WIFE HANDS OVER \$25,000 TO RECOUP FOR DEFALCATION

Mrs. David Hobbs Reimburses C.P.R. and Government Treasuries—Hobbs' Previous Record.

Montreal, Oct. 23.—(Special.)—Mrs. David Hobbs, wife of the defaulting customs officer, came forward to-day and paid over the sum of \$25,000 to the Canadian Pacific and the federal treasury. Early to-day Mrs. Hobbs called upon Davidson and Wainwright, who had represented the government, and intimated her desire to recoup the party or parties who had suffered loss on account of her husband's departure. The amount handed over was \$25,000, consisting of \$22,000 in cash and \$3,000 in bonds, and a receipt was given to the effect that the amount was to be applied to the loss sustained by the government of the C.P.R. or both. The amount also provides for the \$25,000 for which Charles Menninger, the customs cashier, was responsible. It has also been stated that Hobbs had opened an account with a broker in his wife's name, and that when he skipped out the sum of \$25,000 remitted to his credit. It also came out to-day that Daniel Hobbs had already served a term of eight years in Scotland before coming to Canada.

NEW THEATRE FOR TORONTO.

E. D. Stair in City Yesterday and Arrangements Practically Made. The arrival in the city yesterday on a business visit of E. D. Stair, the multi-millionaire theatrical man, and partner of A. J. Small of the Grand Opera House, and also one of the big guns of the Klaw & Erlinger-Stair & Harlin theatrical syndicate, gave rise to a great deal of talk regarding a new house for Toronto. As a result of Mr. Stair's visit the idea has it on good authority that a deal for a new up-to-date theatre was practically completed. Mr. Small was seen last night, but when asked about the reported deal, refused to either confirm or deny it.

RAILWAY SUPERSTRUCTURE EXEMPT COURT OF REVISION SO DECLARES

Gives a Basis for City to Appeal to the Higher Courts—Chairman Proctor to Retire at the End of This Year.

Assessment figures are not of exceeding interest to the outside public, save to the parties at issue, but those in the court of revision are an exception to the rule. James Fullerton, K.C., and M. K. Cowan, K.C., were friendly combatants. It appears that in the first five wards of the city, the assessors made no assessments on the G.T.R. and the C.P.R. in respect of superstructures on their rights of way. On November 16, the railway companies are appealing. The question at variance is to what the assessors in the whole of the six wards should be made. The companies had never before been assessed. It was thought that they were not assessable in this way. Our opinion is, said Chairman Proctor, "that you cannot assess these superstructures."

HAMILTON WOOD DEALERS MUST GET CIVIC STAMP

Aldermen Decide That Wagon Boxes Must Be Duly Measured Every Three Months.

Hamilton, Oct. 23.—(Special.)—At the meeting of the city council this evening, Ald. Main stated that the by-law fixing salaries, according to the report of the special salaries committee, would come up at the meeting of the council next Monday evening. The result of the committee's work in measuring the wagon boxes of wood and coal merchants revealed the fact that a couple of dealers were using boxes that measured about ten cubic feet less than the by-law call for. These were the only flagrant violations reported. In the future all dealers who have to use wagon boxes measured and stamped once every three months, and will have to report to the wood market for the inspection.

Windsor, Oct. 23.—(Special.)—The intimation has been received from Police Magistrate Bartlett that he intends to resign at the end of the present year. 886 KILLED; 13,783 HURT.

Have of Railways in United States During One Year.

Washington, D.C., Oct. 23.—During the twelve months ending June 30, 1905, 886 persons were killed and 13,783 injured in railroad accidents, according to a report of the Interstate Commerce Commission issued today.

Comparison with 1904 shows an increase of 100 killed and 422 injured among passengers and employes. There were 2121 collisions, and 1335 derailments, of which 143 collisions and 188 derailments resulted in passenger trains. The damage to cars, engines and roadways by these accidents amounted to \$2,416,671.

U. S. NOT INTERFERING IN ANGLO-CUBAN TREATY. Washington, D.C., Oct. 23.—It can be reiterated on the highest authority that although convinced that the proposed Anglo-Cuban treaty is distinctly injurious to Cuba's interests, the United States government has never questioned Cuba's full right to negotiate such a treaty with Great Britain, or with any other foreign nation.

GERMAN FOREIGN TRADE. Berlin, Oct. 23.—A statement of the foreign trade of Germany for the past nine months, issued today, shows imports valued at \$1,257,500,000, an increase of \$1,000,000, and exports at \$1,028,600,000, an increase of \$82,250,000.

SERIOUS CHARGE, THIS. Victoria, B.C., Oct. 23.—(Special)—Captain Bomer of the steamer Hazelton is under investigation for attempting to ram a rival steamer and altering aids to navigation to cause a wreck.

TYPHOID AND SMALLPOX INCREASE IN CASES

Death Record More Satisfactory—Scarlet Fever is Not So Prevalent—Consumption's Harvest.

The provincial board of health has issued the following report concerning the health of the province in September:

The returns from 761 division registrars for the month of September gave 2128 deaths from all causes, being 144 more than were reported for the same month last year, but the increase is largely due to the fact that 28 more division registrars made returns, making the death rate 12.1 in 1000.

The table of infectious diseases below shows a decrease in the number of deaths, and an increase of nearly one hundred in the number of cases, which would indicate that some of the diseases were of a milder type than in September a year ago.

Smallpox and diphtheria prevailed to about the same extent, the latter showing 21 fewer cases, but with the same number of deaths.

Scarlet fever reached a very low point, only 27 cases and one death occurring.

Typhoid fever was somewhat more prevalent through the province; the reports gave 278 cases and 48 deaths, while for the corresponding period last year 153 cases with 66 deaths were reported.

The apparent high case mortality in typhoid is no doubt due to a great many cases not being reported by the attending physicians, while the secretaries of the local boards made returns of all the deaths.

Of the 233 deaths from the different infectious diseases, consumption caused 150.

The defendants and their members of the union entered into a conspiracy to so harass, intimidate and annoy plaintiffs as to induce them in the conduct of their business as to compel plaintiffs to discharge their non-union men, in pursuance of which they maliciously, by threats and intimidation, refused to purchase their goods, and also did send out circulars stating that the Metallic Roofing Co. was conducting an "unfair" shop.

The case has been heard in various courts, where technical questions have been argued and decided.

Lee and O'Donoghue are representing the defendants, and Tilley and Johnston the plaintiffs.

The case will start next Wednesday night.

HOLDS HATCH WITH RIFLE

Four Men Wounded in Series of Fights Between Officers and Crew.
