

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# CONSTITUTION OF THE SOCIETY.

The Society shall be called the Diocesan Church Society of NEW BRUNSWICK. 

No alteration shall be made in the Constitution of this Society, nor shall any Bye-Law, Rule or Regulation of the Society be repealed, annulled or altered, except at a meeting of the General Committee, by the vote of at least two-thirds of the members present, nor until it shall have received the sanction of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, which sanction must be given in writing, and delivered to the Secretary, within six months of the said Meeting.

No alteration or amendment in the Constitution, nor any repeal, cancellation, alteration or amendment of any Bye-Law, Rule, or Regulation of the Society, shall be proposed or made at any Meeting, unless notice shall have been given in writing at the next previous Anniversary Meeting of such proposed repeal or cancellation, nor unless the terms of such proposed alteration or amendment shall have been stated in writing at such previous Meeting; from which, without the unanimous consent of the members present, no deviation, except of a mere formal nature, shall be permitted.

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No repeal, cancellation, alteration, or amendment, shall be proposed, except by a member qualified to vote at the Anniversary Meeting, whose name shall be entered on the Minutes, by the Secretary, together with the said proposition.

The payment at any one time of a sum not less than Ten Pounds, shall constitute a Life Member; and the payment annually of any sum, however small, shall constitute the person paying the same, a Member of the Society. Provided that no Member shall be qualified to vote at any General Meeting of the Society, unless of the full age of twenty-one years, nor unless he be a Life Member, or shall have subscribed and paid at least Five shillings during the year preceding such Meeting. · . det prografie to de la la decembra . - 1. The Officers of the Society shall be a President, two or more Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, one or more Secretaries, and two Auditors of Accounts.
  - 2. The Lord Bishop of the Diocese shall be the President of the

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Society, and the Archdeacon the Senior Vice-President; and any Life Member may, at any Anniversary Meeting, be elected a Vice-

President of the Society.

3. The Treasurer, Secretary, or Secretaries, and the Auditors, shall be annually elected at the Anniversary Meeting; and in case of the death, resignation, or removal from the Province, of any such Officer, the vacancy shall be filled up by the Executive Committee, at its next or any subsequent Meeting within the year; and the Lord Bishop shall, if he see fit, call a Special Meeting of the Executive Committee, for the purpose of filling any such vacancy.

#### VIL.

### (Executive Committee.)

1. There shall be also an Executive Committee, to be composed of the following Members, viz.:

The Officers of the Society as provided for in the next proceding

All Clergymen resident in the Diocese, duly licensed by the Lord

Bishop, and Subscribers to the Society.

And twenty-four Lay Members of the Society, being Life Members, or Annual Subscribers of at least One Pound; to be annually elected at the Anniversary Meeting, provided that no annual Subscriber shall be qualified to be elected, unless he shall, during the year preceding each Meeting, have paid his subscription of at least One pound.

2. Five Members of the Executive Committee, three of whom to

be Laymen, shall form a Quorum.

3. The Executive Committee shall meet either at Fredericton or Saint John, on the first Wednesday in January. on the day next following the Annual Meeting, on the first Wednesday in March, on the first Wednesday in June, and on Wednesday after the first Tuesday in October.

# VIII.

# (Objects.)

The Society shall embrace the following objects, and none other, viz.:

1. Missionary Visits to places where there is no settled Clergy-

man, and aid to new and poor Missions.

2. The establishment of Divinity Scholarships at King's College, Fredericton; and assistance, where necessary, to those who may be under preparation for the Ministry, especially Sons of Clergymen.

 Aid to Sunday and other Schools in which Church principles are taught, and the training and encouraging of Schoolmasters and

Catechists.

4. The supply of such Books and Tracts as are on the Catalogue of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and none other.

5. Aid

7. The stipends of the ch vision for

e Catalogue and none 5. Aid to the building and enlarging of Churches and Chapels.

6. Aid to the building of Parsonage Houses.

7. The creation of a fund towards the augmentation of the stipends of Clergymen who are poor; and towards the education of the children of such Clergymen; and towards the making a provision for those who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity.

8. The creation of a fund for the Widows and Orphans of the

Clergy.

IX.

The Society will employ no Clergyman on Missionary services without the Bishop's license and appointment, and will submit its choice of Divinity Scholarships to his Lordship's approbation.

x.

It shall be competent to any Member of the Society to limit his subscription to any one or more of the objects above recited, which he may be most anxious to promote.

XI.

# (Local Committee.)

consisting of two or more Parishes, shall, at the discretion of the Missionary of and Mission, constitute a Local Committee; and so also the Members residing in any District of a Parish set off under the authority of the Lord Bishop, with the concurrence of the Rector and Church Corporation of such Parish (there being in such District a Church duly consecrated, and a resident Clergyman licensed thereto, by the Lord Bishop, may, at the desire of such Clergyman, and with the approval of the Bishop and the Rector of the Parish, form, separate Local Committee; and in that case the District shall, for the purpose of the Society, be considered as a separate Parish.

2. Each Local Committee shall hold an Annual Meeting on some convenient day, previous to the Anniversary Meeting, when the recommendation to the General Committee of special objects shall

be determined on.

3. Each Local Committee shall be empowered to depute two Lay Members of the Society to be elected at the Annual Meeting of the Committee, to assist the Missionary in submitting the recommendations of the Committee to the consideration of the General Committee.

4. It shall be competent to each Committee to recommend any of the above recited objects to the special consideration of the General Committee, in the appropriation of the funds of the Society.

XII.

1. The Society shall hold its Anniversary Meeting at Fredericton and Saint John alternately, on the first Thursday in July in each year.

2. A Special General Meeting may be called at any time by the President, or in his absence, by any two or more of the Vice-Presidents, four weeks notice being first given thereof by advertisement in one or more newspapers, published in Fredericton and Saint John respectively.

#### XIII.

### (The General Committee.)

1. The General Committee of the Society shall be composed of the following Members, viz.: The Lord Bishop of the Diocese, who shall be the Chairman; but in the absence of the Lord Bishop, the Committee may elect a Chairman, the Secretary or Secretaries who shall also serve in that capacity at the Meeting of the General Committee, the Treasurer and the Auditors, the Rector or Missionary of each Parish, or of a Mission comprising two or more Parishes, and the Clergyman of any separate District of a Parish (provided that in the absence or sickness of the Rector of any Parish, the duly licensed Curate or Assistant Minister shall be considered pro hac vice a Member of the General Committee), and the Lay Deputies elected by the Local Committees as before provided; all such persons being Subscribers to the Society.

2. The General Committee shall meet on the two days next y vious to the Anniversary Meeting, to make the Annual appropriation of the funds of the Society; and a Report of the proceedings of such Meeting shall be made at the Anniversary Meeting.

3. The Order of Business in General Committee shall be as follows: Firstly. Production of Certificate of Lay Deputies.

Secondly. Secretary's Report to be read, and also a Report of the proceedings of the Executive Committee for the past year. Thirdly. Report of the Auditors to be read and faid before the

General Committee.

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#### RESOLUTION OF THE SOCIETY.

That all future Grants, by this Society, for any purpose, may be reappropriated as the Society shall think fit, if not claimed within three years from the date of the respective grants. (5th Report, page 8.)

#### RESOLUTIONS OF THE GENERAL COMMITTE E.

That the title to all Churches, towards the erection or completion of which any grant is made from the funds of this Society, be vested either in the Church Corporation of the Parish in which such Church is situated, or in some party or parties in trust to convey the site, as soon as practicable, of such Church to the Church Corporation as soon as the same may be legally constituted. (14th Report, page 24.)

That no grants from this Committee, subject to conditions, be paid until an order is issued from the Executive Committee, who will previously ascertain that the conditions of the grants have been fulfilled. (7th Report, page 21.)

That in future no application for grants shall be considered which are not made on the first day of the meeting of the General Committee, or previously. (18th Report, page 24.)

That each Missionary receiving a salary from this Society, be requested to make an annual return to the Secretary, to be handed in by him at the first meeting of the General Committee, as follows, viz.:

The number of Churches under his charge.

The number of weekly or other stated services held in such Churches or stations.

The number of Communicants.

The average number of attendants.

The amount contributed in each Parish towards the support of such Missionary. (19th Report, page 24.)

Whereas the attention of the General Committee has been called to the necessity of legal proceedings being taken against those parties from whom interest on Loans is due. Revolved, That the Chairman of the Loan Committee be called upon to take the necessary proceedings in all such cases, and that the securities belonging to the Society, be placed in the custody of the said Chairman. (22d Report, page 34.)

That the Treasurer be requested to close his yearly accounts on the first day of May, in each year.

That he be requested to transmit his accounts, when made up, to the Auditors, for their audit, and to do so with all practicable dispatch.

