"That the Assembly receive and adopt the Report of the Church and Manse Building Board, express gratitude to God for the work done during the past year, thank the Established Church of Scotland for the one hundred pounds sterling (£100 stig.) given for the prosecution of the work of the Board, and express the hope that the good example thus set may be followed by other churches in the mother land, so that immigrants from Britain may be provided with places of worship ; commend the Fund anew to the liberality of the Church as an important means of Church extension in Western Canada, and thank the Chairman and Secretary for the valuable service rendered during the year.

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REPORT

Board of Management

CHURCH AND MANSE BUILDING FUND
FOR 1889.

The Board of Management of the Church and Manse Building Fund are grateful to God for the work they have been enabled to do during the past year. By the Act passed by the Dominion Parliament, British Columbia and North-Western Ontario now share equally with Manitoba and the North-West Territories in the benefits of the Fund. The Fund is now practically for the advancement of christian work in the whole of what may be called the Missionary Synod of the Church. The Board assisted 26 Congregations during the year. One of them received a grant and a temporary loan, another a loan additional to what had been previously made, and a third a loan to reduce a mortgage and place the same in the hands of the Board. The number of congregations helped to erect new buildings was thus 24. Of these, 4 are in British Columbia, 3 in North-Western Ontario, 5 in the North-West, and 12 in Manitoba. The congregations aided are connected with the following Presbyteries.

PRESBYTERY OF WINNIPEG.

- SCHREIBER.**—A divisional point on the C. P. R., 132 miles east of Port Arthur. The town has work shops and offices connected with the C. P. R. and the most of the population are in the service of the Company. Inhabitants number from 250 to 300. Church built costing \$1100; grant \$100.
- FORT WILLIAM.**—A town on the C. P. R., 6 miles west of Port Arthur. Heavy shipping of the railway company done there. Has two elevators, capacity $2\frac{3}{4}$ million bushels. It is intended to erect railway workshops at Fort William. Frame church cost \$3500; grant \$200, and a temporary loan to purchase lumber till instalment on subscription paid.
- KEEWATIN.**—129 miles east of Winnipeg. Has four saw mills cutting between 20 and 25 million feet of lumber annually. Flour mill with capacity of 1200 barrels per diem in operation. Population 800. Church costing \$2500; grant \$200.
- SUNNYSIDE.**—A small village, surrounded by a good agricultural country. Loan of \$200 on Church costing \$1200.
- MANITOBA COLLEGE MISSION.**—Was organized in Winnipeg for the benefit of the Icelanders. Suitable site secured and Church costing (with lot) \$1400 erected; loan \$500. Church already too small and it is to be enlarged this summer to twice its present capacity.
- SPRINGFIELD.**—A fine agricultural and ranching district east of Winnipeg 8 or 10 miles. Board loaned \$600 to remove mortgage of \$1000 on Church, congregation raising balance.

PRESBYTERY OF ROCK LAKE.

PILOT MOUND.—Additional loan of \$800 to make up a loan of \$1300 on Church costing \$2700. The district is an excellent agricultural country. Town growing and congregation increasing.

DELORAINÉ.—Town on Pembina Mountain branch of C. P. R. 20 1/2 miles south-west of Winnipeg, surrounded by a rich farming land. Population 400 or 5000. Manse costing \$1200; loan \$500.

PRESBYTERY OF BRANDON.

CHATER.—Village on main line C. P. R. 7 miles east of Brandon. On three sides good farming land and thrifty settlers. Church costing \$8500; loan of \$600.

MCGREGOR.—Growing village on main line C. P. R. About 75 miles west of Winnipeg. Good ranching and farming country in the neighborhood. Church worth \$1200; loan of \$600.

RODEN.—A country district of great promise, north-west of Brandon. Church costing \$1200; loan \$300.

BINSCARTH.—Town on the M. & N. W. Ry, 155 miles north-west of Portage la Prairie, surrounded by a good farming and grazing country. Church cost \$1000; grant \$150.

GOLDEN STREAM.—Country district, south of Gladstone, a town on M. & N. W. Ry. Church costing \$900; grant \$100.

HOLLAND.—Thriving town on M. & S. W. Ry., 80 miles from Winnipeg. Fine frame Church costing \$2500; loan \$500.

GLENBORO.—Present terminus of the M. & S. W. Ry. Population 500. Surrounded by a rich agricultural country. Church costing \$1500; loan \$650.

MONTEITH.—Promising agricultural section, 20 miles south-west of Brandon. Church costing \$900; loan \$100.

BREADALBANE.—Lies on the north side of the Assiniboine river, about 8 miles from Virden. The settlement is largely Presbyterian and engaged in farming. Church costing \$1600; loan \$800. Subscription list covers cost and maturing instalments repay loan.

