## BAD EXPLOSION AT COBALT.

Ontario Mining Town Severely Shaken up by Explosion of Dynamite.

### FIRE FOLLOWS.

Cobalt, Ont., May 19.—A terrific explosion took place here at four o'clock yesterday. A large powder house filled with 7 1/2 tons of dynamite near the north end of the town was ignited by fire which began in a shack a few yards away.

The explosion wrecked a score of houses and destroyed nearly every pane of glass in the town.

The contents of many stores were hurled from their shelves and a great deal of valuable property was destroyed.

A number of people were hurt by flying rocks, falling timber and cut by glass, and many were prostrated from nervous shock. No person was seriously hurt as they were warned by the authorities in time to flee.

Splendid work was done by Policemen Mackay and License Inspector Blackwell in the work of rescue, and fighting the flames. About fifty houses in the French section were burned, but the fire has been gotten under control.

There is a lot of indignation felt by the citizens against the owners of the explosives having it stored in the town.

## House Struck By Lightning.

Thos. O'Sullivan Injured in his Home—Wife has Narrow Escape.

BATHURST, May 21.—A severe electrical storm passed over this town and vicinity on Saturday evening lasting nearly an hour. The lightning was the fiercest experienced here for many years and the claps of thunder were deafening. Hail came as large as marbles fell with a down pour of rain. During the height of the storm the house of Mr. Thomas O'Sullivan, senior, near Adams Burns Co. Mill was struck with lightning, the electric fluid passing down the chimney and through several of the rooms. Mr. O'Sullivan, who was in one of the rooms was struck on the right leg just below the knee, burning and blistering the leg to the foot, and knocked unconscious. Mrs. O'Sullivan who was with him was badly stunned, a cat lying under the stove in the kitchen was instantly killed. Dr. R. G. Duncan was quickly summoned by telephone to render the medical aid necessary. A number of telegraph poles in town were split and badly damaged.

MRS. WM. WILKINSON.

Mrs. Wilkinson, wife of Rev. William Wilkinson rector of Bay du Vin, died at Kentville, N. S., on Thursday last after a long illness. Besides a husband she leaves a family of eight, who have the sympathy of all in their sad bereavement.

The funeral took place Sunday afternoon from the home of Judge Wilkinson, Bathurst and was very largely attended, to St. Paul's church, where the impressive funeral service was conducted by Ven. Archdeacon Forsythe, being crowded with sorrowing friends. The choir of St. Mary's church supplemented St. Paul's choir and the hymns—Hail Gladdening Morn, On the Resurrection Morning, and For All My Saints—were sung. The pall bearers were M. S. Hocken, E. W. Jarvis, George B. Fraser, Dr. J. B. Benson, Tucker Williston, of Bay du Vin, and Wm. McLeod, of Bay du Vin, and burial was in St. Paul's cemetery. Among the many beautiful floral tributes were one from the family of the deceased and one from Judge Wilkinson.

## MEETING OF TOWN COUNCIL.

Regular Meeting Held Thursday Evening in Council Chamber.

### BILLS PASSED.

Four Firemen to be Sent to Fredericton to Take Part in Firemen's Sports.

The regular monthly meeting of the Newcastle Town Council was held in the Council Chamber Thursday evening. There were present His Worship Mayor Hennessy and Alds. Ritchie, Desmond, Williston, J. Clark, T. A. Clarke, Helyea and Lawlor.

A communication from the contractor of the Chatham Cathedral, asking for the use of the Town stone crusher for 10 or 12 days was read.

On motion of Ald. J. Clark the communication was received and the Public Works Department was authorized to enter into an agreement with the contractor.

A communication from Electrician Follansbee, asking for an increase of 50 per month salary was read and referred to the Water & Light committee.

A communication from Inspector Kelly in reference to lights for North West bridge was read.

Ald. Lawlor said that there was a petition of the ratepayers in reference to the extension of the Electric Light system to the Bridge. He suggested that the communication from Mr. Kelly and the petition be handed to a special committee to go fully into the matter and report to the council.

Ald. Williston moved that the communication and petition be handed to a special committee of three to enquire into probable cost and revenue and report at as early a date as convenient.—Carried.

Ald. Lawlor, Williston and J. Clark were appointed such special committee.

A communication in reference to the bonds was referred to the Finance Committee.

A bill from Theo. Jardine for meals given disaster on order of policeman, \$1.75 was ordered paid. The clerk was asked to forward bill to regimental headquarters for rebate.

Ald. J. Clark submitted the following report from the Park & Fire committee. To His Worship THE MAYOR AND ALDERMEN OF THE TOWN OF NEWCASTLE. GENTLEMEN—

The Park & Fire committee submit the following report: We would recommend that a proper alarm whistle be placed on the Power House for fire alarms.