That the Auditors be requested, as soon as they have completed their audit, to have their report printed, together with all the accounts in detail, under their respective headings of A, B, C, &c.; and That they be requested to lay before the General Committee, at

That they be requested to lay before the General Committee, at their first meeting, a sufficient number of copies of their report and accounts so printed, as may be required.

That when a Missionary is absent from his Mission, on account of ill health, with leave from the Lord Bishop, his Lordship be authorized, in his discretion, to pay to him the whole, or any part of the sum granted for such Mission. (28d Report, page 38.)

That a blank form of draft on the Treasurer of this Society, by a Missionary, for his salary, be printed and furnished to the Missionaries; such form to bear on the face of it the authority under which the salary is claimed, and the period for which it is claimed. (24th Report, page 20.)

That if any alterations should be found necessary in the Schedule of Missionary salaries, granted by this Committee, by reason of the death, absence, or removal of any Missionary named therein, the same shall be made by the Lord Bishop, with the concurrence of the Executivo

That all grants by this Committee for Missionary salaries, and all sums placed at the disposal of the Lord Bishop, shall be for the service of the fiscal year in which the grants are made, and shall expire with it.

That the Treasurer be directed, in future, to pay no drafts for salaries, from the Missionaries, but those which are drawn according to the printed form which has been already furnished by the Secretary of the Society for that purpose. (25th Report.)

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# REPORT.

Among the occurrences of the past year with reference to this Society, there does not appear anything of marked interest to bring before its members. The last half year's report is in their possession, and exhibits, it must be admitted, many tokens of encouragement. It will be seen that the contributions for the half year largely exceeded that proportion of the usual annual amount, while the offerings from many parishes came up to, and in some instances exceeded, the sums sent in previously for a whole year. The Anniversary Meetings, held for the first time in July, were of a most interesting character. At the suggestion of the Lord Bishop, the General Committee made a small addition to the usual grants to some of the Missionaries, where it was felt to be absolutely necessary, especially in those cases where there had been a diminution in their stipends from other sources.

The demand for the publications of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge is still on the increase: it is found difficult, with the amount disposable for that purpose, to keep a sufficient supply of the Book of Common Prayer

at the Depositories.

By reference to the Treasurer's accounts, it will be observed that after promptly meeting all demands upon the funds, there remained a considerable cash balance at the close of the fiscal year, in which no part of the contributions of the current year is included. The Loan Committee were

enabled to invest the sum of £600.

The strict integrity, with which the Treasurer has always attended to his responsible duties, is unanimously acknowledged. A system of accounts by means of printed forms has been lately provided, by which it is thought greater clearness may be afforded, so that any member of the Society can easily understand the state of the funds, and observe the several items of receipt and expenditure. This is of the first importance; for every one interested in the Society should feel assured that all its operations are conducted with exactness, and the strictest economy.

With regard to the prospects for the current year, we must turn to the Reports of the Missionaries and of the

Local Committees, of which an abstract is presented as usual. Many of these will be read with interest. The Society may well be thankful in contributing to the maintenance of so many zealous Missionaries. Year after year we mark the increasing amount of labour some of these devoted men are enabled to perform. Who can doubt but that their labours are watched and blessed by Him who has compassion on those "who are scattered abroad like sheep not having a shepherd"?

And over.—The Rev. W. Henry Street is happy to report that a desire for the welfare of the Society continues to be manifested by the people of this Mission. "I have endeavoured," he says, "to impress upon them the necessity of contributing to their utmost in support of a Society, which must ultimately be a main prop in the support of our Church in this Province.

"I entered upon the charge of this Mission in September last, and although my ability to labour in it has fallen far short of that of my zealous and experienced predecessor, still I trust no exertion shall be wanting on my part to carry forward the good work begun.

"The extent of this Mission is great, requiring much labor from the Missionary, and rendering it impossible to give that attention to all parts of it which they require.

"I may mention that in addition to the subscriptions to the Society, the people of Tobique have subscribed upwards of £40 towards the purchase of a bell for their Church.

"Thanking the Society for their liberal grant of books, we hope to be again remembered this year." Contributions are £22 7s. 1d.

BATHURST, &c.—Rev. C. F. Street writes as follows: "This Mission continues very extensive and laborious. As the labours of the Missionary increase his pastoral charge, so his duties become more abundant, his responsibilities greater; and consequently the Mission, which was very great when I was sent three years ago to it, is now entirely too laborious for one clergyman. For this reason I shall be obliged to lessen the number of my visits during the year to the Restigouche Mission, or to withdraw my services entirely from it.

"The congregation in Bathurst were contemplating the raising funds for the building of a parsonage as well as for procuring an organ; I therefore did not demand of them the usual contributions to the Diocesan Church Society for the year, knowing how limited is their ability to

"I trust that the Society, and all interested in the Church's welfare, will aid us in the building of the parsonage, for so long as there is none, there will always be great difficulty and uncertainty respecting the Missionary's maintenance. Collections amount to £2 10s."

BLACKVILLE AND NELSON.—Rev. W. Cruden reports £9 5s. 6d. as contributions from this Mission.

Buctouche.—Rev. Alfred H. Weeks has made a report with reference to his duties up to 1st June, 1860, which will be wind in the abstract of the returns of the missionaries.

CAMPOBELLO.—Rev. J. S. Williams has enclosed returns as follows:—For Schools, £10; general purposes, £7 10s. 3d.; total, £17 10s. 3d.

Mr. Williams writes, that at the meeting of the Local Committee, the

and Foreign.

"Having been long absent, there is not much for me to communicate; but I may say that the Church has never been shut, my valued parishioner, Mr. Byron, having always officiated as lay reader, when no clergyman was present. In September last, the Bishop made some stay on the Island, and while here I. baptized one adult and confirmed four persons. I returned to my Mission, by God'a blessing, on the 11th May, and have been able to perform the Sunday and Festival Services since that time, but have not felt strong enough to resume the daily services. The Bishop has just been here with us, and confirmed three more persons."

CAMBRIDGE, GRAND LAKE.—Rev. A. Wood has forwarded a list of

subscribers to the amount of £7.

CANTERBURY, HOWARD SETTLEMENT.—Rev. T. Hartin has inclosed a list of subscribers amounting to £6 2s. 11d.

Carleton.—Rev. F. Coster reports that the contributions from this Committee will exceed £12.

CHATHAM.—Rev. S. Bacon reports that the annual meeting of the Local Committee was held on Ascension Day, when the following resolutions were adopted:—

1. That this Committee feel a lively sense of gratitude to Almighty God for the rapidly increasing prosperity of the Diocesan Church Society; and it is their firm conviction, that if the first object of the present constitution be vigorously supported, no better institution could be devised as an endowment fund.

2. That this Committee are decidedly of opinion, that it is the imperative duty of every faithful member of the Church to double his donations and annual contributions, and assist with his fervent prayers a continuation of the Divine blessing upon a Society which promises to be the main support of the Colonial Church.

3. That this Committee do respectfully suggest that the Rural Deans do bring this subject prominently forward during their quarterly meetings in all the various parishes within their Deanery districts.

4. That this Committee return their grateful thanks for the grants of books annually made to the Chatham Parochial and Sunday School Library, which are duly appreciated; and they trust to be again remembered in the next appropriation.

The contributions amount to £35 8s. 9d.

Douglas.—The Rev. G. G. Roberts writes as follows:-

"The services during the past year and five months, whether on Sundays or week days, in Churches or Stations, have been well attended. Several additions have been made to the number of communicants. Besides forty-three children, two adults have been baptized, and quite a number of others are preparing for baptism. Indeed I have good reason to hope that the number of baptisms, during the remainder of the year, will be at least three times as great as during the first five months of it; and I trust also that the number of communicants will be considerably increased after the approaching confirmation.

"I am thankful to say that I have a cheering account to give of the progress of the Tay Creek Church. I do not mean merely the external building, though that is almost completed, and is certainly very neat and pretty; but I mean also that the Church is being built up, through God's blessing, in the hearts of many of the

settlers, and that I have a good hope of sceing our little sanctuary, after its consecration, pretty well filled up with zealous and attached members of our Communion. During several days which I lately spent in the Settlement, a deep interest was shown by young and old with regard to the doctrines of our holy faith; and the sincerity of this interest was proved by increased contributions to the Diocesan Church Society, and also by the number of candidates for confirmation. Thirteen have already presented themselves, almost all of whom seemingly desire in sincerity and truth to dedicate themselves to the service of their Saviour. This is a larger number than I could have expected in so small a Settlement.

"At the meeting of the Local Committee, our thankfulness was expressed to the Diocesan Church Society for its liberal aid to the Parish, and a continuance thereof respectfully requested. Assistance was re-

quested towards the new Church at Tay Creek.

"The collections are not yet completed, but I feel quite confident they will be at least as large as any former year."

FREDERICTON.—Rev. C. Lee reports contributions to the amount of £194 9s. 5d.

