### True Time.

Two kinds of time are used in Almanacs—*clock* or *mean time* in some, or *apparent* or *sun time* in others. *Clock* time is always right, while *sun time* varies every day. People generally suppose it is twelve o'clock when the sun is due South, or at a properly made noon-mark. But this is a mistake. The Sun is seldom on the meridian at *twelve o'clock*; indeed, this is the case only on four days of the year, namely—April 15, June 15, September 1, and December 24. In this Almanac, as in most other Almanacs, the time used is *clock time*. Old-fashioned Almanacs, which use *apparent time*, give the rising and the setting of the Sun's *centre* and make no allowance for the effect of refraction of the Sun's rays by the atmosphere. The more modern and improved Almanacs, which use *clock time*, give the rising and setting of the Sun's *upper limb*, and duly allow for refraction. The practice of setting time-pieces by the rising or setting of the Sun or Moon is not strictly correct, as the unevenness of the earth's surface and intervening objects, such as hills and forests, near the points of rising and setting, occasion a deviation in every place from the time expressed in the Almanac, which time is adapted to a smooth, level horizon. The only means of keeping correct time is by the use of a noon-mark or a meridian line.

### Chronological Notes.

**GOLDEN NUMBER.**—The Lunar Cycle is a cycle or course of 19 years, in which the phenomena of the moon occur within an hour and about 29 minutes of the time at which they occurred 19 years before; and the place of each year in this cycle is shown by its golden number. The first year of the Christian era was the second of the Lunar Cycle.

**EPACT.**—The common solar year of 365 days contains 12 moons and 11 days. The Epact indicates the moon's age on January 1.

**SOLAR CYCLE.**—The Solar Cycle is a period of 28 years, during which the week-days occur on the same days of the month as they did during the previous solar cycle. The number of the Solar Cycle shows the place of the year in that cycle. The first year of the Christian era was the tenth of the Solar Cycle.

**DOMINICAL LETTER.**—The first seven letters of the alphabet are used in a Calendar to show the days of the week, and the Dominical letter is that which marks the Sundays. The first day of the year is always marked by the letter A. In leap-year there are two letters—one till the end of February, and then the preceding letter.

**ROMAN INDICTION.**—A period of 15 years, used by the Romans for taxing their provinces. It dates from the 1st of January, 313. The first year of the Christian era is reckoned as the fourth of the cycle of Indiction.

**JULIAN PERIOD.**—A period of 7,980 years; obtained by multiplying together the Lunar Cycle, Solar Cycle, and Roman Indiction— $19 \times 28 \times 15 = 7,980$ . This period was invented in 1583, and is used in calculations of astronomy and chronology. The first year of the Christian era is reckoned as the 4714th of the Julian Period.

The Year 5632 of the Jewish Era commences on September 16, 1871.  
Ramadan (Month of Abstinence observed by the Turks) commences on November 14, 1871.

The Year 1288 of the Mohammedan Era commences on March 23, 1871.

Eclipses for the year 1871.

There will be four Eclipses this year, two of the Sun, and two of the Moon, as follows:

- I. A Partial Eclipse of the Moon, January 6, in the evening; visible in P.E. Island, the Moon rising eclipsed. Eclipse ends 6h.39m.
- II. An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, June 17; invisible in America.
- III. A Partial Eclipse of the Moon, July 2; visible in California and Oregon, but invisible in this Island.
- IV. A Total Eclipse of the Sun, December 11, invisible in America.

Morning Stars.

Venus from Sept. 26 to end of the year.  
Mars not this year.  
Jupiter from June 30 to Oct. 22.  
Saturn until March 30.

Evening Stars.

Venus until Sept. 26.  
Mars all the year.  
Jupiter until June 30, and after Oct. 22.  
Saturn from March 30 to end of the year.

Planets Brightest.

MERCURY; February 13, June 13, and October 6, rising before the Sun; also April 20, August 17, and December 12, setting soon after the Sun. VENUS, August 20 and November 1, being at the latter time an early Morning Star. MARS, March 19, rising about sunset. JUPITER, not this year, not reaching the opposition. SATURN, June 28, rising about sunset.

To ascertain the Length of the Day and Night.

At any time of the year, add 12 hours to the time of the Sun's setting, and from the sum subtract the time of rising, for the length of the day. Subtract the time of setting from 12 hours, and to the remainder add the time of rising next morning, for the length of the night. These rules are equally true for apparent time.

