[Special to the ADVERTISER.] TORONTO, April 4 .- With the trumpet's blare and boom of guns the formal opening of the new Parliament buildings of the Province of Ontario took place to-day, when the Legislature assembled for busines in the magnificent structure for the first time. The weather was bright and warm adding much to the brilliancy of the cere monies and to the enjoyment derived from the afternoon by the tens of thousands who gathered in every nook of the buildings or craned their necks from points of vantage in neighboring parts of Queen's Park. It was shortly before 3 o'clock when two 9-pounders shortly before 3 o'clock when two 9-pounders of the Toronto Field Battery under Major Joe Mead rumbled up the avenue, their silent gunners sitting with folded arms behind, and took up a position in rear of the buildings. Then came strains of martial music and the glint of steel and the glare of red coats showed that the guard of honor was approaching from where the trees of the avenue almost reached the vanishing point. The guard was composed of 70 men of the Canadian regiment of infantry from the new fort, with the band, Major Buchan was in command, with Capt. Macdougal and Lieut. Fiset. All were in review order. Lieut.-Gov. Kirkpatrick, who wore his Windsor uniform, alighted from his carriage and entered for the first time in his official capacity the new home of the Ontario. Legislature. The Free Library.

To the Editor of the Advertiser:

As there have been so many schemes proposed in regard to the establishment of a free library, and seemingly no satisfactery conclusion arrived at, you will perhaps oblige me by stating my view of the matter.

I, along with many other ratepayers, voted for the bylaw under the impression that the law provided for a certain source of income for it, not to exceed a certain fixed rate out of the annual taxes, and an elected board of management to see to the proper expenditure of the ame. Because anybody can figure it out that with the fixed sum at the disposal of the board they have not the means to carry out any of the proposed schemes, and consequently will have to adopt a course which any prudent body ought to adopt, viz., live within their income. They might either rent a room in the Mechanics' Institute or at any other convenient place, and provide the books and set the thing going as far as their means allow, or perhaps might lay by a little every year until they can build a separate building of their own; but as far as my understanding the matter goes, the City Council has no right to saddle the city with any debenture debt or any other expenditure beyond the limit which the law allows the board of management to spend from year to year. Our correspondent apparently misappre hends the extent of the powers of the Library Board, of which the taxpayers were fully made aware by the ADVERTISER before the vote was taken. After the act is adopted, the council at the request of the Library Board, must levy a special annual rate sufficient to turnish the amount estimated by the Library Board, but not exceeding 1 mill on the dollar upon the assessed value of real estate and personal property. The Council is empowered to issue "free library debentures" at the request of the management, to provide building, books, etc.; but the interest and sinking fund must come out of the ½-mill rate levied. Any expenditure beyond that would be illegal, unless granted by a precial vote of the special vote of the taxpayers. In resouving to provide a library building, the London-Free Library Board has undertaken to keep strictly within the law and to sanction n expenditure that would require a rate

LONDON'S LATEST THRILL

Caused by a Man Who Dives Down 95
Feet Into a Tank of Water.

London's latest thrill is derived from the feat of a man who dives down 95 feet from the roof of the Westminster Aquarium into a narrow and comparatively shallow tank of water set in the floor of the building. The exploit calls for an astounding combination of nerve and skill, and is far more noteworthy than any of the bridge-jumping acts which have been so tirescomely frequent of late years.

The diver is Thomas Burns, who has acquired considerable notoriety as a diver from bridges and as an expert swimmer, and not a little fame from his having saved no fewer than 32 lives during his career. He is a sturdity-built man, some 26 years of age. He has frequently dived from bridges over 100 feet high into rivers, but his dive at the Aquarium is a very different affair. He stands on a tiny platform suspended among the iron girders of the root, 95 feet above the floor, and sees below him, instead of a broad, deep river, a mass of flaring, be wildering lights, a sea of upturned faces, and in the wooden floor of the stage what seems from that height to be a mere slot, the tank which he must surely land in. The tank is eighteen feet long, eight feet wide and seven feet deep. The diver actually dives, takes a header, and does not drop feet foremost, after the manner of the bridge jumpers. The marvelous precision required to land in the tank is easily appreciable, as is also the fate that would be fall him should he miss his mark.

