# NATIONS SEEK PEACE

Count Karolyi Leads Movement in Hungary for Separation From Austria

Want Armies Separated So Hungary May Sue for Peace—In Turkey, Movement Against Enver Pasha But First Step Towards Effort to Escape From Ruinous War

London, Aug. 7—(New York Sun cable)—Count Karolyi, as the head of the opposition party, will make a vigorous effort this month to force a separation of the Austrian and Hungarian armies, so that Hungary may sue for a separate peace, according to a letter received here today from the Morning Post's correspondent in Budapest.

The Pesti Naplo asserts that it is due solely to the self-sacrificing bravery of the Hungarians that Austria Las not been entirely crushed.



North of Posieres, in France, the British have captured another section of the German second line, making five miles of this line in their hands. The Germans are now trying to hold a salient much like that at Ypres, and its early capture may be taken for granted. The deadly method of British attack is shown oy the following extracts from one of the reports of the fighting:

"The bombardment began about daybreak and continued unceasingly until night. It destroyed the defences, levelled entrenchments, and rendered shelters uninhabitable.

The British troops advanced through entrenchments which had been completely destroyed, and machine guns and defenders buried, and at certain points not the slightest resistance was encountered."

German prisoners testify to the acturacy and deadly nature of the British gun-fire, following which the infantry rushed the enemy positions and held them against all counter-attacks. The work of the Australians in this fight was especially brilliant, and the German losses were heavy.

### **British Advance On** Front of Two Miles

Last Night's Cables Tell of Successes for the Allies on Every Front-Australians Distinguish Themselves

With the British Armies in France, Aug. 5, via London, Aug. 6 -Under a merciless concentration of shell fire, the Australians are holding on to their gains today after their brilliant advance last night on a front of two miles north of Pozieres. The Germans already have delivered three powerful counter-attacks, to retake the lost ground, and all have failed.

In one of the counter-attacks the Germans came forward holding up their hands, and surrendered. Behind them the British guns

placed curtains of shell fire through which it was impossible for them to retreat, while the Australians' machine guns and rifles, mowing them down, made it hopeless to continue the charge.

Their last previous attack having been by the right flank, the British renewed the offensive by the left flank after a week of bombing and sapping. Here the task fell to the Australians, who added another victory to the brilliant record in the taking of Pozieres. GAINS EXTEND TO NEARLY TWO MILES.

"Including the capture of the German trenches reported this morning, we, during the last two days pushed forward our line north and west of Posteres, some 400 to 600 yards over a front of about 3,000 yards.




