PROCEEDINGS OF FIRST DAY.

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In accordance with the Constitution of Orangeisin, and pursuant to Resolution passed at the last Annual Session of this Right Worshipful Grand Lodge, the Companions of the Illustrious Order of the Royal Scarlet, and the Brethren of the other Degrees of Orangeism, met in the Town Hall of Guelph, at 12 o'clock noon, on the 18th day of February, 1862. The Chair was taken by the Right Worshipful the Grand Master. All the Companions being robed in full Scarlet Regalia, and the Grand Officers in their proper stations, prayer was offered by Companion, the Rev. Sir William Gundy, No. 521, after which the Grand Lodge was declared open in due form. Sir Ogle R. Gowan, Knight Companion of the Royal Scarlet, immediately arose and stated that in his opinion the first act of the Grand Lodge should be to pass a resolution sympathizing with our beloved and widowed Queen; he had therefore great pleasure in moving, seconded by Sir Benjamin Drake—

That an humble address of condolence and sympathy be prepared and presented to Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, from the Loyal Orangemen of Western Canada, expressive of the deep sense they entertain of the melancholy bereavement by which Her Majesty has been so recently overwhelmed, and the whole Empire placed in grief and mourning by the death of His Royal Highness, the late Prince Consort, and that the most Worshipful the Grand Master, with Companions Sir O. R. Gowan, Sir G. L. Allen, Sir F. H. Medcalf, and Sir F. E. Cornish, be appointed a select special committee to prepare such address, and to take all such further steps as to them may seem advisable, to have it presented to Her Majesty, which resolution was unanimously adopted.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Right Worshipful the Grand Lodge of Western Canada, met pursuant to adjournment, at the hour of two o'clock, P. M. The Grand Master, F. H. Medcalf, Esq., J. P., No. 275, in the chair. The Grand Secretary, N. C. Gowan, Esq., J. P., No. 1040, then presented the following report:

GUELPH, February 18, 1862.

To the Right Worshipful the Grand Master, the Grand Officers and Members of the Right Worshipful the Provincial Grand Orange Lodge of Western Canada,—

SIRS AND BROTHERS, - Another Annual revolution of time has brought us to the third regular Annual Session of the Right Wor. shipful Grand Lodge of Western Canada, in which we are now met to consult for the general good of our Heaven-owned Protestant and Loyal Cause; to compare our losses and gains, to revise our plans. to infuse new life and increased activity into every Lodge of our widely extended Brotherhood. The following is a synopsis of the leading events of the year. In submitting this my Annual Report, I beg leave, First, to congratulate you upon the peace that has prevailed throughout the year, and that still marks our history. I am most happy to say that, having travelled through various parts of the territory, under the jurisdiction of this Grand Lodge, for the purpose of visiting the Lodges, aiding in conferring the Degrees, attending our Anniversaries, and of publicly explaining and defending our principles and objects; and having received four hundred and three communications, I find that the split which unfortunately once prevailed among us, is now happily nowhere to be found. The whole Brotherhood appears impressed with the opinion that union is essential to the due working and continued prosperity of Orange ism. The unwise differences which kept Brethren apart for years, are now satisfactorily and forever settled.

Personal and Local feeling has given way to a desige on the part of all, to promote the glorious objects to attain which Orangeism exists, as a purely Protestant and Loyal Institution. Many most gratifying results have been produced by the general peace and unity that exists among the membership, under charge of the G. L. of W. C. Secondly, I have sincere pleasure in informing the Grand Lodge, that the intercourse which has existed throughout the year between myself and the R. W. the Grand Master, and indeed I may add between all the Grand Officers, has been of the most pleasing

and satisfactory character. There has been no obstacle, of which I am aware, to the fullest and most fraternal intercourse between each and every of the Grand Officers. My correspondence during the term of my office has been very voluminous; I have received, as above stated, 403 letters, and have written 578. You will perceive however, that I have departed from my former course in reference to the correspondence connected with my department of the order. Formerly I made an entry in my Registry of every letter addressed to me as Grand Secretary, no matter upon what subject it treated. I also brought with me to the G. L. the whole of the correspondence which I submitted for the action of the R. W. the G. Lodge. This year, however. I have not followed that course, because from the experience gained at Annual Meetings, I found that in the judgment of the Brethren, the books were burdened with matters that were not of real importance, and the time of the committee on correspondence was too long occupied by examining communications that they considered should be finally disposed of by the Grand Secretary; I have always been of this opinion myself, and the reason that I formerly entered in the Registry, and took to the Grand Lodge every letter that I received, was, because I found a few captious, unhappy, dissatisfied spirits in our Grand Lodges, who were jealous because they did not do everything themselves, and who by slander sought to damage me so that they might obtain the office I fill, and which you were kind enough, not only unsolicited by me, but even in my absence from the Grand Lodge, to confer upon me: I have therefore not made an entry in the registry of many letters received, because I did not consider them of sufficient importance to occupy the time of the Grand Lodge in their examinations. I have, however, made entries of 246, which I considered were of so much importance as to demand a short epitome, showing the number of the letter, the amount of money, if any, it contained, the name of the writer, the number of his Lodge, the District and County to which he belonged, his position in the Order, his Post Office address, the date of his letter, when it was posted, when received and when answered,