Also that some necessary change be made on the hose reels; and that a V be procured so that the engine can be attached to the hydrants at places within the fire district where the pressure is not sufficient. That four of the Firemen approved by this council be sent to Fredericton to attend the Firemen's Sports in July next and that a reasonable amount be given them for expenses not to exceed \$14.00.

Ald. Lawlor moved that Mr. Setley be engaged to make the next quarterly audit.—Carried.

The Mayor asked the Ferry committee if the Master was receiving an additional subsidy and was to make daily trips to Redbank, and what time was she supposed to leave Newcastle and Redbank.

The chairman was not present so no answer was given. It was the opinion of aldermen that the time table should be published in the press.

The council then adjourned.

## MANY SEARCH WITHOUT AVAIL.

Cape Breton Children Still Missing—200 Searchers on Sunday.

### DEEP MYSTERY.

Cape Breton, May 20.—In spite of the fact that 200 men and women made a systematic search of the country around the Cremer house today for miles, there is still no word of the missing children. An unconfirmed rumor came in late tonight that an Indian had been seen a few days ago carrying a white child through the woods. Magistrate Riley knew nothing of the matter and the rumor is not credited. This evening Magistrate Riley telephoned Sheriff McQueen at Dorchester of the progress of events. The sheriff said he would communicate with the Solicitor General and recommended that an application be made to the military authorities asking that the local regiment be called out on Thursday the 24th to make a further scrutiny of the territory. Under the present circumstances the sheriff said he would hesitate before taking any action, or at least before consulting with the Solicitor General. Magistrate Riley said he expected to hear again tomorrow from Sheriff McQueen.

## Sherring Has Reached Canada.

Arrived in Montreal on Monday A.M. was Given Grand Reception.

MONTREAL, May 21.—William Sherring, of Hamilton, winner of the Marathon race at Athens, arrived in this city from New York this morning on his way home, and is the guest of the local sporting club officials. In their company he visited the M. A. A. club house and later drove out to the grounds at Westmount, where the party took luncheon together. This afternoon he will attend the ball game and leave for home by the G. T. R., in the evening.

## HE IS NOTED TRAIN ROBBER

One of Imperial Limited Robbers Identified as Bill Miner.

Vancouver, May 17.—Edwards, one of the men held on the charge of robbing the Canadian Pacific Imperial Limited, is undoubtedly Bill Miner, the most notorious of living train robbers. He has the marks and other marks corresponding with those recorded when he was serving a sentence in the San Quentin, Cal., penitentiary. Miner is now 62 years of age. His trial will be held at Kamloops and he will likely get life sentence.

## Neborattoff and Stoessel Sentenced to Death.

This is Said to be the Verdict of the Russian Court of Enquiry.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 21.—It is rumored that the military court which has been investigating the surrender of Port Arthur and the battle of the Sea of Japan has condemned to death Lt. General Stoessel, who commanded the Russian forces at Port Arthur, and Rear Admiral Neborattoff, who commanded one of Admiral Rojevsky's squadrons and who surrendered during the naval battle to the Japanese.

## THE RECORD DRIVE.

The record lumber drive of the Miramichi waters was made this season by Mr. Con Regan, and his crew of stream drivers, having driven from Fowler Lake to Indian town a distance of fifty-one miles in five days and a quarter. Last year he drove the same stream from Drakes Falls a distance of forty-seven miles in ten days, with exceedingly low water. It has always been said that Mr. James Robinson, ex M. P. had a competent foreman, but Mr. Regan has beyond a doubt, proven himself to be one of the best, and worthy of all the praise he has received since his return.

## FRENCH READERS IN ACADIAN SCHOOLS ARE ARRANGED FOR

Bi-Lingual Books Superseded, and in Lowest Four Grades English Will be Taught by Berlitz Method—Important Meeting Here—The Question of Teachers' Salaries.

The committee appointed to compile French readers for use in Acadian public schools in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia held meeting at the Dufferin Hotel here yesterday. It has been decided to publish four readers for the lower grades. The bi-lingual readers at present in use will be discontinued and English will be taught colloquially on the Berlitz method.

The changes will go into force July 1st, 1907, and it is estimated will affect about 50,000 children in the two provinces. The meetings yesterday were attended by Dr. J. R. Inch, chief superintendent of education for this province; Inspector C. D. Herbert, of Dupres Corner, (N. B.), Hon. A. H. Cousens, Acadian member of the Nova Scotia government; Rev. Fr. Dagnaud, of Church Point (N. S.); Rev. Fr. Bargein, C. S. C., St. Joseph's College, Miramichi; and Prof. Jules M. Lanos, of the Royal Military College, Kingston (Ont.). The other members of the committee—Hon. C. H. Labille, chief commissioner of public works, New Brunswick, and Dr. A. H. McKay, superintendent of education for Nova Scotia—were unable to be present.

