### BRAKEMAN KILLED

Edward S MacMurray met Death at Bartibogue

#### KILLED INSTANTLY

Was Making a Flying Shunt When he fell in front of Moving Train of Cars

Newcastle learned with deepest sorrow Friday afternoon of the tragic death of brakeman Edward S MacMurray which took place at Bartibogue station about three o'clock.

The unfortunate young man, who was breaking on Con. Wm. Bovard's pulp special was engaged in making a flying shunt in the Bartibogue yard. As all know in making such a shunt it is necessary to shift the tracks quickly. This he endeavored to do when in some unaccountable manner his hands slipped off the switch lever and he lost his balance, falling on the track in front of the rapidly moving cars. He was struck on the head and killed instantly.

Word was sent to Newcastle where his mother, Mrs Robert MacMurray and brothers and sisters reside, and the news gently broken to the family. It is only about eighteen months since Mr. MacMurray father of the deceased, was killed in the Newcastle yard.

The remains were taken to West Branch, Kent county for interment. The funeral from the home of the deceased to the station was largely attended. Services at the house were conducted by Rev H. Amott, assisted by Revs. F. T. Snell and H. Johnston. The pall bearers were: Messrs. Clifford McKay, Robert Smallwood, John Smallwood, Harry Graham and Wm. Sheppard.

The deceased young man, who was much respected here was 23 years of age. The sorrowing family have the heartfelt sympathy of the entire community.—Advocate.

### PROTECTING GAME

Prosecution of Offenders at Chatham and Tracadie: Last week

In its game the North Shore has a valuable asset and this is being more fully realized each year by the residents. That a few law breakers could kill game and escape detection or punishment was in the past admitted but it is harder to evade the action of the law, especially when good wardens are appointed.

Last week a Chatham merchant was up before Police Magistrate Connors charged with having a moose calf skin in his possession. He pleaded guilty and was fined \$100 and costs.

On the same day a Little Southwest man was up before the same court charged with killing beaver. He pleaded guilty and was fined \$30 and costs. The fine was allowed to stand for one month.

A St Isidore resident was up before Albert Robichaud at Tracadie for killing a moose out of season. He pleaded guilty and was fined \$50 and costs. The costs were paid and the fine allowed to stand for a time.

Game Warden Robinson informs the Advocate that he has a few more cases which will come up later.

Stephen Campbell the game warden of Pokenouche is doing good service and is receiving the support of the residents of that locality in his work.

Gloucester County people had the reputation of being unfavorable to the game laws, but Warden Robinson says that this is not the case as they seem as anxious to have this valuable asset preserved and he wishes through the Advocate to thank the residents of the part of the County he recently visited for the assistance and hospitality rendered him during the discharge of his duties.—Advocate

## PUBLIC ACCOUNTS

Reports of Committees Pre-  
sented to Legislature.

### PROVINCIAL HOSPITAL

Concerning the Highway Ac-  
counts—Number of Bills  
Passed

FREDERICTON, March 22.—The  
report of the committee on agriculture  
as submitted this evening, contained  
nothing of more than ordinary im-  
portance. The report emphasized the im-  
portance of the use of good seed by  
the farmers, but declared against  
the suggested plan of having the  
Agricultural Department supply  
approved seed to the farmers.  
The agricultural societies were spoken  
of as the proper media through which  
the farmers should secure improvement  
of seed, but the policy pursued by the  
department in holding seed fairs was  
condemned. The employment of two  
experts to lecture before the farmers on  
wheat raising during this year was  
recommended as was a continuance of  
strict supervision of roller mills. The  
importance of hogs and poultry raising  
was touched upon, and the department  
urged to do all possible to encourage  
the farmers in raising hogs and poultry.  
The report also commended the govern-  
ment for its course in aiding New Brun-  
swick scholars at agricultural colleges,  
and advised the publication of an ad-  
ditional one thousand copies of the  
agricultural report.

Mr. Osman submitted the report of  
the public accounts committee, which  
however, was not signed by Messrs  
Morrison and Smith, the opposition  
members of the committee. The  
report told of the careful scrutiny made  
of all the accounts and of the full  
information given the committee by  
the heads of the various departments.  
The accounts, as a whole, were pro-  
nounced very satisfactory. The re-  
port recommended, however, that  
strong efforts be made to collect  
\$1,75 still owing the province by  
purchasers of seed, and that, failing  
collection, the several accounts mak-  
ing up the sum be wiped out as  
debt; that delinquent road superin-  
tendents be ordered to furnish im-  
mediately detailed accounts; that the  
report provided by the Public Works  
Department be made more explicit in  
their directions; that in purchasing  
supplies for the Provincial Hospital  
the tender system should be followed  
as far as possible, and that an endeavor  
be made to avoid the necessity of  
publishing Dr. Auglin's personal  
accounts. The report also commended  
Mr. W. S. London, assistant Auditor  
General, and Mr. C. Y. Diblee for  
their efforts in aiding the committee's  
work.

