BRYAN RIDICULED BY NEWSPAPERS OF EUROPE

Paris Times Says Public Will Lose All Faith in Diplomacy if Secretary of State Continues to Give Lectures in Connection With Vaudeville Shows.

PARIS, Sept. 10.—The Times' leading editorial on foreign affairs, edited and usually written by Andre Tardieu, one of the under-secretaries of the department of foreign affairs, and accepted generally by the European press as directly inspired utterances reflecting the opinions of foreign office heads, is devoted tonight to ridiculing Secretary of State Bryan for his appearance with a traveling vaudeville show.

The caption over the editorial is "The Bryan Sketch" and his part in the show is treated as vaudeville. The editorial says Mr. Bryan's enterprise is especially dangerous in this age, when the tendency of the public is to despise diplomacy as futile, or at least to refuse to take diplomats seriously.

"A few more samples of this kind and the public will lose all faith," it goes on. It is pointed out that Mr. Bryan's "antics" really call for an essay on American manners and morals, illustrating once again that in the United States a political career is esteemed as a most venerated profession, hence inferior men have been predominant in American politics throughout the last century, all citizens of marked ability and of pronounced intelligence being kept out of politics, and the really good men going into business, from which position they use political means, but never hold office.

"That's why the United States Government so often appears to be a monstrous paradox," it continues. "When one has followed Mr. Bryan's career of political honor, one is less surprised to see him in a circus than in the ministry. The single inconceivable thing is that this talker about having got himself called to direct the nation's diplomacy."

(Special to The Toronto World.) PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 10.—Twenty women, all members of the Women's Auxiliary of the Army and Navy Union, tonight organized the "National Order of Hairpins," with Mrs. J. Russell Downs as president and Mrs. H. Judson as secretary and treasurer.

The first bylaw formulated by the society is an ironclad one. It provides that all members must abandon garb and support their hose with hairpins. Failure to do this means exclusion.

The challenge adopted by the society is: "Are you a hairpin?" Then the fair member who is challenged must prove it by daintily lifting her skirt and exhibiting the emblem of the society on the stocking that is to take the place of the garter.

MOST IMPORTANT DISCOVERY AT POMPEII FOR CENTURIES

First Remains of Ancient City Port Have Been Unearthed Under Twenty Feet of Ashes, Lava and Sand, Quarter of a Mile From Present Shore.

Special Cable to The World. Copyrighted by The Toronto and N. Y. World. ROME, Sept. 10.—The most important discovery at Pompeii for centuries is announced. It came thru the efforts of Lorenzo Cozza, the sculptor of Rome, who has been carrying on the work begun by his father. He has just unearthed the first remains of the ancient city port, situated 1250 metres from the actual seashore now, and 700 metres from the old city gate. It was known as Porta Marina. The City of Pompeii itself is half a mile further inland than at the time of its destruction, the coast line having advanced thru silting up thru the successive ages.

Mr. Cozza worked on the theory of this displacement of the coast line, and for years he has been experimenting on a prolongation of the street leading seaward from the Porta Marina. Recently he came upon solid blocks of granite at a depth of 23 feet, under successive layers of ashes, lava and sand. Excavations proved that he struck the original quay, whose stones still bear indentations caused by the action of waves. Much new light will be thrown upon the shipping customs of ancient Rome, and the eruption itself. Further important discoveries are awaited.

PREMIER BOTHA TALKS PLAINLY

Has Not Championed British Empire More Than South Africa is His Reply to Opponents.

CAPE TOWN, Sept. 10.—(C. A. P.)—Addressing a mass meeting at Standerton yesterday, General Botha challenged anyone to show that he stood more for the British Empire than for South Africa. He reminded his audience that he spoke and voted at the Imperial conference against Sir Joseph Ward's proposal for a great imperial parliament standing above all colonial parliaments. "I was not," he characterized the proposal as "ridiculous." "Nevertheless," he said, from the very beginning he had argued that in building up this country, the parliament they occupied in South Africa, they should not take an attitude of hostility to the British Empire, and he affirmed that the Union would be doing an evil day's work if it took such a position without some justification.