Dr. Inch, in speaking of the result of the conference to a representative of The Telegraph, said that the new readers would be designed to take a child through the lowest four grades. The books were now being compiled and much of the time the committee had been taken up in arranging the subject matter they would contain.

In going over the selections the spirit of the school law had been strictly observed and no sectarian or religious teaching was included and readers would contain extracts from French authors and translations from standard English works besides some original contributions.

The fourth reader, Dr. Inch added, would deal particularly with the resources of the dominion compiled from the latest records. It had been placed in the hands of Rev. Father Dagnaud, one of the members of the committee, and would be to a great extent his own work. The three remaining readers would also be compiled by other members of the committee. Prof. Lanos would have charge of the one intended for grade 1, Rev. Fr. Bourgeois of that for grade 2 and Inspector Herbert of the reader for grade three.

It had not yet been decided, Dr. Inch said, who would be the publishers and the committee intended to call for tenders from Canadian firms and also from T. Nelson & Son, of Edinburgh, Scotland. The date fixed for the issue of the new books was July 1st, next year.

THE CHANGE FROM PRESENT. In reply to a question as to where the books would be used and to what extent the present system would be changed, Dr. Inch replied that the readers would be supplied to all schools in the French speaking districts of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia and it was possible that their use might be extended to the French population on P. E. Island. At a rough estimate, he thought 50,000 would be affected.

With regard to changes in the system, the chief superintendent said the old bi-lingual readers, which were now in use in these schools, would be done away with. The method of placing French and English on opposite pages was regarded by many authorities as a distraction and a handicap to the children. It was intended that English should be taught in the early grades colloquially on the Berlitz method which was quite in vogue in this province for the teaching of foreign languages some years ago.

The children would, therefore, have no book instruction in English until they reached the fifth grade when the usual English manuals on grammar and arithmetic would be used. The readers Dr. Inch mentioned, were not designed for use in mixed schools, but only where the great majority of the children were French.

### TEACHERS' SALARIES.

At the close of the interview Dr. Inch was asked if there was any prospect of the teachers' salaries in New Brunswick being increased and reference was made to the petition to that effect, which was presented at the last session of the legislature. The chief superintendent said he understood the government were favorable to the increase, but were waiting for the outcome of the negotiations for better terms for the province from Ottawa. He pointed out that the educational expenditure had increased very rapidly in recent years. The adoption of manual training and domestic science and the establishing of consolidated schools had drawn heavily on the provincial resources and additional grants had also been made to teachers in the high schools throughout the province. He hoped, however, that it would not be long before the increase asked for could be granted.



## RUM-CRAZED TELEGRAPH OPERATOR KILLS ONE AND WOUNDS MANY

**Surrounded by Bloodhounds and Armed Posse He Shoots Himself Dead.**

Atlanta, Ga., May 15.—Crazed by drink and disappointed in a love affair, James A. Clark, a telegraph operator at the little town of Chamblée, a dozen miles north of Atlanta, killed one man, severely wounded others, slightly wounded two more, set fire to the home of one of his victims, and when surrounded by a posse, shortly after noon today, shot himself through the heart.

Clark, who came some months ago from Baldwin, Ga., paid marked attention to the niece of E. S. Purcell, but was discouraged. He went to the Purcell home last evening and demanded admittance, which was refused. He set fire to the kitchen and E. S. Purcell and his son, W. J. Purcell, appeared to fight the flames, Clark fired upon them wounding both.

Returning about midnight, Clark made another attempt to set fire to the house and when an attempt was made to seize him he shot W. S. Mark, railroad station agent, in the neck. Clark then went to Dunwoody, about five miles distant, where he arrived early today. He went to the store of Nash & Cheek and demanded ammunition, which the store people, having been warned by telephone, refused. Clark immediately fired, killing Cheek with a bullet through the heart and dangerously wounding Nash. He then ran to the woods, attacking on the way W. J. Coker, whom he wounded slightly. Officers were roused at once and hounds were put on the track of the insane man. He was seen in the roadway near Chamblée, shortly after noon today, and on finding himself surrounded he ended his wild career.

## FOUGHT TO THE DEATH ON TOP OF OVERTURNED CANOE

**In Love With Same Girl, two Young Men of Nipigon, Ont., Engaged in Hand to Hand Struggle After Paddling out Into Lake—Fisherman and Daughter Watched Combat.**

FORT WILLIAM, May 7.—As a result of a feud which had its inception in Nipigon, a small town sixty miles east of Fort William, W. A. Armstrong and Isidore Bouchard, formerly employed on the projected line of the transcontinental railway, are dead in Helen Lake on the north shore of Lake Superior. Armstrong and Bouchard were drowned last Tuesday and their deaths were without exception the most tragic that ever occurred in this district. While in a canoe half a mile from shore the men engaged in a combat, capsizing the craft. Undaunted, they climbed to the top of the overturned canoe and engaged in a hand to hand struggle lasting nearly thirty minutes, when, their strength spent, they slipped into the water and sank.