Burns is hoisted up to his aerial perch by means of a rope and pulley. The spectators can barely discen him through that distance of perpendicular space. They see him peer over the platform edge, then they see his toes project over, he crouches down, and then he glides off the platform head foremost, and comes plunging down with stiffly outstretched arms, and hands meeting in front of him in regular "header" fashion. But when little more than half-way down his feet fall over his back toward his head, he turns almost completely over, accompaniment to the dive has voiced itself, he strikes the water with his shoulders and back with a prodiglous thad. He skims just under the surface of the water, seeming barely to enter it, and comes up face upward. He scarcely breathes hard after the tremendous exploit, and goes off immediately to give an exhibition of fancy swimming in another part of the building. The wonderful skill, the superb pluck and the unmistakable element of danger involved in the feat, together with the not remote prospect of a horrible catastrophe, bring crowds to behold this latest sensation.

Cregier for mayor, while the Socialists had for their candidate Henry Ehrenpreis.

Caused by a Man Who Dives Down 95

Feet Into a Tank of Water.

London's latest thrill is derived from the feat of a man who dives down 95 feet from the roof of the Westminster Aquarium into a narrow and comparatively shallow tank of water set in the floor of the building. The exploit calls for an asteunding combination of nerve and skill, and is far more noteworthy than any of the bridge jumping acts which have been so tirescomely frequent of late years.

The diver is Thomas Burns, who has acquired considerable notoriety as a diver from bridges and as an expert swimmer, and not a little tame from his having saved no fewer than 32 lives during his career. He is a sturdily-built man, some 26 years of age. He has frequently dived from bridges over 100 feet high into rivers, but his dive at the Aquarium is a very different affair. He stands on a tiny platform suspended among the iron girders of the root, 95 feet above the floor, and sees below him, instead of a broad, deep river, a mass of flaring, bewildering lights, a sea of upturned faces, and in the wooden floor of the stage what seems from that height to be a mere slot, the tank which he must surely land in. The tank is eighteen feet long, eight feet wide and seven feet deep. The diver actually dives, takes a header, and does not drop feet foremost, after the manner of the bridge jumpers. The marvelous precision required to land in the tank is easily appreciable, as is also the fate that would be fall him should he miss his mark.

Burns is hoisted up to his aerial perch by means of a rope and pulley. The spectators can barely discern him through that distance of perpendicular space. They see him peer over the platform edge, then they see his toes project over, he crouches down, and then he glides off the platform head foremost, and comes plunging down with stiffly outstretched arms, and hands meeting in front of him in regular "header" fashion. But when little more than half-way down his feet fall over his back toward his head, he turns almost completely over, By the breaking of a scaffold on a house being built at Sing Sing, N. Y., on Tues-day, John Applebee, a prominent builder and contractor, was instantly killed, and Thomas Smith, a carpenter, was fatally in-

There can be no doubt that the High Commissioner is a very much disappointed man. He knew that he aided, in a most unwarrantable that something would thereby be done manner, and subsequently to his own of the Canadian Ministers during the election campaign of 1891. He has looked, doubtless, for gratitude and consideration on that score. Hence his demand that the Ottawa Government should insist on its following ratifying the French treaty negotiated by him, and as a conse-quence of which he hoped to be able to obtain further imperial decorations. One cannot wonder, therefore, that Sir Charles told Senator Snowball, who saw him in Paris, that he would resent the action of the Administration in failing to carry the treaty through Parliament. The London Canadian Gazette, which has hitherto been regarded as the Tupperian mouthpiece, takes this view of the question, for it calls for the ratification of the treaty as an absolute necessity to the preservation of the good name of the Government, and it points out that British precedent demands either that the treaty should be ratified, or that the High Cor missioner should resign. HOW TAXES ARE PILED ON.

