

MINUTES OF CONFERENCE

HELD IN

THE METHODIST CHURCH IN STANSTEAD,

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC.

Organization of Conference, June 16th, 1880.

THE SEVENTH SESSION of the MONTREAL ANNUAL CON FERENCE of the Methodist Church of Canada was opened in the Methodist Church in Stanstead, Province of Quebec, on Wednesday, the 16th day of June, 1880, at 10 a.m., the President, the Rev. GEORGE MCRITCHIE, being in the chair.

The PRESIDENT announced the 490th hymn, after which the Rev. T. G. WILLIAMS, Secretary, read the 19th Psalm and the 4th chapter of 2nd Corinthians, and the Revs. R. WHITING and G. H. DAVIS led in prayer.

The SECRETARY called the Conference roll, and one hundred and sixteen responded to their names.

The Conference proceeded to the election by ballot of a President, whereupon the Rev. WILLIAM HANSFORD was chosen.

The PRESIDENT briefly addressed the Conference, and directed them to proceed to the election of a Secretary.

The ballot resulted in the election of the Rev. T. G. WILLIAMS.

The SECRETARY nominated the Revs. M. L. PEARSON and JAMES KINES, Assistant Secretaries; and the Rev. WILLIAM PHILP as Journal Secretary.

These nominations were confirmed by the Conference.

I.-JOHN B. SELLEY, M.D.

The Rev. John B. Selley, M.D., was born in Devonshire, England, on the 9th of June, 1808. His parents belonged to the Episcopal Church, in which it appears he received his early religious training. When brought under deep convictions about his spiritual interests, he was led, by the word of God and earnest prayer, to a full surrender of himself to the Lord The peace of God filled his soul, and enjoying the blessing of a renewed heart, he went on his way rejoicing. At the age of twenty-two years he united himself with the Wesleyan Methodist Church in his native land, and two years later was received and employed as a Local Preacher. Having been accepted by the authorities of the Church for the itinerant work, he was, on the 27th day of August, 1836, ordained at Portsmouth by the Rev. Dr. Alder, and on the day following sailed in company with that truly apostolic man, the late Rev. Dr. W. M. Harvard, under whose superintendency he received his first appointment in the city of Montreal. The next year he was stationed on the Old Shefford Circuit, and subsequently he laboured in various parts of the great mission field, being employed a part of the time in the West Indies. In many of those circuits and missions he laboured with energy, acceptance, and success, some of the fruit of his zeal and faithfulness in the Master's service remaining to the present time. Under the influence of growing bodily infirmities, he took a superannuated relation in 1856.

In natural talents, culture, and intelligence Dr. Selley was far above the average—ardent in manner, energetic in work, sympathizing in spirit, generous-hearted, and brotherly; strongly attached to the Methodist doctrines, church, and usages, and in the pulpit able, zealous, and eloquent. In his later years he found increasing interest, profit, and delight in the reading and study of the word of God, in relation to which he has recorded this testimony :—" It has never failed to afford me what I have

endeavoured in faith to seek in it,—peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ, joy in the Holy Ghost, and a blessed hope of immortality and eternal life." On the 10th of May, 1880, at Exeter, Ontario, he departed this life rejoicing in God his Saviour, and uttering among his last words, "Thank the Lord. Praise—praise—glory-glory."

2.—JAMES E. WERDEN.

Our brother, the subject of this short notice, was born of Christian parents, in the Township of Sophiasburg, Prince Edward County, Ontario, August 21st, 1847.

In his seventeenth year he sought and obtained a clear Scriptural evidence of his acceptance with God, which he retained till he departed to be with Christ. Having united with the Wesleyan Methodist Church, he began to labour in the capacity of a Sabbath-school teacher, and held inquiry meetings in his father's house, and was soon placed by the Church on the list of local preachers; and being impressed that God had called to ahim more extended field of usefulness, he was not disobedient to the heavenly vision, but offered himself as a candidate for our ministry in 1871. Four years later he was ordained, at the first Conference after the division, which was held in the city of Kingston. In the winter following he was united in marriage with Miss Hannah Scales, in whom he found a most exemplary Christian companion. Brother Werden was an average preacher studet, diligennt, kind pastor, husband, and father, and a most exemplary Christian. He preached holiness, lived it, and went down to the grave with an untarnished character.

In the winter of 1879 he caught a cold, which developed into consumption, and terminated fatally November 6th, 1879, at his last field of labour, on Amherst Island.

3.---Alfred E. Jaques.

Brother Jaques was born in Montreal, on the 19th March, 1851, of devoted Methodist parents. He was converted to God in the days of his youth, and immediately he entered heartily into Sabbath-school work, and other openings of usefulness in connection with St. James Street Methodist Church, Montreal. By the grace of God he was enabled to maintain a consistent course to the end of his life. His path was that of the just, shining more and more unto the perfect day.

After labouring some time as an evangelist, he was received as a candidate for the ministry of the Methodist Church, in the year 1877. He went cheerfully to any field where the Church appointed him, and laboured with acceptance in the work of preaching Christ until failing health compelled him to retire. During some months of wasting affliction he was most graciously sustained by divine help, terminating, as he had lived, a career of trust upon the atoning merits of Christ. His end was peace. He died on the 28th day of April, 1880.

4.—JABEZ BUNTING KEOUGH

Was born in the Province of Quebec, in 1829; was converted to God at the early age of ten years; entered the ministry in 1854, and entered into rest on the 27th of December, 1879.