THIS is a good season to prepare fuel, and if there is not enough on hand to last through the year, get it in; labor is cheaper at this season than at any other, and dry fuel is a grand thing to keep up good humor of a cold day; keep the wood shed piled full ready to the hand of the good wife, that her patience may not be tried by a smoky fire, of a cold, windy morning. If you have no wood shed, pile the wood near the kitchen door and cover the pile with a few boards or slabs to shed the rain.

After a heavy fall of snow, break up roads; this can be easily done before the snow becomes frozen on the surface. Remove the snow from roofs of buildings

that will be endangered by its weight when soaked with water, and also to prevent the water from backing up under the shingles and leaking through, or freezing in the spouts and bursting them—"an ounce of prevention is worth numerous pounds of cure."

Keep the manure heap constantly growing; this is the farmer's saving bank, and upon it mainly depends his success; look after all the means of supply; if you keep the stock stabled, much will be saved that would otherwise go to waste, and by providing plenty of absorbents, the manure heap will grow rapidly. If possible keep it under cover that it may not receive too much moisture, as it is easier to supply water when needed, than to dry the over-wet manure; if you have no place to keep it under cover, pile it in heaps; packed firm on the outside, work over and add muck when it heats, by this means there will be no superabundance of water to be carted out in the spring, and the material will be of a more uniform consistency, and easier spread and mixed with the soil.

See that all animals are well fed. Beeves that are fattening should be kept quiet in warm, well-ventilated quarters, and fed regularly; the application of the comb not only adds to their appearance, but keeps the skin in a healthy condition. Cows should have succulent food, and not be exposed to draughts or cold wind.

As the days lengthen the farmer is reminded of the approach of spring, when every moment will be required to get crops planted in time; and it behooves him to do every thing possible to reduce the amount of work necessary to be done then. If you have no plans laid as to what you intend to grow, do so at once. If you are near a market a great deal of money may be made by raising early chickens, they bring an extra price in May and June as broilers, or the pullets will be laying from September to Christmas—when eggs are highest in price.—provided they are well fed and furnished with dry quarters. To raise early broods with success, requires special attention; later in the season the hen left uncooped will provide for her

brood with very little care, as there are then plenty of insects and worms to be found, but at this season, while the ground is frozen and the air is cold, it is necessary to supply the proper kind of food and a warm dry shelter—their food should correspond with what they get in the natural state. Any one who has watched a brood of young chicks following the hen in the spring, will have noticed how she will call them together when she finds a ground worm, and picks it in small pieces among them: this would suggest that animal food in small particles must be furnished; the yolk of the egg is, naturally, their first food, and is necessary for their rapid growth, a variety of vegetables and pure water will keep them healthy, scalded Indian meal seasoned with pepper and salt is very good after they are a week old. A little ingenuity will afford a dry, warm shelter: a piece of ground may be covered with hot-bed sash, with warm manure banked around the frame, care being taken to provide ventilation.

Overhaul all the tools and machinery: if anything needs repair have it done at once. Exposure destroys more than fair use; give the wood work a coat of paint, in which linseed oil forms an important part. Look over the list of implements furnished by the dealers, and see whether there are not some new inventions that would facilitate year operations, and save labor. Have material on hand to mend or replace such as may be broken by accident.

THE increase of flocks and herds usually take place this month, and great care should be taken that none suffer; brood mares, if worked should be driven with caution, never over work or put to their speed; light work will not hurt them, even before the plow and harrow; if not worked, take them out every day for a walk or drive. Cows with calf should not be confined too much in the stable; on dry days leave them out where they can take exercise and not be interfered with by quarrelsome cattle. Cows soon to calve should be placed every night in well littered stalls; if the bags become hard and feverish, it is sometimes necessary to draw the milk and rub and wash the bag

with warm water; use the same treatment after calving if necessary; for the purpose of increasing the secretion of milk, give succulent food, oats and bran; steaming the fodder is also very beneficial; never compel a cow to drink water with ice floating in it. Ewes near yeasting should be separated from the rest of the flock, and each one provided with dry comfortable quarters, and an extra allowance of roots, peas or beans supplied. Sows that will farrow this month must be supplied with clean, warm sleeping apartments, having a strip fastened around about a foot from the floor, to prevent her lying on the little ones or crowding them against the sides of the pen; feed raw roots before and after farrowing.

