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RAISING A RAILROAD BRIDGE.

Lifted Five Feet Without Interrupting Traffic. The raising of a bridge in Switzerland upon the line of the International Rail way, from Parts to Vienna, has attract ed considerable attention from the methods pursued. The occasion for the change was that the river crossed—the Rhine—håd lost in the sectional area of the passage between the piers, about twenty-five per cent in thirteen years

the passage between the piers, about twenty-five per cent in thirteen years owing to the deposition of gravel and sediment, while the high water level had risen to such an extent as to pile floating debris six feet deep on the bridge floor in times of flood. The alterations included some reinforcements, beside the raising of the whole structure about five feet. The bridge was continuous over a centre pier, and had two main vertical posts there and four vertical end posts. To each of these posts an inclined strut was strached in a transverse vertical plane, presenting a surface for the top of a hydraulic jack to act upon. Eight special 100-ton jacks were used, with an eight inch stroke and a working pressure of 400 atmospheres, the piston being nearly 0.7 in diameter. The fluid used was a mixture of water, alcohol and glycerine. Sixteen men operated the jacks, their movements being synchronized by a code of signals, designed to secure uniformity of action. The bridge was raised a foot or two by short lifts, followed up by thorough blocking, and then building under one course of cut stone masonry. The total load was 546 tons, and the maximum load on a single jack was 88 tons. The bridge was raised in four stages during intervals between trains. The longest interval between trains was about two hours. The weight of trains was sirigly restricted during

trains. The longest interval between trains was about two hours. The weight of trains was rigidly restricted during the time the bridge was undergoing repairs, and their speed was limited to three miles an hour in crossing the bridge. In addition, a special block system was organized upon that section of the line upon which the bridge is located, so that operations could be suspended, and the track restored five minutes before the arrival of a train at the site.—Locomotive Engineering.

A writer on strains in girders, referring to the amount of movement of iron girders due to expansion and contraction under extreme variations of temperature, observes that for iron and steel the coefficient or rate of expansion is nearly 1 inch for 100 degrees F, of heat for every 100 feet in length. Thus a girder 60 feet in length will expansion in the first of expansion of 100 inch for 100 degrees increase of temperature and contract the same amount for 100 degrees decrease of temperature or a girder 75 feet long will vary 75-10 inch or \$\frac{1}{2}\$ inch, for a variation of 100 degrees. He says: "In order to provid for all contingencies it is the general practice to allow for a vibration of 100 degrees F. or a movement equal to 1 inches for every 100 feet in length." A girder 6 feet long will therefore require to have an allowance for movement in the moving end equal to 9-10 inch or 1 inch. C. o ther end being fixed. It is only necessary to put the rollers-nude one end of the girder, so that the movement of the girder may be at the end only.—Iron Age. only. -Iron Age.

Raising Useful Insects.

"Here is an interesting colony of insects," said an entomologist who was showing a writer over his country place in the suburbs of Washington.

"You see," he explained, "a little bunch of eggs has been deposited on this stone wall. Nearly all of them are hatched already. The young insects that are newly out are yellow, while those a little older are red and black. Yes, they do look something like small spiders, but they are not such.

"They are wheel bugs. They grow to be large predatory insects as big as the end of your thumbs. Caterpillars and various other garden pests are their chosen food. So, you observe, I encourage this colony. Any one of my neighbors would promptly destroy it, but I know better. People around here wonder how my trees and plants are always in such perfect condition. Here you have one of the reasons. The wheel bug is so called because of a mark on the thorax which looks like a wheel."—Washington Star. Raising Useful Insects.



When there is a rush of honey coming in, the bees build store or drone comb, because they can take care of the honey faster than with smaller work cells.

It is always best to be fully prepared to handle bees when attempting to hive them. Sometimes they can be scooped up with the hands with impunity, and the next hive will sting at every possible opportunity.

If a swarm is hived in a clean, cool and well ventilated hive and placed in the shade, the bees will seldom desert it. But if left exposed to the hot sun too long they may conclude to seek more pleasant quarters.

Where honey is to be shipped to market the use of a full sheet of foundation is an advantage, as the comb is strenger and not so liable to break from the wood. The honey has also a fin r appearance, and this, of course, pleases the customer.

People who keep bees and have no running water near should keep a supply near the apiary. One vessel should be a little salty, putting about a teasponful of salt to a pail of water. While rearing, brood bees will carry a great deal of water.

Spraying with a solution of salicylic acid, if done in the early stages of the disease, will sometimes afford relief, but if it has made a good start it will be better to destroy the whole hive, bees and all, as completely as possible.


