



Early evening papers devoted half a page to official com explaining why considerations of public safety demanded secrecy. And Londoners laughed and said things about official red-tape that would be considered treasonable in Canada, and rumors spread, though they were much less stupid than you will hear in St. John. London was not anxious to know where the bombs had been dropped; but it did want to know how many Zeppelins had visited the town, and how much dam age had been done.

About four o'clock the papers appeared with the following official communication

"In amplification of the information which appears in this morning's papers, the following particulars of last night's Zeppelin raid in the metropolitan area are now available for publication :-

'Late last night about ninety bombs, mostly of an incendiary character, were dropped from hostile aircraft in various localities not far distant from each other.

"A number of fires, of which only three were large enough to require the services of fire engines, broke out. All fires were promptly and effectively dealt with. Only one of these fires necessitated a district call. The fires were all caused by the incendiary bombs referred to

"No public building was injured, but a number of private premises were damaged by fire or water.

"The number of casualties is small. So far as at present ascer tained, one infant, one boy, one man, and one woman were killed, and another woman is so seriously injured that her life is despaired of. few other private citizens were seriously injured. The precise number is not yet ascertained.

"Adequate police arrangements, including the calling out of the spe cial constables, enabled the situation to be kept thoroughly in hand."

LONDON NOT IMPRESSED.

So far as I can judge the first Zeppelin raid has made about as much impression on the vast welter known as London as dropping copies of the Times in St. John streets would have upon Commissione Potts. Of course it has created indignation. A great boom in recruiting is reported to have taken place today. Also in Shoreditch there have been a few riots, and mobs have attacked shops suspected of being con ducted by persons of German nationality. But we are told little damage was done, the police and special constabulary soon gaining control. As for the effect of the news, it reminded me of Mayor Frink's proclama tion during the street car riots, warning people to stop in their homes on pain of being shot. London streets were thronged to a late hou tonight; one would think the populace turned out to witness the performance of the Zeppelins in case they put in another appearance.

One fact stands out clearly, and that is the absurdity of the German theory that Zeppelins might be made a weapon of moral suasion: that they might have a great effect in causing panic over wide areas. The Zeppelins visited London about the time theatre crowds were com ing out; most of these knew nothing about the raid; the great majority Continued on page 2.

London, June 22-The Petrograd correspondent of the Times says "The fall of Lemberg is awaited here with calm resolve. Lemberg has been used by the Russians as a base for supplies, and has not been placed in a posture for defense from the west.

"The Russian retirement from the Lemberg region will necessitate ome readjustment of the Dniester front in favor of a less vulnerable line. In view of the strength of the Russian positions on the Tanew front, no immediate development of the Austro-German offensive is an


ticipated in that quarter." Petrograd, June 21—The Austro-German attempt to force a way through the Russian lines north and south of Grodek, in the battle of Lemberg, has not yet been successful.

Regarding the approaching crisis in the Galician campaign, the Bourse Gazette says:

"If, in view of the continued German reinforcements in Galicia, the situation forces us to choose between retaining Lemberg and pre-

serving the freedom of our operations, it is possible we shall have to make a sentimental sacrifice and abandon the Galician capital."