"I have much pleasure," Mr. Nichols writes, "in informing the Society that the Church at Hopewell Hill was opened for Divine Service

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orming the So-Divine Service on Sunday, the 1st of July, on which occasion more than one hundred and fifty persons were present, and a collection was taken up towards the building fund amounting to £3 12s. It is a plain but handsome village Church, and the people are, I am happy to say, very much pleased with it. It has cost, including the land, £336; and after receiving the grants from the Society, will be still in debt £180. This I have assumed, trusting to the continued liberality of the people, to further help from the Society, and to the charity of the Church at large. Contributions to the Society are £11.

"During the past year, I have kept up Services at Hopewell Hill, Harvey, Salmon River, New Ireland, and at Hillsboro'. In the past six months, in the absence of the Rector, I have held monthly services at Moncton, by the invitation of the parishioners, and with the consent of

the Bishop."

LANCASTER.—Rev. J. Armstrong has written with regard to this Mission as follows:—

"During the winter I have performed Divine Service at Musquash twice every other Sunday, together with any occasional duties required, without reference to remuneration. Since the first of the present month, I have consented at the particular request of the Church Wardens and Vestry, to take a more general charge of the Parish, with remuneration, during the summer months, or until Mr. Smith accepts the Rectorship of it. There have been some unpleasant disputes between the parishioners, but which, I am happy to say, have been satisfactorily adjusted; and if only a suitable clergyman be appointed to take the permanent charge of the Parish, the pastoral affairs of it will. I have no doubt, go on harmoniously and prosperously. The only difficulty is the number of Churches to be served, and their distance apart from each other; but this is an evil of so general a kind in the Diocese, that, at present, I suppose there is no remedy for it."

H. Garbutt, Esq., reports that the contributions will amount to £28

I have had during the summer months a Sunday School after the afternoon service; it is quite a new thing in the Settlement, and I humbly pray for the Divine blessing upon the instruction given.

"I have now three small Sunday Schools in operation in the Mission, attended by between fifty and sixty children. We do not make quite as much stir as some of our dissenting brethren in our operations; but

I hope real and permanent good is done.

"The last Church consecrated, makes three built during my occupancy of the Mission, besides the Parsonage; and I am thankful that this

amount of necessary work has been accomplished.

"Another small Church would supply sufficiently all the wants of the Church of England in this Parish. My congregations in the three older Stations have remained much as in former years, with one exception and there, owing to causes over which I had no control, there has been a slight falling off. On the other hand, twice the number attend the ministry of God's word in the fourth Station, where our new Church is built, the accommodation being so much better than we formerly had."

Contributions are £16 3s. 9d.

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Mr. McGivern writes that he is satisfied of the beneficial effects of the change in the time of holding the meetings of the Society. "We are nearly," he says, "seven pounds in advance of last year; and this I attribute principally to summer work."

"I do say with much pleasure and thankfulness, that the people here have 'given willingly,' which is no less a duty than a high privilege

in such a cause."

St. David and St. Patrick,—Rev. J. S. Thomson reports £10 as the amount of contributions from this Mission. Mr. Thomson writes:—

"I have pleasure in reporting that the affairs of my Mission appear, and I trust really are, in a prosperous condition. I have but one church edifice at present for public worship (until the new building at Saint Patrick is completed), and three stations, distant respectively from my residence five, nine, and eleven miles. In all of these the services of the Church are regularly held, and numerously attended. I have in the course of the last 14 months baptized thirteen adults in the Parish Church of St. David, several of them heads of families, and one of them a venerable and much respected man; they were nearly all brought up in other denominations; but after serious deliberation and due preparation, have now united themselves with our Apostolic Church. A number of them availed themselves of the Bishop's late visit, to ratify their baptismal vows in the rite of confirmation.

"I have also baptized twenty five children during the last year, many of them during service. Marriages have been seven; burials eleven. "We have a monthly Communion in St. David. The number of

communicants, in the whole Mission, is seventy-one.

"The Church at Saint Patrick is now externally finished; and we hope to obtain twenty-five or thirty pounds to assist us in completing the interior. It will require a large sum to finish the whole; and I do not feel able again personally to call upon those liberal and benevolent Churchmen of the United States and this Province, who have so often and so kindly aided in this and similar undertakings. They will have their reward.

"The amount of Ten Pounds which I have to report will, I feel con-

fident, be much increased before my list is completed.

"The grateful thanks of my people and myself are offered for past kindnesses in the annual grants; and we respectfully beg a continuance of them."

St. James—St. John.—H. W. Frith, Esq., reports contributions to the amount of £90.

St. Marks—St. John.—C. H. Fairweather, Esq., Secretary of this Committee, reports contributions to the amount of £117 16s. 4d.

St. Mary's .- Rev. W. Jaffrey writes as follows :-

"I have been able to forward to the Treasurer the usual amount of collections and subscriptions from my Mission, which I take to be a fair indication that my parishioners have lost none of the interest which they have heretofore manifested in behalf of the Society.

"During the past year my labours have been eminently blessed in all parts of my Mission, except one, where their fruits seemed so small that I was induced to place the Station under the charge of a Catechist, Mr. Rogers, who is very acceptable to the people, and likely to be of

much benefit to the Church.

"At present I have seven Stations, where I hold regular periodical Services; and it will be gratifying to the Society to know that at all these Stations my congregations have very much increased, that the offertory collections have nearly doubled those of former years, and that many of my hearers are taking a much more lively interest in the cause of Christ than heretofore.

"Inclosed I send you a check for £50, which I would have the Society accept as my first instalment to the Clergy Endowment Fund, hoping that when the matter is brought prominently before my parishioners, they may also be induced to do something towards so good a cause."

Shediac.—Rev. George S. Jarvis, D. D., reports an increased amount of contributions—viz: £12 5s.

Simonds.—Rev. G. Schofield reports £13 10s. 11d. as the amount of contributions already paid. A further sum is expected. "During the year," he writes, "I have maintained the regular services at Loch Lomond, Black River, and Quaco Road. The church at Black River is generally full. At Quaco Road the attendance has varied from thirty in winter to sixty in summer. Loch Lomond is the least encouraging Station, though I have a service there every Sabbath afternoon.

"During the year I have baptised 22 children; and on Friday next expect to present 18 candidates for confirmation. At our last Communion there were 5 communicants at Loch Lomond, 10 at Quaco Road,

and 19 at Black River.

"As Mr. Disbrow still retains the Chaplaincy of the Penitentiary, I have been able to devote all my time to the Mission. This has been a gain to the Parish, but a pecuniary loss to me.

"The Sunday Schools at Black River and Quaco Road, which had been discontinued during the winter, have been recommenced; and I have been gratified with the improvement of the scholars.

"There is a small library at each Church, and the books are read and

valued, especially by the young people.

"I am thankful for the harmony and good feeling which pervaded the congregations, and pray God ever to send us peace and prosperity."

Springfield.—Rev. C. P. Bliss writes that this Local Committee, at its meeting, thanked the Society for the liberal grants hitherto made to the Mission, which they trusted would be continued. The change in the time of holding the meetings has had an injurious effect in getting in the contributions. It also hinders the attendance of the lay delegates from the country.

"I think," Mr. Bliss continues, "I can with truth say that this Mission, in some respects, is in a satisfactory state. I have performed services 187 different times, and officiated at 26 funerals, preaching on each occasion. How trying and fatiguing this is at times, you may imagine, when I tell you as one instance out of many in this parish, that from Saturday, 23d June, to Sunday last, I preached nine times, paid eight visits to five sick persons, administering the Sacrament twice, and travelling 170 miles.

"I have much pleasure in informing the Society that eight have been added to the list of communicants. The congregations are large at all the different Stations; and, if any thing, on the increase.

"The Society can count upon £17 2s. 8d. from Springfield."

Sussex.—Rev. T. McGhee writes that owing to unavoidable hindrances, the collections are not yet completed; but he thinks they will not be less than in former years.

UPHAM.—Rev. J. S. Hanford writes as follows:—

"Mr. DeVeber having left this Mission, I was transferred from Andover to Upham, which Mission you will remember embraces the Parishes of Upham, Hammond, and St. Martins, with four Churches to be regularly served, besides four Stations without church buildings, where I hold stated Services. Hence you will see there is ground enough and to spare for the occupation of any one man.

"I am happy to find the people manifest a good feeling towards the Society, and that they consider it an agency of great importance for the christian welfare of the people. May they long continue to do so!

"The contributions for the year, I am thankful to find, will still exceed those of the preceding year, and amount in the whole to £34 9s. 7d. (of which £2 17s. 6d. is for the second object.)

"I may also add that the people of Hammond have of themselves undertaken, and will soon have completed, repairs on the Church which

will cost £40 or upwards.

"On behalf of this Mission generally, I thank the Society for the books granted last year, and hope to be again remembered this year; for I am still of opinion that great good may be done, especially in our extensive Missions, by the silent yet powerfully working agency of books. We have sometimes paid too little attention to this subject. Books of all kinds, religious as well as secular, are sold or distributed about the country, and most people think they must buy some of them, when they are brought to their very doors, and often know not what they are getting; and one cannot but regret to see how few publications of strictly Church principles are to be found on the tables of our Church people themselves."