The amendments to the liquor li-  
cense Act which were passed to-night  
are not those suggested by Rev.  
Thomas Marshall and his temperance  
colleagues. The first of these new  
amendments provides that it shall be  
unlawful for any person holding a  
license under the Liquor License Act,  
to send liquor into a county, city or  
town in which the act is in force, or  
into any locality where the sale of li-  
cense is prohibited under the pro-  
visions of the Liquor License Act,  
where such licensed person knows or  
has reason to believe that the person  
or persons to whom such liquor is sent  
or are engaged in the sale of liquor  
contrary to law; and the person so  
offending shall be liable to a penalty of  
not less than twenty dollars nor more  
than fifty dollars for a first offence,  
and not less than fifty dollars nor  
more than one hundred dollars for a  
second offence, and not less than one  
hundred dollars nor more than two  
hundred dollars for a third offence.  
The second amendment provides for  
the cancellation of the license of any  
person who is shown to the license  
commissioners to have been convicted  
a second time of a breach of the above  
provision. The license, however, is  
given ten days in which he may ap-  
peal from a decision of the commis-  
sioners cancelling his license. The  
appeal lies to the Lieutenant Govern-  
or in Council and must be made  
within twenty days from the issuance  
of the cancellation order. The Lieu-  
tenant Governor in Council may, on  
hearing the evidence, repeal or res-  
cind the order. No licensee is to be  
permitted to send liquor into any  
Scott Act county or into any locality  
where the sale of liquor is prohibited  
by any express company or other con-  
veyance C. O. D. On complaint  
being made to the license commis-  
sioners that any licensee has so offend-  
ed, the board shall give reasonable  
notice to the licensee whose conduct is  
complained of, and upon it appearing  
to the board that such licensee has

offended against the above provisions  
it shall be the duty of the board to  
make the order cancelling the license  
of such licensee. Upon such order  
being made all the provisions of this  
act as to appealing, etc., shall apply.  
It is further provided that any express  
company or other carrier by or on be-  
half of any person, in a county in  
which the C. T. A. is in force, or in  
any locality where the sale of liquor is  
prohibited under the provisions of the  
Liquor License Act, to be paid for on  
delivery, and the manager or agent of  
the company or other carrier in the  
place where the liquor is delivered to  
such express company or other carrier,  
shall be respectively liable to a penalty  
of not less than forty dollars and not  
exceeding one hundred dollars for each  
offence. The bill was passed without  
debate.

### FAMINE IN JAPAN

Red Cross Society Report  
About 1,000,000 people  
Starving

New York, March 22.—The  
New York state branch of the  
American National Red Cross today  
issued a statement as to famine  
conditions in Japan. It was  
explained that owing to the  
national characteristics of the  
Japanese in not calling for help,  
these facts have just become known.

"The famine in Japan," the state-  
ment says, which has been con-  
sidered for some time moderately  
serious, is now known as the  
result of reliable private advices  
received by the New York State  
Red Cross to be one of the most  
terrible starvation emergencies of  
modern times. The failure of the  
rice crops, which at one time was  
believed to be limited to certain  
classes only, in the northern  
provinces has been found to be  
general in those parts of Japan and  
conservative estimates place the  
number of starving Japanese at  
from 800,000 to 1,000,000 people.  
For these, owing to extended rains  
last summer which have ruined  
the rice and other food crops, there  
is absolutely no relief in sight until  
next October when a new har-  
vest will be available.

"As if this were not bad enough  
the present winter has been one of  
the most severe in Japan in many  
years, \$16,000,000 is the total  
sum which will be required to  
save the Japanese country people.  
This is estimated by allowing for a  
cost of ten cents per person per  
day."

## AFTER THE CUP

Sir Thomas Lipton Proposes  
to Complete at Newport

### HIS YACHT IS ELIGIBLE

Contest Would be Given  
International  
Flavor

New York, March 22.—After  
the meeting of the New York  
Yacht Club last evening, Oliver E.  
Cromwell, chairman of the regatta  
committee of the club, made the in-  
teresting statement that he was  
unofficially informed that Sir  
Thomas Lipton would by a com-  
petitor with the Shamrock 111 in  
the race off Newport in August for  
the cup offered by King Edward.

From another source it was  
learned that Sir Thomas had ad-  
dressed a letter of enquiry to a  
prominent yachtsman on this side  
of the water as to whether the  
Shamrock would be eligible for  
the race, and as to the chances of  
his securing an American crew and  
skipper to handle her, stating that  
he would race if he could get a  
crew. Her eligibility is beyond  
question, under the terms of the  
deed of gift of the cup. Whether  
or not skipper and crew can be  
secured is another question which  
Sir Thomas' own experience ought  
to answer. The conditions for the  
race are recited in section four:  
"Any yacht belonging to any yacht  
club in the United States in good  
standing shall be eligible to enter  
provided that in case of a single  
masted vessel shall be of a water  
line length of not less than fifty  
feet, and that in case of a vessel of  
more than one mast she shall be of  
a water line length of more than  
sixty feet, etc."

The Shamrock is enrolled regu-  
larly in both the New York and  
Atlantic yacht clubs.

The entry of the Shamrock in the  
race would give the contest an  
international flavor and an interest  
even beyond that which it promises  
in any case to invoke. It would  
necessitate the starting of either  
the Columbia or Constitution to  
defend American laurels. The  
Shamrock would rate well under  
the new rule, paying no penalty  
for her excessive draught, as she  
was launched prior to January 1  
1905, and would have an excellent  
chance of lifting the cup.