Look out for mulleins, thistles, teasels and other biennial weeds that will mature their seed coming season. Cut them off a couple of inches below the surface with a sharp hoe, that the water may enter the roots and destroy them. Removing weeds is one of the most profitable occupations on a farm. How much better crops could be raised if no weed was allowed to go to seed; pasture fields and fence rows are overlooked, and the consequence is that a crop of seed is produced every year sufficient to stock the whole farm.

If you have not procured all necessary seed, do so without delay. It would be best if every farmer would raise his own seed, but as few will give proper attention to the subject, it may be best, as a general thing, to purchase from reliable seedsmen. Do not plant anything doubtful, if you have seeds that are not first rate, you had better feed them to the chickens; shrivelled and imperfect seed may germinate, but they cannot produce strong, vigorous shoots nor perfect grains, and by planting them you only subject yourself to an extra risk of getting a full crop.

THIS is the month when the change from winter to spring is most apparent, the lengthened days and warm sun warn the farmer to be up and doing; there may be some hard freezing at night, but the sun is beginning to tell on vegetation, the trees are pushing forth their leaves and blossoms, and the farmer who has not planned beforehand, finds work crowding upon him and very little time left for thought. At this season storms are frequent,

and many delays are occasioned thereby, but by doing such work in the fields during dry weather as can be safely done then, and reserving the in-door work for wet weather, the thoughtful proprietor can keep his hands profitably employed.

Commence the season with a determination that you will not allow a weed to grow; make a general clearing out of fence rows, and afterwards root out every weed whenever and wherever you see it; on too many farms they are seen as high as the grain, and potato fields are hardly recognized except by the rag-weed. Do not attempt to plow land while it is wet, many fields are greatly injured by being worked in this condition, as the sun will bake the lumps so hard they cannot be broken, and thus the surface is rendered uneven and the seed cannot be properly covered.

Spring grains have but a short time to grow, and as soon as the land is ready should be put in, after first being soaked in strong pickle to kill smut. Grass and clover may be sown on land which is suitably prepared, or on old sod harrowed well; it is advisable to sow a little white clover with grass seed wherever an application of plaster will not bring it in abundantly, as it generally will on old land. It will pay in the end to send men and boys through grain fields to cut out weeds with hoes; those that get an early start will live, and ripen their seed or make strong roots, to the injury of the next crop of grass.

Early potatoes should be planted only in good soil that has been prepared in the fall, as fresh manure is liable to cause rot; plant as soon as the soil is warm, cutting the pieces with at least two eyes, and letting them dry a little while before planting; by doing this the sprout will derive more nourishment than if the pieces are small and put into the ground as soon as cut; they may be cut smaller later in the season. Plant deep under light ridges so that the field may be harrowed.

THIS is the month that vegetation makes most rapid growth, and corn fields which have looked yellow and poor during May, unfold their leaves under the hot suns of June, and so will other crops if they are in open and well worked soils. Farmers who are careful to take advantage of opportunities are well ahead with their work, so that even if the corn has to be replanted in some places, and other delays occur, they will be ready for the proper work of this month.

Cattle in the pastures must be looked after every day; see that they do not want for fresh water; when they drink at a pond, large

poles or sticks should be so placed as to prevent them standing in the water, as it will soon become tainted by their droppings; they should always be yarded at night, at least, the manure thus saved will more than pay for the trouble. Where only one or two cows are kept, it is a great deal more economical to keep them yarded or stabled during the whole summer; it takes but a short time to cut green feed enough to last a day, frequently less time than it does to hunt up the cow and drive her home, and the manure can be all saved, while there is no feed wasted by being tramped under foot, as there is in the field. Few farmers calculate the amount of money that would be saved if cattle were not allowed to range on the pastures at all; it would not be necessary to maintain any dividing fences, and if these were dispensed with, the strip of land on each side could be cultivated, and not left, as it too often is at present, as a nursery for weeds, the seeds of which are carried all over the farm. Where a number of cattle are kept on good pastures it will pay to tether them by a strap around the hind leg attached to a chain with a swivel, the chain to be fastened to an iron pin driven into the ground; the chain will answer the double purpose of keeping them fast and spreading their droppings evenly over the surface, the length of chain to be governed by the quantity of food the animal will consume in a certain time; they soon become accustomed to the strap, and will eat the grass clean and spread their droppings evenly, the new growth of grass receiving the immediate benefit, and not being subject to the tramping of the cattle.