Woodstock.—Rev. S. D. Lee Street writes that at a meeting of this Local Committee, the following resolutions were passed:—

1st. That this Committee beg to return sincere thanks for the grant of books to this Mission, at the last annua! meeting of the Society, and

hope to be again remembered in the same way.

2nd. That this Committee continue to entertain the most lively interest in the welfare of the Society, and hope by the blessing of God, that its usefulness in promoting the cause of religion and extension of Christ's Church, may continue to increase.

3d. That this Committee have endeavoured to redeem the pledge given at the last annual meeting, of increased exertions in behalf of the Diocesan Church Society, and many have, in consequence, increased their contributions, and in some instances doubled the amount of last year. But in consequence of the late disastrous fire, which has greatly reduced the circumstances of many, this Committee regret that the amount from this Mission will not be as large as they anticipated.

4th. That this Committee desire to call the attention of the Society to the vast extent of country between the Woodstock Mission and the Canada Boundary, with extensive and populous settlements on both sides of the river, and but one missionary, whose greatest exertions can but inadequately supply the wants of a very small portion of this extensive field. This Committee would therefore again urge upon the Society the importance of employing travelling missionaries, where occasional visits to such destitute places would have a tendency, not only to advance the cause of religion and keep the doctrines of the Church alive in the minds of those at present deprived of her Services, but would also be preparing the way for resident missionaries among them.

5th. That William F. Dibblee, Esq., and John M. Robinson, Esq., be the Lay Delegates to attend at the annual meeting.

Contributions amount to £70 13s. 61d.

Woodstock, Richmond and Jacksontown.—Rev. W. S. Covert, who is curate of Woodstock, and also missionary at Richmond, at which place he resides, writes that he received his appointment on the 1st of August last. He has forwarded a report of his duties; and he states the subscriptions for the resident missionary at Richmond amount to about £60.

"A large portion of my time," he writes, "is consumed in travelling over this extensive Mission, and attending the various Stations. But, although the labour is considerable, there seems much ground for

encouragement and thankfulness."

The Treasurer received by "J. M." through the Post Office, £50 for the general purposes of the Society.

It appears, therefore, that the following sums have been contributed to the Society. For the 2nd object, £2 17s. 6d.; 3d, £15; 4th, £10; general purposes, £1,584 6s. 8d. Total, £1,612 4s. 2d.

Taking everything into consideration, there is, perhaps, less ground for discouragement than for hope. If larger contributions have been anticipated, it must be remembered that a great proportion was received at the half yearly meeting, while the scarcity of money and the depressed condition of trade in many localities, proved a real hindrance.

It should be clearly understood that the contributions may be made at any season of the year, most suitable to the various parishes—either in the winter or summer. The Society only requires that the returns be made in time for

the annual report.

The time is close at hand, when, unless other means are provided, the calls upon the funds of the Society will be much greater than at present. At every vacancy by death, or removal, either the whole or a large proportion of the allowance from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, is liable to be withdrawn.

From the proceedings of the General Committee it will be seen that this venerable Society, to which we are all so deeply indebted, has made a proposal, through the Lord Bishop, to the Church in this Diocese, and that steps have been taken to carry on and to conclude negociations upon

this most important subject.

It is plain, however, that whatever be the result of these negociations, there will be yearly an increasing demand upon the resources of the Church in this Diocese, and that the requisite amount cannot be afforded from the ordinary income of the Society, unless it is greatly increased. Now, by the blessing of God, there is already a large amount in legacies to the Society, which must before many years become available, and there is an increasing fund at interest for missionary and other purposes. If this matter in all its vital importance were set before the several members of the Church throughout the Diocese, it surely may not be impossible, while providing for the present staff of missionaries, to carry out the project for an Endowment The attention of the members of the Church throughout the Diocese will shortly be called to this subject, and, in dependence upon the blessing of the great Head of the Church, it is hoped that the proposed effort will be crowned with success. The stipends allowed by the Society to each of the missionaries on its list is, it must be admitted, very limited—very disproportionate to the services required and the necessary expenses incurred. The outfit itself absorbs a large portion of the first year's

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come; and this is often a source of future embarrassment. low, there are very few instances in which more might of the done in the various Missions in the way of local support. The returns, for the most part, show a very small em under this head. With regard to this matter it is difficult for the Society to make any positive stipulation; but retainly when a large proportion of the missionary's salary provided from its funds, the people who receive the mefit should do all in their power for the comfort and nvenience of the clergyman. It should also be undergood that when local means of support increase, the Society should be so far relieved, as to be enabled to turn its tention to other places of greater spiritual destitution. 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### REPORT OF THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE EXECUTIVAL COMMITTEE FOR THE PAST YEAR.

The Minutes of the Meeting held at Fredericton on the 8th of July last, will be found in the 24th Report (p. 27.)

The next Meeting was held at St. John on the 5th Oct.

The account of Barnes & Co. for printing the Report, amounting to £28 7s. 6d., was ordered to be paid.

A statement of the Treasurer's Accounts was laid before

the Committee.

A Committee, consisting of the Rev. F. Coster, Mr. F. A. Wiggins, W. Jack, and the Auditors, was appointed to provide printed forms, in blank, for the Treasurer's accounts.

On the report of Mr. Carman with reference to certain securities in the hands of Mr. Dibblee, a Select Committee was appointed to request Mr. Dibblee to hand over the same to the Chairman of the Loan Committee, and to pay any proper charge against the Society, not exceeding the sum of £6.

An account of the Secretary for postage and travelling expenses, amounting to £2 7s. 1d., was ordered to be paid.

It was ordered that twenty copies of the last Reports, from A. D. 1850, be bound and placed in the Book Depositories for sale.

The Rev. I. W. D. Gray, D. D., from the Committee appointed at the late visitation of the clergy, presented a report, which he read, and, on motion, it was resolved that the same be received and filed.

There was no business transacted at the meeting of the Committee at Fredericton in January, a quorum not being in attendance.

The Committee met at St. John on the 7th of March. A statement of the Treasurer's accounts was submitted, made up to the 1st inst.

The following report was submitted from the Loan Committee, which was received and entered upon the Minutes:

The Loan Committee beg leave to report, that since the last meeting of the Society they have invested the sum of £600 in the St. John Water debentures, bearing interest at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum, payable half yearly, on the 1st May and 1st November in each year. Your Committee, after mature deliberation, having come to the conclusion that the above mode of investment was in many respects preferable to the ordinary security by bond and mortgage, and finding that two

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debentures of £300 each were offered to public competition in August last, determined to tender for the same at 2 per cent. premium, that being the lowest rate at which, from the existing state of the money market, they could reasonably expect to obtain them. The tender so made was successful, and your Committee have learned with satisfaction that the rate of premium has since risen to 5 per cent, showing the good opinion entertained by capitalists of this species of security.

The total amount of premium and interest on the debentures to time of investment, was £26 2s. 1d., which your Committee advanced in September last, and have since been repaid by the coupons falling due 1st May and 1st November last, leaving the sum of £6 17s. 11d. to the credit of the Society, and which amount your Committee have paid into

the Bank of New Brunswick to the Treasurer's account.

Rev. F. Coster, from the Committee appointed in October last, with reference to blank forms for the Treasurer's accounts, presented the following report, which was ordered to be received and entered upon the Minutes:—

The Committee appointed at the October Meeting of the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Church Society to consider "whether a printed form in blank could be provided for the Treasurer's Accounts, which would render them more easy of reference, and more intelligible to the members of the Society, with authority to provide for the same, should they deem it expedient," beg to report that they have provided a printed form which they think will answer the purpose, and now submit it for the adoption of the Committee. The cost of providing the same has been £3: of this sum they request an order for the payment.

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the Executive er "whether a rer's Accounts, nore intelligible for the same, r have provided pose, and now of providing the r the payment.

While the Committee had the Society's Accounts under their conideration, some things suggested themselves to them, which they desire b bring under the notice of the General and Executive Committees of the Society.