The decision of Sir Thomas in  
the matter will be awaited with the  
keenest interest. If he is to enter  
the race, his determination to do so  
will have to be made very shortly,  
as it will mean considerable time  
to fit out and turn up the cup  
challenger after her long rest in  
Brooklyn.

### EARTHQUAKE IN ITALIAN ISLAND

Twenty-One Shocks Felt;  
People Panic Stricken

New York, March 22.—A  
despatch to the Herald from  
Palermo, Italy, says that there  
have been twenty-one earthquake  
shocks on the Island of Ustica  
during the last three days. The  
population lives in constant terror.  
A great valley has been formed in  
the centre of the island, and all  
the houses have been demolished.  
The shocks were vertical, not  
undulatory, and were accompanied  
by loud subterranean rumblings.

The last shock, which occurred  
on Wednesday afternoon, finished  
the work of destruction. Panic  
seized upon the two thousand in-  
habitants of the island, who  
abandoned their homes after the  
first visitation of the earthquakes  
and camped in fields and public  
squares. Many took refuge in  
boats in the harbor. The island  
is used as a penal settlement for  
hardened criminals, of whom 600  
are quartered there. These were

also panic-stricken and attempted  
to escape, attacking their guards,  
but were subdued. They began a  
second disturbance yesterday.  
One of the three mountains on the  
island is reported by the submarine  
cable to be in eruption. The  
government at the first news sent  
the cruiser Varese to subdue the  
revolt of the prisoners and aid  
sufferers. She was followed by the  
cruiser Eurydice, with a scientific  
party aboard to study the seismic  
phenomena. Yesterday the steam-  
ship Egadi was sent with soldiers,  
doctors, a detachment of the Red  
Cross nurses and litters, as greater  
disasters are feared. The prefect  
of Palermo has been ordered to  
send a representative to the scene.

Ustica is a island of 2,000 in-  
habitants in the province of  
Palermo, sixty-eight miles north-  
west of Palermo. Its soil is very

### BLAZE IN I. C. R. SHOPS

Close call on Monday Night  
Of Remaining Portion of  
I. C. R. Works

A fire which, had it gone un-  
noticed ten minutes longer would  
have been beyond all control, and  
which from its location points very  
strongly to incendiarism, was dis-  
covered in a corner of the I. C. R.  
tender shop by watchman Garland  
on Monday night; it was in a most  
dangerous position and had it  
gotten under headway would have  
threatened all the remaining I. C. R.  
plant.

It was about half-past eight in  
the evening when the fire was dis-  
covered. Under a door in the  
centre of the tender shop, which  
shop immediately adjoins the  
round-house on one side, and the  
machine shops on the other, had  
been wedged a large quantity of  
waste and in two distinct places  
this waste was burning. When  
discovered the flames had made  
their way well up the inside of the  
door, a considerable portion of the  
door-sill having been consumed,  
and the flames were making rapid  
headway. Night-watchman Gar-  
land was making his rounds as  
usual, and it is indeed a fortunate  
circumstance that he happened to  
see the blaze. It was secluded  
from his sight by two locomotive-  
tenders which were standing di-  
rectly in front of where the fire  
was. The slight reflection of the  
blaze did not escape watchman  
Garland's notice and he im-  
mediately summoned the aid of  
some workmen who were in the  
round-house and the flames were  
extinguished.

In the place in which the fire  
located, there was no necessity for  
the use of waste and there were no  
fires in the vicinity from which  
the waste could catch. The door  
under which the fire was located  
leads out to the turn-table of the  
old roundhouse and there is a  
quantity of snow outside the door;  
the fire was inside and the only  
possible use for waste in such a  
position would be to keep out the  
cold draughts. Workmen had  
been employed on the tender of No.  
102 locomotive on the previous  
day. There were no fires in the  
vicinity, and the locality was one  
of the most dangerous in which a  
fire could start. The surround-  
ing walls are all of wood and con-  
nect directly with the erecting and  
machine shops.

On Tuesday night, or rather  
early Wednesday morning, a  
trap was found sleeping near by,  
where the fire was discovered and  
was ordered out by watchman  
Garland. The tramp was reposing  
on the floor covered with an  
overcoat when discovered and left  
hastily when threatened with  
arrest.

Mr. Garland has served in the  
capacity of watchman for four  
years and a half and during that  
time has put out over one hundred  
incipient blazes in different parts  
of the shop. He was not on duty  
at the time of the recent great I. C.  
R. fire, being ill at home, so it  
can be said that no serious fires  
ever occurred while he was on  
duty. It is creditable to his  
watchfulness that the blaze on  
Monday night, located as it was in  
an obscure portion of the shop was  
discovered. Transcript 22nd.

### BATTLE IN PHILIPPINES

Governor Curry Reports on  
Recent Sanguinary  
Engagement

Manila, March 26.—Governor  
Curry is safe and well but the par-  
ticulars of his rescue are not avail-  
able at this hour.

General Buchman, commanding  
the department of Visayas, has  
left for Catbalogan, the capital of  
the island of Samar, to lend the aid  
of the federal government to the  
insular authorities if desirable.

Small detachments of federal  
troops are now assisting the con-  
stabulary in the pursuit of the  
fugitive Pulajanes. The insular  
government has not yet requested  
federal aid.