WORK! work! work! from before sunrise till the stars peep out, the farm hands are on the go, there is no time for reading or calculating, and well-laid plans will tell now. No machine will run long without power and lubrication; neither will men or animals hold out long without proper food and rest. The extra work required of the good wife must be considered, and no man should consider himself above giving a helping hand; at all times her work is sufficiently onerous, but at this season, the extra

cooking and confinement in-doors will tell on her constitution. Have plenty of wood cut ready to her hand, and assist with the dairy work whenever she requests it. Men are too apt to think that compared with them, the women have a very easy time of it, but there are no human beings under the sun who have as much work and as many cares as the farmer's wife with a growing family.

If the hay crop is large it will require some generalship to house it all in good condition, as showers will come on just when they are not wanted, and if forethought has not provided against accidents to machinery, much valuable time will be lost thereby. It is generally conceded that the best time to cut grass for hay is when it is in blossom, but at this time it will require longer to cure than if left till the seed ripen; the grass should not be cut till the dew is off, and as soon as wilted should be stirred constantly until ready to cock up, which should be done while the sun is up and the hay is hot; let the curing be done as much as possible in the cocks, and after the first day keep in heaps, turning and loosening up frequently, but do not spread thin unless soaked by a heavy shower; as soon as sufficiently cured stow away under shelter; if the barn is not large enough, erect a temporary covering that will shed rain; hay will keep if properly stacked in the field, but rain and sun will injure it to a greater amount than the cost of providing shelter. Fields kept permanently in grass should receive a top dressing of some kind as soon as the hay is removed; well-rotted barn yard manure is generally best. Keep cattle off till the new growth has a good start; or, better still, keep them off altogether.

every day's delay impairs its value. Harvesting with a machine is, comparatively, light work, and if you have no machine it will pay to have an interest in one, by two or three neighbors purchasing one in partnership, and not be subject to the caprice of any outside party.

It will be a great point gained to have the grain threshed as soon as possible, as it is safer in the granary than in the stack, and will not afford so good an opportunity for the depredations of mice, rats, &c. When the threshing is being done it is best for the farmer to superintend the matter and only put his hand to the work when an accident occurs; he can save more than will pay for a couple of hands, by watching that grain is not carried away with the straw, as the best machines will sometimes choke, and the grain instead of dropping to its place will be carried out, or the heads will not be sufficiently broken, and without some one to look after this matter especially, it will be apt to be overlooked—and there is no one better capable of doing this than the owner.

Preparations for marketing fruit; if not already made, must be attended to now. Picking and packing are of as much importance as raising good fruits; a great majority of purchasers are governed more by the looks than anything else. If fruit is to be sent a long distance to market, and sold in bulk, it is very important to have it packed tight and in such way that it will open well, assort carefully, and have the same quality of fruit all through the package, as one package of good, well assorted fruit of any kind will bring as much as two thrown loosely in a barrel or crate, and jolted till the mellow ones are bruised or mashed, and the whole package soiled.

Fall-fallowing will be found profitable on many farms where the soil consists of a clay loam or any soil that contains latent plant food.

It requires some experience to tell just when to cut grain, for if it is cut too soon the straw is benefitted at the expense of the grain, and if left till fully ripe the grain is apt to shell, and be lost. The best time is when the kernel has passed from the milky state to a doughy consistency. This may be ascertained by trying several heads from different parts of the field; when grain is in this condition it should be harvested,

SEPTEMBER, standing betwixt the summer and the autumn, unites in itself the characters of the two seasons. Dry and sweltering heats of the first week or two, give place to storms and blustering winds, often accompanied by frost. It is a month of care and anxiety to the farmer; success or failure are so evenly balanced that his good judgment and activity are often sorely tested to secure the harvests upon which

his labor has been expended, and at the same time to make the ground ready for next year's crops. A Northern September epitomizes the year—seed time and harvest, summer and winter, often crowded into 30 days. Day and night are evenly balanced in the course of this month, so, with a pardonable fertility of imagination the Ancients saw a pair of weighing scales among the stars, and called the constellation, and sign of the zodiac in which the sun measures equal hours of darkness and light, *Libra*.

EGGS.—If eggs can not be marketed fresh and well, pack them for winter food, dipping the fresh eggs in melted tallow and packing them in dry chaff or sawdust, the ends up, and in boxes so that they may be inverted occasionally.

MANURE AND MUCK.—Before the rains fill the swamps, make sure of a good stock of muck for mixing with dung in winter. Gather diligently all poultry droppings, the deposits from house drains, scraps of woolen cloth, hair and leather, bones, and everything that will decay to add value to the compost heap.