- 1. The Subscriptions and Collections.—It is very desirable that the lergy and others who kindly interest themselves in making collections or the Society should distinctly understand, that the Society are comelled to regard a subscription list when sent in, as an acknowledgment in the part of the person sending it in, that he has in his hands money elonging to the Society must require him to account for this sum. If, therefore, he llows the names of any persons to appear in that list, who have not aid their subscriptions, he must understand that he does so at the risk fleing called upon to make good the deficiency that will ensue at his win expense. This is a principle from which the Society never can lepart. Their estimates of expenditure and investment are made upon a estimate of their income, formed upon the lists of contributions so ent in. If these lists are realized only in part, the estimates of the ociety will of course exceed their means, and difficulties will be sure o arise.
- 2. Missionary Salarics.—The accounts of the Society are very much omplicated by its being impossible, under the present system, to close he missionary schedule within the year in which it is granted. At ach Annual Meeting (except the last) it has been the practice to provide or four quarters' salaries, viz., April, July, October and January. The hree first appear in the accounts of the year, but the fourth stands over or the next year's accounts, and forms what is commonly called a fifth quarter." This source of confusion may easily be removed, by naking the July quarter not payable until after the Annual Meeting hall have been held. The day fixed by the Constitution for the Meeting, is the first Thursday in July, the General Committee must therefore neet before the 5th of the month. The quarters to be provided for hen, will be July, October, January and April, all of which will be aid within the fiscal year, and will appear in the accounts of the year, which are in future to be closed on the 1st May. Thus the missionary schedule will be closed within the year for which it is granted, and his will greatly simplify the Society's accounts.

It should be made to appear distinctly that all grants for missionary alaries, and the like, tegether with all sums placed at the Bishop's isposal, are for the service of the year in which the grants are made

espectively, and expire with it.

The Committee recommend the adoption of a printed form for the dissionary schedule which is usually submitted by the Bishop to the leneral Committee.

3. Grants for Churches.—To prevent the accumulation of uncertain laims and balances, it is desirable that the Resolution of 1841 should e rescinded, viz., "That all future grants for any purpose may be reppropriated as the Society shall think fit, if not claimed within three cass from the date of the respective grants." And that in lieu therefore should be enacted that every grant which is not claimed and paid within the fiscal year in which it is made, shall be void. No practical aconvenience would arise from the adoption of such a regulation, ecause any grant which it is desirable to retain can be renewed at the ext Annual Meeting. Some considerable advantage will accrue from It will prevent the accumulation of balances which must every year

be brought forward: (in the 24th Report, two pages of the Auditors' Report are almost entirely taken up with such balances), and the accounts will be greatly simplified by the omission of such items.

4. That the General Committee be requested to state that all grants for missionary salaries, and all sums placed at the disposal of the Lord Bishop, are for the services of the fiscal year in which the grants are made respectively, and expire

with it

5. That the General Committee be requested to make it a condition on which their grants for building churches are made, that the grant shall be void unless it be claimed and paid within the fiscal year in which it is granted, that is before the 1st May.

6. That the Society be moved at the next annual Meeting to repeal the resolution passed in 1841, as follows—viz: "That all future grants for any purpose may be appropriated as the Society shall think fit, if not claimed within three years from the date of the respective grants."

7. That a form in blank for the missionary schedule usually

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laid before the General Committee by the Lord Bishop, submitted to and entirely approved by his Lordship, be printed, and that he be respectfully requested to make use of it, and that the Committee on the printed form of accounts have the same printed.

It was resolved that the form of accounts now submitted, and the blank forms mentioned in the foregoing resolutions, be filed, and that the thanks of this Meeting are due to the Committee for their report.

The Committee met at Fredericton on the 6th day of June.

Mr. Carman, from the Committee appointed in October last, to call on Mr. Dibblee for the securities in his hands, &c., reported that the Committee had paid Mr. Dibblee £6, and had received from him the said securities, and had transmitted the same to the Chairman of the Loan Committee.

The Hon. J. A. Street informed the Committee that certain proceedings had been taken to perpetuate the testimony in the case of the legacy of the late Mrs. DcWolf, which would probably be completed before the meeting of the General Committee in July next.

An application was made by the Rev. T. Hartin for an order on the Treasurer to pay the grant formerly made to the Church at Canterbury. It was, on motion, Resolved, That the title to the land being incomplete, the question be deferred to the next meeting of this Committee.

An application of a similar character was also read by the Secretary on behalf of the Rev. H. B. Nichols, which was referred to the Auditors and the Secretary, to report thereon to the General Committee.

An account of the Secretary for postage and travelling expenses, amounting to £4 1s. 11d., from Oct. 1859, to June 1860, was ordered to be paid, and a Committee appointed to assist him in making arrangements for the approaching Meetings of the Society.

The Committee met in St. John on the 6th July, the day after the Anniversary Meetings of the Society.

On motion of the Rev. F. Coster—Resolved, That the Rev. C. Lee, the Hon. the Master of the Rolls, Dr. Robb, Mr. J. Wilkinson, Mr. W. Carman, Mr. J. C. Allen, Mr. E. Simonds, and the Secretary, do compose the Fredericton Book Depository Committee for the ensuing year.

And further Resolved, That Mr. F. A. Wiggins, Mr. W. Wright and Mr. W. Jack, do compose the Loan Committee for the ensuing year.

On motion of the Rev. F. Coster—Resolved, That the Loan Committee be requested to make a permanent investment of £200, and a temporary investment of £300, should they be of opinion that the state of the funds will admit of the same.

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## APPENDIX.

## IOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

The Anniversary Meeting of the Diocesan Church Society of ew Brunswick, took place at Trinity Church Sunday School ouse in the City of Saint John, on Thursday, the 5th July, 1860. he Chair was taken by the Lord Bishop of Fredericton.

A hymn-" Jesus shall reign," &c., was sung, and prayer offered, nen His Lordship rose and made a few preliminary remarks, as to e objects of the meeting, and then called upon the Secretary, the ev. W. Q. Ketchum, to read the Annual Report.

After the minutes of the several Committees were read His ordship the Bishop called upon the Rev. John Arnistrong, who se and moved the following Resolution:-

That the Report be adopted, and printed under the directions of the Executive mmittee.

We live in stirring times. The whole continent of Europe is in a ate of agitation and distrust; no two nations of that wast country havg any confidence in each other; even that power which in former days led and reigned over every other power in the more civilized part of e world, is crumbling to pieces and passing away; and should the rch of war be kindled in Europe, there is no saying what may be the sult of such a conflict. A deep interest, of course, is taken in every ring rumour, and in the latest intelligence put into circulation; and e means of communicating information has now reached to an excess volocity never before known, insomuch that a message frem the rone, or a speech from the Secretary of State, is wafted to the most stant parts as quickly as they are delivered. The sentences are conyed from the very lips of the speakers to the electric wires, by which ley are carried at lightning speed to the most eastern parts of the ritish dominions. The proceedings of mercantile associations, of sci-ntific societies, and of philosophical transactions, are circulated far and ide with equal swiftness. But there is another kingdom with which e have to do; I mean that kingdom which is not of this world; that e say, "Thy kingdom come," that kingdom which, we are told, cometh not of observation," and yet not entirely without observation for the proceedings of the church and its coadjutors, the great religious cicties which adorn the present age, excite the Interest and attention en of those who are principally concerned in the affairs of the king-oms of this world, princes and rulers, senators and statesmen; but

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those proceedings attract the notice of a higher order of beings the those who inhabit this earth. The angels of heaven are deeply or cerned in all the movements and transactions of this heavenly kingde There are the two elder societies, the handmaids of the Church, whi have so essentially sowed its interests in these Provinces and the adjoining States; and, as one standing in the foremost rank of all others, I na next, the noble "British and Foreign Bible Society;" the Bible Societ Most happy should I be, my lord, if your Lordship could be induced sanction, to patronize, and to support that noble institution; aye, a the Diocesan Church Society of New Brunswick would thrive and pr per all the better too. There are our Missionary Societies, our Paste Aid Societies, our Educational Societies, our Society for the Conversi of the Jews, and many others too numerous to mention, the proceeding and transactions of which, as being helpers to the church, are carried as on the wings of angels into the heavenly kingdom, where they communicated from one celestial being to another with all possil celerity. Mr. Armstrong, ough I feel that I can add little to what has been seid by the venerand reverend mover; yet I will venture to remark, that when we ct that the present is the 25th Anniversary of the Society, and then take up the consecutive annual reports, and observe the progressi advancement of the Society, and the increasing good that it has according plished, and the good feeling and sympathy which it has introduce among the Church people in every part of the Province, it must not on be pleasing but highly encouraging to every one who wishes well to great objects of the Society, more especially that we new know that time is not distant when all pecuniary aid from the S. P. G. Society w be withdrawn from this and our sister Provinces, and we are then to left dependent upon ourselves and our own resources. This fact, he ever, in my mind, so far from discouraging or damping our exertion should rather create a spirit of self-reliance (without which nothing importance can be accomplished), and teach us the necessity of red bling our exertions in promoting the good cause. The determination the part of the S. P. G. Society to leave us to ourselves, oughtn to surprise us; the only cause of surprise is, that she has continued h aid so long. When we reflect upon the spiritual destitution that p vails among so large a portion of the indigent population of the gra metropolis of the kingdom, and in many of the other large towns in t old country, who must certainly have greater claims upon the funds the Home Society, produced as they are for the most part by the volutary contributions of the people of England, we have no reason to co plain. I believe the step (however we may at first feel it) will eventual be productive of good. I believe the Church people of this Provin have the means, if they had the inclination (under God's Providence to supply the wants of the Church. Suppose, for instance, that t subscribers should double their respective annual contributions, can a one believe that such a step would have any injurious effect upon temporal affairs of the subscribers, or that they would individually it; I believe they would not; and if they did, a little prudence a economy in the management of their affairs would set all right; besi the visible improvement and impetus such a step would give to operations of the Society, would, to every well-wisher of the Church, ample compensation. Such an additional advance to the funds of t Society would, I believe, lead in a short time to missionaries being # to every part of the Province, and that spiritual destitution, which is prevails in many districts of the Province, be removed, and the was of the people in this respect be supplied. In addition, the Society was thereby be enabled to increase the miserable stipends at present given to the missionaries now emyloyed, and thereby save them the necess as at present of performing their clerical duties in such a state of penul that with many of them it is not living, but a bare existence; and the are frequently obliged, it is said, either to run in debt or outrage the feelings of charity in support of which it is their duty to preach. things should not exist when it is in the power of the people to reme fter the able and eloquent speech of the reverendand veneral mover, I feel that I am trespassing upon the time of the meeting, a shall therefore conclude with expressing my thanks to the revere mover for his masterly and appropriate speech on moving this Resolution