Regarding the navy, General Botha denied that it was his intention to get the Union's policy from England. All he proposed to do, he declared, was to consult the Imperial Government as to interests held at Simonstown, so that the present amicable position might be maintained.

FIND CARTER WHO DELIVERED TRUNK

Police Unearthing Important Evidence in the Rubenstein Murder Case.

OTTAWA, Sept. 10.—(Can. Press.)—Discovery of the baggagesman who delivered the trunk at 344 Somerset street, the scene of the tragedy, was the most important development today in the quest for the murderer of Abe Rubenstein, alias Charles Robertson; the New York race track employee, whose dead body was found in the cellar of a vacant store here last evening.

An empty trunk found beside the body bore evidence of having been used to convey the remains to the store. On Sept. 2 the Canadian Transfer Company sent a trunk off a train which arrived from the west over the Canadian Pacific Railway, with instructions to deliver it at 382 Somerset street. There being no such number, the transfer driver left it at 354.

An effort is being made at Montreal to find the point from which the trunk was shipped. The police have the number of the cheque, and the C.P.R. records at headquarters in Montreal are being searched for the company's duplicate. The theory of the police is that Rubenstein, who disappeared on Aug. 25, may have been lured some distance outside Ottawa, and there murdered, his body being afterwards shipped to Ottawa with the intention to destroy it.

LIBERAL LEADS IN CUMBERLAND PRINCE ALBERT, Sask., Sept. 10.—(Can. Press.)—First information of Cumberland by-election, north of here, shows that the Liberal in the contest was side-decided to King George in the election. D. A. Hall, Liberal, had 98 and W. C. McKay, Conservative, 17 votes. Returns from other polls will likely not be in for several days.

GOVERNMENT IN CLASH WITH COURTS

Thaw's Deportation Will Not Prevent Case Being Argued in Montreal on Monday Next and Constitutionality of Immigration Act Will Be Under Fire.

MONTREAL, Sept. 10.—(Can. Press.)—Today's developments in the Thaw case will in no wise result in the postponement of the hearing on the recently issued writ of habeas corpus, slated to come up in the court of King's bench next Monday morning. The writ will be returned; those to whom it was issued will either produce the body of Thaw, as required by the court order, or they will advance reasons for their failure to do so for the consideration of their lordships.

No matter whether their client is produced or not the fight will go on with a view to attacking the constitutionality of the immigration act under which he was deported from the country.

Conflict of Authority. In certain quarters—and not by any means ill-informed ones, either—the whole situation is described as one involving a conflict between the judicial and the executive authorities. By these gentlemen, who comprise certain members of the legal profession enjoying the highest of reputations, but who, in view of the nebulous stage of proceedings are reluctant to be quoted, it is pointed out that according to the fundamental principle of law, parliament, once it has enacted legislation, becomes functio officio, in so far as that particular legislation is concerned. This, it is exclusively up to the judicial authority to interpret, apply and carry out such legislation. Any intervention on the part of parliament, a parliamentary official, minister or officer, thus becomes illegal in so far as the interpretation or application of the law is concerned.

Slap in Face. In the opinion of these latter, the interference of a parliamentary official in ordering the deportation of Thaw, whose body was ordered to be produced before the court of appeals in order that the latter might look into the reasons of his detention here, is tantamount to a slap in the face meted out to the judges of the court of king's bench.

Quite apart from all consideration of whether or not the fact that a habeas corpus had been issued in the case should have acted as a stay of further action, the Thaw counsel particularly object to the haste and despatch, which, they allege, was used by the acting minister of the interior, in rejecting the appeal—entered against the board of enquiry's finding, and forthwith ordering the deportation of Thaw.

ROGERS UPHOLDS DOHERTY.

MONTREAL, Sept. 10.—(Can. Press.)—Hon. Robert Rogers, when asked tonight whether, as a former minister of the interior, he would express an opinion on to-day's events in the Thaw case, remarked that he could say nothing further than express hearty approval of the action of Hon. C. J. Doherty in ordering Thaw's deportation. It was the only proper thing for the acting minister of the interior to do, to end the whole miserable case, and he was entirely within the law, said Mr. Rogers.