WEEDS.—Burn all that have gone to seed, and add the rest to a compost heap, quickened with lime, horse dung, or the like.

THIS is the month for agricultural fairs and cattle shows, at which a great deal of useful information, as well as recreation can be obtained. Endeavor to attend with the whole family that are old enough to appreciate fine fruit, improved stock and machinery—not only agricultural

machinery, but labor-saving machinery for the household and dairy.

If the root crop is large, a place will have to be provided for securing it against frost, this can be best done by burying; the roots need not be dug till late this month if the weather is not unusually cold; if carrots are kept clean, and the soil loose, they will make a good growth yet. Select a well-drained place and dig a pit about six feet wide and three or four feet deep, the roots should be packed in sections about two feet wide across the pit to the level of the ground, a space of six inches is left between the sections to be filled in with earth, and so on alternately a section of roots and earth till all are stowed away; the pit should then be covered with eighteen inches or two feet of soil and rounded so as to shed rain; roots will keep a great deal better this way than if stored in one pit or cellar in large quantities, and a section can be removed without exposing the balance.

Cattle should be stabled at nights as the weather gets cold; those intended for fattening should be fed on some grain now in addition to their other food, for they will lay on flesh fast this month if properly fed. Keep up the flow of milk in cows by feeding pumpkins without the seeds, roots, soft corn, etc. Hogs should be putting on fat now, and must have all they can eat of thoroughly cooked, rich food. Keep them clean by giving warm nests and plenty of litter, and be careful to save all the manure, as a great deal of the profit from hogs lies in the manure heap. Let them have ashes and charcoal; they even like to root among coal ashes.

THE work for this month consists chiefly in preparation for winter. The stock must all be stabled at night, and their feed has now to be supplied them; the change from grass to hay and grain may operate injuriously on some, and without attention, loss will ensue. Look well to the roofs and walls of stables, fasten loose shingles and weak hinges. See that spouts are clear of rubbish, and that water courses are not blocked up. If the cellar is not frost-proof, make it so.

If prices are fair, it is better to dispose of crops than to store away in expectation of higher prices, no one can tell with certainty what wheat, corn, or potatoes will bring next spring; prices may be higher than they are now, but by holding over you run the risk of loss from various causes. Look over the market reports, and when the price will pay a fair profit, sell.

Cattle intended for slaughter must be kept improving; the frosty weather of this month will sharpen their appetite, and if supplied regularly with plenty of food they will increase rapidly; an occasional change of diet and the use of the card and curry-comb will keep them in good health. Cows must be kept quiet and fed corn stalks cut fine, soaked twelve hours and well sprinkled with meal. It will pay those having warm milk rooms to make butter all winter; to make butter, however, will require liberal feeding with corn meal, rye bran, oil-cake, carrots and other roots. Sheep should have dry sheds, sunny yards, and be fed from racks and troughs. Ewes served early this month will yeau in April, and the lambs will bring a large price in May and June. Horses that are not worked, will do very well on hay alone, watered twice a day and groomed twice a week; if worked they must be groomed daily and fed liberally.

Profitable employment will be found on a great many farms in building a suitable place to store ice enough to last through the summer; two essential points are that the ice shall be properly protected from the atmosphere and supplied with drainage; few substances are better to protect it than wheat chaff packed between the ice and the wall, and a row of fence rails laid on the ground and covered with a foot of straw will supply drainage; a room ten feet square will be found large enough, and if a little care is taken in its construction will last a lifetime; the house should be kept in a well shaded place.

there has been no record kept for the year, make preparation to keep one next year; get a strong-bound blank book, and make the entries every night, or once a week; this will not take much time, and the satisfaction it will afford for reference, will amply repay all trouble. If there is a Farmers' Club in the neighborhood attend it, by all means; and if there is no such gathering you can start one by calling your neighbors to meet on a certain evening at your house, and organize by selecting a president and secretary. The subjects for discussion should embrace everything in connection with your business, such as improved stock, implements, new crops, better seed and prices; a collection of catalogues from seedsmen and implement makers will afford a groundwork for discussion.

