





"Under the act today," the coroner continued, "he cannot legally practice surgery or medicine. If the question arises as to whether she did get medical treatment and was not treated right it is important you should make a statement. Be careful. If you accuse Dr. Emery, Dr. Walker or Dr. Spangler of gross carclessness, from which the patient died, you indict them practically for manslaughter."

In closing, the coroner urged the jury to bring in a verdict not from sympathy but according to the evidence advanced. It was not for them to dispute the credibility of the witnesses.

Before the jury retired the coroner, at the instance of Dr. MacRae, submitted to them the following questions:

Whether death was induced or accelerated by improper treatment or conduct of anyone? If so, by whom?
