at 13c @ 14c. Lard sells at 9 fe to loc. Mess Porle sells at $\$ 13.50$ for 5 to 10 barrel lots. Mogs steady at $\$ 5.75$ (a) $\$ 6.25$ on the strect. Potatoes in fair demand, with sales of car lots at 50 c a bag.
Woor.-There is very little flecee offering, but the market is firm in sympathy with outside markets. Dealers pay 190 to 22 c for fleece, the latter for solections, and 24 c to 25 c for southdown. There is a moderste demand from the factories; supers aro quoted at 23 c and extrus at 26 c to 28 c .