When quite young he found his way to Toronto, and at once made many friends among the Methodists by his fervour in prayer, usefulness in the Sunday-school, and readiness to engage in any Christian labour that presented itself. At that time the Rev. James Caughey was preaching in Toronto; Brother Keough attended all the services, taking an active part, and during the day, while at work, conversing with his fellow-workmen on the subject of their salvation. It was at this time he received his anointing for his life-work, and fully consecrated himself to the After spending some time at Victoria College, he was Lord. recommended by friends, who saw in him promises of usefulness, to give himself wholly to the work of the Lord. For a quarter of a century he continued his labours, chiefly in the Ottawa District, having charge of many of the principal Circuits. On all his Circuits God was with him, giving him grace in the eyes of the people. Where he has preached, the people revere his name, and speak of him with the warmest affection and

esteem. Brother Keough was a faithful minister of the Lord Jesus Christ, a devoted pastor, an excellent administrator, a wise counsellor and a true friend. No interest of the Church was allowed to suffer from want of care or promptness on his part. His record is unimpeachable, and speaks of parsonages and churches built, Connexional funds increased, sinners converted and believers confirmed.

His home-life was happy and affectionate. He was blessed with a wife who always took the deepest interest in her husband's work, and who promoted to the utmost of her ability all his plans. She and five children now mourn the loss of a devoted husband and kind father. Brother Keough received his last appointment in 1879 to the old L'Orignal Circuit. Early in December he was stricken down by disease and was conscious only at intervals till the day of his death. His brother, Rev. Thomas Keough, of the Toronto Conference, with some very intimate friends, were summoned. To them he spoke of peace in Christ and assurance of acceptance through His merits, then quietly passed away to be forever at rest.

5.—JOSEPH LITTLE.

Moved by the Rev. William Scott, seconded by the Rev. James Elliott, D.D., and *Resolved*, That although the relation of the late Brother Joseph Little to the Conference was not such as to give him a place in the record of deceased ministers, yet the special services of Brother Little in many parts of our work entitle him to the grateful remembrance of the Conference; and we hereby express our high appreciation of his zealous and successful efforts, giving thanks to God for the abundant grace shown in him; and while expressing submission to the Divine will, greatly regret that we can no more see his genial counte nance or be profitted by his zealous labours for Christ and his cause; and that the foregoing be published in the Minutes of Conference. 1880.]

REPORT OF SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee desire to express their gratitude to the Great Head of the Church for the marked progress that is visible in the work of the past year. It is exceedingly gratifying to know that 742 conversions have been reported, an increase of 45 over the last report, and that 2,340 of our scholars are meeting in class. Although the number of preaching places reported is less than last year, the schools have not diminished, and there has been an increase of 553 scholars, together with a marked improvement in average attendance.

Your Committee are pleased to find an increase in the circulation of PLEASANT HOURS and the Berean Leaves, but regret that there is a decrease in the circulation of the BANNER.

Your Committee would recommend to the Church the importance of a thorough training of the children in our distinctive doctrines, and to this end would urge that greater attention be given to the study of the Catechisms.

Your Committee are pleased to know that greater attention is being paid to the subject of Temperance, and would recommend that S. S. Temperance meetings be held, and the pledge circulated as widely as possible, both in reference to intoxicating drinks and tobacco.

We are glad to find that our Sabbath-schools are taking a deep interest in missionary work. This is evident from the fact that the sum of \$3,772 was collected during the year—an increase of \$411.

Your Committee in examining the schedules, regret to observe that in connection with 273 preaching places, no schools are reported, and would call the attention of the Superintendents of Circuits to this fact, believing that if attention were given to this matter, great improvement would result.

Your Committee recommend that the Rev. William Hall, M.A., be re-appointed Treasurer of the General S. S. Fund.

METHODIST CONFERENCE.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE WORK.

Your Committee deeply regret to report a decrease of 286 in the membership of the Church during the year. There is cause for deep humiliation and earnest heart-searching before God that we have not been able to accomplish all the good that our position and advantages would warrant us in expecting. Two or three thousand souls, rescued from sin and brought into the communion of God's people during the year, is certainly a grand thing, and should receive due prominence; but, what are these among so many ministers and laymen engaged in the active work of Christ? It is proper, however, to notice that the decrease in the membership is owing largely to removals from our own Conference to the North-West and the United States. It is a pleasing feature in the work that so much good has been done in connection with the Sabbath-schools of our Church during the year. About 740 children and young people have been converted through the aid of this valuable instrumentality.

Your Committee are of opinion that more vigorous efforts should be made to render the regular means of grace more interesting and profitable, and that something special should be done in every District and Circuit to improve the official status of local preachers and class-leaders, and that concentrated efforts should be made in those places most promising for revival services. There are many Circuits in our work where local help is very feeble and inefficient, and it becomes almost absolutely necessary to bring in foreign aid in order to accomplish anything. No assistance will be so valuable in such cases as that which the ministers on the District can render. Brethren stationed in such places are often discouraged by the chilly atmosphere of the Church, who would be inspirited to do something worthy of themselves if brethren occupying more favourable places would, at suitable times, come to their aid.

