**MANY PATIENTS
AT THE HOSPITAL**

95 Operations, 874 Treatments for Month in Out-Patient Dept.

The detailed report from the recently opened out-patient department was received by the Board of Commissioners of the General Public Hospital at their meeting yesterday afternoon. The board was highly gratified at the work and the excellence of the report and asked that a letter of appreciation be sent to Dr. O. B. Evans, secretary of the out-patient staff. There were 95 operations and 874 treatments in the out-patient department during the month, an unusually large number in both instances.

M. E. Agar, the president, was in the chair, and others present were Commissioners Mrs. J. V. McEllan, Colonel Alexander McMillan, D.S.O., J. L. O'Brien, W. E. Emerson, J. K. Kelley, K.C., Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts and Dr. E. J. Ryan and R. H. Gale, superintendent of the hospital.

The superintendent's report told of the admission of 250 patients, the dis-

charge of 238 with 156 remaining at the end of the month. The average number had been 150.9, a high figure. There were 68 operations in the operating room. The 23 deaths was an unusually large number, but 17 of these were medical cases, many in the hospital for a very short period.

The financial statement showed receipts totalling \$13,780.24 in which the following items were included: Pay patients, \$5,084.38; X-ray, \$488; salaries, \$557 and city chamberlain, \$714.78. The balance on hand was \$11,048.10 and bills to that amount were passed by the meeting, others being held over.

25,945 Meals Served.

The dietitian reported 25,945 meals served, compared with 22,841 in the corresponding month last year. The cost was a shade greater per meal.

J. King Kelley was appointed commissioner for the ensuing month.

Provincial Body to Petition
Central Council, Asking
for Grant.

Faced with the prospect of curtailment of the work because of lack of finances, the New Brunswick division of the Red Cross Society at its meeting yesterday afternoon asked its special committee on finances to draft a petition asking for a grant to present to the annual meeting of the Central Council in Ottawa on March 14 and also considered various ways of raising funds in the province. The meeting was held yesterday in the depot with R. T. Hayes, M. L. A., president, in the chair, and a large attendance of members.

C. B. Allan, the treasurer, reported a balance on hand of \$2,052.36 and total receipts of \$7,831.07 for the Japanese Relief fund.

Correspondence read included the resignation of E. A. Schofield from the executive and from the convener of the campaign committee. Mr. Schofield said his work as convener of the Red Cross workshop committee made too great a tax on his time. There were now 84 men being employed at the workshops.

Junior Finances.

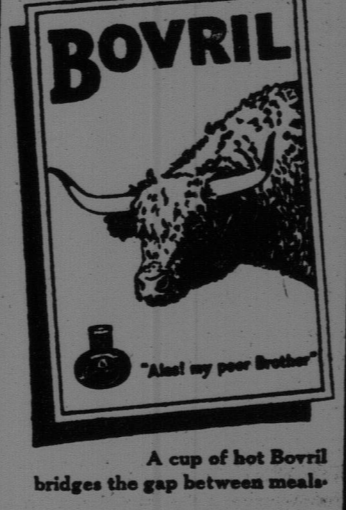
Mrs. Margaret Lawrence, junior supervisor, reported \$300.65 in the children's fund, told of sending out the scrap books and other work of the juniors to the hospitals. New junior branches had been established at Newburgh, Beloit, Rockville, Chatham and Wilson's Beach.

The report of the nursing service was given by Miss A. Melkijoin, who told of 516 visits by five nurses, who also supervised 2,542 school children and gave 36 health talks.

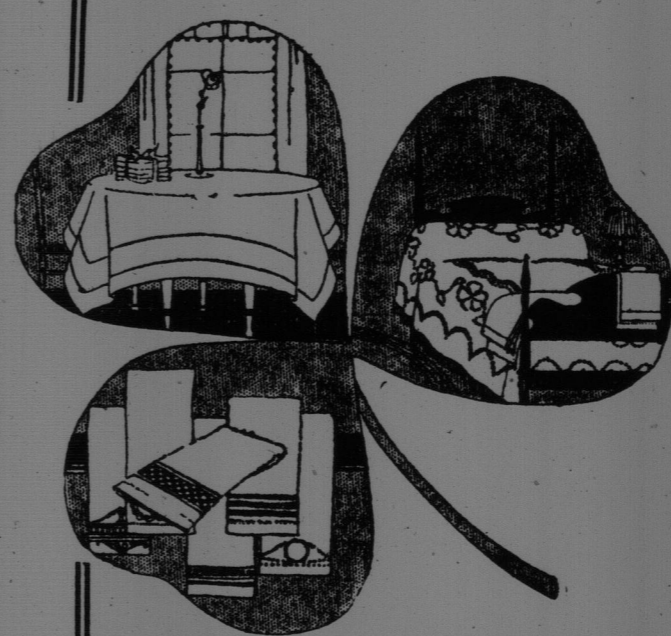

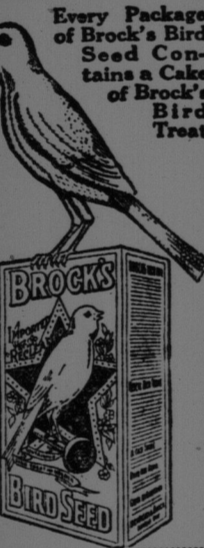

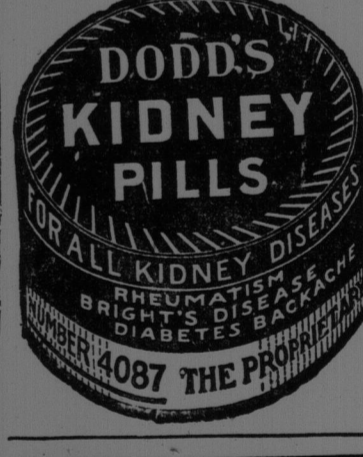
