Washington, D.C., April 11 .- The report of the Department of Agriculture for April 1 makes the average condition of winter wheat 86, against 81.4 last April and 77.1 wheat SG, against SI.4 last April and 77.1 on April 1, 1806. The average condition of winter rye is 92.1, against 88.9 on April 1, 1896. There are few, sections of the coun-try from which a very satisfactory report as to the condition of winter grain has not been received. The winter over a large part of the country has been mild and dry. The lowest averages from important winter wheat States are those of Himols and Cali-fornia, 75 and 62, respectively.




