NOVA SCOTIANS ON TARIFF MATTERS

Views Presented to Commission in Halifax

Manufacturers for Continuance of Present Protection—The Fish Men—Merchants Against Special Taxes as Now Collected.

(Canadian Press.) Halifax, N. S., Nov. 8.—Sir Henry Drayton, minister of finance, and Hon. C. D. Robertson, minister of labor, representing the federal tariff commission spent a busy morning here getting the views of Nova Scotia on the question of "protection." Groups of representatives of the manufacturers, the fishing interests, the farmers and the retail and wholesale merchants presented stated cases.

W. D. Piercey read the manufacturers' brief which opened with the direct assertion that "the manufacturers of Halifax and other parts of Nova Scotia, as a class believe it to be in their interests in the interests of the workingman, of the consumer and the nation as a whole that a policy of protection, such as has been enforced since 1870, should continue to be the policy followed by the government of Canada."

A. H. Brittain of Montreal, vice-president and general manager of the Maritime Fish Corporation, urged that "the best interests of the Canadian consumer, as well as those of the fishermen, will be served by the continuance of the present duty on fresh fish. It will enable us to develop plans for marketing, so as to make fresh fish available at reasonable prices to practically all communities in Canada."

The retail merchants, as represented by their committee on the board of trade, lodged a protest against the luxury tax at present in force, suggesting in its place the enforcement of a "turnover" tax. Wholesalers also urged the adoption of a "turnover" tax in place of the "business-profits" tax.

The farmers were represented by Adam Burris, M. P. of Upper Musquodoboit, and J. B. Archibald of Middle Musquodoboit, unsuccessful Conservative candidate at the recent provincial election, and John Easton, one of the most prominent farmers of Kings county.

DECIDE FUTURE OF BIG BASEBALL Owners in Session in Chicago to Determine on Peace or War.

Chicago, Nov. 8.—Owners of the major league baseball clubs were in session here today to decide for peace or war in major baseball, with reorganization of the National Commission as the deciding factor.

Magnates of the eight National League clubs, and the Chicago, Boston and New York American League clubs, extended until ten o'clock today their ultimatum to the other five American League clubs on an option of the latter plan for a new commission or a declaration of war.

President Johnson, of the American League, summoned all the American League clubs to meet at nine o'clock. The St. Louis and Detroit representatives of the "loyal five" supporting Johnson did not arrive in time for the preliminary meeting yesterday, so the attitude of the majority of the American League clubs was in doubt when their meeting began here today.

When the "ultimatum" was issued here on October 18, Johnson declared he would approve no plan until after the Cook county baseball grand jury had reported and a counter proposition was issued by the "loyal five" but the eleven National and American League clubs at an informal session voted to stick by their position with the threat of a new twelve club league repeated.

NEW YORK'S HEART TOUCHED BY THIS SPECTACULAR FUNERAL ON EAST SIDE FOR VICTIM OF DETECTIVE'S REVOLVER

New York, Nov. 8.—One of the most spectacular funerals that the east side has seen in months, was that of Mrs. Dolores Monta today. Scores of sympathizers followed the flower banked hearse with its six snoring horses, and hundreds huddled their heads in deference to the young woman who met her death at the hands of Detective James Kenny last Thursday.

Mrs. Monta, who was a Red Cross worker during the war, left her newborn baby on Thursday to go on a short errand. A bullet fired by Kenny at a thief who had stolen a carton of cigarettes struck her down.

The detective was exonerated from all blame. Kenny attended the funeral and started a subscription to provide for the expenses.

STATEMENT BY MRS. STEVENSON IN PENNIAC CASE

(Special to Times.) Fredericton, N. B., Nov. 8.—A statement from Mrs. Stevenson, wife of Herbert Stevenson, who is accused of attempting to murder Arthur L. Noble at Penniac on Wednesday night, has been obtained by the Mail, in which she says in part—"One thing that has hurt me immeasurably is the opinion that my husband fired those shots impelled by jealousy to kill. SIR GEORGE PERLEY AGAIN TO BRITAIN SOON

PAVING MATTERS DEALT WITH BY CITY COUNCIL

1921 Program to be Submitted Next Week—The Morgue Matter Before the Council Again—Incinerator Again Proposed.

A start at least was made by the city commissioners on preparations for next year's paving program, when tenders for paving blocks and curbing were opened today and Commissioner Frink promised to bring into next Monday's committee meeting a statement of the paving work recommended for the season of 1921. The tenders were ordered referred to Commissioner Frink and the road engineer for report. They were as follows:

For two lots of 240,700 and 25,000 granite blocks, regular—B. Mooney & Sons \$110 a thousand; G. H. Deater, \$106 a thousand; Granite Street Paving and Construction Co., \$118 a thousand.