My Lord, Ladies and Gentlemen: -- Monotonies are not, in general, casing; but there is one, to which we have been accustomed to listen om year to year, which we have heard from our Secretary this evening, hich has been repeated by the preceding speakers, and is reiterated the resolution entrusted to me, which always gives us pleasure, and at is the statement that the interest felt for this Society, and the ends contributed to it, are on the increuse. And we have the greater ends contributed to it, are on the increuse. asen to be thankful for this, because there has been, during the past ear, another monotonous sound, which we have never any pleasure in stening to, and that is the old complaint that trade is dull and money arec. The resolution which I have just read to you recognizes the ontinued success of this Society, and traces it to its true source, the lessing of the Almighty. I trust that, while rejoicing in our prosperity, e shall never forget the hand that ministers it, never be elated beyond ue bounds, or be constrained upon a reverse in our affairs, to confess, hat in our prosperity we said we should never be moved. e work for the honor of God, and pursue our work in the spirit of rayer, so long we may confidently expect that God will further our forts; that whether the times be, in other respects, prosperous or dverse, whether the fig tree blossoms or blossoms not, whether the ine, and the olive, and the flock flourish or full, we shall be able to joice in the Lord and joy in the God of our salvation. Vigorous effort ads to success, and success ought to lead to still more vigorous effort. o the resolution entrusted to me affirms, and it points our efforts to vo special objects, viz., the increase of the annual contributions to this pciety, and the providing a permanent endowment for our Church in is Diocese. The latter I take to be the main object of the resolution; nd, as this subject is new to the greater part of the persons present, I pall confine my remarks to this point. Here, however, permit me to y that, in consenting to move a resolution of this nature, I do not ndertake the task as a mere matter of form; it is not for the sake of aking a speech, or even testing the sense of this meeting in regard to but earnestly to recommend it to you, as an object, for the accomlishment of which, a cordial, united and vigorous effort ought to be ade, and made at once. In saying this, I am quite aware that some, hose opinions are entitled to respect, think differently upon this point; ut, after carefully weighing the reasons they assign for so thinking, y own opinion remains unchanged. But why, it may be asked, moot e question at present? Why introduce it at this particular crisis? ecause we are now formally apprised of the design of the Society for e Propagation of the Gospel to withdraw from us the grant which they ave hitherto extended to us, a grant amounting to upwards of £4000 g. a year, out of which the salaries of the greater part of our mission-ries have been paid. The grounds upon which they have come to this ccision are not unreasonable. They say that we have enjoyed it a ng time, and that now, other lands more distant and more destitute ave a stronger claim to it. They propose, however, to withdraw it, ot all at once, but by a gradual process, by giving us, at this time, a ock sum equivalent to their present grant, and then diminishing that m, at the rate of £100 stg. per annum, until the whole sum is with-awn. Now looking forward to the expiration of that period, we shall

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have lost the use of a capital amounting to £40,000 stg.; and the question is, how can we meet this emergency? How are we to supply the deficiency, which the withdrawal of this amount will produce! Can the different parishes in the Diocese sustain themselves? Can each parish support its own clergy? Impossible at present. It is admitted on all hands that they cannot, that at least two-thirds, I might almost say three-fourths of them are not self-sustaining. Now, this being admitted the only alternative that presents itself is this, either to close our Churches in two-thirds of our present missions, depriving the members of our communion of the ordinances in which they and their forefathers have delighted, and silencing through successive generations, as far as we are concerned, the tidings of the everlasting Gospel among them, or else to make a united and vigorous effort to meet the emergency, by supplying, to a certain extent at all events, the deficiency of which we have heard. Which side of the alternative shall we choose? I am satisfied, my Christian friends, that there is not a Church of England person in this room to night, who would be willing, who would tolerate for a moment, the idea of closing our Churches and depriving the members of them and their children after them, of the ministrations of the Gospel. I have a right therefore to conclude that you agree with me at least in this, that in some way or other an effort ought to be made to avert this evil, and maintain the integrity of our Church. But the question is How? In what way? Shall it be by raising at once moderate sum, (say £20,000), and investing it as a partial endowment! Or shall it be by an appeal to the voluntary principle from year w year, as every fresh emergency arises? There are some to whose judgments the latter expedient commends itself as the more desirable Let us use our best exertions, they say, to increase our contributions towards the Diocesan Church Society. Yes, let us do so. To this sentiment I most cordially respond. Let us carry forward these contributions, from year to year, to the utmost possible extent. But, when you have done this, and there is no question but what it ought to be done, you will not meet the emergency before you. There is a great difficulty in keeping up a constant pressure for increased contributions to a voluntary, association; and, keep it up as vigorously as you may, there are times when it will fail to accomplish its object; and, if you fail to accomplish its object in any single year, the pay of your mission aries must, to the same extent, be suspended. And how can you expect a missionary establishment to be vigorously sustained, upon a basis attended with so much uncertainty? Some think, indeed, that such an uncertainty would be useful, that it would be better for the interests of the Church, that elergymen should feel themselves dependent upon the good feeling of their parishioners. Now this is true to a certain extent, but not to the extent which is here assumed. Clergymen ought to feel that their usefulness in some measure depends upon the estimation in which they are held by their parishioners, and that their comforts, to a certain extent, are also dependent upon them. But, if you make them utterly dependent, so dependent that the offence which may be given by a faithful ministry, may, at any moment, deprive them and their families of bread, you present a strong temptation in their way to become pleasers of men, instead of pleasers of God; and, to the same extent, deprive their people of the security for a faithful ministry. Some men indeed, have strength of principle enough to become martyrs in a good But, in a quiescent state of the church, the spirit of martyrdom is not common It is given in the abnormal rather than in the ordinary condition of affairs. 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occeed in other professions, will incur the expense of a classical and cological education, and then devote themselves to the arduous work the ministry in a Province like this, where the remuneration for their bour is a mere pittance, barely sufficient to support them as single en; and where the tenure of that diminutive sum is only the tenure of a ngle year. I repeat it; it is not fair, it is not just, it is not reasonable, expect this. We have high authority to appeal to in this matter. expect this. e have something like a precedent sketched out for us in that economy here the temporal as well as spiritual concerns of the ministers of ligion, were defined by Divine Wisdom with minute precision. And hat is that precedent? The voluntary principle? Just the reverse! he Priest and Levite had their cities, and their tenths set apart and cured to them by the Divine Law. They were as much their right any other inheritance. They constituted, in fact, a permanent dowment, for the support of that religion which God had sanctioned. nd when the dispensation of Christ superseded that of the Jews, it as found expedient, not indeed for the planting, but for the peranence of religion, in the different countries where it was introduced, adopt the same system. That the endowment of the Church in gland, has proved, under God, a means of security to it, and made it bulwark to Christianity in our nation, is obvious. That the want of ch an endowment is a check to its progress in the United States, is ually apparent. In addressing our General Committee, two evenings o, his Lordship referred to the striking fact, that, the three contious States of Vermont, New Hampshire and Maine, just bordering on us, and where the population is quadruple that of our Province, number of Episcopal ciergymen is only equal to the number that have in this Dioceso; and to the further fact that in the State of ine, which contains at least thrice our population, the few Episcopal rgy that are there, are all situated in the towns, because in the country is there is no means of subsistence for them. The truth is, that the untary principle is an admirable auxiliary, where you have something re fixed and stable to fall back upon; but, it is too variable and untain in its operations, to give that steady and permanent support to Church which it ought to receive. But is it practicable, you ask, to raise £20,000 for this object? Prac-able? Where lies the difficulty? Suppose our population, in the ovince, to be 300,000, and the members of the Church of England to one-seventh of that population, i. c., about 40,000 persons. imagined that among 40,000 members of the Church of England, 0,000 cannot be raised for the endowment of our Church? Surely have ten men of our communion that could give us £500 apiece, there you have one-fourth of the sum at once; and is it credible t, among the 39,990, we cannot collect the residue? But why collect t once, another asks; is it not being too generous? Why not let terity take care of themselves? Suppose our predecessors in the ther Country had reasoned thus; where, I ask, would our Church,

But, admitting all this, another objects that there are preliminary questions that ough first to be settled. Who, for instance, are to be the Trustees of the fund And who is to exercise the patronage of it? Now, I grant that these are important questions, that they ought to be settled, settled after ma ture consideration, settled upon a firm, and to all parties as far as possible, satisfactory basis. But, if so, give that consideration to them a once. Settle them without delay. But do not make these matters of detail, the adjustment of which you have in your own hands, an excus for sitting down and doing nothing. If we must choose between evils it is better, in a case like this, to be a little over zealous, than to be for ever hesitating, doubting, vacillating, seeing a lion in the way, which only exists, perhaps, in our own imagination. It is not the less true because a poet has said it, that "our doubts are traitors, and make a lose the good we oft might win." Better to take as our motto in the cause, what another poet has said, "Nil desperandum," and proceed forthwith to lay our plans for carrying out this desirable object.

