FEDERAL RISING OF BOXERS

EXPECTED TO REACH THE CHINA

Authorities at Hong Kong Receive Information That It Is Planned For the Month of November—Whereabouts of the Rebels Unknown.

Hong Kong Requisitions Great Britain For 10,000 More Troops From India—Sixteenth Bengal Lancers Recalled From the North to Hong Kong in Fear of a Boxer Rising in the South—Expedition For Pao Ting Fu Leaves To-Day.

Hong Kong, Oct. 10.—It is said that the authorities here have received information that a general rising in the southern provinces has been planned for the month of November.

Location of the Rebels Unknown.—The whereabouts of the rebels in the hinterland is not known, but is believed to be ten miles north of the British border. A detachment of 100 Chinese troops took position at San Chung yesterday and 100 more arrived there to-day.

Ten thousand more troops from India.—Ten thousand more troops from India have been requisitioned for Hong Kong. The Sixteenth Bengal Lancers and the Hong Kong Regiment have been recalled from the north to Hong Kong. The present intention is that there will be a Boxer rising similar to that which has occurred in North China.

THE SITUATION IS GRAVE.
But the Details as to Fears in Southern China Are as Yet Meagre.

London, Oct. 11.—(4:50 a.m.)—The Hong Kong special this morning all refer to the gravity of the situation in Southern China, but they give no further details than have already been forwarded in despatches to the Associated Press. In some quarters it is urged that it would be better to employ British troops to assist the Chinese.

U. S. Attitude Makes Trouble.—The British, commenting editorially upon the attitude of the United States, says: Every dissent, even on minor points, from the suggestions of the powers is unfortunate, as it leads to fresh correspondence and to further delay. We can only hope that when Lord Salisbury is free to turn his attention to China he will find some middle course that will secure the support of all the powers.

Expedition to Pao Ting Fu.—A detachment of 400 British troops started in the direction of Pao Ting Fu Saturday to cooperate with 400 troops reported to have left Peking.

Yan Wah-tsees Ignores It.—The Minister of Foreign Affairs in Peking, Yan Wah-tsees, refused to acknowledge the existence of the Boxers, saying that he had sent a telegram to the British and Italian troops.

ANOTHER FATAL CLASH IN THE ANTHRACITE MINING REGIONS

A Coal and Iron Policeman Shot Dead, Another Policeman and a Striker Dangerously Wounded—There Were Two Riots and Women Had a Hand in the Fighting.

Haddon, Pa., Oct. 10.—The second fatal clash between the striking mine-workers and the non-striking men occurred early this morning in the anthracite region in Schuylkill County, 12 miles from here, when a coal and iron policeman was shot and instantly killed and another policeman and a striker dangerously wounded. In addition, about a dozen of the employees of the colliery were badly injured by being struck by the strikers.

The dead man is Ralph Mills of Beaver Meadow. George Keller of Beaver Meadow is in the Mercer Hospital here with a bullet in his hand. The striker wounded is Joseph Letzke of Shepley, shot thru the groin.

Two Separate Riots.—The shooting was the result of two separate riots. The first began at 2 o'clock this morning and reached a climax about 6 o'clock, when the men of the colliery, mostly Hungarians, attacked the men on their way to work in the Onondia colliery, operated by Cox Bros. & Co. The matchless numbered about 300. The coal and iron policeman, who endeavored to protect those on their way to work, was forced to shoot. At this time, and the matchers then dispersed.

Another clash was the result of an attempt on the part of the strikers to force a train of coal cars from the slopes down to a breaker. The engine which was attached to the cars was surrounded by men and women, who stoned the engine. Superintendent Kudlick of Dighton

MISHAP TO THE OTTOMAN.
Ran on Reef After Leaving Montreal and Was Afterwards Brought to Anchor.

Montreal, Oct. 10.—(Special.)—In running out of Montreal harbor this morning, the Ottoman steamship Ottoman, from Liverpool, averted a considerable distance from her course, and in doing so grazed a rocky reef in the vicinity of St. Helens Island. No untoward result, however, was anticipated until the vessel had proceeded a number of miles, when it became known that she had struck. Water had already leaked in considerable quantities into hold, and an hour later, notwithstanding the efforts of the crew, it was deemed that it were well to come to anchor, and the vessel was accordingly stopped.

Details of the vessel which was brought to anchor at 8 o'clock, are as follows: She is a vessel of 1,500 tons, built in Glasgow. She was on her way to Liverpool with a cargo of coal. She was run by Capt. J. H. Rogers.

LEFT DAWSON SEPTEMBER 30.

They report that just before the departure of the Zealandia, the mill left with a million dollars in gold for the bank of B.N.A. The river was falling, but most of the freight had gone in. Yesterday they gained two more seats—Cardiff and the Otley division of Yorkshire—thus equalizing the party gains. Ministerialists and the Opposition have now gained 27 seats each.

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DESPERATE BURGLARS HAD A BUSY TIME IN PARKDALE

The immunity that Toronto has enjoyed from the operations of burglars was rudely disturbed early yesterday morning by three daring robbers who entered a house in the western section of the city. Two stores and two private residences were broken into, and it was not the fault of the burglar that the murder was not committed.

A little before 1 o'clock a grocery and tobacco store at 514 West Front-street, near the corner of the street, was entered by thieves, who broke the glass in the front door and drew the bolt.

A Considerable Burglar. Only a few seconds elapsed before one of the men returned and said he came back to say good-bye to the burglar. He had, and both Mr. and Mrs. Craig grasped the thief quickly and held him for a moment.

Mr. and Mrs. Craig then got up and went to the home of their son-in-law, John Smith, who lives at 1111 Front-street, where they reported the matter to Constable Walker.

Constable Walker, who was on duty at the time, was called to the scene and found the burglar who had been taken from the house by Constable Walker.

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Who Were the Robbers? Who shot the burglar? Constable Walker is able to give of the three men fairly pretty well. All three were dark haired. One was tall and slender, about 5 feet 9 inches in height.