As to local attorneys who were making such an outcry about the violation of our guarantee of liberty, Mr. Rogers said he would advise them to relearn their law.

WITNESS HELD ON CHARGE OF MURDER

Steeves Accused of Being Accessory After Fact in Atkinson Case.

SYDNEY, N.S., Sept. 10.—(Can. Press.)—Another arrest was made tonight in the Atkinson murder case, when Provincial Constable Edwards took into custody Calvin Steeves, one of the chief witnesses in the case, on a warrant charging him with being an accessory after the fact.

From his own evidence Steeves is the man who drove Frank Haynes to the scene of the crime twice after the tragedy. Steeves is now in the county jail awaiting a hearing.

THAW UNDER GUARD IN ROOM OF HOTEL IN NEW HAMPSHIRE EXTRAORDINARY FIGHT TO BEGIN

Thaw Makes Appeal. COLEBROOK, N.H., Sept. 10.—(Can. Press.)—Harry Thaw issued this statement tonight: "What occurred under the English flag this morning is something I can't discuss, but we believe good Canadians will do what is right. Now I have come to New Hampshire on my difficult way home to Pennsylvania.

"There is no honest legal charge against me, and we hope New Hampshire won't accept any substitute from the officials of New York. "We hope citizens of New Hampshire who won't be bluffed will write the governor."

WASHINGTON TO GIVE UP THAW?

Note From Downing Street May Be Outcome of Serious International Complications.

MONTREAL, Sept. 10.—(Can. Press.)—"I believe it is now a case for Downing street," was the opinion of one of the leading lawyers of Quebec bar, in regard to the present situation of the Thaw case. While not permitting his name to be made public, the speaker explained that, with Thaw in the hands of the United States authorities, the only possible ending of the case, were it to be made a test of both the immigration act and the power of the courts, would be a note from Downing street to Washington requesting that Thaw be permitted to return to Montreal to appear before the court on the writ of habeas corpus which commanded his delivery on Monday next.

"If the case is carried thru in the absence of Thaw, and the privy council rules that the court of king's bench was within its jurisdiction in granting the writ, this would be a precedent which would be a request from either the minister of the interior, who is responsible for deporting Thaw, or direct from the British foreign minister. This, of course, would be merely in the nature of a request, as a writ of habeas corpus, even upheld by the privy council, would leave no extra-territorial powers.

Would Washington Act? "Would Washington be likely to comply with any such request?" the speaker was asked.

"There is only a distant possibility of this, but what else could be done? If the courts rule that Thaw is to be produced before them, and the act which forbids interference on the part of the courts is ruled unconstitutional, which is quite possible should Thaw's counsel decide to continue, the only hope of getting Thaw back would be by way of a polite request to Washington to permit him to return, which the United States Government might, as a matter of courtesy, consent to."

CREED OF INDIANS PROVES DANGEROUS

Manitoba Redmen Allow Cattle to Die Thru Sheer Neglect. WINNIPEG, Sept. 10.—(Can. Press.)—A serious condition of affairs amongst the Indians at Fairford, Manitoba, is reported by Rev. S. Lough, who represents the Baptist Union of Western Canada in that district, and who arrived in the city yesterday.

Mr. Lough says that owing to the extent to which the tenets of the adherents of the apostolic faith have obtained amongst the Indians they have practically abandoned all industry and are neglecting their cattle and allowing them to die.

In one case a man had ten head of cattle die from this cause.

VANCOUVER RETAINS MANN CUP EASILY

VANCOUVER, B.C., Sept. 10.—(Can. Press.)—Armstrong's lacrosse players will return home without the Mann cup, and were hopelessly beaten in both championships. Last Saturday Vancouver players romped home winners by a score of 18 goals to 2, and today, in the final match collected 9 more. In the two matches Vancouver's total was 25 goals to Armstrong's 11. Today's exhibition was a poor one. The cupholders were minus the services of Bob Knight and this made a hole in the home combination. But even without him the champions played rings around the visitors, and experienced little difficulty in amassing a big total.