PRESBYTERY OF REGINA.

GLEN ADELAIDE.—A farming district about 25 miles south-west of Moosomin. Church costing \$600; grant, \$100.

MACHUNISH.—Lies north-west of Qu'Appelle. A good agricultural district. Church worth \$1100; grant, \$150.

TOUCHWOOD HILLS.—Farming and ranching district 75 miles north of Qu'Appelle on the trail to Prince Albert. Thrifty settlement of limited extent. Has a promise of growth with the construction of a railway. Church costing \$1000; grant \$100.

PRESBYTERY OF CALGARY.

BANFF.—On eastern slope of the Rockies. Health and summer resort. Brick veneered church, cost \$1700; grant \$325.

DONALD.—Divisional point of C.P.R. in the valley of the Columbia. Important lumbering, railway and mining centre. Church worth \$2000; grant \$150.

PRESBYTERY OF COLUMBIA.

KAMLOOPS.—Town on C. P. R., 250 miles east of Vancouver, at the confluence of North and South Thompson rivers. Has saw and grist mills. Population 1500—900 Whites, 400 Chinese and 200 Indians. Farming, ranching and lumbering are chief industries in vicinity. Church costing \$5000; loan \$800.

CHILLIWHACK.—An important farming district, about 2 miles from Mission, a station on the C.P.R. Manse costing \$2500; loan \$800.

PORIT HANEY.—Station on main line C. P. R., 26 miles east of Vancouver. Has a fish freezing establishment, brick yard, &c. Surrounded by a fine agricultural country. Church costing \$1500; grant \$200.

At Swift Current, Maple Creek, Pine Creek, Clandeboye, Clegg, Austin, and other points, steps have been taken to build this year, and the building of railways through Southern Manitoba this season will stimulate building.

Summing up the totals for these seven years the following are the results:—

Of these buildings 16 are Manses, 4 Church-Manses, and 114 Churches; 22 are of hewn logs, 102 are frame structures, 4 brick and 5 stone.

Efforts have been made by the Board during the year to effect settlements with congregations that had long-standing debts, and with considerable success. Doubtful loans have been greatly reduced, the Board accepting part payment when the congregation was unable to meet its full obligation. The Board found congregations anxious to effect settlements and willing to meet obligations as far as they were able. That nine congregations decided to become self-sustaining since last report is in no small measure due to the settlements effected. Payments on loans are now becoming more general and will hereafter prove a larger source of revenue to the Board. The list submitted in this report will show payments on loans.

The Canada North-West Land Co. continues to place the Board and congregations under deep obligation by granting sites for church edifices free of cost. Special thanks are due to W. B. Scarth, Esq., M.P., for the interest shown in this work. The C. P. R. Co. also has granted several free sites and made great reductions in other cases. L. A. Hamilton, Esq., Land Commissioner, has been most obliging. The Company has continued the policy of granting a rebate of 3 1/2 per cent. on all freight charges for lumber, and in some cases greater concessions still have been made.

Your Board are pleased to report that through the Colonial Committee of the Church of Scotland the sum of £100 has been received for the work of church erection. It is to be hoped that the excellent example thus set may be followed up and that members of the parent churches may help to give visibility to Presbyterianism in the Lone Land. Large numbers of Scottish and North of Ireland immigrants are settling in this country, and to follow them with the gospel that made the Mother Land great is surely a duty and a privilege. The best thanks of the Board are due and are heartily tendered for this timely contribution.

The immigration to this country has this spring been the largest since 1882. Of the newcomers a large percentage are Presbyterians. They are increasing the strength of older settlements and extending the area of occupation. The Church must be prepared to extend aid to them in their efforts to erect places of worship.

To enable the Assembly and the friends of the Fund to know the character of the population it may be stated that according to the census taken by the Dominion Government in 1886 the three leading Protestant denominations stood as follows: Presbyterians, 23,406; Anglicans, 23,206; Methodists, 18,648; and that the rate per cent. of increase between 1881 and 1886 for these denominations respectively was 104.4, 69.2 and 98.7. The rate for the whole Province was 74.4. As stated in a previous report, 32 per cent. of the white population of the North-West Territories are Presbyterians.

For the purposes of this Fund very little money has been received except from Ontario. The Maritime Provinces have sent their sons and daughters to the North-West in large numbers and it is to be hoped that they may extend a helping hand in overtaking their spiritual wants. What the Hunter Fund has done for Nova Scotia, the Church and Manse Building Fund is intended to do for the North-West!

The settlement of many debts of long standing and the arrest of building during the winter account for the balance at credit. The building operations of summer will likely wipe it out.