For 67,200 grooved rail blocks—B. Mooney & Sons \$176 a thousand; Granite Street Paving & Construction Co., \$174.

Curbstones, 7 inch, straight—B. Mooney & Sons, \$2.50 a hundred; Granite S. P. & C. Co., \$2.40.

Curbstones, circular—B. Mooney & Sons, \$2.85; Granite S. P. & C. Co., \$2.81.

The Granite Street Paving & Construction Co. wrote that it would be impossible to deliver paving blocks in time and asking if the city would consider the tender for delivery during August.

Commissioner Frink said that these blocks were intended for the greater part of Douglas avenue, but if the bidders for the work included the obtaining of blocks, they could be used to good advantage elsewhere. He said that when the work in the avenue was undertaken traffic would have to be diverted to the Street, short road and some very necessary work was urgently required there.

Commissioner Jones asked what the commissioner intended to do with the street, which was declared to be in a disgraceful condition.

Dr. Frink said that the old council wanted to do the work as well as the extension of city road to the One Mile House. British street was also in bad shape he said. He would try to bring his recommendations at next Monday's meeting.

The Morgue. Commissioner Thornton read a letter from the Crosby Molasses Co. offering \$4,000 for the purchase of the lot near Water street without furnishing on condition that the city lease the lot nearby now leased to J. BAUER CO. WINS

Exchequer Case Involving War Legislation and German Business.

Ottawa, Nov. 8.—(By Canadian Press.)—Judgment was given by Mr. Justice Audette in the Exchequer Court on Saturday in the case of the Bauer Chemical Company vs. The Santeague Company of Canada and William W. Barry.

The finding was in favor of the Bauer Chemical Company. The case was the first tried since the war involving the rights to trade-marks covering the sale of German products sold in Canada, and it confirms the causes of the plaintiffs, an American company, to rights sold to them by the American trade custodian.

In England the official controller seized the business of the branch established by the Berlin firm of Bauer & Company, voided their trade-marks and forfeited and sold their business. In the United States, after entering the war, the American branch of this Berlin firm, incorporated into a company was also forfeited and the trademarks in dispute.

The judgment points out that although the Canadian government passed a number of orders-in-council under the war measures act, respecting trading with the enemy no enactment can be found depriving the plaintiffs in this case of the ownership of the trademarks in dispute.

The judgment states that the sale by the American custodian has purged any taint of German ownership and that the American company are entitled to the trademarks in question.

"The action," says the judgment, "is based upon a sale, or title derived from the government of a friendly nation allied with Canada in the war and Canadian legislation and orders in council respecting trading with the enemy do not effect such a transaction."

Had Quarreled With Husband and Jumped From Second Story—Unhurt.







**CHEAP TRAVEL**

**How Exchange in European Countries Helped Dutch Traveler.**

Venice, Nov. 8.—A Dutchman, who has been making a tour of Europe, visiting Venice among other places, gives the following curious account of his traveling expenses.

He left his home in Maestricht to go to Paris with 20 florins. Those he changed into French money, getting for them 126 francs. His ticket cost him 24, so he arrived in the capital with 102. He then left for Turin, the journey costing him 44 francs.

At Turin he changed the remaining 58 francs into Italian money, getting for them 84 lire. Of those he kept 18 in going to Venice, and other 18 in going to Munich. There he changed the balance of 46 Italian lire into Austrian marks, of which he got 225. A ticket to Berlin cost him 100 marks and another to Aix-la-Chapelle 110.

He was now within a dozen miles of his starting point, Maestricht, and still had remaining his 20 florins, 18 Austrian marks. Those he had changed into Dutch money, getting for them 65 centimos (18 cents). The 18 were 75 centimos. So his 20 florins, his 18 centimos (less than 5 cents), thanks to the amenities of the exchange, arrived him round a large part of Europe.