Some weeks ago Armstrong and Bouchard became involved in a quarrel over a girl, and ever since 'bad blood' between the two has existed. In Nipigon last Monday Armstrong publicly threatened Bouchard, notwithstanding that on the day following they left for the north with a party of surveyors. They proceeded about five miles, when Armstrong and Bouchard left their companions and returned to Nipigon, where they called on the women they both admired. Early Tuesday morning the two men put off in a canoe, ostensibly to rejoin the surveyors, and it was soon afterwards that they were seen astride their overturned canoe fighting with all the strength they possessed.

A fisherman and his daughter standing on the shore half a mile away were the only ones to witness the death struggle. A minute later Armstrong toppled from the canoe and disappeared from view. Their bodies have not been recovered.

### THE SALARY GRAB.

In connection with the salary grab question two letters from Northumberland County may be of interest to our readers:

"Hardwick, Northumberland Co., N. B. (Liberal) "Yes, the members of the Commons deserve the increase. All the old maids in the land make a dead end on them to head the subscription list with a large sum for church, school or any other scheme they have on hand to benefit the human race. W. S. Leggie earns his salary and Laurier will do nothing wrong. Have been voting ever since Confederation and have never yet voted Tory. P. S.—I am just an office holder nor an office seeker—simply a GOOD OLD LIBERAL."

South Nelson, Northumberland Co., N. B. (Conservative) "No, I am not, and never was in favor of the salary grab passed in parliament at Ottawa last session, and I, as a solid Conservative from infancy, condemn the action of our leader, Mr. Borden, and the Conservative members, especially Mr. Foster, ex-minister, who sat silent and dumb while they voted him his \$3,500 pension allowance. If any one else were looking for twenty dollars he would kick for a week over it."

The above shows but too clearly that, when it comes down to a mercenary personal interest, neither has much chance to upbraid the other. Indeed it would have been to the interest of the Conservative party to oppose the salary grab, even if they were in favor of it, so as to furnish goods for an election campaign. With what glowing emphasis could Mr. Foster have then gone forth to the constituencies and denounced the leader of the Liberal party as a robber. But pshaw, has, ere now, allowed the mouse to glide from beneath her paws and drop down a hole near by, before she had even thought of pursuit. And so it has proven. But in this case it is even worse than that, for an opportunity for pursuit was given and pshaw did not even then avail herself of it. We little wonder that our friend from South Nelson should denounce the action of the ex-minister, and there is little doubt that he will not be alone in his denunciation when the day of election comes. The Conservative party might well have opposed the salary grab measure, and at the same time have run very little chance of losing the benefit of it, for the measure would, no doubt, have passed at any rate. "But we must take the current when it serves or loose our ventures."

The scarcity of houses to rent in Newcastle seems to be a problem that may be regarded as serious. New-comers to the city appear to have considerable difficulty in obtaining the accommodation they desire. While this may be regarded as a sign of prosperity, it seems a pity that with so many desiring better homes the supply is not nearly equal to the demand. The change in the location of the train despatchers and the bringing of them here would appear to be a preliminary in the long wistful measure to make this a division point. If such should be the case it would mean that a considerable number of families, at present resident elsewhere would move here, and would require houses. But at the present time houses are not procurable. What will the situation be like when this additional number comes in? Surely the erection of some up to date apartment flats in a suitable locality of the town would be a paying investment.

### CANADA'S GROWING TIME.

The returns just brought down covering the first ten months of the fiscal year record a most gratifying increase both in imports and exports, while the increase in the latter is much the greater. The imports increased by \$25,280,200; exports by \$35,815,754. Such remarkable figures bear eloquent witness to the abounding prosperity of the Dominion, but an analysis of them is even more conclusive in this respect by demonstrating that business activity is universal throughout

the country, and is not confined to any particular branch.

Looking over the records of our agricultural returns we find that the increase in exports under this head have risen from \$25,709,630 in 1905 to \$44,102,266 in 1906 or the enormous increase of seventy two per cent. Much of this may be credited to the growing increase in the products of the North West, the productive capacity of which is increasing with the arrival of every settler from Eastern Canada and the United States, or those emigrating there from foreign countries. It is not at all a surprising fact that the imports should grow as it has when our capacity to produce and purchase is increasing with such leaps and bounds. And while agriculture naturally leads the list, all other lines of industry are also showing a marked advance. The exports in minerals have increased in value by nearly two millions of dollars, and their products by about three millions, and manufactures by about the same sum. The expansion of trade in Canada, great as it has been since 1897, shows no sign of ceasing, but on the other hand appears to be only getting under way.