The complaint made to the ADVERTISER by a city buyer of sewer pipes a few days ago has called forth communications from W. C. Trotter, president of the St. Johns, Que., Sewer Pipe Company, and Mr. J. J. Cassidey, secretary of the Manufacturers' Association (or Red Parlor). Both these gentlemen take exception to the statement that the virtual tax on imported sewer pipes is, as our correspondent informed us, about 100 per cent. on the price demanded by the United States manufacturers, and Mr. Cassidey asserts that "during the last fiscal year the imports of that article into Canada were valued at \$59,064, the duty collected being at the rate of 35 per cent.


We have taken the trouble to make some inquiry into the sewer pipe question, and have discovered that in regard to this com modity, as well as many others, the customs department at Ottawa have means of discriminating against importers, and arbitrarily adding to the tax by declining to assess the duty at invoice prices. We have before us, for example, the latest price list of a leading manufac turer of sewer pipes in the United States. It shows that if the duty on 12-inch United States sewer pipe were only 35 per cent. on cost, as our correspondents contend, it would be 4 37-100 cents per foot. But in order to increase the tax, and thus discourage the trade, and compel Canadians to pay the price demanded by the two manufacturers of the product in Canada, the customs department at Ottawa decree an arbitrary valuation on the import, making the actual duty, at the present date something like 10 41-100 cents per foot. In other words, the trade allows 85 per cent. off list prices and a cash discount of 2 per cent., whilst the rule of the customs authorities is only to allow 65 per

Even if it were correct that the duty is only 35 per cent. on the actual price at the point of production, and it is not, the ADVERTISER would still hold the rate charged to be wholly unwarranted. It is not collected to obtain revenue, for but a mere trifle is raised by the impost, and no one will for a moment contend that it is justifiable to tax the community 35 per cent. for the benefit of a few men. The tax should be reduced by at least one-half, and that at the earliest opportunity; and the customs authorities should cease insisting that the Canadian buyer should be deprived of the benefit that comes to him from buy. ing for cash and in quantities that warrant the seller to give him a good bargain.

LONDON'S LATEST THRILL

Caused by a Man Who Dives Down 95 Feet Into a Tank of Water.

London's latest thrill is derived from the feat of a man who dives down 95 feet from the roof of the Westminster Aquarium into a narrow and comparatively shallow tank of water set in the floor of the building. The exploit calls for an astomating combination of nerve and skill, and is far more noteworthy than any of the bridge-jumping acts which have been so tiresomely frequent of late years.

The diver is Thomas Burns, who has acquired considerable notoriety as a diver from bridges and as an expert swimmer, and not a little fame from his having saved no fewer than 32 lives during his career. He is a sturdily-built man, some 26 years of age. He has frequently dived from bridges over 100 feet high into rivers, but his dive at the Aquarium is a very different affair. He stands on a tiny platform suspended among the iron girders of the root, 95 feet above the floor, and sees below him, instead of a broad, deep river, a mass of flaring, bewildering lights, a sea of upturned faces, and in the wooden floor of the stage what seems from that height to be a mere slot, the tank which he must surely land in. The tank is eighteen feet long, eight feet wide and seven feet deep. The diver actually dives, takes a header, and does not drop feet foremost, after the manner of the bridge jumpers. The marvelous precision required to land in the tank is easily appreciable, as is also the fate that would befall him should he miss his mark.

Burns is hoisted up to his aerial perch by means of a rope and pulley. The spectators can barely discern him through that distance of perpendicular space. They see him peer over the platform edge, then they see his toes project over, he crouches down, and then he glides off the platform head foremost, and comes plunging down with stiffly outstreched arms, and hands meeting in front of him in regular "header" fashion. But when little more than balf-way down his feet fall over his back toward his head, he turns almost completely over, and before the murmur of excitement and horror that is the usual




