Mr. Drummond said that the meeting of the directors was held on Dec. 31, 1903, and that the general statement for the half year ending Oct. 31, 1903, was as follows: Balance forward, \$1,100,000; account April 30, 1903, \$721,807.75; total, \$1,821,807.75.

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NEW ZEALAND AND CANADA NEWS SERVICE ADVOCATED

Sir Sandford Fleming Discusses the Need for More Use Being Made of the Pacific Cable and Makes a Suggestion for the Good of the Empire.

Ottawa, Dec. 7.—(Special.)—To-morrow is the anniversary of the inauguration of the Pacific cable and Sir Sandford Fleming, the father of the scheme, has very fittingly addressed a letter to the people and the press of New Zealand and Canada, in which he advocates a limited free news service between the two countries which would take up only half an hour of the time of the cable a week, and would be thus, conducive to the good of both countries and be supported by both.

When the Pacific cable scheme was first broached it was intended that a news service should be instituted, but the idea fell through because Australia refused to take part in the scheme. He thinks that the other parties to the contract should act without the aid of the Commonwealth. His suggestion is that a news service should be instituted, but the idea fell through because Australia refused to take part in the scheme.

The Canadian government, desiring to take full advantage of the newly laid cable, passed an order in council on March 7, 1903, pointing out that a news service would tend to promote trade and extend commercial intercourse between the British countries at both ends of the cable, and that other advantages would result. Australia and New Zealand were invited to unite with Canada in taking steps to establish a news service across the Pacific which would be free of charge to all newspapers, and that the limit should be 500 words in both directions daily for a period of three months.

The government of New Zealand responded in favour of the proposal, but the government of the Commonwealth raised objections to it. Up to the present the objections raised have not been removed.

We are now at the beginning of the second year of the operation of the Pacific Cable, and if Australia does not yet see the way to co-operate in a most important movement, there seems a good reason why Canada and New Zealand should any longer be denied a service which would be of great benefit to the common interests, is capable of conferring.

No expense has been spared to render the Pacific cable a perfect means of telegraphic communication. It is equipped in the fullest manner, with the best of everything which science can suggest, including the latest automatic instruments; it is provided with a complete staff of carefully selected officers, and is operated by a highly trained crew. The state is in possession of a perfect medium by which intelligence can be transmitted from Australia to Canada, and vice versa, at a cost of only one penny per word.

The Pacific cable has proved itself eminently fitted for the accomplishment of the most important of its duties. It has proved itself to be a most valuable instrument, and it is to be regretted that it is not being used to the full extent of its capacity. It is to be hoped that the Commonwealth will see the wisdom of instituting a news service across the Pacific cable, and that it will be supported by both Australia and New Zealand.