together with the subject of his letter and tenor of my reply. The publication in the Annual Report of this epitome of my correspondence, would give a great amount of information to the Brethren at large; it contains many important questions in Orange jurisprudence and the decisions given thereon. The answers given to the questions put to me, have in every case been such as I believe to be strictly in accordance with the Constitution, practice and principles of our noble Order, and though the jurisprudence of Orangeism is to a great extent founded on those abstract principles which govern and control all organizations, and, though there are certain fundamental laws of our Order, concerning which there can be no misunderstanding, and about which, therefore, there never has been any difference of opinion. yet, there are questions which are ever and anon arising, upon which conflicting decisions have been given by high Orange authorities and which therefore should be finally settled. It is highly desirable that there should be a uniformity of practice and of views in everything relating to the practical working of the Order, and a well defined and universally known law upon every point of importance in connexion with the Institution. For these reasons I recommend that the epitome of my correspondence be published in the Report of the G. L. I also beg leave to state that I have selected from among the communications such as will require the special attention of the Committee on Correspondence, and these only will be submitted to that Committee. By this arrangement of my correspon, dence, I have secured a great saving of labour, time and annoyance to the Committee, and have consequently given more time to the Grand Lodge to deliberate upon those important matters that should properly engage a full share of attention, and of the most dispassionate investigation. I would not presume to make the various suggestions contained in this report, did I not consider that it behoves the Executive Officers of the Order, to watch its interests with a zealous care, to perfect its proportions, to add to its beauty and attractiveness, and thus insure increased usefulness and permanency; but as I felt it my duty when G. S. of the M. W. G. L. to recommend that the

following questions, viz: 1st. How many Lodges are in your County. 2nd. What are the numbers of the Warrants now working under your jurisdiction. 3rd. Are there any dormant numbers that were issued for your County. 4th. Are there any Warrants issued for your County, now working in another County or vice versa, 5th. What are the names of your Districts. 6th, Give the number of each Warrant in the different Districts. 7th. What is the date of issue of each Warrant. 8th. Is there any Lodge sitting in a tavern 9th. How many Chapters are working in your County? should be submitted to the various County Masters, and their answers obtained for the information of the Grand Lodge, so that where irregularities or violations of the Constitution, or neglect of duty existed, they might be remedied. With the same objects in view, I beg leave again respectfully to call attention to the fact that I find several irregularities and unconstitutional courses being pursued by Officers and Lodges of the Order. For instance, I find Lodges which constitutionally belong to one County, paying dues and working in another. This evil should be remedied. The Counties of North and South Simcoe, of York, of East and West Middlesex, are, I am informed, open to censure in this matter. I also find as a result of the split of 1853, of both parties issuing Warrants, and from other causes, that there are several Lodges scattered through the Province, bearing the same number on the face of the Warrant. I find that in some Lodges, Candidates are proposed and initiated at the same Lodge Meeting. This should never be the case, unless that a Dispensation is obtained from the Grand Master, who alone can authorize the curtailment of the required time. The Degrees are also, I am informed, conferred too hastily, that is, the Constitutional period does not always elapse from the time one is received till another is conferred. I find in several cases, Lodges attached to Districts not belonging to their own County, and while sitting in one County, connected with a different one. The Districts of Euphemia, York and Barrie, may be mentioned as illustrations of this statement, and to progress the bill staff page the states of the st

The Primary Lodge sitting in Deleware, though now working in East Middlesex, properly belongs to West Middlesex, and should be required to go back to the County to which it Constitutionally belongs. Districts also, I wish to remark, should not be numbered, but should be named, and should bear the name of the Township in which they are located. I make this remark because the G. L. contemplates that each Parliamentary Riding in Counties shall form a County Lodge, and that each Township shall form a District or Township Lodge. Several of the Lodges meet at too late an hour, and thereby keep Brethren from their homes till unseasonable hours, which exerts an injurious influence upon the minds of their families, and prejudices them against our Order. I have no doubt that from this cause alone, many have been induced by their wives or parents to take their certificates and cease to be contributing and active members of our Order. Many Officers of Lodges are too remiss in their duty, punctuality in attendance, and in the discharge of the duties of their offices, on the part of Lodge Officers, is essential to the prosperity of the Order. I have discovered that in some Lodges, Brethren are permitted to take their seats without being lothed in the Regalia, or even giving the sign of the Degree ine which the Lodge is working. I also find that in some cases Brethren are attached to two Lodges at the same time. Also, some Brethren have two certificates. These errors should not exist. A clause should, I think, be inserted in the Constitution, declaring that an individual cannot obtain from any Lodge a certificate, until he first deposits the certificate from the Lodge to which he last belonged, and also declaring that no member can belong to two Lodges at the same time; for if the contrary is allowed, a member, though expelled from one Lodge, may get a certificate from another, and thus continue his connection with the Order. A rule also is required in the case of appeals, where a Brother is fined, suspended or expelled, and lodges a proper appeal, many believe he should not be deprived of any of his rights as an officer or member of the order, till his appeal is finally settled. Lodges should understand that instead of sending every matter of dispute or mismanagement to the executive of the Grand Lodge, they should first apply to the District if right is not done there, or if they be dissatisfied, then they should appeal to the County, and then to the Grand Lodge, and the executive should not be asked to act upon any matter of appeal, unless it has gone through this process. The Grand Lodge should also pass a law upon the question, "Can monies be appropriated by the Lodges when sitting in the higher Degrees, the same as if the Lodge was working under the Orange." I also think a law should be passed deciding the question whether or not any evidence save that of a Brother should be admissable in cases of Orange trials. The Grand Lodge should also decide who should instal County, District, and Primary Masters in the absence of Past Masters of these Lodges.