Stock of all kinds require the farmer's daily, personal attention. The cold weather is apt to induce carelessness, and they frequently want water and exercise. Make it a point to give all a daily airing for an hour or two,—young cattle should have more,—keep them constantly growing by sufficient food and exercise. See that horses are well shod and caulked as soon as icy weather comes. Keep the cow stables clean, and give plenty of ventilation, but avoid cold drafts. Fattening hogs must be kept gaining all the time or else every quart of corn consumed detracts from the profits, stimulate their appetites by a variety of food and change in its preparation; corn should be either ground, boiled, or soaked; potatoes also should be cooked and salted and fed while warm; have the pens supplied with plenty of litter, that there may be no waste of the animal heat, as it is cheaper to keep this up by warm pens than to compel the hogs to generate it from their feed; have them killed by Christmas or soon after, as it costs more to keep them fattening during the very cold weather. In slaughtering use a long thin-bladed knife, and drive it in well towards the heart.

THIS is the season when most farmers have little to do after feeding stock for the day; the frozen ground and cold winds putting a stop to out-door work, and the man without ambition will set by the stove or fire-place and doze away the time in idleness. But there is profitable employment for this month as well as the rest of the year. If a dairy has been kept it will be a great satisfaction to go over it and note the mistakes that have been made and the points gained. If

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be enclosed. Can be registered on prepayment of 3d additional by stamps; if name and address of sender be written on parcel should it fail of delivery, it will be returned to sender unopened.

POSTAGE STAMPS.

Can be had at the General Post office, Ch'town, during office hours. Letters to be registered must be posted at least *half an hour previous* to the closing of the mail by which they are to be sent; the postage, as well as the registration fee, *must be prepaid*. The registration of a letter to any place in this Island, British North America, United States, or the United Kingdom, is six-pence currency.

*Attention to the following remarks, by those who are in the habit of sending money by mail, is strongly recommended:*

Registration is applicable to all description of letters and parcels, whether they contain articles of value or not. Registration is not an absolute guarantee against the miscarriage or loss of a letter; but a registered letter can be traced, when one unregistered can not, and the posting and delivery or non-delivery can be proven. A registered letter is thus secured against many of the casualties which, from incorrect address, forgetfulness of the receiver, or other error, may affect an unregistered letter against actual dishonesty on the part of the Post Office employees; a registered letter is incomparably more secure than an unregistered one—an unregistered letter leaves no trace behind it, whilst passing in the great stream of ordinary correspondence, though its presence as a money letter, and the nature of its contents, are, to any person accustomed to handle letters, as manifest as though the letter had been singled out and marked by the registered stamp. If the consequences were limited to the mere risk of the loss of the money so sent, the senders of money in unregistered letters might reasonably urge, that if they choose to encounter the risk, they are free to do so; but higher considerations are involved, and the chance of loss to the careless remitter is really but the smallest part of the evil associated with the practice. The department has gone to a great deal of trouble and expense to ensure as far as is possible the sure and safe transmission of money by mail—the safest mode of remitting is by *money orders*,—where there are no money order offices, the *registration system* is available.

**STATISTICS, &c., RELATING TO P. E. ISLAND.**

Prince Edward Island contains an area of about 1,250,000 acres, nearly all of which is fit for cultivation. It is divided into three Counties and 67 Townships. The population is about 100,000—of whom about 45,000 are in Queen's County. The population of Prince and King's Counties is nearly equal. Charlottetown, the Capital of the Island, is in Queen's County, and contains about 8000 inhabitants. Responsible Government was granted in 1851. The number of Schools now in operation is 360, attended by about 14,000 children. In 1852, when the present Free Education Act was passed, the number was 160. There are beside the Prince of Wales College (public,) and St. Dunstan's College (Roman Catholic,) the Wesleyan Day School (Denominational,) a County Grammar School in Georgetown, Summerside and Charlottetown, and 15 similar Schools throughout other parts of the Island. The whole cost of public Instruction, which is under the control of a Board of Education, consisting of nine Members and two Examiners, is defrayed out of the general revenue. There is a School Visitor for each County, who reports to the Board and the latter to the Government. By the census of 1861, there were on the Island—856 Threshing Machines, 3 Tobacco Factories, 89 Fishing Establishments, 141 Grist Mills, 46 Carding Mills, 176 Saw Mills, 9 Fulling and Dressing Mills, 48 Lime-kilns, 9 Brick-kilns, 159 Churches, 55 Tanneries, 20 Breweries and 1,239 Fishing Boats. The number of Sleighs and Carriages manufactured that year was 1,151. There were grown or manufactured in 1860—

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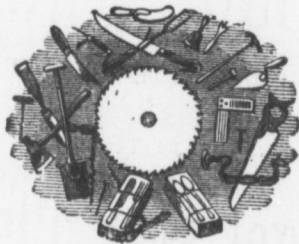
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