It is our opinion that the class-meeting should receive more attention by ministers. A means of grace which has

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so largely conserved the piety of the Methodist Church as class-meeting, should be guarded with the utmost care and diligence. If the brethren will only use the class meeting to accomplish all the good it is intended to do, the Church will make far more rapid progress than ever. Now, more than at any other time, the members of the Church are looking to the ministers for example and instruction in reference to class meeting. Since the discussion of this subject in the last General Conference, the disposition to neglect class has become more apparent, and much depends upon prominence being given by the ministers to this means of grace as to its usefulness in the future. We deem it also advisable to call attention to the fruit of revival services. More care should be taken of new converts than is generally Too often those who have been converted are left to done. themselves at the close of special services, and the painful consequences is, that often many of them wander away from the means of grace and from God.

Your Committee deplore the existence of large Church debts, and the injurious effects of these upon the general work of the Church, and do most sincerely urge the greatest care and prudence in incurring debt in building Churches. Many congregations are crippled and paralyzed for many years, if not for all time, by unmanageable financial burdens. These things largely tend to drive some people away from the Church, and often hinder others from entering her communion.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your Committee submit the following for your adoption : That we are as firmly persuaded as ever that it is the duty of all Christians to abstain from all intoxicating drinks, and by all lawful means to aid in securing the suppression of the liquor traffic, which we believe to be the

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cause of that man-degrading and God-dishonouring sin of drunkenness, out of which flows the greater proportion of the crimes committed in our country.

That as the Canada Temperance Act is now, by the judgment of the Supreme Court, declared to be valid and in full force, we believe it offers to the country the most complete and effectual measure for the suppression of this evil that has existed in our country; and we would therefore urge all our people to aid in its adoption wherever it is submitted for enactment.

That the attempt made in the last session of the Dominion Parliament to change the majority required for its adoption, meets with our strongest disapproval, and we record our thanks to those members of the House of Commons and of the Senate whose loyalty to right in this case secured its defeat.

To this matter of attendance your Trustee Board desire to draw special attention. If a few more boarders could be secured, the Institution would be in a much more prosperous condition. As this is a matter of vital importance, the Trustee Board does most earnestly request the kind offices of the ministers in spreading information about the Institution, and in securing students.

In reference to the Boarding Department, there is much reason for satisfaction. The diet has been wholesome. tables have been well spread. The rooms are furnished with stoves, and are comfortable. The Steward is both diligent and competent.

Your Trustees regret very much to say that the usual Government Grant has been greatly reduced. This has caused us a good deal of anxiety, and has materially affected

the College. However, an effort has been made to recover the Grant, and it is confidently hoped that the effort will be successful.

Concerning the future of the College, your Trustees are most desirous that the Institution should do a good and a great work in the country.

Your Trustees are anxious that some provision should be made for the sons and daughters of the ministers. In this Province, of meagre educational advantages, it is most needful that the Church should endeavour to aid the brethren on poor out-of-the-way Missions in educating their families.

Also, it is exceedingly desirable that by some means a revenue should be secured to the Institution. It is evident that while in this very Province other Protestant denominations have well-endowed Institutions, we cannot hope to take any educational stand or attain to any educational status without an endowment.

In view of all these interests and circumstances, your Trustees most respectfully and most earnestly solicit the patient consideration and the fervent prayers of this body of Christian ministers.

We desire you to join with us in thanksgiving to God for His great mercies in the past, and to join with us in prayer that we may be guided in shaping the future of the Institution. Honoured brethren, we most sincerely ask your aid that we may be enabled to build up the College in Moral, Educational and Financial strength. It is our hope and expectation that the Institution will soon cease to be a burden, and will soon become an auxiliary and an inspiration to the Church in her efforts to promote knowledge and a Christian civilization in this Province.

We ask your prayers and kind offices in behalf of the College.

We thank God and take courage.

Resolved,—That the Conference be hereby recommended to instruct and authorize the Chairman and Financial Secretary of the Pembroke District, with the German Missionary stationed on said District, with the sanction of the next Annual Missionary Committee Meeting for this Conference, after the Central Board has been consulted by the representatives of the Annual Conference on the Central Board, to conduct the negotiations necessary to transfer our German work to the "Evangelical Association," so far as found expedient, by the end of the present Conference year.

SABBATH DESECRATION.

Moved by Rev. R. M. Hammond, seconded by Rev. W. D. Brown, and

Resolved,—That whereas this Conference views the desecration of the Lord's Day as being contrary to all correct Christian teaching, and as opening the door to much evil; and whereas the frequent running on the Sabbath of steamboats and railway trains, for business or pleasure, seems to indicate a growing tendency in this direction, we strongly deprecate such Sabbath desecration, and respectfully and earnestly request our people to discountenance this evil by every means in their power, and promote, as far as possible. a healthy public sentiment on this important question.

CONNEXIONAL FUNDS.

Moved by Rev. George Douglas, LL.D., seconded by Rev. Hugh Johnston, M.A., B.D., and

Resolved,—That this Conference deprecates the system which is gradually obtaining, of leaving the amounts to be contributed by the Circuit or Mission to the Connexional Funds entirely in the hands of the Official Board, and recommends that an effort be made to secure in all our churches the presentation of the claims of these funds from the pulpit."

THEOLOGICAL INSTITUTIONS.

Moved by Rev. J. Elliott, D.D., seconded by the Rev. J. Borland, and

Resolved,—That we have heard with great satisfaction the reports of the Theological Colleges. We rejoice in the increasing facilities afforded our young men for the attainment of a superior education; and we suggest the propriety of District Meetings urging our young men to avail themselves of the privileges now within their reach, and also that we impress upon our people the necessity of liberality in support of our educational institutions.

REGISTRATION, &C., PROVINCE OF QUEBEC.