To the generous friends—especially in Ontario and Quebec—who have given such valuable assistance in the work of church erection and extension in the North-West, we offer our cordial thanks.

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Regulations for the Church and Manse Building Fund.

(Adopted by the General Assembly, June, 1887.)

1. The Fund shall be called The Church and Manse Building Fund of the Presbyterian Church in Canada for Manitoba and the North-West.

2. The amount to be aimed at in the first place shall be one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000); the Fund shall be raised by subscriptions and bequests.

3. The management of the Fund shall be entrusted to a Board of fifteen members, twelve of these to be appointed annually by the General Assembly. The other twelve of the Board shall be the Superintendent of Missions for Manitoba and the North-West, the Convener of the Home Mission Committee of the General Assembly, Western Section, and one member to be appointed by the said Committee. The Board shall have power to fill any vacancies made by death or resignation until the meeting of the next General Assembly thereafter. The usual place of meeting of the Board shall be at Winnipeg.

4. All applications for aid in the erection of churches or manses shall be made to this Board through the Presbytery within whose bounds the congregation is situated, and before being considered by the Board must be recommended by the Presbytery, but the Board shall be sole judge as to the merits of the application, and the nature and amount of aid to be given.

5. The money constituting the Fund shall be, at the discretion of the Board, either invested and the revenue accruing therefrom given in the form of grants to congregations to assist in the erection of churches or manses, or the capital shall be employed to make loans or grants to such congregations.

6. Such loans shall be for a limited number of years, and at a moderate rate of interest. For good reasons the Board may remit the interest.

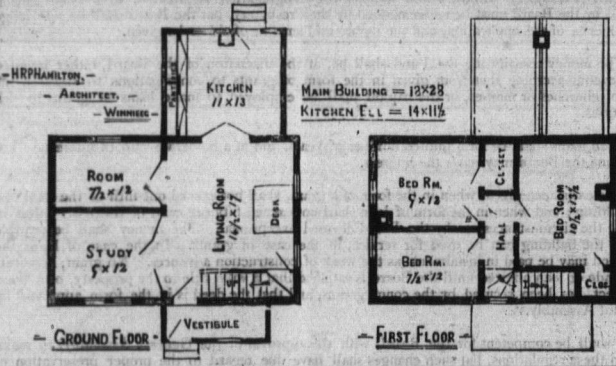
7. The assistance given, when in the form of a grant, shall not exceed one-fifth of the total cost of the building; and when in the form of loan shall not exceed fifty per cent. of the cost, unless in either case the circumstances are by the Board deemed exceptional. The money shall be payable only when the building can be used for service, in the case of grants. In the case of loans the money voted may be paid in instalments as the work of construction advances. No grant, however, is to be made or loan affected until the Board is satisfied that a valid title to the property, or a bond to that effect, has been secured by the congregation, and that the deed is in the form approved by the General Assembly.

8. It shall be competent for the Board, with the approval of the General Assembly, to make changes in these regulations, but such changes shall have due regard to the proper preservation of the capital entrusted to the Board.

9. The Board shall report its transactions annually to the General Assembly.

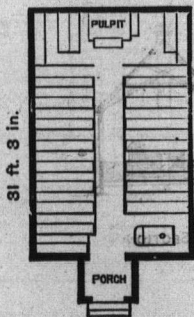
DESIGN 1. CHURCH AND MANSE COMBINED.

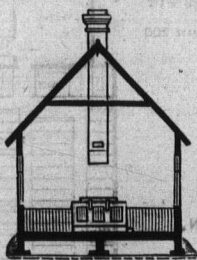

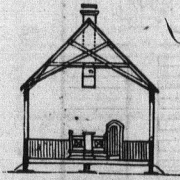

I give and bequeath to the Board of Management of the Church and Manse Building Fund of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, for Manitoba and the North-West, the sum of and I direct that the said legacy be paid exclusively out of such part of my personal estate as may lawfully be appropriated to such purpose, and in preference to any other payment therefrom.

The Church and Manse Board and its Work.

The Church and Manse Board was appointed by the Assembly of 1882, with the view of helping forward the work of Church extension in the Canadian Northwest. Christian work cannot be effectually carried on unless missionaries are comfortably housed, and suitable places of worship provided. To gain the confidence of the people we must act as if we intended to stay. A church gives visibility and begets confidence, besides providing accommodation for services and Sabbath-school work. During the past seven years over 150 churches and manses have been erected. The manses save nearly \$4,000 in rent annually, and the churches have enlarged congregations, increased revenue, given a great impetus to Sabbath-schools, and in every way helped our cause. The field is widening every year. Two-thirds of the congregations in the Synod are without places of worship, and owing to the construction of railways and the general development of the country, applications are continually being made to the Board for aid to erect places of worship.