The motion was seconded by the Hon. Judge Parker, and unaminously adopted.

The Rev. H. Pollard moved the third resolution, as follows:

Whereas the missionary work is the great object of this Society, and "the harvest is pleateons, yet the laborers are few," while it should form the subject of constant prayer to the Lord of the harvest to send forth laborers into inharvest, the Society ought by every means in its power to further an object such vast importance.

My Lord, L. DIES AND GENTLEMEN—If I were addressing an audience the Mother Country, I should be afraid lest the word missionary would be misunderstood. To minds in my native land, it would suggest thoughts of heathen nations where, a door for the gospel is now opening but forms the particular sphere of that great Society the Church Misionary Society. They would naturally revert to Japan, where Prodence seems making a way for the Word of Truth; or to China, who internal disturbances are paving the way for the Gospel of Peace; or India, where the muting, with all its horrors, so fresh in our mind seems to tell us that we have not used that vast country as God would have us use it, for the promotion of the truths of Christianity; or Borneo, where the devoted missionaries know not what a day may bris forth; the embers of insurrection continually breaking forth, showly that a great fire smoulders beneath; or to New Zealand, from which last mails have brought us news of fresh troubles and dangers; or Africa, with the noble mission, headed by the Universities of Oxfor and Cambridge. Such would be the ideas connected with the wo missionary in England; but there is scarcely any fear of being misu derstood in this diocese, the work of the clergy is so strictly missionary It is true that we are not sent to the heathen, but we are sent to those who have been accustomed to worship God, for the most part, in the same way as we have in the homes of their fathers; they once we able to offer up their devotions in the Churches of the Mother County but now are deprived of these privileges, and are in danger of sinking into a state of practical heathenism. I remember an incident white came under my own notice a short time ago. 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
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

even years old jumped upon the runner of the sleigh, and thus accomanied us a little way. Some hundred yards before us, I saw a horse rawing a load of hay leaving a yard, driven by another lad; when my roung companion saw them moving, he uttered the most horrid curses nd imprecations, that I looked upon him with the greatest amazement, nd turned to my other companion for an explanation: "Oh, said he, ust over there (peinting to some houses), live some families, who are a ad set; they never keep Sunday, never go to any place of worship, but re infidels, 'without any fear of God.'" How, with such an instance efore us, and I doubt not every clergyman could tell of similar, or even rorse instances, may we not say that the ork in this Province is really nissionary. You, my friends, who live his place, and have weekly r daily opportunities of serving God an house, where continually he church bell summons you to the he rayer, where you may val: with your fellows in the house of Gou as friends, and enjoy all the onsolations of our holy religion; you cannot realize what it is to be deprived of all these blessings. There are many parts of this Province where the people are never summoned to join in the services of the Phurch; others, who have but very seldom opportunities of worshipping lod as they used to do; and all this in spite of the greatest efforts of he small band of clergy, who are often taxed beyond their powers, and who are obliged to leave much undone that they would thankfully see lone, because it is impossible for the present number of clergy to supply he spiritual wants of the diocese. For though, since his Lordship has presided over it, the number has been increased, yet it has been very lowly, and now each year some four or five only are ordained, little nore than enough to supply the places of those who are taken away in he natural course of events. I am one of those who believe that if the nen were forthcoming, the money would be also forthcoming; I cannot elieve, that Churchmen in our large towns would suffer the ministers f the gospel to want the necessaries of life, if their wants were made nown to them. Let us get the men, and the money would be ready lso. And why is it so few do come forward to take upon themselves he ministry of the gospel? Our army and navy can always be suplied with volunteers, who are willing to spend their lives on what is alled the field of glory; but how few are willing to enroll themselves nder the banner of Christ, and fight in His behalf against the spiritual nemies. It is true, the service does not offer them any pecuniary adantages; but if they seek that, let them stay away, we do not want uch amongst the number of clergy; they must be willing to spend and e spent in the service of the Lord, and for the salvation of souls. Why o I see so few young men before me this evening? Is it because they ave no interest in the matter, or have no souls to be saved. It cannot e so; it must be, because they have not been taught to look upon reigion as the chief end of life, and upon the service of Christ as the nolest object, because the matter has not been brought sufficiently before hem. I believe that if in our schools a thoroughly Christian education vere given, and the children brought up with a proper sease of their esponsibility as members of Christ's Church, and the subject of the Phristian ministry brought prominently before their notice; if there vere any disposition in them, fitting them for the ministry, it would be rought cut, and the ranks of the clergy more numerously supplied with good men and true. In this way, the subject is being taken up in England. The service f God in the ministry is now kept before pupils in the Grammar and

ther public Schools. I may mention an instance of the exertion now









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made to supply the want of clergy, in the city of Canterbury. They have there a Clergy Orphan School, where sons of the clergy are educated in a manner befitting their position. Then there is a fund raised to maintain and educate such young men as desire to devote themselves to the service of God from the time they leave the school till they are old enough to enter the Missionary College of Saint Augustine—from 16 to 20 years of age; and we are interested in this movement, because doubtless some of them will join us in this diocese.

In conclusion, I will allude to one other point in this resolution. It speaks of the necessity of fervent prayers for the clergy in their work. My Lord, I fear that but few comparatively do pray for the clergy. Do they expect that a blessing will descend upon the labours of these ministers, except it be given by the Lord of the harvest. Do they expect that their own strength is sufficient for their work? They may plant, they may water, but God alone giveth the increase; it is the duty, therefore, of every one to offer up continual prayers to God, that the efforts of the clergy might be blessed, and that the scantiness of numbers might be made up by the efficiency of those who now are labouren in the Lord's vineyard of souls.

Mr. H. W. Frith, in seconding the resolution, said:

I have been requested, my Lord, to second and support the resolution which has just been moved, and if, in rising to comply with the request, I experience any feeling other than that of pleasure, it arises only from my consciousness of inability to do justice to a subject of such "vast importance." Believing, as I do, that if not the very existence, at least the growth and advancement of our Church in this Province depends on the success of this Society, and that our Church, while it is one of the most scriptural branches of the Church of Christ, contains in itself the best means of spreading the gospel, I can sincerely say, that whether it be as a local collector of its funds, as a member of a business committee, or thus to advocate its claims in public, this Society can always command my services.

The resolution assumes "that the missionary work is the great object of this Society," and the Rev. Gentleman who has just preceded me, has alluded to the popular sense of the word "Missionary," by which we usually understand a mission to the heathen. But in the fuller and more literal sense of the word not only is this Society Missionary-but the whole Christian Church-the Christian system. Indeed, to be missionary, or aggressive, is one of the peculiar and distinctive features of Christianity. Other religious systems have not been so, or not to the same extent. We all know that Judaism, the oldest system of divine origin, was content to hold its own amidst the nation to which it was revealed; that the ancient schools of philosophy made little effort to extend their teachings beyond the sphere immediately surrounding them; and that even the great apostacy of Mahomedanism, which at one time made such rapid and alarming progress, ceased to be aggressive when the triumphs and conquests of its sword were driven back. But not so Christianity. From the time when our Blessed Saviour gave the command to his disciples, and through them to his whole church, and to all who should call upon his name, "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature," from that time to the present, the Church of Christ has been a missionary, an aggressive church; and it can only cease to be so on one of two conditions-either that its object is accomplished, and the glorious consummation attained when "the kingdoms of this world shall have become the kingdoms of our Lord s which is in that it sho