### AMENDING THE ELECTION LAW.

The special Parliamentary Committee which is considering amendments to the election law has made two suggestions, and neither can be boasted of as being very practical. One is to disfranchise an elector for six years who refrains from voting at an election; and the other is to widen the area of punishment for those who are engaged in the nefarious business of hiring and renting conveyances for election day.

As for the practicability of such amendments, it is needless to say that if the former is not made weak enough that "a coach and four can be driven through" it will be a hardship. If the law should read that every elector must vote on election day, then the question arises, what will be the fate of a man who is sick and unable to attend. This probably, will be one of the exceptions to the rule. But how is this to be determined? You may say that the certificate of a medical man will be sufficient. But does the medical man have to examine the patient on or before the election day, or will it be sufficient if he hands in his certificate after the patient gets better. Then the question arises, suppose the elector is poor and cannot very well afford to have a doctor, that his sickness is such that while it prevents him from going say five miles to the poll to vote, it is not sufficient to warrant sending for a doctor: if he remains at home in the house. What then? And the doctor does not know that the man is sick until he is well and then is he going to be able to issue a certificate of ill health? But apart from all that, how easy it would be to get a certificate of ill health for some unscrupulous doctor. Just as easy as it is at present to get a prescription for a bottle of whiskey and thus evade the Scott Act, with this difference that it would be far more difficult to punish the doctor, for after

the patient is well, especially where he has not been sick at all, it would be both difficult and expensive to prove that he had not been sick and that, therefore, the certificate had not been properly obtained. If the law was made so as to excuse a patient who was home in bed under the doctor's care, everybody who had not voted at the election would be enabled to crawl in through the same aperture and deposit his vote at the next election. Then, it might happen that a man was unexpectedly called away from the poll on business before he had had an opportunity of depositing his ballot. Is he to be disfranchised for six years for an offence which is no offence at all? It may be that he was as anxious to vote as any that actually cast their ballots and yet circumstances prevented him from doing so. And yet, if such a loophole were left, how many are there who could not arrange their circumstances to bring them under the exception? The amendment will require no small amount of consideration before it can be made practical, for the disfranchisement system would, in many instances, be a convenience to the indifferent instead of a punishment.

With reference to the cab question that, too, is not practical. The law against the open employment of cabs is only a cloak for hypocrisy. Practically every city election is fought with hired cabs, but the not very difficult task of dodging the letter of the law enables the candidates to escape unscathed that ground. A city election would be almost impossible without the free use of cabs. Suppose a compulsory voting was made law. Some old man or woman who was unable to get to poll very easily without the use of a team, yet unable to hire one, would, and does, find it very convenient and nice to have a cab sent after him or her, and yet it does not take effect as a bribe to the voter. Indeed, it would be much better if all cabs were free on election day, to enable those who are otherwise unable to attend, to approach the poll and cast their ballots. Parliament should legislate hypocrisy on this point out of existence by permitting election committees to pay a reasonable sum for the use of conveyances on election day. It will no more bribe the cab men than the hiring of halls and the like will bribe their respective owners. If, then, we are to have an amendment to the election law, why not have an amendment that will work out in practice and to advance purity at elections and not encumber our statute books with laws that are scarce worth the paper they are written on!

### RUSSIA IN THE EAST

Crippled as Russia may be by her contest with Japan, she has not entirely abandoned what the newspapers and there views speak of as her "traditional policy." She is sending out to Mongolia an expedition, which has probably started. The purpose of this expedition is to survey the hitherto unexplored region between Manchuria and Urga. One statement, which was about some week ago, was to the effect that there was an understanding between Russia and Great Britain in regard to this movement; that Great Britain would have, so far as Russia is concerned, a free hand in Tibet, while Russia would not be interfered with in Mongolia. The British Foreign office seems to have promptly met this statement with a semi-official declaration that it was based upon misinformation, and that there could be no such understanding, as it would be surely objectionable to Japan. The expedition which Russia is sending into Mongolia is a very strong and well-equipped one, and is calculated to impress the Mongolians both by its numbers and its character. No less than

sixty officers, many of them men of experience, are in the party, and their avowed object is to survey the railroad system which will enable the whole eastern Mongolian territory to be pretty well traversed and explored if not captured.—Globe.

## THE ROYAL VISIT TO CANADA.

H. R. H. Prince Arthur of Connaught's trip through Canada has been a pleasant and interesting one to this Royal visitor. The vast resources of the Canadian Northwest were shown to him, as well as the great development which is taking place in Eastern Canada, and his trip over the Grand Trunk Railway System gave him an idea of the wonderful advancement of the railroads of this country. While on the Grand Trunk His Royal Highness remarked several times on the perfect road-bed over which the Grand Trunk trains were operated, the smooth running of the train on which he travelled, and the magnificent equipment that was provided for his comfort. Being the only double track railway in Canada, and the finest roadbed in the Dominion, it was natural that he would recognize these noticeable features.