Major General Wood has loaned  
the constabulary 500 Krag-Jorgensen  
rifles to supplant the single shot  
Springfields they have been using.

Governor Curry has reported to  
the government on the recent en-  
gagement with Pulajanes at Mag-  
taon. He says:—

"Had a hard fight in which Cap-  
tain Jones, of the constabulary lost  
his command, but gained a magni-  
ficent victory in the face of over-  
whelming odds. The Pulajanes  
under a flag of truce and while pro-  
mising to surrender immediately  
opened fire charging the constabulary.

"The leader of the Pulajanes  
ordered his men to first wipe out  
the constabulary and then to cap-  
ture the governor and the other  
Americans.

I have requested a company of  
federal troops immediately, and  
later when joined by this additional  
force will prepare to wage war of  
extermination against the fugitives,  
which is the only alternative.

"The constabulary did splendid  
work, though their inferior fire  
arms, were minus bayonets, placed  
them at a disadvantage. With the  
assistance of the federal troops we  
will be able to exterminate the  
fugitives, who are now in the  
mountains, and will destroy the  
crops.

"The natives of Samar, with the  
exception of the Pulajanes are in  
sympathy with us, and are assist-

## THE I. C. R.

The annual report of the Department of Railways and Canals is at hand and gives some interesting statements with regard to the Intercolonial Railway. It shows that during the present year the road has gone behind \$1,725,303.92. At first these figures seem startling but a review of facts place the matter under a different and more favorable light. Vast improvements have been made in the road and in the rolling stock. Half a million dollars increase over last year has been spent on locomotive power alone and an extra quarter of a million on the maintenance of ways and works, twenty-two new engines, two dining cars, fourteen parlor cars, twenty-first class cars, four second class sleepers, four postal and one hundred and fifty box, cattle and refrigerator cars have been added to the equipment. The passenger accommodations have been brought up to the standard so that to-day we have one of the most commodious railways in Canada. All this time it remained and in many respects still remains the cheapest railway service in the Dominion.

But while the Intercolonial during the whole year made a deficit of \$800,000 it is interesting to note that during the last six months there was a decrease over last year of nearly \$200,000 in the expenses while the earnings during the same period were increased \$233,296 showing on the whole a betterment during the last six months of the year of nearly half million dollars.

The reason for this great increase can well be credited to the Minister himself. At the beginning of the year Mr. Emmerson set about a sweeping reform which not only consisted in reducing the expenditures but at the same time improved the conditions of the road. It required however some time to get it in proper working order. Indeed it was not until six months had elapsed that the result became felt. From that time forward the earnings of the road increased and the expense diminished and at the close of the year it had during the six months previous a betterment of over last year of nearly half a million dollars. The result was a surprise to everyone. It proved conclusively that the present Minister of Railways was not the "dead head" he was at first reported. His friends were loud in their praise of the new Minister and even words of encouragement were forced from his worst enemies. They unanimously agreed that they had mistaken their man. The Ottawa Citizen, one of the leading Conservative organs, generously and justly says,—"It must be said Mr. Emmerson that he has exhibited more capacity in improving the earning powers of the national road than any of his predecessors, and the country will be disposed to entrust him with the task of making good his promise that the Intercolonial will eventually be made a first class paying proposition. He has had hard luck in having experienced a heavy loss by the Moncton fire just when his management of the line had brought a surplus of earning over expenditure in sight, but he has demonstrated that a Minister of Railways with a reasonably free hand can make the road pay despite the trammels of politics." This is certainly a praiseworthy statement coming as it does from one of Mr. Emmerson's opponents. The statement is rather severe on Mr. Haggart, a former Minister of Railways, who occupied part of two days in praising himself. He did it indirectly, to be sure, but nevertheless, he did it. He condemned the present management in the most pronounced terms and pointed out how from 1892-1896 (the time when he was in power) the road had no deficit. The honorable gentleman must have blushed

had he allowed his mind to wander back to the dates he mentioned when the Intercolonial was nothing more than a "one horse" road to what it is today. The earnings of the road today are nearly a million dollars more than double what they were in any of these years and the service then was certainly the worst of any road in Canada.

We should be proud that we have a railway which is not only equal to the best, but in a very short time will be the very best railroad in the Dominion, and at the same time be the paying investment which the returns for the last six months predict for it. Then, only the, will Mr. Emmerson have that crown of laurels which the public had prepared for his predecessor when that gentleman showed his unworthiness by snatching at the throat of his lord and master, Mr. Blair was beguiled into the belief that without him the Intercolonial could not and would not exist. He withdrew his support at the most critical period possible, but we were fortunate in having a man who has not only shown himself in every respect superior to the ex-minister, but entirely free from all those monetary ambitions which, it is generally believed, induced his predecessor to abandon the helm when the tempest was at its height. There is little doubt that Mr. Emmerson will remain in office to complete the reform he so skillfully begun. As the Ottawa Citizen puts it "The country will be disposed to entrust him with the task of making good his promise that the Intercolonial will eventually be made a first class paying proposition."