Moved by the Rev. J. T. Pitcher, seconded by the Rev. William Scott, and

Resolved,—That in view of the embarrassing uncertainty as to the law and forms of registration of acts of civil status in the Province of Quebec, we request that the Rev. W. I. Shaw, LL.B., and J. J. Maclaren, Esq., Q.C., be a Special Committee to furnish the Conference with the information and forms required in the premises.

INDIANS AT OKA.

Moved by Rev. E. A. Ward, seconded by the Rev. William Ryan, and

Resolved,—That the President of the General Conference be requested to issue a circular in behalf of the Indians at Oka, in reference to the aid so necessary in defraying the expenses incurred in the suits at law now engaged against them.

EXEMPTION OF CHILDREN UNDER TWELVE YEARS OF AGE.

Moved by Rev. H. F. Bland, seconded by Rev. J. Elliott'

Resolved,—That all persons under twelve years of age eligible for Church Membership shall be exempt from the operation of the Children's Fund Tax, and that a column be reserved for children under that age.

Resolved,—That this Conference requires that every minister changing Circuits be responsible for the pulpit work on the Circuit which he is leaving until after the second Sabbath after the close of Conference.

Financial and other Returns.

Whereas the Financial Returns sent from the Districts to the Conference are frequently incomplete and incorrect, making it quite impossible to compile perfect and accurate tabular statements for the Minutes of Conference; it was

Resolved,—(1) That the Financial and District Secretaries be required to have their accounts and tabular statements audited and certified as correct before handing them to the Conference authorities.

(2) That the Secretary of Conference, when sending the books for the May District Meetings, shall call the attention of the Chairman to the above resolution.

(3) That this Conference direct the Financial Secretaries to settle with the Treasurers of the several Funds on the basis of the returns in the District Financial Schedule, and the Treasurer of each fund to affix his signature underneath the total sum, in attestation of its agreement with his account; and that the Statistic Committee compile the returns for the printed minutes from these attested Schedules only.

Treasurer and Financial Secretaries.

Resolved,—That it shall be required of every Financial Secretary. either by himself or by a proxy, to meet the Treasurers of the several Connexional Funds, to report the receipts of their respective Districts, on Tuesday, at two o'clock p.m., the day before the annual meeting of the Conference.

Income of Domestic Missions.

Resolved,—That the Financial District Meeting shall examine into the circumstances and probable income of Domestic Missions, in the same way as in respect to Circuits, and suggest the amount that should be appropriated for the support or assistance of such Missions.

Chairmen and Domestic Missions.

Resolved,—That the Chairmen of Districts forward to the Missionary Secretaries the amount recommended by the several September Financial District Meetings for the Domestic Missions, as soon as practicable after the close of each meeting.

Probationers Attending College.

Resolved,—That in all cases when Probationers, who have travelled four years, are then allowed by the Conference to attend College, their reception into full connexion and their ordination are thereby deferred.

The Book-Room.

Resolved,—That every Minister and Preacher is henceforth peremptorily required to settle his account with the Book Steward at or before the meeting of Conference.

Resolved,—Should any Minister or Preacher, having claims on the Connexional Funds, fail to pay up his account with the office as above directed, it shall be the duty of the Book Steward annually to draw upon the Treasurer of any of those funds an amount not exceeding one-fourth of the claim of the brother on such fund towards the payment of his debt; and the Treasurer of such fund is hereby directed to honour such drafts when presented.

Superannuated Ministers' Fund.

Resolved,—That whereas the rule requires that all widows, claimants on the Superannuated Ministers' Fund, shall be members of our Church; therefore it shall be the duty of the Chairman of each Annual District Meeting to make

inquiries into the case of widows residing within their respective bounds, as to their membership, and report the fact annually to the Conference.

Systematic Beneficence.

Resolved,—That this Conference earnestly recommends each of its Ministers to bring the subject of Systematic Beneficence before the Congregation under his charge at least once a year.

Youth of the Church.

Resolved,—That whereas provision is made in the Discipline for the spiritual culture and welfare of the children of our Congregations; and whereas, notwithstanding, in too many instances they are permitted to wander away from the fold to which they legitimately belong, and are either lost in the world or become absorbed in other churches, the claims of the children, as provided for in the Discipline, should be wisely and conscientiously responded to.

French Missions.

Resolved,—That our French Missionaries be required, before taking up or continuing any English work, to obtain the expressed sanction of their own Chairman and the English Superintendent within the bounds of whose Circuit or Mission the proposed work is situated, as well as that of the Chairman of the English District.

COURSE OF STUDY

TO BE

PURSUED BY CANDIDATES FOR THE MINISTRY OF THE METHODIST CHURCH OF CANADA.

Preliminary.—English Branches : English Grammar and Composition, Arithmetic, Geography, Ancient History (Schmitz'), Modern History (Collier's British Empire). Biblical History : New Testament History (Smith's). Theology : Wesley's Sermons, i. to lii. ; Wesley on Christian Perfection.

The standard of qualification for young men recommended to be received into our Conferences as Probationers shall not be lower than fifty per cent. of the marks on the Preliminary Course of Study.

Any Candidate who may present a public school teacher's certificate of the second class, or a certificate of having passed a matriculation examination at any of our Universities, shall not be required to be examined on the English branches of the Preliminary Course; but he shall be required to pass an examination on the subjects of Biblical History and Theology two and three, Preliminary Course--before the Examining Board of his Conference, or for the College at which he may be pursuing his studies.