The present Constitution of the Order is regarded by many to be most defective, contradictory and inconsistent, and I therefore think that our Grand Lodge should request the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge for its examination by a competent Committee, with a view to its being rendered harmonious and effective. The establishment of a Constitution that will meet the increasing demands of the Order, I look upon as the most important duty of the many leading minds of Orangeism. This fact is seen at a glance when we remember that the Constitution is the rule and guide of between one and two hundred thousand members scattered throughout the Province. There are, I regret to say, great differences of opinion upon the subject of Provincial Grand Lodges. It is true that some intelligent and worthy members of the Order think our cause will derive decided advantages from the system of Provincial Grand Lodges, but I believe a much larger number of equally intelligent and worthy members think just the contrary; and it cannot be denied that since the inauguration of Provincial Grand Lodges, the history and working of the Order afford strong

arguments against the present Constitution and in favour of a return to our former modus operandi.

From the last report of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge, I find that there was a falling off in the number of letters received by the Executive, of, I think over 400, thereby showing a diminution of interest in the working of the Order. I also find that there was a less number of Warrants taken out than there had been during previous years, and of the 33 Warrants that were obtained, 23 of them were for the Province of Western Canada, which is well known to be universally opposed to Provincial Lodges, and the remaining Ten were issued to Central Canada, while for the very Provinces that we were told required Provincial Lodges, viz: Canada East, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, not a single Warrant has been issued since their establishment; and the Grand Secretary complains in his report that he can give no information at all as to the working of the Order in New Brunswick. In my opinion every member of the Order should have had an opportunity of canvassing the merits of the proposed system before it was adopted.

With this object in view, the changes should have been laid before every Primary Lodge in the whole Order, and if a decided majority asked for the change, it should have been made, if on the other hand, a majority were opposed, as I am confident is the case, then they should not have been made; and even now, the best thing that the Grand Lodge can do, is to appoint a committee composed of the most intelligent and experienced members of the Order, both from those who approve of the old system, and from those who approve of the present constitution. Let this committee meet and agree upon a constitution, to be submitted to the various Primary Lodges, and if approved by a majority, let it be adopted; our constitution most certainly should be in accordance with the judgment of the majority of the Order. Surely our Institution has not become all at once so aristocratic that we can afford to disdain the wishes of those directly

interested in its laws and government. Let this question be settled according to Parliamentary usage; that is, let the majority rule, not a sectional majority, but a majority of the whole Lodges of the Order. If a sectional majority ruled in Parliament, then a majority of Upper Canada is opposed to the present form of Union of the Provinces, but a majority of the whole is infavour of it. Now, let not a sectional majority change the constitution of Orangeism. If a change is made, let it be by a majority vote of the whole Order. This is the only course which is certain to be satisfactory and permanent. Strict discipline and honest dealing, are necessary to the preservation of the high character and influence of the Order, and should ever distinguish Primary, District, County, Provincial and Grand Lodges. Neither the influence nor the respectability of the Order is determined solely by its numbers. I cannot, therefore, regard the falling off in our membership as a proof that Orangeism has lost its strong hold upon the sympathy of the Loyal Protestants of British America, but rather as an evidence of the dissatisfaction which exists against the present constitution of the Order. The last report of Brother Shannon, Grand Secretary of Central Canada, States, that about sixty Lodges in that Province have not made returns or paid dues. This fact, together with others, of which I am in possession, proves that the assertion of those who are boasting that under the changed constitution, Central Canada is in a most efficient and homogeneous state, is not true. If, however, the present system is to continue, Warrants should be issued from the Most Worshipful, to District, County and Provincial Grand Lodges, the scale of prices for which, should have a gradual rise, viz: As the Primary Lodges have to pay \$6 for theirs, the Districts should be charged \$8, the County \$10, and the Provincial \$20, and the M. W. G. Lodge should pass a rule sanctioning their claims. This Grand Lodge should recommend to the M. W. G. L., a rule, enacting that when a Primary Lodge ceases to meet, the District should be empowered to grant certificates to such members of the dormant Lodge as the District may consider entitled to receive them. I am of opinion, that as the County of Wentworth is constitutionally entitled to two County

