The federal reserve bank statement was regarded as bearish, as it said indications were for larger production of all grains, except wheat, than a year ago. The greatest obstacle to the farmer, it centinued, was the inadequate transportation facilities. There was some buying in order to take advance in freight rates becomes effective tomorrow.
