The employment of an irregular, guerilla-like force of this description to verawe one party to a labor dispute has had the reverse of a conciliatory effect in the majority of cases, and the climax was reached when the Carnegie Company hired some 300 Pinkerton agents, at \$5 a day, to take shot-gun and revolver control of their





Our condition would not be so bad were it not that our principal supporters and givers are themselves burned out and heavy losers by the fire. Thus sadly cippled, we appeal to you for help." In response to his appeal the following resolution was unanimously carried: "That having heard from Rev. G. P. Storey, who is representing the interests of Newfoundland College in their unfortunate disaster in the destruction of their college buildings, we heartily sympathize with the Methodist people of Newfoundland in their great loss, and pledge ourselves to do all in our power to assist them by collections or otherwise as may be arranged"

FELL 3,000 FEET.

An Acronaut Driven Ten Feet in the Ground-He Was Killed. An Aoronaut Drivon Ten Feet in the Ground-He Was Killed.

St. Paul, Aug. 1.—Five thousand people of Inver Grove, just south of this city, were the horrified spectators Saturday afternoon of a terrible fall to death of Prof. Hobe, the aeronaut. When the balloon reached the usual altitude Hobe could be seen tugging at the valve cord, which would not work. Before he could manipulate it the balloon was at least 3,000 feet above the earth. In the regular way he cut losse the parachute and shot rapidly eurthward, but to the horror of the crowd the parachute did not expand, and the unfortunate aeronaut fell like a shot toward the ground. So great was the force of the fall that he was driven into the soft ground to a depth of ten feet and instantly killed. It required the work of an hour to reach the body, and death had occurred long before.