Lodges, the sooner that County avails itself of the privilege of its sister Counties, the better, and I am sure that Brother James Wilson, the present esteemed County Master, will, whenever the Brethren wish, duly call and organize a County Lodge for each Riding, in that extensive County. A seal for the use of this Provincial Grand Lodge is required, and I also beg to remind the Districts and Counties, that they also should have a seal attached to all their official documents. Several of the Primary Lodges, I also regret to find, are without seals; I therefore take this opportunity of recommending that every Lodge, as soon as it is able, do obtain a seal, which shall be attached to all communications officially sent from the different Lodges of the Order. I also take the liberty of suggesting, that in future, a letter, copying book be purchased, similar to the one I obtained for the Most Worshipful Grand-Lodge, so that communications of importance may be presented entire for reference in after years. Three years ago last June, I commenced the compilation of an Orange Directory, which I would have completed and had published for the information of the Brotherhood long since, had I received the full and correct information needed to render such a work serviceable. The Grand Secretary of Central Canada undertook this work for his Province, for which he deserved and received the thanks of his Grand Lodge. I regret, however, to find that his Directory is in many respects defective and incorrect, thus proving that such works should not be published till the whole of the information required is duly obtained, otherwise they are of little or no use. I preferred, and still prefer having no Directory, rather than one, that will not accomplish its professed object. Since your Grand Secretary came into the office to which he was elected, not only without asking a single vote, but also in his absence and without his knowledge, there have been issued four Dispensations for opening Chapters of the Illustrious Order of the Royal Scarlet, and fifteen Warrants for opening Lodges in the other Degrees of the Order. Though the past struggles of the Fathers, Founders and leading spirits of Orangeism against tyranny and intolerance,

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have won much for our Order, and destroyed many a grevious wrong, yet there is much to be done before the Orangemen of America can raise their heads and say, that, at last they enjoy all the rights and privileges to which they are justly entitled. The refusal of our Act of Incorporation by a Conservative Parliament, and the proscription of Orangemen from the Police Force of the Conservative City of Toronto, &c., &c., is proof positive of this. But the public is awaking to the fact that Orangemen cling faithfully to that Protestant and Divine Christianity, under whose shelter were laid the foundations of British Freedom and Majesty, and that in our ranks may be found the purest and best men of the Empire, and I am satisfied that if Orangemen would only unite in one solid phalanx, we might in the present state of parties, win one by one, every right to which our intelligence, wealth, respectability, numbers and principles entitle us.

I cannot close this my Annual Report without recommending to the Orangemen of Western Canada, the Downshire Protestant, so ably edited by Brother William Johnston, Esq., of Ballykilbeg House, in the County Down in Ireland. This paper is justly regarded as the able organ of Orangeism in the dear old green Island, and it ought to be taken by, at least, every Lodge of Orangemenin the world. have also very great pleasure in recommending the Orange and Protestant Banner, a most excellent magazine, edited and published in Bradford, England, by our true hearted Brother, Squire Auty, Esq. I should likewise desire to see every Lodge in our Province taking a copy of Brother Auty's spirited little magazine. The papers that advocate Orange Principles in this Country are so numerous and well known, that to name any particular one would be doing injustice to others equally deserving. I therefore deem it unnecessary to refer to them. our Angulal Returns. (I beg have to recommon

I am satisfied that there is not any greater or more growing evilin our Order than the want of full information in regard to every member of the Institution, and of uniformity in every Primary District, County and Provincial Lodge. This is especially the case in regard

to the details of our system. I have, therefore, with a view to secure full information concerning every member and every Lodge, and also with a view to unity of mode and ceremony, at the cost of a great deal of thought, time, expense and trouble, endeavored to secure adapted and uniform returns, by sending to all Lodges a printed book, with proper headings, the information contained in which will enable the Order to wield that power to which its numbers, intelligence, wealth and respectability entitle it. One copy of these returns should be sent by the Secretary of each Primary Lodge, to the Provincial Grand Secretary's Office; and immediately on its reception, he will return a letter to the Secretary of each Primary Lodge, acknowledging its receipt. These returns will, I doubt not, be the means of drawing the whole Institution into closer communication, by the full knowledge of each other that they will afford. They will also tend to produce harmony, business talent, zeal, uniformity, liberality, unity and efficiency in the Lodges. They will put in possession of the Grand Lodge, and through it in possession of the members of the Order in general, a vast amount of knowledge, and that of such a nature as should be possessed by every member of the Orange Institution. They will produce increased usefulness by putting the Grand Lodge in possession of correct and certified information upon every matter of detail affecting each Lodge and each member of the Order. The annual returns is thus made a complete Directory of each subordinate Lodge in Western Canada, and constitutes a table recapitulating the full working of each Lodge for the year, and is the most complete, concise and authentic review ever used in Lodges of the Orange or any other similar Order. I have already received the thanks and congratulations of several intelligent Brethren for getting up such a full and perfect system for our Annual Returns. (I beg leave to recommend that in future, the Annual be not communicated to the Master of any Primary Lodge, until he produces to the District Master, first, the Provincial Grand Secretary's letter, acknowledging the receipt of the Annual Return, and secondly, the Provincial Grand Treasurer's letter acknowledging