(Toronto Globe)



**MARCH ROUND WHITE HOUSE WITH BANNERS**


Washington, Nov. 7.—Hundreds of Irish sympathizers marched for an hour in single file around the White House as a protest against the recent death of Terrance MacSwiney, Lord Mayor of Cork, who starved himself in London prison. The demonstration was organized at a meeting of the local branch of the Friends of Irish Freedom earlier in the night and it was announced it would be repeated each night for 73 days, once for each of the 73 days MacSwiney fasted before his death. Banners bearing inscriptions "Get Swiney's death shall not be in vain" and others, were carried by the marchers who moved in silent procession around and around the White House. President Wilson, it was said, retired, and there was no indication in the White House that the presence of the marchers had been observed.

**SEEK ASSISTANCE FOR FIGHTING TYPHOID FEVER**

Salem, Ohio, Nov. 7.—Declaring that the situation has gotten beyond control of local authorities, Mayor John W. Post today telephoned Governor James M. Cox for state aid in fighting the typhoid fever epidemic which has been raging here almost a month. Seven deaths have resulted.

Thirty new cases and one death were reported within the last two days. There are approximately 1,000 cases in the city, it was said, after a survey. Only twenty physicians and 200 nurses are caring for the patients who comprise about one-eighth of the population.

REPORTER SHOT

The two men entered their automobile and drove off quickly in the direction of Bridgeport. Investigation later showed that the two strangers had been engaged in stealing gasoline from a state highway department tank nearby.



**UNCOVERING THE PAST OF LONG AGO**

Discoveries in South America by Expedition From Johns Hopkins University.

Baltimore, Md., Nov. 8.—Results of the George Huntington Williams Memorial Expedition to South America, which was sent to Chile, Bolivia and Peru in April, 1919, by the Johns Hopkins University for the purpose of investigating the history of the Andes Mountains and searching for pre-historic remains which would tend to throw light upon the early history of South America, have been made public by Dr. Edward W. Berry, of the Department of Geology.

Dr. Berry, professor of paleontology, and Dr. J. F. Singwald, Jr., professor of economic geology at Johns Hopkins, both of whom were members of the expedition, have been working all summer over the mass of material and copious notes collected in South America, and have at last brought the matter into such shape that an announcement of the results of the expedition might be made.

One of the most interesting discoveries that the expedition made was undoubtedly evidence that South America was connected with the Antarctic regions by land masses that sank below the sea ages ago. Dr. Berry said that the dis-

**D'ANNUNZIO IN TROUBLE AGAIN**

(Canadian Press Despatch.)  
Rome, Nov. 7.—Just as the negotiations between Italy and Jugoslavia are about to begin, trouble has occurred between the insurgent troops under Gabriele D'Annunzio in command at Fiume, and the Serbs. On Thursday, D'Annunzio sent Captain Piffero, his first aide, from Trent with sailors and Alpine troops to occupy St. Mark's Rock, at the entrance of the Adriatic strait, to prevent the Serbians from the opposite shore, on Dacari promontory, from interfering with navigation.

On Friday, the Serbians, realizing that the Fiumeans had occupied and were fortifying the place, opened fire on them,

Captain Piffero sent a few Alpine soldiers across the strait and the Serbian contingent fled. Three of them were captured and taken to Fiume, where they declared they had been ordered to fire upon St. Mark's to prevent the work of fortification.

**DEAD MEN TELL NO TALES**

The actual uplift into mountains occurred in very recent times, probably not long before the men of the old stone age appeared in Europe. He said that, geologically speaking, the Andes are the youngest large mountain system in the world.

Included in the numerous geological specimens and fossil remains which the expedition brought home are large numbers of fossil shells found on the crests of the Andes, indicating that the strata forming the mountains were once submerged below the level of the sea. Remains of a fossil flora, such as immense ferns, and other plants of the

Carboniferous Age which help to make the coal beds of the region were found. A few specimens of large land animals, such as huge ground sloths, saber-tooth tigers and other animals of a remote age were found, but practically none of the antediluvian reptilian animals were discovered.

