Guelph, Dec. 7.—(Special.)—The citizens of Guelph propose to exhibit hospitality that will be on a par with the animal exhibit of the big Fair during the week. To this end every householder is participating. It is estimated that the fourteen hotels will accommodate 900, and that means comfortably and without the use of cots. Four hundred homes have been opened, among the best people of the city, to the visitors, and Secretary McKenzie said there were more ready to volunteer if it was necessary. Mayor Hamilton and a citizens' committee took up this phase of the subject, and the system is so thoroly arranged that Mr. Hamilton declared to The World to-day he was satisfied there could be no complaint on this score. Secretary McKenzie has an office or the ground floor of the City Hall, and already has provided quarters for a large number. Separate rooms can in many instances be provided in private residences. The hotels do not offer rooms for single occupants, and the citizens' committee does not believe the visitors will be so unreasonable as to demand anything of this kind. But the accommodation offered is excellent and the expense is from \$1 in a private residence to \$2 and \$2.50 in the hotels, per day. In some instances for the whole week the price is less. The indications are that this trouble-some question of accommodation has been disposed of, at least for the present Fair. The big crowds will be present Wednesday and Thursday. 

Shields and Thomas Real Leaders, With \$121,000 to Their Credit

New York, Dec. 7.—William C. Whitney nominally leads the list of winning owners of 1003, which came to an end on Saturday with the close of the Bennings season, tho the Shields' interests are the real leaders. The list of owners whose horses have won \$10,000 or more include 55, who have won more than \$1,631,000. Another million or mare has been distributed among the remainder of the turfmen, about 400 in number, few of whom have won no races. The leading trainers of the year, as shown by the statistics, are A. J. Joyner, who trained the horses of J. B. Haggin and Sydney Paget, who won more than \$163,000; John W. Hogers, who handled the horses of William C. Whitney and the Wessbury Stable, whose combined winnings are \$126,105; Jas. Rowe, who was in charge of Messrs. James R., and Foxhail P. Keene's racers, wind carned \$12,500; Alex. and Wm. Shields, whose racers, in conjunction wath those of E. R. Thomas, have won \$121,000, some of which, however, must be credited to those who preceded the Messrs. Shields in control of the Thomas horses, and R. I. Miller, trainer for the Hampton Stable, whose cold Africander was the chief three year-old stake winner of the year. The latter stable's winnings were \$82,875, That the turf never was more prospersous or more healthy is revealed by this list of winning owners.



The decision of the Court of Appeal in the case of the extension of time for the hearing of the North Norfolk and North Perth election petitions was handed down yesterday. Mr. Justice Osler granted an order postponing the hearing of the petitions till Jan. 31 next, and this was appealed against by the Liberhis, who claimed that a date for the trials ought to have been fixed, and as the six months' limit had been passed the petitions should fail. The Chief Justice, in announcing the decision, said: We have come to the conclusion that the orders were properly made, under the circumstances, and that the discretion of Mr. Justice Osler to extend the time was rightly exercised. His order is confirmed. The whole court agreed. In a lengthy written judgment it was found that the duty of fixing the time and place of the trials belonged to the judges, as the Conservatives contended, and that the demands of justice required an extension. The fact that, owing to other engagements the judges were unable to commence the trials within the time limit should not prejudice the petitioners, and probably the only motion open to them under the circumstances was to extend the time. The judgment goes on to say:

Lumbermen Have No Kick Coming,

The Conditions Have Changed. George McCormick, M.P., is in the city to attend the sale of Crown lands on Wednesday. He said he could say as an opponent of the government that there was nothing in the statement made by a Toronto paper that sufficient time had not been given the lumbermen to look over the properties to be sold. The chief objection was on account of the fact that the season was so late that prospective purchasers would not have time to do anything this year. Mr. McCormick has not yet decided definitely whether he is going out of politics. He requires a couple of days yet before giving his answer to the North Ontario Conservatives, but it is undecistood he is anxious to quit politics in order to devote his whole attention to his business affairs. He leaves on Wednesday for British Columbia, where he is interested in the Pacific Coast Lumber Company, and the Okanagan Lumber Company, and will be absent from these parts until the middle of January.

A large number of lumbermen have assembled for the sale on Wednesday. Among them is A. G. Bell, manager of the Spanish River Boom Company. He said to The World last night that the government had made some changes in the conditions of sale. The ground cent had been raised from \$3 to \$5 a mile per year, and the stumpage dues from \$1.25 to \$2 a thousand feet. The purchasers will have 15 years instead of 10 in which to operate on their lands. On the whole, there was no kick coming. city to attend the sale of Crown lands