The great object of these improved forms of return is, as I said, to put the Grand Lodge, and through it, the entire membership into full and certified knowledge of everything connected with each member of the Order, to produce greater regularity in our organization, improvement in our system of finance, and the making every man know all about, and feel an interest in, the Order to which he belongs. And it surely will be conceded that the most potent element for the advancement of Orangeism, is a true knowledge of everything connected with the Order, and the publicity of such matters as are deemed proper for the public eye. I regret to say, that these axioms have not been generally acknowledged and acted upon by Orangemen. I certainly think that this is not wise, prudent or even in accordance with the dictates of common sense. Orangeism is like the pure gold, the more it is rubbed the brighter it shines, it should not therefore be kept in the dark, for the more fully everything connected with its principles, objects and modes of operation, and even with the various details of the system is known, the more will the Order commend itself to every Protestant Loyalist in the land. I trust, therefore, that the Annual Returns I have sent to the Lodges will be neatly and correctly filled up, and speedily returned. If so, I have the strongest conviction that they will verify, in all respects, my judgment of their usefulness. The Grand Secretary of the M. W. G. Lodge, Brother A. Fleming, notified me on the 11th of October, 1861, that the Reports of the Most Worshipful Grand lodge were ready for me to distribute among the brethren of W. C. But I refused to receive them : First, because I thought, as it is my duty to distribute the Reports of the Provincial Grand Lodge, on the same analogy of reasoning, it is the duty of the G. S. of the M. W. 6. Lodge to distribute the Reports of that body, for, as he sustains to the M. W. G. Lodge, the same relation that I do to the Provincial Grand Lodge of W. C., I therefore considered he should discharge the duties of the Secretaryship to that Lodge, the same as I do those of the Secretaryship to the Provincial Grand Lodge. Secondly, had

I received them, I should have had to pay the postage on each one of them, as no printed matter will pass through the Post Office without the postage being pre-paid, and I considered it was enough for us to draw upon our funds to pay for the Reports of our Pro. vincial Grand Lodge, without drawing upon our local funds to pay the postage on reports of the M. W. G. Lodge. Besides, as that body gets half of the dues of the Lodges, under the jurisdiction of all the Provincial Grand Lodges, and two dollars for every Warrant issued, together with the whole of the funds arising from the Royal Scarlet Order, which many of the Brethren think should be divided between the Provincial and the M. W. G. Lodge, the same as funds for the Warrants and dues are divided. I therefore, thought it only right that it should pay the postage on, and distribute its own reports, For these reasons, I declined to receive the reports from Brother Fleming, and requested him to distribute them himself, which I have no doubt he has done long since.

I am satisfied, that in order to secure uniformity and business habits in the Institution, the Executive must get up a set of books for each Primary, District, and County Lodge. These books should be properly ruled, with printed headings, and so arranged that each Lodge Secretary would only have to fill up the blanks. If this be done, the Lodge will quickly learn how to keep their accounts, and to manage business between each of their members. Brethren are frequently moving from one part of the country to another, and with each move they meet with different codes of laws, constructions of the Constitution, difference in Lectures, and in the modes of working the Institution. These things should not exist in our Order, and to procure for the use of all Lodges, blank books properly ruled and headed.

I request the attention of the Committee on Finance to the Printing accounts. I have had a great deal of trouble from newspaper offices, for advertising accounts. I have examined the reports of the G. L. upon this subject, and find that in one year alone, printing

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ate up the enormous sum of \$586 28. And Mr. Beaty claims as still due him between one and two hundred pounds. The fact is, for the last few years the press ate up the funds of the Order. We should do our work the same as other secret societies, mainly through our own mediums of communication, and by this means save the immense annual draw upon our funds for printing, which has been so seriously felt in the Order. Besides, the giving advertisements to one paper and not to another, causes the one not receiving them to find fault with the Order, or with the Executive officers. When I was Grand Secretary of the M. W. G. L. several parties, both from U. and L. Canada, wrote me on this subject, and expressed disapprobation at being, as they considered, slighted. For instance, Brother Knox, of Montreal, and Shannon of Kingston, and Dewhurst of Brantford. I beg, therefore, to recommend that in future no advertisement of the Annual Meeting of this G. L be sent to any Newspaper, for three reasons, 1st. To save expense. 2nd. To prevent jealousy. 3rd. Because printed circulars that will only cost \$1 50, will answer as good a purpose. Holding these views, I have avoided advertising in any paper, and thereby prevented the jealousy and cost of former years. I requested the editors of the Globe and Leader to notice the time and place of our meeting, which they did, without any charge.

Applications for Warrants are occasionally made to the Grand Master, though all such applications should be to the Grand Secretary. The neglect to send communications to the proper officer, besides doing violence to the legitimate modus operandi of the Order, occasions much delay in the execution of orders, and great inconvenience to the officers of the Institution. It must in future, be insisted upon, that departure from the regular course will not be tolerated.

