The action of the tanners was the result of a refusal of the employers to grant a nine-hour day, a 10 per cent. advance, and recognition of the union. The strike will affect fourteen tanneries, three of which are controlled by the American Hide are controlled by the American Hide and Leather Company. Five hundred tailors demand rooms in which to work, in lieu of using their homes as a workshop. Excavating teamsters demand an increase of 25 cents a day, and called a strike in all barns where the union scale is not paid. Steamfitters, numbering 700, declined to work, pending the settlement of a demand for \$4.50 a day—an increase of 50 cents. In the five strikes which occurred to-day, a total of 5000 men quit work. total of 5000 men quit work.