Among other interesting discoveries was that the Andes Mountains, about which little had been known before, were from five to twenty million years younger than the rocks around Baltimore. Dr. Berry said that the rocks comprising the western range of the Andes were of mesozoic age, or about five million years old. The eastern range of the mountains was of the Paleozoic, Silurian and Devonian ages, and were formed about twenty million years ago.

**CELEBRATION OF ARMISTICE DAY**

Matter Left in the Hands of Mayor Schofield at Council Meeting Today.

A suggestion that Armistice Day, November 11, be marked by some sort of civic celebration was made by Mayor Schofield at the city commissioners in committee meeting this morning. He said that he had taken the matter up with the superintendent of schools to find if it was not possible to have the children dismissed at least half an hour before the usual time and was informed that the matter would be taken up at a meeting of the board of school trustees this evening. He also suggested that the two German guns might be brought up from the barracks and placed on King square. Commissioner Frink was of the opinion that King square might not be suitable and Mr. Thomson suggested that one be placed in Haymarket square, in the vicinity of which a great many of the soldiers were recruited. It was decided to leave the matter in the hands of the mayor.

**AT BOARD OF TRADE**

Resolution on Luxury Tax to Be Considered by Ontario Boards of Trade.

A directory of the merchants and manufacturers of Yokohama, Japan, had been added to the list at the board of trade that are open for consultation. Hon. E. W. Wigmore has written to the board of trade that he will be glad to discuss the matter of the luxury tax with Sir Henry Drayton on his return to Ottawa. The following resolution is to be considered by the Ontario Associated Boards of Trade and Chambers of Commerce representing approximately fifty-nine organizations, which is to meet soon in Belleville, Ont.: "Resolved, that the representatives of the Associated Boards of Trade and Chambers of Commerce of Ontario assembled at Belleville, desire to present out to the Right Honourable Sir Henry Drayton, minister of finance, that the present system of raising revenue through luxury taxes has had a most harmful effect on retail business, the retailers in many instances having to assume the tax themselves, and the addition of any further burden at the present critical condition of business is greatly to be deplored. The collection of this tax involves an immense amount of work that should not be inflicted on merchants and their employees, and it introduces into business a most repulsive feature, namely, the ease of and the temptation to evade the tax by unscrupulous persons to the great detriment of honest merchants. We believe that the substitution of a small tax on the entire sales of all businesses of say, one per cent or two per cent instead of the present complicated and cumbersome system, would be much better in every way and would not work any hardship on anyone. This system would not cripple and retard business as the present tax does and would be so much more easily and cheaply collected and audited and could be made to produce as much or more revenue than the present system."

**COLLAPSES IN POLICE COURT**

Five men arrested over the week-end were dealt with in the police court this morning. Joseph Hayes, charged with being drunk and breaking a window in Frank Doran's store in Brussels street, pleaded guilty and was remanded. Thomas Wilson, arrested last night by Detective Saunders on charge of vagrancy and having no visible means of support, was ordered to be deported to his home in the United States. Three men charged with drunkenness pleaded guilty and were remanded to jail. While one of the men was standing awaiting the order of the magistrate he was suddenly taken ill and collapsed and was carried down stairs to the guard room. The magistrate made several comments on the quality of the "stuff" the man had been drinking.

**MRS. JAMES IRVINE.**

The death of Mrs. James Irvine occurred this morning at her home in Milford, after a prolonged illness. More than a year ago she was stricken with paralysis and had lain helpless since. She died this morning at nine o'clock, aged sixty-five years. Besides her husband, Mrs. Irvine leaves two sons, The sons are Robert of Milford, and Fred of St. John, and the daughters are Mrs. James F. Ferguson of St. John and Misses Gertrude and Muriel at home. John Ferris of St. John and Mrs. Carter of Boston are a brother and a sister. A large circle of friends and neighbors to whom Mrs. Irvine was always a friend in time of need will regret to learn of her death.

**WILL TEST ALARM.**

Fire alarm box No. 56, which was reported to be working unsatisfactorily yesterday morning, has been inspected by the fire department engineer and found to be apparently in good order. Commissioner Thornton said this morning that he had decided to have the alarm tested between nine and ten o'clock tomorrow morning. It is thought that the person who sent in the alarm did not pull the hook all the way down.