Special features were demonstrated to him which had not been operated on any other train in the world, such as a telephone switch board installed in one of the cars, giving telephonic communication between each car on the train, and at each stopping place connection was made with the local distances and local circuits. Each of the guests on the train had telephones in the private cars which they occupied, and communication could be had with local centres, as well as long distance circuits. Another special feature was the electric lighting of the train, which was done by the operation of a steam turbine engine and dynamo, situated in the baggage car and fed by steam from the locomotive.

The consensus of opinion of all who had the opportunity of seeing this Royal train was—"the finest train in the world."

All the arrangements for the Royal party while on the Grand Trunk were carried out without a hitch, and his Royal Highness felt constrained to telegraph the management when leaving the road, his appreciation and thanks for the comfort he enjoyed while on their lines.

Before leaving Canada, however, the Grand Trunk presented Prince Arthur with a handsome full Morocco album, containing a collection of photographs of the exterior views of the several cars which made up the train, and the group pictures which were taken at Niagara Falls and other points. This souvenir will no doubt recall many happy hours, and be a pleasant reminder of his visit to Canada.

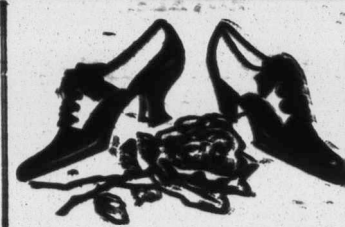

The regimental colors are of blue silk, gold fringed, with the regimental crest in the centre—a four legged, a Tudor crown above it, and surrounded by a wreath of maple leaves, thistles, roses and Shamrocks. Underneath is the regimental motto—'Pro Jure Constituunt'. There is a Union Jack in the upper corner of the buff, and the staff is capped by the King's crest in gold. The King's colors are made of red, white and blue silk, gold fringed, a Union Jack with Northumberland Regiment, LXXIII on a circle in the centre. The staff is surmounted by the Royal crest in gold. These handsome colors cost \$250.00. The Northumberland County Council contributed \$100, and the Restigouche Council \$50. The officers of the regiment will contribute the rest of the cost. These colors are only ordered when the regiment is present, and will be carried from and into Chatham, when the men go to and return from camp, in their cases, as only three companions will be present. We must go to Sussex, during camp, to see the colors carried by men in martial array.—World.

## CZAR DEFIES PARLIAMENT.

Civil War May Result as a Con-  
sequence—Many  
Rumors.

St. Petersburg, May 23.—A bomb was thrown into the parliamentary camp this afternoon by a note received by President Mouravieff, of the lower house, from Peterhof, which, instead of making an appointment for an audience at which he and the delegation could present the address in reply to the speech from the throne, contained the information that Emperor Nicholas would not receive the delegation. Discouraged utterly at this unexpected development, the leaders of the majority in the house hastily summoned a caucus of constitutional deputies. President Mouravieff, instead of sending the address to Baron Fredericks, minister of the imperial house, immediately issued a call for a meeting of parliament at 11 o'clock tomorrow, at which he will report the occurrence and ask for further instructions. A most heated meeting is in prospect. The first disposition of the caucus of the constitutional democrats, which was in session all the afternoon and evening and at midnight had not been concluded, was to regard the refusal to receive the delegation as a challenge and an open affront, only answerable by a counter declaration of war. The deputies were red with rage, but after the first passion, the leaders realized the danger of too precipitate action and set themselves to bringing their enraged followers under control. Cooler councils seemed ultimately to be prevailing, but it is almost certain that the radical group, accompanied by a portion of the peasants, will break away tomorrow and endeavor to force the house into some fiery declaration against the emperor and the government which will compel an immediate rupture and civil war.

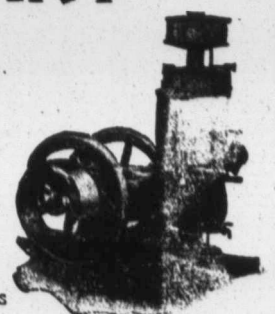
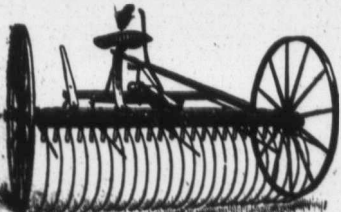

## GETTING READY FOR EXHIBITION.

Permission Secured for use of Drill Hall and Grounds—Some Other New Features.

C. J. Milligan, manager of the exhibition, yesterday received word from Sir Frederick Borden, minister of militia, giving the association permission to use the drill shed and militia grounds for exhibition purposes from August 15th to September 15.

Work on the Amusement Hall and other buildings of the association will be commenced at once, to get them in readiness for the exhibition. Wm. Taylor has been engaged to do the work, and will put on a crowd of men this morning. He will be busy right up to the fair.

Director Wisely has been given instructions to get the main building in shape, and is starting men at work today.