First Year.—Biblical Introduction (Angus' Hand-book, Pt. i.); Biblical History (Smith's Old Testament History); Theology, (Fletcher's Checks, Chaps. i. to v.)

Second Year.—Exegesis (Wesley's and Watson's Notes on Matthew; Wesley's and Whedon's Notes on John); Church History (Kurtz' History of the Church to the Reformation, Stevens' History of Methodism to the death of Wesley); Theology, (Watson's Institutes, Part ii., Chaps. i. to xvii.)

Third Year.—Exegesis (Wesley's and Whedon's Notes on Romans); Rhetoric (Whately's); Church History (Fisher's History of the Reformation); Theology (Watson's Institutes, Part ii., Chap. xviii. to the end); Pearson on the Creed.

Fourth Year.—Theology (Watson's Institutes, Parts iii. and iv.); Apologetics (Hopkins' Evidence of Christianity; Garbett's

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Dogmatic Faith); Logic (Whately's); Metaphysics, Hamilton (Bowman's American Edition); Stewart's Active and Moral Powers; Discipline of the Methodist Church of Canada.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR GRADUATES IN ARTS.

Candidates who have proceeded to a degree in Arts, or who may do so prior to Ordination, shall pursue the following Course of Study :---

Preliminary.-Theology (Wesley's Sermons, i. to lii.; Wesley on Christian Perfection); Biblical History (Smith's New Testament).

First Year.—Biblical Introduction (Angus' Hand-book, Part i.); Theology, (Fletcher's Checks, i. to v.)

Second Year.—Biblical History (Smith's Old Testament); Theology (Garbett's Dogmatic Faith); Hopkins' Evidences of Christianity.

Third Year.—Exegesis (Gospels of Matthew and John in Greek; Wesley's, Watson's, and Whedon's Notes on Matthew and John); Church History (Kurtz' History of the Church to the Reformation); Theology (Watson's Institutes, Part ii, chaps. i. to xvii. inclusive, and Parts iii. and iv.)

Fourth Year.—Exegesis (Epistles to the Romans in Greek; Wesley and Whedon's Notes on Romans); Church History (Fisher's History of the Reformation; Stevens' History of Methodism to the death of Wesley); Theology (Watson's Institutes, Part ii., chap. xviii. to the end); Discipline of the Methodist Church of Canada.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR PROBATIONERS AT COLLEGE.

All Candidates on Probation, except Undergraduates in Arts, who are recognized by their Annual Conference as such, on being appointed to College, shall pursue the following Course of Study :

First Year.—Systematic Theology; Exegesis; the Greek Language; Homiletical Studies; Rhetoric and the English

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Language; Logic; Church History; Hebrew, or Natural Science.

Second Year.—Systematic Theology; Exegesis of the New Testament in Greek; Homiletical Studies and Elocution; Metaphysics; Church History; Hebrew, or Natural Science.

Third Year.—Historical Theology; Exegesis of the New Testament in Greek; Homiletical Studies; Ethics and Evidences; Old Testament Exegesis, or Natural Science.

The option allowed in No. 5 each year shall be determined by the Faculty of Theology according to their judgment of the circumstances and ability of the student.

COURSE OF STUDY FOR CANDIDATES FOR THE GERMAN WORK.

All Candidates, before being recommended to the Conference to be received on trial, shall pass a satisfactory examination in the following subjects :---

Preliminary.—Elements of German Grammar; Nast's Larger Catechism; The Calverin Church History; The Discipline of the Methodist Church of Canada.

After admission on trial, they shall be examined each year during their probation as follows :—

First Year.—Jacoby's Compends of Doctrines and Scripture Proofs; Wesley's Sermons, Vol. i.; Hare on Justification; Kurtz' Sacred History; Webster's General History; Wurst's Grammar.

Second Year.—Wesley's Sermons, Vol. ii. ; Wesley on Christian Perfection ; Fletcher's Appeal ; Saucer's Church History ; Wurst's Grammar.

Third Year.—Nast's Introduction to the New Testament; Lisco's Exposition of the Creed; Nast's Wesley and his Coadjutors; Pearson on Infidelity; Ahn's First Course of English.

Fourth Year.—Warren's Logic ; Luthard's Apologetics ; Harless' Christian Ethics ; Ahn's Second Course of English.

The Candidates shall present a written sermon each year on some subject embraced in the course of study.

In addition to the usual thorough Theological Examination of Candidates before the District Meeting, the Chairman shall examine each Candidate as to his Studies and General Reading for the year, with a view to giving advice as to his course and method of study. No Candidate shall be allowed the year of probation until the studies for that year are completed.

The examination of Candidates shall be held in each District, under the supervision of the Chairman and the Examiners resident on the District, on the third Wednesday in April in each year; and at such place as the Chairman

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shall appoint. All papers shall be sent by the Examiners to the Chairmen not later than the second Wednesday in April in each year. The answers to the papers shall be sent by the Chairman to the respective Examiners, who shall forward to the Secretary of the Board the valuation. The Secretary shall prepare the certificates, and forward them to the Chairman of the District, to be presented by him to the May District Meeting. The Secretary of the Board shall send the Chairman of each District the name of any Candidate or Probationer who may have taken part of the subjects in any given course, and the standing he has attained, but shall not issue the certificate in any year's course until the Candidate or Probationer has completed it; and, further, no certificate shall be issued unless the Candidate has reached the passing point of thirty-five per cent. in each subject, and an average of fifty per cent. in all subjects, except in cases where the papers have failed to come to hand.