In closing this report, I particularly desire to call the attention of Committee on Correspondence, to the following communications, viz: from Bro. William Randall, District Master of West Williams, in the County of West Middlesex, under date, August 7th, 1861, in

which he complains of having had to pay Grand Lodge dues twice in the same year. Several Brethren have also complained that though their dues have been paid, and receipts given, yet they are not acknowledged in the Annual Report. I am persuaded the remedy for this is, to send the dues direct to the Grand Treasurer, and to get receipts from him. I wish, also, to call attention to the fact that some of the County Masters, instead of applying to me for Warrants, send their applications to the Grand Secretary of the M. W. G. L. I have heretofore received such applications, and immediately sent the Warrants, but always told the Grand Secretary, that in replying to the parties he should inform them that they should apply to me. In future, I shall not receive any applications for Warrants, except through the County Masters, directed to myself.

I also call attention to the Communication of Brother G. M. Todd. C. M. of South Wellington, on the subject of securing the Town Hall of Guelph for the use of this Grand Lodge. I have had to advance the money from my own funds to do so, as the Provincial Grand Master declined to act in the matter, stating that it was the usual custom to grant to the G. L., free of expense, the use of some suitable public building, where we could meet in Annual Session. This, I think, is a correct view of the matter. However, in this case I had no alternative but to advance the money, or the Hall would not have been secured for the use of the Grand Lodge. I beg leave however, to recommend that in future, before the place for holding the Annual Session be appointed, the Brethren requesting it, guarantee the use of a proper place for holding it, free of charge. Surely, the large sum of money spent in the Town where the Grand Lodge meets, should be sufficient inducement to that Town to furnish a place in which to meet, to those who, for days together, are benefitting by the free use of our money. If this suggestion is acted upon, it will be in accordance with that prudent economy which I have always advocated, and which especially, in the present state of our finances the Order should act upon, besides saving all trouble about this matter in the future. In connection with Brother Todd's

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communication above referred to, he has sent me another, bearing on the interest of our glorious Order, in the County of which he is the head officer. This communication I also recommend to the attention of the Committee on Correspondence.

I next call attention to the communication of the zealous and intelligent C. M. of Kent, who writes upon the subject of the payment of the dues from the Primary Lodges to the Grand Lodge. This is a matter not sufficiently explicit in the present Constitution. I therefore recommend the Committee to draft and recommend to the M. W. G. L. for adoption, a law for the government of Lodges, stating first, when the Grand Lodge dues shall be paid. Secondly, ordering that they shall be forwarded directly to the Provincial Grand Treasurer, by the Treasurer of each Primary Lodge. Thirdly, enacting that upon the receipt of the dues, the Grand Treasurer shall send to the Treasurer of each Primary Lodge, a receipt acknowledging the payment of the dues of his Lodge. And fourthly, decreeing that District Masters shall not be permitted to give the Annual to the Master of any Primary Lodge until he first produces the Grand Treasurer's receipt for the dues, and also the Grand Secretary's letter, acknowledging the receipt of the Annual Return from the Lodge.

I also recommend that when members are suspended or expelled for non-payment of dues, the amount of each Brother's indebtedness to his Lodge be stated. If this plan be adopted, the Grand Lodge will learn whether Primary Lodges are acting according to the rule on page 41 of the Constitution; and if this rule is duly honored, there will, I am satisfied, be less expulsions or suspensions on account of non-payment of dues.

I also wish the Committee to examine the letter of Brother Wm. Howard, Master of the District of in the County of Huron, dated August 5th, 1861, in which he complains of improper conduct on the part of Brother Henry Rawlings, on the 12th of July last. The case should be carefully examined, and if Brother Rawlings is innocent, his character should be justified, but if he has behaved improperly, especially on the glorious and ever-to-be-remembered Anniversary of the Boyne, he should receive the marked censure of the Grand Lodge. Above all things, it is necessary that the Festal days of the Order should be properly celebrated: and this cannot be done unless the Brethren are obedient to the officers in command of processions and celebrations.

The attention of the committee is also respectfully called to the communication of Brother Alfred Nash, County Master of Lambton. This Brother is one of the most zealous Orangemen in Canada, and the state of things his letter describes as prevailing in the Western District of his County, should be looked after and a remedy applied. The unprovided for case, referred to in the communication of Brother John Orr, Deputy Master of No. 604, should engage the attention of the Committee, and a rule to meet such cases be recommended by them, for the action of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge.