## THE INSURANCE ENQUIRY

The Insurance Commission has plenty of work cut out for it. So far as the investigation has gone, and so far as an outside observer can judge, the Insurance Department at Ottawa has not been much of a check, if any, upon the management of the Companies. Its inspections have been perfunctory, incomplete and unsatisfactory. There has been no careful, or detailed, examination of books or business. Independent audits may have taken place or they may not; values of stocks, and bonds may have been as claimed, or they may not; a thousand and one matters usually coming under the head of efficient inspection may or may not have been as represented. Whether through inadequacy of staff—though a larger one does not seem to have been asked for, whether through inadequacy in the law—though changes do not appear to have been passed very seriously whether through the natural growth of official optimism, confidence and indifference to detail, a condition has arisen which demands the keen inquiry of the Commission. There may be nothing really wrong with the Companies, with their business or with their methods of management; and I do not believe there is anything seriously wrong. But it is obvious that the Insurance Department does not know whether there is or not and that upon the Commission, therefore, lies additional responsibility in its continued investigation.

The American experts who have been investigating the dogfish problem have come to the conclusion that the most practical way of meeting the plague is by making the fish a marketable commodity. The authorities agree that the dogfish cannot be exterminated and it is therefore suggested as the best policy that Government assistance be directed to place it upon the market as a food-fish.—Ex

A resolution favoring the erection of a market building and town hall, was passed by the Town Council on Monday and a committee of three appointed to look up a suitable site. This is a move in the right direction and should be endorsed by every ratepayer. Persons having lots of land suitable for a building of this kind should notify L. T. Joudry chairman of the committee at once. Should the right piece of land be obtainable a vote of the ratepayers will be taken to ascertain the feeling of the people in regard to expenditure of the amount of money which will be necessary to erect a suitable building.

## FUNERAL OF THE LATE WILLIAM MURRAY.

On Friday last the remains of the late William Murray of Cross Point, P. Q., whose sudden death on the 20th inst startled the community were laid to rest in the cemetery at St. Anne de Restigouche, after service in the Church there which was attended by a large concourse of the friends of the deceased, the funeral procession being the largest seen here for years.

In Mr. Murray's death the lumber community of Restigouche has lost one of its best representatives, as for many years past he was identified with the trade and at all times regarded as a safe and reliable operator.

Born at Richibucto in 1852 he came to Restigouche about 1883 and as one of the firm of Murray Brothers, and since their dissolution in his own behalf has operated on the Restigouche ever since. A man of unusual vigor and magnificent physique he seemed to have a lease of life for many years and his friends were quite unprepared to bear of his sudden demise.

He is survived by Mrs. Murray, his widow, his sons Michael, Richard, John and William, the latter two of whom are absent in the United States and his daughter Gertrude.

We understand that the operations conducted by Mr. Murray at the time of his decease will be carried to conclusion by Messrs Michael and Richard his sons.

During this time he took a strong fancy to a clever workman named Cruys, whom he persuaded to return with him to Russia after he had revealed to him his true name and position. Cruys drew the plans for the first ships built for the Russian navy, and to show his appreciation, Peter the Great made him an admiral and gave orders that the Russian navy should thenceforth have a special flag with a white cross upon it to perpetuate the memory of his trusted associate, Cruys being an old form of the Dutch word for cross.

**The Horn Dance.**  
Among the quaint old customs and ceremonies still kept alive in English country districts there is only one "horn dance," and that is to be found at Abbot's Bromley, in Staffordshire. Every year at the village wake the dance is still carried out. The origin of the horn dance is lost in the mists of history, but it has been traced back as far as the eleventh century. Until the seventeenth century it was practiced at Christmas, on New Year's day and on Twelfth day. In the time of Henry VIII. the dance was performed in front of the church every Sunday and a collection for the poor taken up from the spectators.

## I. C. R. CHANGES

The first move has been made in what it is believed will ultimately result in the removal from Gibson and this city of the head offices of the Canada Eastern branch of the I. C. R. to a point on the main line and probably Newcastle.

The notice has been received at Gibson from Moncton that the train despatchers' department at Gibson is to be removed to Newcastle and that train despatchers J. D. McNutt and P. McCarron are to report at Newcastle on April 10th.

The city will feel the loss of this department and the loss of the others would indeed be severe.

Messrs McNutt and McCarron both reside in the east end of the city and the many friends which they and their families have made here will exceedingly regret their departure.

HAVE never known my friend to be in better form, both mental and physical, than in the year '05. "If you could have looked into Alarby's back shop you would have seen a dead pig swung from a hook in the ceiling and a gentleman in his shirt sleeves furiously stabbing at it with this weapon. I was that energetic person, and I have satisfied myself that by no exertion of my strength can I transfix the pig with a single blow. Perhaps you would care to try?"

"Not for worlds. But why were you doing this?"

"Because it seemed to me to have an indirect bearing upon the mystery of Woodman's Lee. Ah, Hopkins, I got your wire last night, and I have been expecting you. Come and join us."

Our visitor was an exceedingly alert man, thirty years of age, dressed in a quiet tweed suit, but retaining the erect bearing of one who was accustomed to official uniform. I recognized him at once as Stanley Hopkins, a young police inspector, for whose fu-

"A sheath knife, still in its sheath. It lay at the feet of the dead man. Mrs. Carey identified it as being her husband's property."

Holmes was lost in thought for some time.

"Well," said he at last, "I suppose I shall have to come out and have a look at it."