STANDING REGULATIONS RESPECTING CANDIDATES.

Every person before being received as a full Local Preacher shall have previously laboured at least three months as an Exhorter, and three months on trial as Local Preacher; and no Candidate for our Itinerancy shall be recommended by a Quarterly Meeting to a District Meeting, who has not laboured at least three months as a full Local Preacher.

No Candidate shall be recommended by any District Meeting, to be received on trial for that year, who does not produce a certificate from the Examining Committee of the District to which he belongs. But the cases of all young men on trial shall be reported to their respective District Meetings.

All recommendations of Candidates to be received on

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trial shall be made at the February Quarterly Official Meeting, and the Candidates recommended shall appear before the next meeting of the Examining Committee of the District to which they belong.

If in any given year the number of Candidates recommended by the District Meeting shall be greater than the Stationing Committee deem it prudent to employ for that year, the Examining Board shall meet at Conference, and determine who are the most suitable to be employed for our Itinerant work, and who are to be placed on the List of Reserve; being governed by their own class lists and those of the District Meetings.

The District Meeting shall examine, as heretofore, all the Candidates in regard to their religious experience and belief of our doctrines, together with their general qualifications and suitability for our Itinerant work, and shall arrange them in three classes, according to the results of the Examination.

The Conference requires Candidates for our Ministry to preach a Trial Sermon before the District Meeting by which they are recommended, or before a Committee appointed by the District Meeting, who shall report their opinion on the sermon, and embody it in the recommendation of such Candidate to the Conterence.

Nothing in our present Course of Study shall be understood to prevent a District Meeting, in special cases, from recommending a Candidate to the Conference for reception on trial, after examination by the Chairman, before the District Meeting, on the subject of the preliminary Course of Study.

PASTORAL ADDRESS

OF THE

MINISTERS OF THE MONTREAL CONFERENCE

TO THE

CHURCHES UNDER THEIR CARE.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,-

"We are bound to give thanks alway to God for you, brethren beloved of the Lord, because God hath from the beginning chosen you to salvation through sanctification of the Spirit and belief of the truth : whereunto He called you by our Gospel, to the obtaining of the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ."

Our relation to you, as they that must give account for your souls, causes us mingled feelings of hope and fear, joy and anxiety. Amid the peculiar dangers to which you are exposed, we watch over you at times with grave concern, and again with exultant joy. You will bear with us as, assembled once more in Annual Conference, we counsel you regarding those perils to which you are exposed, and strive to provoke you to good works. "God is our record how greatly we long after you in Christ Jesus. And this we pray, that your love may abound yet more and more in knowledge and in all judgment; that ye may approve things that are excellent; that ye may be sincere and without offence till the day of Christ; being filled with the fruits of righteousness, which are by Jesus Christ, unto the glory and

praise of God." First and chiefly, we counsel you above all things to aid in maintaining the spiritual life and efficiency of our Church. Samson robbed of his strength was not more the derision of enemies than would be Methodism if stripped of its spiritual power. The evil prophecy repeated for more than a century is still occasionally heard, that this work will come to nought, and that Methodism will gradually lose its spiritual and aggressive force, and decline. It is sufficient for strengthening our faith and cheering our hearts that statistics show that never has Methodism grown so rapidly as during the present period of its history, and never have greater liberality and enterprise been manifested in maintaining the operations of our Church. But just here may be our peril. We see the danger that arises from vast numbers, costly structures, increasing influence in society, educational activity, and an organization that is encompassing the globe-the danger of piety being superseded by ecclesiasticism, of our measuring our usefulness by mere external evidences of strength. To our organization and Connexional polity we believe you, with us, are becoming increasingly attached, for the reason that they seem best adapted to the most effective work for Christ and humanity. \mathbf{At} the same time, we will do wisely to mark our peril so as to avoid it, and to remember the message sent from Heaven to cheer Zerubbabel in restoring the temple at Jerusalem, "Not by might nor by power, but by my Spirit, saith the Lord of hosts." How then shall we avoid this peril, silence our adversaries, and fulfil the gracious design of Providence concerning us? We reply, by maintaining simplicity, tenderness, and warmth of piety. Let religion be the chief business of your lives. Make all plans subordinate to the great object of saving yourselves and saving others.

Give a prominent place in the religious life to the Holy Scriptures, interpreting them neither by too bare and severe a literalness, nor, on the other hand, by such a vapid spirituality as eliminates all substantial truth. Remember the Word of God not only contains a revelation, but is *the* revelation of God, the only revelation to meet the great emer

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gency of sin. Revere its substance without worshipping its letter, and maintain the integrity of the letter as far as you can without narrowness of judgment or of heart. Use the Bible as its precious contents indicate, as a guide to truth and duty, as nourishment for developing true spiritual life and manhood, and as a wellspring of comfort in all care and sorrow.

For the promotion of our Christian life we need further the constant maintenance of the spirit of prayer, and the regular observance of seasons of prayer. Brethren, in love for your souls we ask, Have you a relish for this holy exercise? Is family prayer marked by earnest devotion and fervour, or is it often excluded by secular activity? Is the Master's command observed, "Enter into thy closet and shut the door, and pray to thy Father which is in secret, and thy Father which seeth in secret shall reward thee openly?" If three times a day you open the windows of your soul towards heaven, and let life-giving light pour into the chambers of your heart from the skies, you may be assured that Daniel's God will be your guide and guard, however high and honourable and responsible may be your position. May the God of Elijah and of Fletcher make you men and women of prayer !