I cannot close without saying, I regret to find that Brother Andrew Fleming, Grand Secretary of the M. W. G. L., has placed the Provincial Grand Lodge of Western Canada, in an inferior position to the Provincial Grand Lodges of Central and Eastern Canada. This I think ought not to be the case, because in years to come it may be pleaded by the Grand Lodges of the other Provinces, that they are entitled to the superiority. We all know how readily precedents are seized upon, and pressed into the service of those who have no better arguments wherewith to sustain their cause. Again, as the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge was not organized in Canada East, therefore I do not think it is entitled to the precedence given it, in the Annual Report of the Most Worshipful Grand Lodge. Besides, as Western Canada contains the greatest number of Lodges, and of Orangemen, its Grand Lodge is justly entitled to take precedence of its sister Grand Lodges. I make these observations, because of the tenacity with which certain Brethren grasp, even the smallest tittle of evidence, to bolster up their imaginary claims.

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Before concluding, I may mention that I have delivered a great number of Lectures on the Order, in various parts of the Province, and have good reason to believe that those Lectures, together with those of the Honorable John Hillyard Cameron, Q. C., M. W. G. M.; Lieutenant Colonel O. R. Gowan, the Founder of the Order in British America; the Rev. Drs. Lett and Freeland; William Decew, Esq. J. P.; D'Arcy Boulton, Esq., Barrister, T. R. Ferguson, Esq., M. P. P., and other distinguished Members of our time-honored Order, have been highly useful in removing prejudices from the public mind, and in converting foes into friends, as well as in awakening enthusiasm among the members of the Order.

All of which is respectfully submitted in Union, Love and Truth.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE ORDER.

Lieut. Col. Ogle R. Gowan, No. 137, and Past Grand Master of British America, Chairman of the Committee on the state of the Older, then read the following report:

The Committee on the state of the Order, having particular reference to the effects of Local or Provincial Grand Lodges, upon the prosperity or otherwise of the Institution in Western Canada, beg leave to report, that from the statements made to them by the members and officers of the Order, from every part of Western Canada, they find that the establishment of Local or Provincial Grand Lodges have been attended with the most disastrous results upon the wellbeing of the Society. In some localities, Masters and other Officers have refused to act, so long as these Lodges are continued; in others, many members have ceased to attend their Lodge Meetings altogether, and in all, general langour prevails, and one universal feeling of opposition and discontent seems to prevail. Your committee deem it unnecessary to dwell upon the impolicy and ruinous effects which have been produced in the working of the Order in the Province of Western Canada, by the establishment of these Grand Lodges, since your Grand Lodge has, by an almost unanimous vote, pronounced against their further continuance; and your committee therefore

Lieut. Col. Ogle R. Gowan, 137, P. G. M. of the M. W. G. Lodge, read the report of the Committee on the Grand Secretary's Report as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON GRAND SECRETARY'S REPORT.

The Committee, to whom was referred the report of the Grand Secretary, beg leave to report, that having gone over that important document, they find many valuable suggestions in it, and others, of which they cannot approve. The Committee are happy to find that the political distinction, which at one time may have had the effect of enstranging certain members of the Order from that unanimity of action which ought ever to characterize Orangemen, have been healed, and they are happy in believing that no such unseemly differences will hereafter prevent the harmonious action of the Brotherhood.

The Committee recommend that that portion of the report commencing at the words "Grand Secretary," on the 17th line of the 11th page, down to the words "dispassionate investigation," on the 28th and 29th lines of the 12th page, be not adopted, the committee being of opinion that no officer or member of the Society is justified in attributing improper motives to any member of the Order, for the

course they may think proper to adopt in respective places in your Right Worshipful Grand Lodge. The Committee, while they permit the next paragraph of the report to stand, are of opinion that all letters and correspondence connected with the Order, which may have been received in the period intervening between each meeting of your Most Worshipful Grand Lodge, should be at all times forthcoming at the next ensuing meeting of the Grand Lodge if called for. Leaving to the Committee, to whom they may be referred the power of selecting such of them for examination and investigation as they may deem necessary, and to the Grand Secretary the privilege of calling their attention to such portions of the correspondence as to him may seem to be of sufficient importance as to require special consideration at their hands. The committee are further fortified in the expression of this opinion, by a reference to the next ensuing paragraph of the report, which complains of irregularities having occurred in various places; but as the correspondence connected with these irregularities are not before your committee, they are unable to express any opinion upon them.

The suggestions of the Grand Secretary, bearing upon the subject of the Degrees of the several Orders having been conferred out of time, and also bearing upon the question of the late hours to which the sitting of many Primary Lodges have been prolonged, have not been unnoticed by your committee; but your committee connot conceive how any recommendation from them could add to the weight and authority of those clauses of the Constitution which make provision for a fixed and definite period to elapse between the conferring of each degree. Neither do the committee see that they would be justified in recommending your R. W. Grand Lodge to fix a time to which the meetings of Primary Lodges may be limited, either for the commencement or conclusion of regular Lodge business. The committee are of opinion that if this practice is generally adhered to, no infraction of the rules, such as complained of, can occur. The committee cannot concur in the views of the Grand Secretary, in reference to members who may appeal against fines, suspensions or expulsions which may be pronounced against them. Your committee believe that the sentence should take effect when officially pronounced, and continue in effect till reversed by legal appeal. Neither do your committee concur in the opinion that the next senior officer should be empowered to order a new election, in every case of appeal against, an election held in a subordinate Lodge.