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But the resolution assumes another proposition, which, if true, is one of the most sad and impressive that can be contemplated. It states "the harvest is plenteous, yet the laborers are few." Now, if the church be, as I have said, missionary in its character, what it most of all wants, is a harvest, in which to extend its labors. What then can be more sad than the assertion that such a harvest exists, but is in danger of being lost for want of laborers to gather it in. There is nothing, my Lord, more beautiful in the natural world than a rich harvest—what could be more delightful than to see the broad fields and fertile valleys of our own Province covered with waving corn, and groaning with the fruits of earth. But what can be imagined more affecting or distressing, than to be told that that harvest should never be reaped—that, for want of laborers, those rich fields of grain, on which we were depending for existence and for wealth, must fade where they have ripened, and fall and decay where they stand! And if this be true of the natural, how much more of the spiritual world. If there be, as no doubt there is peculiarly just now, when all religious questions are so much discussed, when every thing that relates to our future existence excites so much more concern than formerly—when there is so much ignorance to be taught, and so much knowledge to be guided aright; if there be, I say, such a harvest of immertal souls, inquiring, and no one to answer their inquiries; seeking information, and no one to satisfy their wants; such a vast harvest, and no one to gather it into the Church of Christ-I ask, my friends, if we can contemplate anything more painful, more deplorable. And are we not told by his Lordship, that four or five missions in this diocese are now vacant solely for want of men to fill them; that the money could be found, but the men cannot; while, if I may refer to a reverend and venerable gentleman who has addressed us this evening, it may not be known to many here, that although, some years since, feeling that his increasing years and infirmity would not permit him to fulfil his duties as he would wish, he resigned a Rectory in this City, where his zealous labors had endeared him to his parishioners, that gentleman has again volunteered his services to supply a mission not far from the City, and now for some time vacant, until a clergyman can be obtained to take charge of it. Does this not put us to shame i

What we want, then, are men and money. When I say this, I but repeat what almost every speaker this evening has said. But let me ask, how are we to get men. It cannot be expected—it is not in the nature of things, that those who are older, who have chosen and acquired a business or profession, who, perhaps, have families dependent on them, can or will turn now to labor as ministers in this harvest. No, it is to the youth of our country we must look to supply this need. But as youth is a period when other walks of life appear more tempting—when the path to wealth or fame is most likely to be sought and followed, we must look to you, my friends, who have children, to provide the men for this service. True, you may well feel that you can do better for them in other ways-but, is it not your duty to give some of them to the Lord—to train and lead their minds to feel that they should devote themselves to Him. I believe that there are many men, who, if in early life, their minds had thus been trained, would gladly have given themselves to the work of the ministry. And to young men, if there are any here, I would say-will not some of you volunteer for this work. Though it holds out to you no earthly rewards—is it no honour to belong to such

an army? We are all now looking forward to one great event. I mean the visit of our gracious Sovereign's son-the Prince of Wales. Now. I will suppose, that in passing through this Province, he should take a fancy to some lad and say to him "Follow me, attach yourself to my train, and I will provide for you;" would that lad stop to ask, what shall be my duty-what my remuneration-shall I be well paid?-or would he not eagerly accept the invitation, trusting all that to his Prince ?-And is the service of the Prince of Peace less honorable? Will you place less confidence in Him, or when he thus invites you to come and serve Him, will you doubt his power or will to provide for you? \* \* \* \* It may be that you cannot acquire wealth—that you will not be able to furnish fine houses with fine furniture—but is it not infinitely better to be engaged in furnishing a Parish Church with living souls? You may not be able to travel about the world and to take your pleasure, as you might do if successful in a secular callingbut is there no pleasure in carrying the glad tidings of great joy to perishing sinners and winning souls to Christ?

We also want money. Now, my Lord, I consider it no reflection on human nature—no reflection on our Rev. Brethren, to say that the church cannot get on without money. I know that there are some, for I have met with them in collecting, who \*peak\*, I can hardly suppose they feel, as if the Church were some voracious cormorant, ready to suck up everything of which it could lay hold. But I ask, is there any institution of half the magnitude, or doing one hundredth part the good the Church is doing, for the same expenditure, with as small an amount

of money? It is idle to discuss the question.

A previous speaker said that we should give our first fruits to God; but who does this? what one among all of us can say that he gives his first fruits to the cause of Christ? On the contrary, is there one of us, who, if he were laid low with illness, and had to call in the doctor, would not be glad to get off with him, for more than double of all his subscriptions to ecclesiastical purposes? Or should any of you have the misfortune to fall into the hands of one of my profession, in an expensive law-suit, would you not consider yourself well off, if you got out of them again for ten, or perhaps twenty times as much as all your contributions to all the charities you support? Or suppose again any one of you should pay a visit to the Great Ship, now lying at New York, and take one or two members of your family with you, can you

do it for the sum total of all your yearly donations?

One remark more and I have done. It is as to the means to be omployed to get what we so much want; various useful plans have been mentioned, and others will doubtless suggest themselves to you. But the resolution directs us to one all may use, and which cannot fail. It says it should form a subject of earnest prayer to "the Lord of the harvest to send more laborers into His harvest." This is but a quotation from Holy Writ—they are the words of our blessed Lord himself, the means which He has commanded us to use. It has been beautifully said of prayer, "that it moves the hand which moves the world." There is another saying which this calls to mind handed down in the annals of science. It is that of an ancient philosopher, who, when praising the power in Mechanics known as the lever, said, "Give me a place to stand, and a lever long enough, and I will move the earth." Prayer is that lever placed by God in the hands of the Christian, by which he may be said to move the world. But how must we pray? not in the cold and hurried manner, in which perhaps too many of us do pray; but earnestly, heartily, as if we desired to gain what we ask. We must pray as we

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should pray, if indeed a harvest were standing in our fields ready to be gathered, while want and famine stared us in the face because there were no laborers to gather it. Pray as we certainly would do, if a powerful enemy were on our shores threatening us with invasion, and we had no men wherewith to repel him. How would we cry unto God in such cases to send us relief—to give us laborers for the harvest, men for our defence. And if we use this means, if thus we pray, we may hope to have our urgent wants supplied, and rest assured that if the Church do cease to be aggressive and missionary, it will *only* be because there is no longer a harvest to be reaped, but all the nations shall have been gathered into the treasury of our Lord.

When the motion was put by the Chair to the meeting, the Bishop made some further remarks on the subject of an Endowment Fund. After alluding to the remarks of the preceding speakers, his Lordship dwelt on the necessity of such endowment, arising from the following facts:-1. We see that it is only by the possession of an endowment that the parochial system has been carried out in every small village in England, and the ordinances of the Church have been supplied to thousands, who would have been wholly deprived of the Word of Life, had the Church been wholly dependant on the voluntary system. 2. We see that in the Dioceses nearest to our own in the United States, most resembling New Brunswick in the character of the population, but far exceeding it in the numerical amount of population, the voluntary system has wholly failed to spread the Gospel in the country villages; but the work of the Church is altogether confined to the towns, and until lately the clergy of those three united Dioceses did not exceed our own single Diocese. 3. The best proof that there can be no abstract objection to an Endowment Fund, is found in the acceptance of it for so many years at the hands of English Churchmen; for the aid of the venerable Society has been a temporary endowment. 4. It appears that there are thirty-four missions in this Province not self-sustaining, many of which will not become self-sustaining for a long period of time. These missions, without more and than the Diocesan Church Society is likely to be able to give, must prove failures and be abandoned; and then all our work there will be undone; our schools will be abandoned, our churches will go to decay, and the whole work must be done over again, at greater expense—if, indeed, it can be done at all. 5. The objection that an Endowment Fund will tend to make the clergy too independent of their parishioners, is met at once by the consideration that even if the sum of £40,000 were raised at once, we should be no better off than we are now; and no clergyman in a country mission has an income so large as to render him independent of parochial aid. The clergy do not wish for luxuries, but necessaries, and these, even now, it is scarcely possible for some of them to obtain; under the voluntary system they would be starved out altogether. 6. It must be remembered that, though the present body of clergy would be the first to feel the loss of an endowment, the laity would ultimately be the real sufferers; neither clergy nor laity would send their sons into a profession where starvation was their portion, and the result must be, that no clergyman would be found to seek for ordination. Even now, the cry is in England and everywhere, that fewer and fewer clergymen are to be found; and in this Diocese at present there are four missions vacant, three of which cannot be supplied for want of clergy. If, therefore, the laity throughout the Province will not assist the clergy in raising some fund, and the Society at home continue to reduce their aid at the present ratio of reduction, (they have already reduced it £800, sterling, in about five years), many missions must become extinct, and the most serious consequences to the Church must ensue.

The mode in which this endowment should be raised and applied, should receive careful consideration; but the principle should be affirmed unanimously, and at once, by all who have the welfare of the Church at heart.

His Lordship then put the Resolution to the meeting, by which it was carried unanimously.

On motion of W. Wright, Esq., it was resolved-

That the thanks of this meeting be, and they are hereby tendered to the officers of the Society for their services during the past year.

A hymn was then sung, and the proceedings terminated by the Lord Bishop prononneing the benediction.

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