We remind you again of the ordinances of the Church as a most important means of grace. With the holy sacraments of Baptism and the Eucharist, it is our aim to have associated holy and solemn influences, without marring the simplicity of these ordinances with any element of superstition or sacerdotalism. Still, while reverently recognizing the supreme divine authority attaching to these sacred institutions, we feel justified in zealously maintaining those social means of grace, prudentially established, which have made our Church a spiritual home to so many millions. Especially do we counsel you to observe a regular attendance at the Class-meeting, without which Methodism, in the opinion both of friends and foes, would, by losing "the spirit of testimony," rapidly decline in power and usefulness. We

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exhort you to this, not so much through anxiety to keep a rule as to save your souls. We thus counsel you because we are convinced that while, without this specific means of grace, other denominations may give evidences of Christian life and enterprise, for us at least this means of grace is essential. We cannot afford to allow it to decline. If you complain that your class is lacking in interest, remedy the evil by doing what you can to increase its interest by regular attendance and prayerful activity. You will bear in mind, brethren, that while we exhort you to the cultivation of personal piety by the various means we have mentioned, it is that you, being fully consecrated to God and His service, may follow the example of the primitive Christians, who went everywhere abroad and declared the Word, and thus by personal effort help to raise the Church to the full standard of purity and power. While we gratefully recognize the marks of Divine approval accompanying revivalistic agency, we still urge upon you greater fidelity to the ordinary means of grace. Then shall revivals and conversions abound. Then shall we teach transgressors the way, and sinners shall be converted. Then "shall the Lord create upon every dwelling-place of Mount Zion, and upon her assemblies, a cloud and smoke by day, and the shining of a flaming fire by night : and upon all the glory

In the next place, we exhort you to "hold fast the form of sound words" which you have heard, that great body of doctrinal truth contained in the Holy Scriptures, which has been providentially preserved from the earliest ages, notwithstanding the corruptions and superstitions of the Church, and the hostility and scepticism of the world. We live in times when our chief danger is not from sectarianism, but from doctrinal laxity. Through mistaken ideas of independence, and through a pernicious love of novelty, there is a growing tendency to tamper with essential truth, and overthrow the foundation of our faith. We do not ignore the danger of an uncharitable and dead orthodoxy. Such an evil is most pernicious, but greater, we

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think, is our peril to-day of being so misled by superficial, or even by learned and plausible speculation, as to betray the great vital truths which have been the nourishment of the Church in all its history. We think we will get nearest to the aim of primitive Methodism and primitive Christianity if we strive to hold the truth of Christ in the spirit of Christ, being uncompromising in our loyalty to truth and charitable in our judgments of men. Without the latter, bigotry and persecution are produced; without the former, doctrinal laxity, scepticism, and atheism. While, as we have shown, we attach the utmost importance to spiritual life and to character, be not misled by the sophism that character is everything and doctrine is of no accountthat, it is no matter what a man believes as long as he is right. The fact is, when a man concludes that it is no matter what he believes, he will very speedily cease to be right. We have no more authority to surrender truth than we have to surrender principle, for all principles of action are necessarily based on eternal truth.

Again, brethren beloved, suffer us, as ministers charged with the responsibility of declaring to the people the whole counsel of God in these times of worldliness and extravagance and commercial dishonesty, also to urge upon you the apostolic injunction, "Be not conformed to this world, but be ye transformed by the renewing of your minds, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect will of God." Look to the purity and integrity of your daily lives. Be not guilty of questionable practices in business. Make not the things of the world your absorbing pursuit, for "if any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in him."

With great satisfaction we remind you that the Missionary cause is still among the most prominent of the great movements of the Church, and has a strong and growing hold upon the affections of God's people. Our Missions are prospering, and our Missionaries are labouring zealously and faithfully among our French-Canadian fellow-citizens,

on the Domestic fields, among the Indian tribes, and in faroff Japan. The good accomplished far exceeds the increase of Church membership, and upon every department of Missionary effort the Great Head of the Church has set the seal of His approval.

With a glow of joy we record what has been accomplished through your zeal and liberality by the Relief and Extension Movement. The burden of debt resting upon our greatest benevolent undertaking has been removed; the Missionary Society has been saved from disaster, and the zeal and Missionary spirit of the Church have been greatly quickened. "Blessed be the Lord God, the God of Israel, who only doeth wondrous things; and blessed be His glorious name forever, and let the whole earth be filled with His glory."

In our Educational interests you will be pleased to learn that our Church is manifesting still the spirit of liberality and enterprise which has marked the entire history of Methodism. In the Dominion of Canada and Newfoundland there are in connection with our Church eight colleges or seminaries, attended by over 1,400 students. Of these institutions, two are within the bounds of the Montreal Conference-the Wesleyan Theological College, Montreal, and the Wesleyan College at Stanstead. The former of these has recently completed one of its most prosperous sessions, and gives evidence of growing influence and The learned Principal, Rev. Dr. Douglas, we are power. glad to say, was able, notwithstanding severe affliction, to discharge the duties of his important office as Theological Tutor almost the entire of the past session. It gives us pleasure also to call your attention to the Stanstead Wesleyan College. This institution is likely to render most important service to the Church. We commend it to your consideration and patronage, and we hope that it will obtain, as it deserves, a large attendance of the youth of our country. It is intended that, for the increased efficiency of the College, efforts shall soon be made to secure an adequate endowment.

