PUBLIC ACCOUNTS

Reports of Committees Presented to Legislature.

PROVINCIAL HOSPITAL

Concerning the Highway Accounts-Number of Bills Passed

FREDERICTON, March 22.-The report of the committee on agriculture, as submitted this evening, contained nothing of more than ordinary importance. The report emphasized the importance of the use of good seed by the farmers, but declared against the suggested plan of having the Agricultural Department supply approved seed to the farmers. The agricultural societies were spoken of as the proper media through which the farmers should secure improvement of seed, but the policy pursued by 'the department in holding seed fairs was commenced. The employment of two exports to lecture before the farmers on wheat raising during this year was ecommended as was a continuance of strict supervision of roller mills. The strict supervision of roller mills. The importance of hogs and poultry raising was touched upon, and the department urged to do all possible to encourage the farmers in raising hogs and poultry. The report also commended the government for its course in aiding New Brunswick scholars at agricultural colleges. swick scholars at agricultural colleges, and advised the publication of an ad-ditional one thousand copies of the agricultural report.

Mr. Osman submitted the report of the public accounts committee, which however, was not signed by Messrs Morrison of the Morrison of the opposition members of the committee, which accounts committee, which however, was not signed by Messrs New York state branch of the Sir Thomas' own experience ought threatened all the remaining I C R General Buchr report told of the careful scrutiny made of all the accounts and of the full information given the committee by The accounts, as a whole, were pronounced very satisfactory, The report recommended, however, that strong efforts be made to collect \$1,175 still owing the province by purchasers of seed, and that, failing collection, the several accounts making up the sum be wiped out as debt; that delinquent road superintendents be ordered to furnish immediately detailed accounts; that the forms provided by the Public Works Department be made more explicit in their directions; that in purchasing supplies for the Provincial Hospital the tender system should be followed as far as possible, and that an endeavor re made to avoid the necessity of publishing Dr. Auglin's personal ccounts. The report also commended Mr W. S. London, assistant Auditor General, and Mr G Y Dibblee for their efforts in aiding the committee's

The amendments to the liquor license Acc which were passed to-night unlawful for any person holding a license under the Liquor License Act, 1st to 27th 27th and 28th to send liquor into a county, city or town in which the act is in force, or into any locality where the sale of liquor is prohibited under the provisions of the Liquor License Act, where such licensed person knows or has reason to believe that the person or persons to whom such liquor is sent s or are engaged in the sale of liquor contrary to law; and the person so cost of offending shall be liable to a penalty of day." not less than twenty-dollars nor more than fifty dollars for the first offende, and not less than fifty dollars nor more than one hundred dollars for a second offence, and not less than one nundred dollars nor more than two hundred dollars for a third offence. The second amendment provides for the cancellation of the license of any person who is shown to the license provision. The license, however, is given ten days in which he may appeal from a decision of the commissioners cancelling his license. The appeal lies to the Lieutenant Governor in Council and must be made within twenty days from the issuance of the cancellation order. The Lieutenant Governor in Council may, on hearing the evidence, repeal or res cind the order. No licensee is to be permitted to send liquor into any Scott Act county or into any locality where the sale of liquor is prohibited by any express company or other conveyence C.O.D On complaint being made to the license commissioners that any licensee has so offend-Laundry ed, the board shall give reasonable notice to the license whose conduct is complained of, and upon it appearing to the board that such licensee has
