
John A. Pinkerton, a well known farm-er' and lumberman, and a prominent Orangeman of Baillie, Charlotte County, died at his home on Saturday evening.

The fire department was given a run last night to the government wharf near the Dr. Morse's I. C. R. tracks for a slight fire on the wharf. The damage was slight.