In the Sunday-school Department progress has been made. The schools within the bounds of our Conference now number 305, having in attendance 18,210 scholars an increase of 553—and 2,535 officers and teachers. A very gratifying feature is the report of 742 conversions during the year—an increase of 45. Our Sunday-school libraries are improving in their character, and are of growing value and power in furnishing our families with a healthy Christian literature, and promoting habits of reading among our young people.

While we may avail ourselves of the aid of the International Lessons and other helps to Bible study, we regret to learn that in many of our schools the Catechism is utterly neglected. We would emphasize the importance of doctrinal instruction. Unless our children are carefully taught the distinctive doctrines of the Church, we are encouraging in them that lax and latitudinarian spirit which we have already mentioned, and leaving them to be carried about by every "wind of doctrine." The Sunday-School work demands the sympathy and support of all who love the Lord Jesus Christ. The Church of the future is in the Sundayschool of to-day. Claim the children for Christ. "Lift up thy hands unto Him, for the life of thy young children that faint for hunger at the top of every street." On this Centennial of the establishment of Sunday-schools by Robert Raikes, the presentation before the world of the leading facts in the life of that good man will show the distinctive honour which Methodism has, not only in the establishment of Sunday-schools, but also in the broadening and Christianizing of their influence. In 1784, John Wesley wrote: "I find these schools springing up wherever I go. Perhaps God may have a deeper end therein than men are aware of. Who knows but some of these schools may become nurseries for Christians ?" In 1787 he said : "These schools will be one great means of reviving religion throughout the kingdom." Pregnant and prophetic words ! Now "their line is gone out through all the earth, and their words to the end of the world."

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With gratitude to Almighty God, we record the increasingly active interest which Christians take in the Temperance Reform. "The liquor traffic is the greatest crime of crimes in the present century." Let all our people be true to our principles in the Temperance work. Ours is a Total Abstinence Church. But while co-operating with all good men in endeavouring to secure an entire prohibition of the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquor, we are constrained to speak in terms of condemnation of meetings which are sometimes held in the name of religion and temperance, but under the control of irreligious men. Let the Church lead in this good work, and let Church temperance meetings be held and Societies be formed in all our communities.

We have great satisfaction in bringing before your attention the interests of our Book Room and of our various Connexional publications. During the past year there has been a considerable increase in the number of subscribers to the *Christian Guardian*. We strongly commend to all the families of our Church this valuable journal, as well as the *Magazine*, for the benefit of acquaintance with information concerning the work of the Church, beside general intelligence and much devotional and instructive literature. The Branch Book Room in Montreal is to be sustained, and it is hoped that it will receive your patronage.

Before our next annual gathering the new Hymn Book will be in your hands. We think that it will give a new impulse to the service of song. In this revision we have lost only the unused hymns, while many well-known and valuable hymns have been added, so that our collection promises to be one of the best Hymnals yet published.

The financial depression which still rests upon our land has affected our Connexional Funds, but it is a matter of thankfulness that they have been generally well sustained. Our Church is connexional, and in this is our strength. This unity commands the judgment and affection of our people, and it is of the utmost importance that this con-

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nexional character be preserved. We therefore urge upon our official brethren that no system of raising money be sanctioned that shall ignore or keep out of sight the various benevolent enterprises of the Church. Let each Fund have its legitimate claim upon the attention of the people, and this will give not only the highest financial efficiency, but also promote the general good of the whole Church. Let these Funds decline, and a few churches may reap a temporary benefit, but the Connexion suffers; while by maintaining these strong bonds of union, the smallest and feeblest churches are strengthened and made to feel that they are parts of a great body by which they are nourished and protected.

We have felt the presence of the Great Head of the Church in all the sessions and religious services of the Conference, and we shall come to you, we trust, from our Annual Assembly in the fulness of the blessings of the Gospel of Christ.

During the past year, from our ministerial ranks four have been removed by death—one a superannuated minister who entered the work in 1838, two who have been cut down in the prime of vigour and usefulness, and one a probationer of marked piety and promise. We also deeply grieve at the loss of a self-denying and faithful lay preacher, who died at his post last winter amid the hardships and inhospitable climate of the Island of Anticosti. The remembrance of the fidelity and heroism of these men we find to be a strong incentive to zeal and toil, to watchfulness and mayer that we also may be able to "endure hardness as good soldiers of Jesus Christ." While our session of Conference has been one long to be remembered by gracious and heavenly influences hallowing our social and religious intercourse, one fact has depressed our spirits-a fact we most profoundly lamentnamely, a decrease in the number of members in the Montreal Conference. An explanation of this decrease may largely be found in the emigration of so many of our people to the North-Western Territories of our beloved Dominion;

at the same time, you, with us, will admit that with such a Church polity, with such a system of theology, and with such methods of work as we inherit, the fact of a decrease of members must drive us to heart-searching and to prayer that this reproach no longer continue against us.

In conclusion, we exhort you to "stand fast and hold the traditions which ye have been taught, whether by word or our epistle." Neglect not the house of God. Pray for your pastors, and endeavour to have them "without carefulness," by providing suitably for their wants, that so with an unburdened and undivided heart, they may give themselves continually to prayer and to the ministry of the Word.

We commend you, with ourselves, to God and the word of His grace. "Now the God of peace that brought again from the dead our Lord Jesus Christ, the Great Shepherd of the sheep, through the blood of the everlasting covenant, make you perfect in every good work to do His will, working in you that which is well pleasing in His sight, through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory for ever and ever. Amen."