Stanley Hopkins gave a cry of joy.

"Thank you, sir. That will, indeed, be a weight off my mind."

Holmes shook his finger at the inspector.

"It would have been an easier task a week ago," said he. "But even now my visit may not be entirely fruitless. Watson, if you can spare the time I should be very glad of your company. If you will call a four wheeler, Hopkins, we shall be ready to start for Forest Row in a quarter of an hour."

## GLOUCESTER COUNTY

An Interesting History of Methodism.

### THE EARLY SETTLERS.

A Bird's Eye View of the County—Interesting Facts.

Gloucester is one of the northern counties of New Brunswick, has an area of 1,950,000 acres, of which 706,337 acres are still owned by the government. It has a coast line of 150 miles on the Bay of Chaleur and Gulf of St. Lawrence, has immense water power, has numerous rivers, and it is traversed by the Intercolonial railway from north to south, while the Carleton and Gulf Shore lines give ready access to particularly attractive sporting grounds, and to a number of delightful summer resorts. The woods are full of deer, moose, and feathered game the rivers and streams teem with the finest varieties of the finny tribe, while the coast is alive with geese, brant, duck and other aquatic fowl. It has large resources in lumber, various minerals have been found in considerable quantities, a large business is done in fish, and wheat and other agricultural products are successfully cultivated. The population of the county according to the last census, was 27,935, of whom 21,599 were French Acadians, 1,335 English, 2,775 Irish, 1,071 Scotch and the balance of various nationalities. Their church relationships are as follows: Roman Catholics, 25,301; Presbyterians, 1,093; Anglicans, 886; Methodists, 274; Baptists, 33; Protestants, 28; the Lutheran, Congregational Brethren, Adventist and Jewish faiths having one or more representatives, with three persons who were reported as "non-specified." Among the institutions of the county is the lazaretto at Tracadie, in which a number of persons afflicted with leprosy are cared for by the dominion government.

them at bay until the fire reached the powder room when both ships were blown up. Such is the explanation, whether or not satisfactory, the reader may decide for himself.

### CAME FROM IRELAND.

Methodism was brought to the county of Gloucester by a little band of Irish immigrants about the year 1820. With them religion was more than a mere belief, it was an experience, they "knew whereof they did affirm," and made use of the means within their reach to keep the holy fire burning. They had no minister, could get none, but they held meetings, had sermons read by some of their number on the Lord's Day, and established a Sabbath School. This was kept up for some nine years, and while "hope deferred had often made their hearts sad, yet as "all things come to those who wait," what they had so long and patiently waited for came at last. The first Methodist preacher to visit Bathurst was Michael Pickles and the time the month of August, 1830. The population of the place numbered about 150 persons, nearly all of whom were Presbyterians. Although it was after nine o'clock of a Saturday night when the preacher arrived in the village, so anxious were the people to hear the word of life, he preached again the following morning, after which he was driven to New Bandon by one Richard Dawson. The Dawson had come with the original immigrants from the town of Bandon, and had given the name with the prefix New to their home on this side the ocean. The preacher received a right royal reception, and the delight of the people at hearing one of their own ministers manifest itself in ways out of the ordinary although quite in accord with the letter of Scripture and the manner of the early Christians. One good sister was so overjoyed that she threw her arms around the neck of the young and beautiful preacher and kissed him again and again.

This visit was followed by others by Enoch Wood and Arthur McNutt during the next two years, and in 1832 Joseph F Bent was sent to care for these interesting people. Under his earnest and devoted efforts the good work was greatly promoted and the need of suitable places in which to hold the services became pressing. A church was begun to be erected in 1834, of the dedication of which no record is available, but on March 24, 1834, there was a sale of the pews, at which the highest price, the pews brought the purchasers being Benjamin Dawson, £10; and William Stevens, £9. Dawson subsequently sold his pew to the Hon. Joseph Campbell.

That church was replaced by a more modern and commodious one which was dedicated about the year 1878. A Church was dedicated by William Allen on New Years Day, 1841, a preliminary service being held the previous night in watching the old year out and the new one in.

Other houses for the worship of God have been erected in other parts of the district during the passing years and to-day there is a large and up-to-date church at New Bandon, in place of the old one; and one at Salmon Beach in course of erection, which promises to be a fine structure. In the matter of church accommodation, the circuit is well provided for, the minister receives a salary of over \$800, the congregational funds are cared for to the amount of \$2,400, and for circuit purposes the figures are \$495. Bathurst has also ranked among our best county circuits, and under its present pastor, Richard Opie, continues to sustain its well earned reputation in loyally supporting the various institutions of the church. Among the most prominent men of the earlier days were Richard and Benjamin Dawson, William Stevens and William Duncan, and in more recent times and at the present the names of Windsor, Buttner, Branch, Kent, Johnson, Gammon, Eddy, Payne, Rennie, Sutherland, Smith, Vance, Stephen, Jennings, Sempley and others, whose contributions run from \$10 to over \$50. This generous spirit is not confined to Bathurst, but manifests itself at New Bandon, Tetagouche, Salmon Beach, Miscou and Canobie. During the twenty-four years that have elapsed away since the work was entered upon there have been appointed thereto

Of the above thirteen died in harness three are superannuated, three were transferred to other conferences, two re-entered secular life, three left the

rank under unhappy circumstances, and the remaining ones are still with us bearing the burdens and seeking to make "full proof of their ministry."