Your committee are of opinion, that a committee of an Orange Lodge, is not limited to the evidence of Orangemen only; but that a committee appointed to investigate any matter, may, in their discretion, receive such testimony, bearing upon the merits of the case, as to them may seem advisable. The committee recommend that that portion of the Grand Secretary's report, commencing at the words "the Grand Lodge," on the fifteenth line of the fifteenth page, and ending at the words, "their claims," on the thirtieth line of page seventeen, be not adopted, as the power of altering the Constitution is rested only in the supreme Grand Lodge. The committee recommend for adoption the next ensuing clause of the report, which provides for a District granting certificates to members of Lodges which have become dormant. The committee see no necessity for any reference to theproposed division of the County of Wentworth, the Constitution of the Order having already made provision for such division, whenever the County may see fit to call for such division.

The committee recommend that the paragraph on page eighteen, ommencing at the words "The Grand Secretary," on line twenty,

and ending at the words, "to them," on line thirty of page nineteen, be not adopted. In adopting the next clause of the report, your committee recommend that the words on the twentieth page and thirtieth line, commencing at "And I beg leave," to the words "Grand Lodge," on the second line of page twenty-one, be not adopted. The committee, however, in adopting the new form, wish to be guarded against its being drawn into a precedent, or of allowing any officer to assume the power of forming and having printed blank forms, without the previous approbation of the Grand Lodge. The committee recommend that that part of the report, commencing at the words "The Grand Secretary," on line twenty-three, page twenty-one, to the words "long since," on the seventeenth line of page twenty-two, be not adopted.

The committee are glad to find that the notifications of the meetings of the Grand Lodge are so much cheaper when communicated by private circular, than by advertisement in the public papers; but the committee would not recommend newspapers being passed over, when they will publish such notices without charge. The committee recommend that for the future, all applications for Warrants be made by County Masters, direct to the Grand Secretary of the Provincial Grand Lodge, and not to the Grand Secretary of British America, as complained of.

The Grand Lodge cordially adopt the suggestion of the Grand Secretary, that for the future no meetings of the Grand Lodge be held, except at such places as may provide the necessary accommodation for the meetings, tree of all charge against the funds of your Right Worshipful Grand Lodge.

The committee are of opinion that provision is already made in the constitution, for the time and mode of the payment of all dues, and the committee cannot recommend any change in the Constitution, as it at present exists. 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REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON SUSPENSIONS AND EXPULSIONS.

Bro. Michael Crawford, J. P., No. 103, Co. Master of Peel Chairman of the Committee on Suspensions and Expulsions then reported as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CORRESPONDENCE.

COMMITTEE ROOM, GUELPH, February 19, 1862.

Your Committee on Correspondence, having carefully examined the letters and communications laid before them, beg to report as follows:—

We have looked over and examined a very voluminous correspondence, a great portion of which refers only to the ordinary routine of business, and upon which we consider it unnecessary to report.

Your Committee would suggest, that in future the Grand Secretary culls the correspondence in such a manner, that only such communications as are necessary for consideration shall be laid before them. Amongst the correspondence brought before your Committee, is a letter from Bro. D'Arcy Boulton, No. 218, County Master of North Simcoe, dated September 5, 1851, with reference to holding Orange Lodges in Taverns or Hotels. Your Committee consider the Constitution on this point is most explicit, and that no Orange Lodge can, Constitutionally, be held in a Tavern, Hotel or Saloon.

Your Committee beg to remark on the letter of Brother John Bedford, dated April 5, 1861, on the subject of establishing Lodges on

Temperance principles. Your Committee are much in favour of having Temperance Lodges organized, but are convinced that it is clearly illegal and unconstitutional, to attach a Temperance pledge to the Orange obligation. In reference to the communication of Bro. John Orr, respecting the Lodge giving up the certificate of a deceased member to his son, who is not a member of the Institution, your committee consider that the certificate should remain in the Lodge, and that the Lodge has no power to grant the certificate of a deceased member.

Your committee recommend that Warrant No. 459, be renewed to Brother James Churchill, on his compliance with the conditions which have been exacted in similiar cases. Your committee consider the answer of the Grand Secretary, to the letter of Brother John Jones, of West's Corners, in reference to holding County Meetings permanently in one place, to be explicit and satisfactory. Your committee entirely concur in the opinion of the Grand Master, adverse to the establishment of Cadet Lodges, as expressed in his letter, dated September 11, 1861. In the perusal of the correspondence, your committee find a memorial addressed to the Provincial Grand Lodge of Western Canada, from Brothers G. R. Bolton, John James Bell, James Roberts, W. L. Dalton, M. D., James Mills, Robert Hart and William Thomas, former Members of Lodge No. 455, in reference to their expulsion; your committee having discovered that the matter contained in their memorial has not yet been brought before the County Lodge to which they are attached, your committee therefore decline to entertain the subject.

In conclusion, your committee beg to state that they consider the correspondence of the Grand Secretary to have been well and ably attended to during the past year.