Dr. G. U. Hay, on behalf of the Natural History Society, who made such a fine exhibit in 1904, has taken up with Manager Milligan the matter of making a more extensive exhibit this year. A new feature will be addresses by well known lecturers, who will give popular talks on various subjects.

It is also proposed to have a full educational exhibit embracing the whole province, including all the subjects taught in the schools which can be shown. Nothing of the kind has been attempted for ten or twelve years, and it should prove a very interesting feature. Dr. J. R. Inch, superintendent of education, discussed the matter with Mr. Milligan and promised his hearty co-operation. Prizes will be offered, of course, to the best exhibits. It is also proposed to have a kindergarten exhibit.

Another interesting department of the exhibit will be the domestic science booth. The ladies' council have undertaken the management, and will give practical demonstrations of the latest and most approved methods of preparing food. Mr. Milligan will meet the committee of the ladies council on the fair grounds on Saturday morning at 11.30 to arrange details.

The prize list is already in the hands of the printers, and will be ready for distribution in about a fortnight. The management have made arrangements to issue for advertising purposes, a very pretty colored post card showing the exhibition buildings. These will be available by any merchants and citizens who wish to distribute them and should be a decided aid to making the public aware that St. John is to have the best exhibition that has been held in recent years.

Designs for the hangers which will be sent broadcast over the country have been submitted by local lithographers, and the committee will meet in a day or two to decide on the one they will adopt.

No effort will be spared to make the exhibition of 1906 one of the best that has ever been held here.

### TALKING HABITS.

Particulars of Different Cities on Telephone Charts.

Telephone is an expensive business to conduct. If you are skeptical about this, all you need do is consult the charts each Bell office prepares to show the volume of traffic that "Central" must attend to at the different hours of the day in every big city—not handle in "any old way," but as smoothly and promptly as the calls that come in during the quietest hours. It is this providing against what the engineers call "the peak of the load" that makes telephone so costly.

Beginning at midnight, the stream of talk is thin and sluggish till well along in the forenoon, when it becomes a veritable flood. The early afternoon is comparatively quiet, but there is another torrent before the close of the city's business day. Then the river of words flows less and less swiftly till midnight comes again.

Though they are much alike in a general way, the varying lines on these telephone charts bring out curiously the characteristic differences of different communities. For instance, the broad, low sweep marking midday on the Boston chart compared with the canyon-like plunge of the lines on the New York chart means that business men in the New England capital spend more time at luncheon than their brethren in Gotham.

These telephone charts also show that business hours in the American metropolises are comparatively shorter—shorter even than in London, whose merchants and professional men are supposed to give more time to social functions and outdoor sports. New Yorkers do not get fairly busy before 10 in the morning, but an hour afterward their work, judging by the telephone calls, reaches its maximum. Then there is a falling off until about 1 in the afternoon, when the tide turns again and rises to a maximum at 3, after which there is a gradual descent. Chicago's talk records show a typical American curve. It begins to rise fully an hour earlier than New York's, goes relatively higher in the afternoon and later on drops much more gradually.

The plotting of these telephone charts is an important matter. It enables the engineers not only to determine the capacity of present exchanges, but also helps them to forecast with surprising accuracy the needs of new exchanges. They give some idea, too, of the very large investment in apparatus which is idle much of the time, but, nevertheless, must be provided so that the plant shall have sufficient capacity to handle promptly all the calls in the busiest hour of the busiest day.

### The Red Man's Last Roll Call.

Like the Moorish king Abu Abdallah, looking mournfully backward at his lost Granada, Geronimo from Fort Sill gazes westward across prairies and hills to the Arizona of his great days which he will not see again. Up at Pine Ridge agency the Sioux nonagenarian Red Cloud, the most famous of living Indian warriors, who could tell as many marvels as Aeneas told to Dido, refuses to accept the government's offer of an allotment of land and goes down like Dickens' Steerforth in the storm at Yarmouth, waving his hand defiantly in the face of destiny. Most of Hercules' labors looked light compared with the task which the late Henry L. Dawes undertook when he and the commission created under the law of 1883 started out to induce the Choctaws, the Creeks and their neighbors to allot their lands to their members as individuals, to abolish their tribal government and to merge themselves in the mass of the country's citizenship. That work has been grandly finished. The last councils of the Five Tribes have been held. The epic of the American Indian has closed.—C. M. Harvey in Atlantic.

### The Horseshoe Curve.

Before long the famous Horseshoe curve on the Pennsylvania railroad will be eliminated. The company is considering two plans for tunnels, one nine miles long and the other eleven, and two plans for new routes over the mountains, one 90 and the other 105 miles long. The object of the proposed change is to make the grades easier and thereby reduce the consumption of coal and the cost of hauling freight, and of course it is desirable to shorten the length of the haul by eliminating as many curves as possible. If the nine mile tunnel is built trains will be pulled through it by electric motors, according to the plans of the projectors. This is the power that is to be used in the new Simplon tunnel through the Alps, which is to be open for traffic on May 1.—Youth's Companion.