The work on this circuit has had a very variable history, if the conference records are to be regarded as reliable. Between the years 1832 and 1855 it had the usual ups and downs, times of religious depression followed by seasons of growth and expansion. One of the latter kind took place during the pastorate of William Allen, who in the days of his physical vigor and strength was a very popular preacher, and successful revivalist. In the British North American Wesleyan Magazine for 1840 we read of a very powerful revival at the Cape, and which began at the first meeting held in the new chapel. The altar, the space around the altar, and the aisles were crowded with weeping penitents, and at one of the meetings the entire audience, with a single exception, knelt while prayer was being offered on behalf of the weeping ones. Account for it as we may there was a power, an unction, a sense of the sinfulness of sin and a consciousness of the Divine Presence in these old time revival meetings, of which there is now but little known since 1855. There are no records of anything special in the revival lines, and the only sources of information available are the minutes of the conference. From these we learn that the lowest number reported as members during the last half century was in 1866, when the figures given are 38—a drop of 39 out of 77. This was probably due to some circumstances of which it is not necessary now to speak, or possibly there was an error in the returns. In 1863, during the pastorate of William W. Perkins, the numbers rose to 143; for several years the figures ranged from 86 to 108; Howard Sprague reported 116, Wm Harrison 104, Joseph Sellar 200, Richard Opie 205, and John Goss 224. These figures furnish food for thought and may be studied with profit by both preachers and people, and whose appeal was to the reason and conscience; the man whose impassioned exhortations stirred the soul and touched the heart and led the hearer to feel that man that; the man whose strength lay in gentle and genial demeanor in his intercourse with his people—a friend to all, an enemy to none; the man of brusque and vigorous style, pushing, energetic and eminently practical, who never overlooked the financial while caring for the spiritual; and the man whose great theme was the higher life, and whose attention was given perhaps more to the church members than to the outside sinner. In make-up and methods they widely differed, but the results were much the same.

### General Unprising Advanced by Socialists

ST PETERSBURG, March 22.—The agitation among the workmen's organizations involves a bold plan on the part of social democrats, revolutionaries and other radical elements to send delegates elected secretly to a meeting to be called at some place in Finland early in April, at which an ultimate plan of operations will be decided upon. A division of sentiments exists among the leaders. Some of them favor calling a general strike in the middle of April for the purpose of forcing the Lower House of Parliament to demand the immediate convocation of a constituent assembly on the basis of universal suffrage, but the more audacious aim at setting up a provisional government. They believe the time is ripe to organize a general uprising, and that, if successful, their representatives could boldly contest the authority of the government. The authorities here have already gotten wind of what is going on.

## TROUBLE IN INDIA

Calcutta, March 24. In consequence of the repeated raids by bands of Waziris and other tribesmen occupying the wild independent territory on the northwest frontier of India, the military authorities in India contemplate sending a powerful expedition into the disturbed districts to convince the tribesmen that these attacks on British outposts and government agents must cease. It is not intended to make the expedition a punitive one, for, in the opinion of Lord Kitchener, the commander-in-chief, the occasional burning of a native village as a punishment for a raid is a temporary measure which merely results in reprisals by the tribesmen. Efforts recently have been made by sending a high official to interview the chiefs of the recalcitrant tribes to persuade them to keep their followers in order and abstain from the periodic attacks upon British posts. The expedition is designed to follow up these representations, and by a show of force to check the evil.

The commander-in-chief is of the opinion that the only way to prevent the recurrence of these troubles is to educate the tribesmen, as has been done in other parts of India, which are now quite peaceful. The employment of force is an extremely difficult matter on account of the terrible character of the country. To occupy the hills in sufficient force to overawe the tribesmen would require to use of the greater part of all of the troops in India.

During the last few months at least half a dozen instances have occurred of attacks by native raiders. In September last two Sepoys were killed and two others wounded by a party of raiders at Ilmdin and in the same week two men of the South Waziristan militia were ambushed and killed. In December a gang of tribesmen attacked the levy post at Gudwana, killing six men and wounding three others of the garrison.

A few days later a village was raided near Peshawar and a considerable quantity of property looted. Major Donaldson, of the Bannu Brigade, was murdered during the same month, and not long ago Lieut. Col. Harman, commanding the South Waziristan militia, was killed. These and similar acts of aggression have become alarmingly frequent of late, and the authorities hope by the methods which are now under consideration to bring the tribesmen into a more friendly attitude.

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## LETTER FROM W. H. WALLACE

Campbellton Mar 28th 1906  
To the Editor of Events

Dear Sir:—In your last week's issue you printed a report in reference to the inspection of our Curling Rink by a St. John man.

Would you kindly allow me space to present a few facts in reference to same.

During the winter a large quantity of snow and ice gathered on the west side of the Rink—the soft weather and rains formed a great weight of ice and snow which strained one of the main trusses before this heavy weight was removed. The directors of the Rink called in our local building inspector to inspect same, who I am informed, said he did not know much about it. He in turn called in his carpenter to assist him in the inspection which resulted in their stating that the building was unsafe and recommended that a St. John inspector, at quite a large sum, be engaged.