Dominion Government's Action in Deporting Fugitive Shifts Scene Suddenly—Jerome Will Assume Charge of Case for New York State Today—Thaw's Lawyers Complain Bitterly.

COLEBROOK, N.H., Sept. 10.—(Can. Press.)—Harry Kendall Thaw, fugitive from Mattawan, slept on American soil tonight, barricaded in a hotel room here, after one of the most exciting days in his career.

Thaw unexpectedly over the Canadian border early today, despite the writ of habeas corpus demanding his production before the king's bench in Montreal, next Monday, he was for three hours a free man, and during that time drove madly in an automobile for fifty little miles thru the hills of Vermont and New Hampshire. Near noon he ran into the arms of a New Hampshire sheriff and was brought to Colebrook, where he retained counsel to resist extradition.

William Travers Jerome, rushing hither in a special train, will assume charge of the case for New York State tomorrow, seeking to have Thaw as a ward of the state, returned to Mattawan. Meantime Thaw is "detained" charged with no crime, held on no warrant. Pleading kidnapping at the hands of officers from New York he asked for a special guard, and Chief of Police Kelly swore in twelve special deputies, all armed. They were patrolling the streets about Thaw's hotel tonight.

At 8:30 o'clock tomorrow morning Judge R. N. Chamberlain of the superior court will hear the applications of Thaw's lawyers for a writ of habeas corpus. Application for the writ was first made this afternoon, but the judge, being occupied with another case, said he could not consider it.

Will Fight to Finish. The fugitive has telegraphed lawyers far and near and purposed to fight the return to Mattawan to the bitter end. He is afraid of Jerome, however, still when he heard that his former prosecutor was coming, asked for the special guards. L. J. Vorhaus of New York City, who, it is said, will conduct the battle against extradition, arrived tonight from Fabryans, N. H.; T. R. E. Molnes of Ottawa, one of the framers of the Canadian Immigration Act, under which Thaw was so unceremoniously deported, also is here. He had removed to Coaticook, Que., to consult with Thaw as associated counsel, only to learn that his client was gone. He denounced the deportation as contempt of court and said that proceedings had been instituted to punish those who participated in Thaw's removal.

Thaw Resisted Violently. Thaw's removal from the immigration quarters at Coaticook was sudden and dramatic. Three mysterious men, (Continued on Page 3, Column 1)

URGE VOTES FOR ULSTER WOMEN

Suffragettes Say Their Battle is Identical in Principle With That of Unionists in Ireland.

LONDON, Sept. 10.—(Can. Press.)—The Women's Social and Political Union is planning to make things uncomfortable for Sir Edward Carson and his colleagues if they fail to make provision for votes for women in the new constitution they are drafting for Ulster.

In a letter to the Ulster leader the women put themselves on record as follows: "You and your colleagues and supporters are forming an Ulster government and preparing an armed rebellion against being brought under a system of government to which you do not give your consent. It is precisely on the same principle that the militant suffragette organization refuses to submit to a government without the consent of women, either in Ulster or in any other part of the kingdom."

TAYLOR ENTICED BOY TO DEATH CALMLY TELLS OF HIS CRIME

Indian, Who is Mentally Defective, Says He Killed Charlie Dawson to Cover Up Another Crime—Thought Kid Would "Squeal," His Statement.

BRANTFORD, Ont., Sept. 10.—(Can. Press).—On his appearance at the police court this morning, Taylor pleaded guilty to the charge of murdering Charlie Dawson and on the other charge pleaded not guilty, waived an examination and was sent up for trial at the next session for both charges.

Taylor confessed early this morning to being guilty of the crime. "Why did you kill him, Jim?" asked Sergeant Wallace. "I did it because I thought the kid would squeal on me," replied Taylor.

To Cover Another Crime. That the death of Charles Dawson was due to the instinct of fear which filled Taylor, and was to have covered another crime, was admitted by Taylor after being given a severe grilling by the police officials.

