Every stranger visiting the Queen Charlotte Islands is astonished at the marked difference between the Haidas and other tribes. They are met by men and women who dress well, who speak good English, and who can discuss many of the leading topics of the day. It was a common practice sixty years ago for the Haidas to raid the whole coast and to return with their deadwarriors and captured slaves. A few are addicted to the use of intoxicants, and the moral standard also of a small minority is not as high as the missionaries desire, but, in this connection, it must be remembered that the Indian marriage law is still governed by custom and is not subject to this restrictions latedward for the good of the whites. Following ancient custom the parent select wives and custom the parent select wives and husbands for their children. If either party becomes dissatisfied, in after years, when the influence of the par-

ents is no longer felt, some Indians do not consider it immoral to leave husband or wife and associate with others. The best men of the Haida Nation however are endeavoring to Nation, however, are endeavoring to abolish these customs and are trying to lead their people on and on to a realization of the benefits of home life under Christian conditions. The ordinary Indian of many lands takes little head of the progress going on around him. It is not so with the Haidas. They read and study conditions and errought as conversant tions, and are quite as conversant with the affairs of the world as any



It seemed to have no effect. Just over the place where the fire started was a shelf on which lay several pleces of heavy plush, highly inflammable. This caught and there was a roar of flames. The fire gong began to clang, the sound echoing throughout the factory. By this time the flames had begun to sweep throughout the ground floor like a flash.

"Mrs. Freeman, in the office, had the telephone receiver down trying to call the central fire station. So swift was the rush of flames that she had to drop it. She and I just managed to get out of the front door when the whole building was aflame.

"As we ran out into the street the bodies of girls began to drop from the upper floor windows. They seemed more like sacks of flour than human beings. It being a comparatively warm day, all the doors and windows were open and this provided a terrific draft. Of the 20 per cent. of foreigners employed, some were Italians, some Polish and some Jews, but the greatest majority of victims were Americans. Some of them had been with us thirty years.

Roger, the elder son, resigned his commission in the 6th Dragoon Guards, and went a roving. In 1853 he left Rio de Janeiro for home in a ship called the Bella. That vessel never reached port, only some wreckage being found. Roger's mother refused to believe that her son was lost, and advertised in the Australian papers for news of him. Her husband was dead, too. His posthumous son, Henry, was, therefore, heir to the baronetcy, and the revenues of £24,000 a year. The Dowager Lady Tichborne's advertisement resulted in the appearance of the famous Claimant, whom she at once identified as her long-lost son, and allowed him out of her fortune £1,000 a year until her death. The family solicitor, seven tenants, and 18 servants of the Tichborne family identified the stranger from Australia 16 servants of the Tichborne family identified the stranger from Australia as Sir Roger Tichborne, and evidence to the same effect was given by six magistrates, one general, three colonels, three captains, and 33 non-commissioned officers and men of his old regiment, the Carabineers. In 1871 the Claimant commenced his action in Chancery for the recovery of the estates, which lasted 103 days, and failed in March, 1872. It convulsed society. There were two parties—the supporters and opponents and talled in Match, 1872. It convulsed society. There were two parties—the supporters and opponents of "Sir Réger," and Parliamentary elections were fought on it. The Claimant was arrested for perjury, and, released on bail, went on tour, where he was welcomed by enthusiastic crowds. In April, 1873, the criminal trial began, with Mr. Hawkins, Q.C. (afterwards Lord Brampton), as the prosecuting counsel, and Dr. Kenealy, Q.C., as the defending counsel. The trial was unparalleled for its bitterness, and Dr. Kenealy was so violent in his attacks on the judges that he was disbarred. The Claimant was convicted, and sentenced to 14 years penal servitude. The theory of the prosecution was that the Claimant was really Arthur Orton, son of George Orton, a butcher at Wapping, who emigrated to Chili, and there to Australia. at Wapping, who emigrated to Chili, and then to Australia. Mr. Maurice Edward Kenealy, son of the Claim

Edward Kenealy, son of the Claimant's famous counsel, has recently published a book, which seeks to prove that the Claimant was not Orton; but in 1896 the Claimant himself published a full confession in which he stated that he was Arthur Orton, and gave details of his parentage and his marriage in New South Wales. Within a few weeks he withdrew this confession. Before his death in 1898 he resumed the name of Sir Roger Tichborne, and stated that he only made the confession because he had no other means of raising money.

Auto With Staterooms.