As I am the designer and builder of the Rink I feel that an injustice has been done me by circulating statements which are not backed up by facts. Since these reports have been made, some six weeks ago, we have had several heavy storms and gales which ought to be a test to any building.

Two large roofs near the town of Campbellton have given away, one of which I assisted to replace. These roofs were built from the plans of an architect and a foreman brought from St. John to inspect the building of the larger one. This with many others in different parts have gone down, but the Rink which was called unsafe because one eight inch plank had broken and patrons warned not to go inside, has been constantly used by our Curlers and families.

I called on our inspector and he refused to give me the name of the man to be brought from St. John or to give me the date he would be in town.

During the past few years I have been called upon to repair quite a number of buildings that would not stand what they were intended for or when they were affected by the nature of the ground, etc. In no case have I done the work without consulting the builder or given an opinion that would discredit their work. I also have in mind two very costly stone churches that are being built by high priced architects the one just across the river from our town. Last summer it was inspected by Mr. Bulmer who was engaged to superintend the building of our Post Office. It was called unsafe by him. The other building to which I refer is the Cathedral at Chatham. Part of it has to be rebuilt at an extra cost of twenty-five thousand dollars; so much for high priced inspection.

Some eight years ago I built a large building for the Kings County Exhibition Association, same design of frame as our Rink. Next year I was engaged to build another. Both buildings have stood all kinds of tests. The attendance on one occasion was six thousand people, and not one dollar has been spent on repairs. I have received many compliments on the construction of these two buildings.

The owners of buildings in our smart little town during the past few years having been paying more attention to foundation. Thousands of loads of sawdust have been placed around them, drains have been opened up. But what has been done to our Rink new sidewalk has been placed across in front of building to form a dam to keep water around foundation, water pipes for two seasons have been run under the Rink, water allowed to overflow, no attention paid to drainage, tons of ice and snow allowed to remain on the roof, etc. Then when an eight inch plank breaks \$50.00 (I am told) is spent to send some high priced fellow to look wise and tell them something they ought not to do, and the money has gone to St. John.

I will not submit to these men's judgments—I have already obtained better.

I feel it is unfair to send broadcast reports that are calculated to affect one who is trying to make his living by honest toil. I bear a good old Scottish name and love their game and I feel sure that a majority of them and all fair minded people do not hold me responsible for the nature of the ground upon which the rink is built, or the elements which none of us can control and the motives of some will end as Burns puts it:—"The best laid schemes, etc. etc."

Four hundred and fifty acres are now under cultivation, and the stock is principally Richibucto and Connecticut Blue Point. The transplanted stock has proven so favorable that it is intended to introduce Baltimore oysters from Chesapeake Bay.—Fishing Gazette.

## RETURNING TO CANADA

Northwest Farmers Went to Australia and Were Greatly Disappointed

OTTAWA, Ont., March 26—

The trade and commerce department has received two reports from its agent in Australia, Mr. Larke, writing from Sydney, says that he visited the Fiji Islands and found that Canadian trade was steadily but slowly increasing. He cites the evidence of a witness before a government commission to show that the Pacific cable was being threatened because it was a publicly owned line. On this subject Mr. Ross the Melbourne agent, says that the Pacific Cable Company was making applications to the commons with government for the same facilities as are now enjoyed by the eastern extension company in regard to special telegraph lines.

Mr. Laikie says that a party of Canadian northwest farmers went to Australia two months ago. They are returning, not being satisfied with the country. They say that land cannot be readily obtained in Australia except at prices beyond its value. Good land is heavily timbered and would take from \$50 to \$125 to clear it. They say that the Canadian winter is preferable to the heat of the Australian summer.

## THE GOVERNOR OF N. S.

Appointed at Yesterday's Cabinet Meeting—Will be Sworn in This Week

OTTAWA, March 27—Hon D. C. Fraser, one of the justices of the supreme court of Nova Scotia, was appointed at today's cabinet meeting lieutenant governor of Nova Scotia.

When the news of his appointment leaked out here tonight telegrams of congratulations were speedily forwarded to him by his numerous friends. It is said to say that his appointment will be well received all over Canada.

Mr. Fraser was one of the most popular members of the house. He resigned from the commons about two years ago and became one of the judges of the supreme court of Nova Scotia. He will assume his duties of the new office at once.

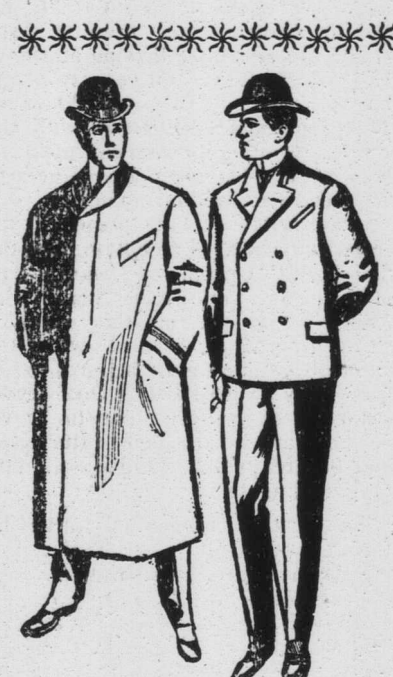