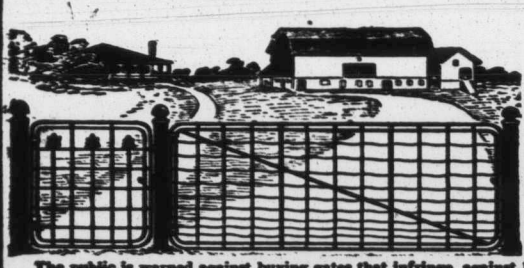

## Who Has Any Meteors to Dispose Of.

Ottawa Geologist Would Like to Get Some New Brunswick Ones Will Look for Them During His Survey of G. T. P. Route.

Ottawa, May 17—(Special).—The area to be explored by R. A. Johnston, of the geological survey in central and north western New Brunswick will be essentially confined to a narrow strip on either side of the proposed route of the National Transcontinental Railway.

Lines have been run by the railway engineers over the whole distance, but the routes to be used over some sections have not been decided upon, more particularly the section from Grand Falls southward to the neighborhood of Boiestown.

The work to be performed over the area in question will consist of an inquiry into its geological and natural features and "mineral resources. In addition to this Mr. Johnston will, as opportunity permits, continue his investigations into the subject of Canadian meteorites with a view to making a bulletin thereon as complete as possible. It is not at all improbable that several of these bodies are in the hands of private parties, where they remain merely as curiosities, and many more, no doubt, remain partially or wholly buried in the soil of the earth's crust.

Parties, therefore, knowing of the whereabouts of any of these or who may have such in their possession, would confer a great favor by communicating information regarding the same to Mr. Johnston, by whom such favors will be greatly appreciated.

## The Indian and the Railroad.

Gall Hamilton said if there never were to be any railroads it would have been an impertinence in Columbus to have discovered America. The Indian's knowledge of the location and direction of the rivers and lakes and of the positions of the portages and his readiness under the right sort of persuasion to put this knowledge at the service of explorers, missionaries and settlers "stood out" this stigma from Columbus before the railroads came. Indians guided Captain John Smith, Champlain and La Salle through the wilderness. Indian trails blazed pathways for the pioneers through forests and over mountains. Sometimes these trails were utilized by the railway builders. At the Louisiana Purchase exposition at St. Louis and at the Lewis and Clark fair at Portland were monuments to the heroic Shoshone girl, Sacagawea, who piloted Lewis and Clark across the Rocky mountains and through the wilderness on each side of that range in their exploration of the Pacific.—C. M. Harvey in Atlantic.

Cheapest Place to Live.

"The cheapest place in the world is Antioch," said a globe trotter. "I once passed a winter there, and all it cost me, though I leased a fine house and kept three servants, was \$4 a week. Antioch is in Asia, on the Mediterranean. The climate is all right for winter—as good a winter climate as Monte Carlo, Palm Beach or Los Angeles. For my house I paid \$5 a month rent. My servants I paid 50 cents a week. Mutton cost 3 cents a pound. Eggs were 2 cents a dozen. Chickens were 5 cents apiece. Fish cost a fifth of a cent a pound. The finest of fresh fruits and vegetables—fresh fruits and vegetables in February—were so cheap that they were not sold in quantity. You got all you wanted for so much a week. All I wanted for my household cost me a quarter weekly. An American resident of Antioch told me that he and his family lived comfortably on \$175 a year."

The Dances and Britain.

John Ackworth, an English dialect novelist who made a special study of the dialects of Lancashire, Yorkshire, the east coasts and also of the Danes, shows that the Danes by their early landings and sojournings in England have influenced the language of the east coasts of Britain to an extraordinary degree and that the Danes and the British, in spite of apparent differences, are one practically in speech and language as well as in the relationship of blood. "So strong is the English of the east coasts of England impregnated with Danish," John Ackworth once said, "that I am sure that if a fisherman from the east coasts of England were to be wrecked on the shores of Denmark and he would only speak in his true native dialect that fisherman would be able to make himself understood."

The Christian Era.

The Christian era was suggested or devised by Dionysius Exiguus, a Roman monk, who, in 527, began its use and proposed that all public and private documents should be dated "in the year of our Lord." It did not come into general use in France until the eighth century nor in England until July, 816; in Spain it was not adopted until the eleventh century; in Portugal it was made legal in 1415; in the empire of the east it was established by royal edict in 1453, a few weeks before the fall of Constantinople.

Where Circulation is Feeblest.

Those who lead a sedentary life find the circulation feeblest about the nose, lips and temples, and those parts of the face should be energetically kneaded several times a day. When the pores become distended the fine, invisible dust in the air enters and clogs and blackens them.