OVER A MILLION WAS CITY'S SHARE

Street Railway Earnings Amounted to Nearly Six Millions Last Year.

THREE MILLIONS LEFT After Operating Charges Are Paid to Be Divided Among Dividends, Etc.

The city auditor has reported to Mayor Hocken that the revenues of the Toronto Railway Company for the year ending August 31, 1912, are \$5,850,548.12, and the commission and mileage paid to the city amount to \$1,907,022.22.

The increase received by the city this year is \$145,512.15, which is nearly all from traffic, the average mileage of track being 113.724, as against 113.50 last year, an increase of less than a quarter of a mile.

Commission is paid by the company to the city at the rate of 8 per cent. on the first million earned, 10 per cent. on the next million, 12 per cent. on the next half million, 15 per cent. on the next million, and 20 per cent. on the balance.

Revenues from suburban lines figure in the report because certain radial route coupon tickets good over the city lines, and the coupons collected on the city lines form part of the revenues of the city lines.

TORONTO STUDENT SHOT AND KILLED

LINDSAY, Sept. 10.—John Sullivan, aged 16, a Toronto student who has been spending his vacation at his home in Victoria road, was accidentally killed yesterday morning while out duck hunting near Lindsay.

ALTERED PLANS FOR GREATER EFFICIENCY

Claims Fred Armstrong in the Witness Box at the Resumed School Snquiry.

PROFITS WERE SMALL He Explained, and He Would Have Preferred Dealing With Business Men.

"We are willing that you should secure three expert men, one from Detroit, Montreal, Buffalo or Toronto if you like, have them make a complete investigation of the specifications as compared with the work actually done by the Fred Armstrong Company, and if you do not find that we have installed heating systems of equal if not of greater efficiency than that called for, we will pay the costs of such investigation."

The above emphatic declaration of M. K. Cowan, K.C., representing the Fred Armstrong Company, at the board of education hearing contracts enquiry, resumed before Judge Winchester yesterday, practically represents the defence of the contracting company, who, thru their president, Mr. Fred Armstrong, admitted yesterday that while some of the work may have been at variance with the specifications, and in some cases the actual number of feet of radiator called for not put into the work, the changes effected worked for a greater efficiency, and in some cases cost the contracting firm more than the specified details would have done.

Referring to the complaint made by steamship companies, that financial retrenchment made necessary by the tightening of the money market had led to the Dominion Government discouraging immigration from Europe to Canada, Superintendent Robert Birmingham, who has charge of the Dominion Government's British immigration to Ontario, stated emphatically in the World yesterday that as far as British immigration to this province was concerned, the case had been entirely the reverse.

Up to Sept. 11 Britishers to the number of 55,497 had been distributed throughout Ontario, as compared with 54,550 for the first nine months of 1912, which at the time established a record. This was approximately 20,000 more than that record, and certainly did not look like a let-up in the government's progressive immigration policy.

On the Queen Alexandra school contracts Mr. Armstrong said he figured out the actual cost of the work was \$1,212,471 while the contract price was only \$5,500.

STRUGGLED WITH FATHER AT GATE

Man Attempted to Force His Daughter Into a Convent.

POLICE FORGOT NAMES

Girl Went Back to Convent While Her Father Disappeared.

Struggling desperately with her father, and at the same time loudly calling for help, a 15-year-old girl created a sensation outside the gates of the Good Shepherd convent on West Lodge avenue, Parkdale, last yesterday afternoon. A great crowd of people was attracted by the excitement, and the police, who were called to the scene, took a hand, and both the man and girl were removed to the police station.

From what the police have learned of the case, it is believed that a man walked up West Lodge avenue yesterday afternoon towards the convent gates with a girl. With a writ of prohibition and habeas corpus out, it seems to me to be utterly impossible to believe, if it is all beyond me, it certainly is a disgrace to the country and to our administration of law."


Was One of Brampton's Oldest and Most Respected Citizens—Funeral on Friday.
